MUSTANGS PUMMEL RED DEVILS 44-0

Win Leaves Wheeler Undefeated Going Into District Play Fri.

Wheeler's ever improving Mustangs stopped the threat of the visiting Texhoma Red Devils last Friday night with a big 44-0 win and the Oklahoma's left Nicholson Field wondering what hit them.

The game was probably rated a toss-up in most quarters but the Mustangs, led by Willie Valencia's 109 yards and Benny Baker's four touchdowns, shredded the Red Devils defense for 306 yards on the ground and held Texoma's vaunted speedster, Glen Quimby, to a meager 42 yards in 13 carries.

The Red Devils not only lost the game but also their poise as three of their players, including Quimby, were ejected in the penalty marred contest.

Wheeler put the game away by halftime scoring twice in each of the first two quarters for a commanding 25-0 lead and really showed their dominance by taking the opening kickoff and driving 59 yards for the first TD

with Baker going over from the 15 through a huge hole at left tackle. Mike Evans booted the extra point just four minutes deep into the game.

Texoma couldn't cross the

midfield stripe until the third quarter and this only to the Mustang 46 and they were pushed back by a penalty to halt their only venture into Mustang territory.

A fumble recovery by Ty Henderson at the Red Devil 23 gave the Mustangs an excellent chance for their second touchdown late in the first quarter and

they quickly took advantage of the break.

Baker got a four off the left side and Valencia picked up another 5 at left tackle before going right up the pipe for 14 yards to the end zone. Texhoma blocked Evan's kick.

Another fumble recovery, just 31 seconds shy of the second quarter, this one at the Texhoma 40, gave the Black Machine another break.

Rich Brown spun up the middle for 17 yards on first down and Baker climaxed the 8 play drive when he went over from the 2 and Wheeler had a 19-0 lead at 9:17 to play in the half.

A time consuming drive of 69 yards in 14 plays got Wheeler's fourth touchdown of the half the next time the Mustangs got their hands on the ball.

The scoring march used up six minutes on the clock and Baker carried four straight times from the 18, scoring on a 6 yard jaunt at left tackle. Failing to complete a pass for the two points left the Mustangs with the 25-0 margin as the teams went to the dressing room.

Texhoma went to the airways in the third period but this also proved to be a mistake as Kevin Andis picked off a Larry Thrasher toss at the Red Devil 31 and threaded his way down the sideline and went in at the flag. Evans boot was wide and the Mustangs had blown the game open.

Flags were plentiful after the Mustangs put their fifth TD on the board and Wheeler was in great field position at the Red Devil 48 after much discussion by the officials on the play that Quimby was ejected on.

Three runs by Valencia moved the ball to the 22 and Brown passed to Russell Gaines in the end zone but the apparent touchdown was erased by offsetting penalties as Wilfred Vigil of the Red Devils and Farrell Alexander of the Mustangs were escorted to the sidelines.

The little altercation didn't slow down the Mustangs for long and they hit paydirt five plays later when Baker plunged over from the one. Once again Evans kick was blocked and the score mounted to 37-0 with the fourth quarter to play.

Flags flew on nearly every play in the final 12 minutes but the Mustangs did add another six pointer as every Mustang got into the game.

Losing the ball on downs at the Texhoma 6, Wheeler got it back two plays later when Paul Bentley got the Mustangs fifth fumble recovery of the game at the 4. Henderson picked up 3 on first down before Mike Gallagher got his second touchdown of the year.

The long trip to Texline for the contest against the Tornados will see the heavily favored Mustangs taking their entire squad as the JV does not have a game scheduled this week.

Because of the distance, the kickoff has been moved to 7 P.M. No injuries were sustained in the win over Texhoma and the virus bug seems to have left so the Mustangs should be in great physical shape for the Texline game. Mentally might be another question.

Texline should pose no real big threat to the Mustangs and situations like this can be problems to a coaching staff in preparing for an opponent as Coach Joe Allen knows. "You can't take anyone lightly in this game but I think winning championships is important enough to our kids that they want

let this happen," Allen said.

LEARN NOT TO BURN

By Ken Daughtry - Fire Marshall

Electrical Appliances and Wiring
Before buying appliances for your home, check to see that it bears the UL or AGA label (fire test labels). Inspect older appliances and replace frayed cords and cracked plugs.

Check to see that your home has overload protection, either with circuit breakers or fuses. These are safety valves. If one blows, find the cause and correct it before replacing it.

Does your home have enough electrical outlets? The National Electrical Code recommends an outlet by placed every six feet along the floor line. Extension cords may be convenient, but they are no substitute for permanent wiring. If you must use an extension cord be sure that it is the same size and type cord as the appliance it is used with. Large appliances such as air conditioners and clothes dryers require special outlets.

Never overload an extension

cord. They're not made to handle more than 700 watts.

Don't run wiring under carpeting.

Keep electrical cords away from sources of heat.
