LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Mr. Editor:

I may not be very intelligent, but it doesn't take long to figure that the GTE logo on the cover of their directory stands for "Give Them Eggesta".

Chillicothe Eagles Are 23-0 Victim

Leading by just a slim 3-0 margin at halftime, the Wheeler Mustangs padded their point total to 23 in the second half and continued to blank the visiting Eagles from Chillicothe and won their annual homecoming tilt with a shutout.

Following true to form, the Mustangs certainly didn't have a good homecoming game but several factors besides the hustle and bustle of the activities of homecoming could have had effects.

One, the eagles were a much better foe than a year ago and certainly had the Mustangs weaknesses well scouted and two, the Mustangs blocked poorly which led to self destruction on numerous promising drives.

Although the Mustangs offense sputtered except in a few instances, the defense continued to put the damper on opponents. The black shirted Mustangs held the visitors to a minus 19 yards on the ground and gave up only 5 yards total offense for the game and this is playing well no matter who is on the field.

Russell Gaines put the Mustangs on the scoreboard with 3:13 to play in the first quarter with a 25 yard field goal, his third and the Mustangs fifth of the young season.

Seven times in the first half the Mustangs had the pigskin in Eagle country and had only the field goal to show for their efforts at halftime.

Lost fumbles killed 2 drives when it appeared that the Mustangs were destined to get more points on the board and a couple of the drives just played out and the Mustangs lost the ball on downs.

Wheeler came out in the second half and took the kickoff and promptly marched 63 yards in 5 plays with Benny Baker breaking through his left side

from his tailback spot and churning 49 yards to paydirt. A pass interference penalty on fourth down against the Eagles gave the Mustangs a new lease on life the play before Baker broke it for six points.

Mike Evans booted the extra point and the Mustangs led by 10-0 and this margin was upped as the third quarter was running out.

A short 18 yard drive to the end zone was culminated by a 15 yard scoring toss to Evans from quarterback Rich Brown. The short scoring drive was set up by a fine breaking through his left side

21 yard punt return by Ty Henderson, Mustang safety.

Henderson returned another punt, this one for 11 yards, to put the Mustangs in good field position again midway of the final period.

Moving on the ground from the Eagle 30 to the 17, the Mustangs went to the air on third down and Gaines made a great catch of a Brown pass in the corner of the end zone to close out the scoring for the night at 5:33.

A fumble, the third the Mustangs lost during the game, stopped the Mustangs at the Chillicothe 15 in the final minute.

MUSTANGS GO FOR THIRD WIN OF YEAR SATURDAY

SATURDAY NITE CONTEST IS PHILLIPS HOMECOMING

Breaking from the tradition of Friday night games, the Wheeler Mustangs travel to Phillips Saturday night to take on the Blackhawks at 8 P.M.

The Phillips Blackhawks pose as probably the Mustangs toughest opponent to date as they try to extend their winning streak to three for the year and their thirty third win in their last thirty six games going back to 1976.

Although 0-2, the Blackhawks will be performing before their homecoming fans and having lost just two homecoming games in their history will spur them on if not trying to knock the Mustangs from their lofty perch isn't incentive enough.

It took a punt return for a touchdown in the final minutes for the Canadian Wildcats to defeat Phillips and the Booker Kiowas did a 14-7 tune on them last week. Booker has been picked as one of the teams with the capability of knocking the Mustangs from the district throne room.

The Blackhawks have used four different offensive formations in their two scrimmages and two games to date and Mustang coaches really don't know what the Blackhawks will throw against them although they ran from the tandem I last week against Booker.

"Phillips has a real good club and they are real quick and stunt a lot which has caused us a lot of

trouble so far," Coach Joe Allen said this week. "Skeeter Wilkinson is a big fullback and will certainly test our inside defense," Allen added.

Phillips employs a five man defensive front and a 4-3 defense that is similar to what the Mustangs use.

Wheeler came out of their homecoming win over Chillicothe in good shape and have been working hard this week to overcome mistakes that hurt them offensively against the Eagles.

"We played good defense in our win last week but were real inconsistent on offense. After the game I thought we played terrible on offense but our films showed we did better than I thought but our blocking really stunk up the place at times," Coach Allen commented.

Combustibles

In order for a fire to get started, three elements are needed—air, heat, and fuel. Some common types of fuel are wood, paper, cloth, grease, oily household rags, paint, and other combustibles—including rubbish. If you want a fire safe home, start by getting rid of all the unnecessary items stored in basements, attics and closets. Once you get rid of these things, you can go on to protect those combustibles such as walls, ceilings and furniture that are a part of your everyday life.

Air + Heat + Fuel = Fire!

Smoking and Matches

Fires can start almost anywhere, but they usually start in the busiest areas of the home, the kitchen and the living room, and they are usually caused by carelessness. Smoking and matches are the prime fire starters in homes today. Even if you don't smoke, chances are your friends do and it's a good idea to have plenty of large, deep ashtrays on hand for smokers—and see that they use them! Also, make sure that you empty them before they get too full, and take special care to inspect them before going to bed for the night. Don't empty ashtrays into waste baskets until you are sure that there are no glowing coals remaining.

Make it a rule that no one smokes in bed or even in a chair when they are overtired. Too many people have been burned

to death because they ignored this rule.

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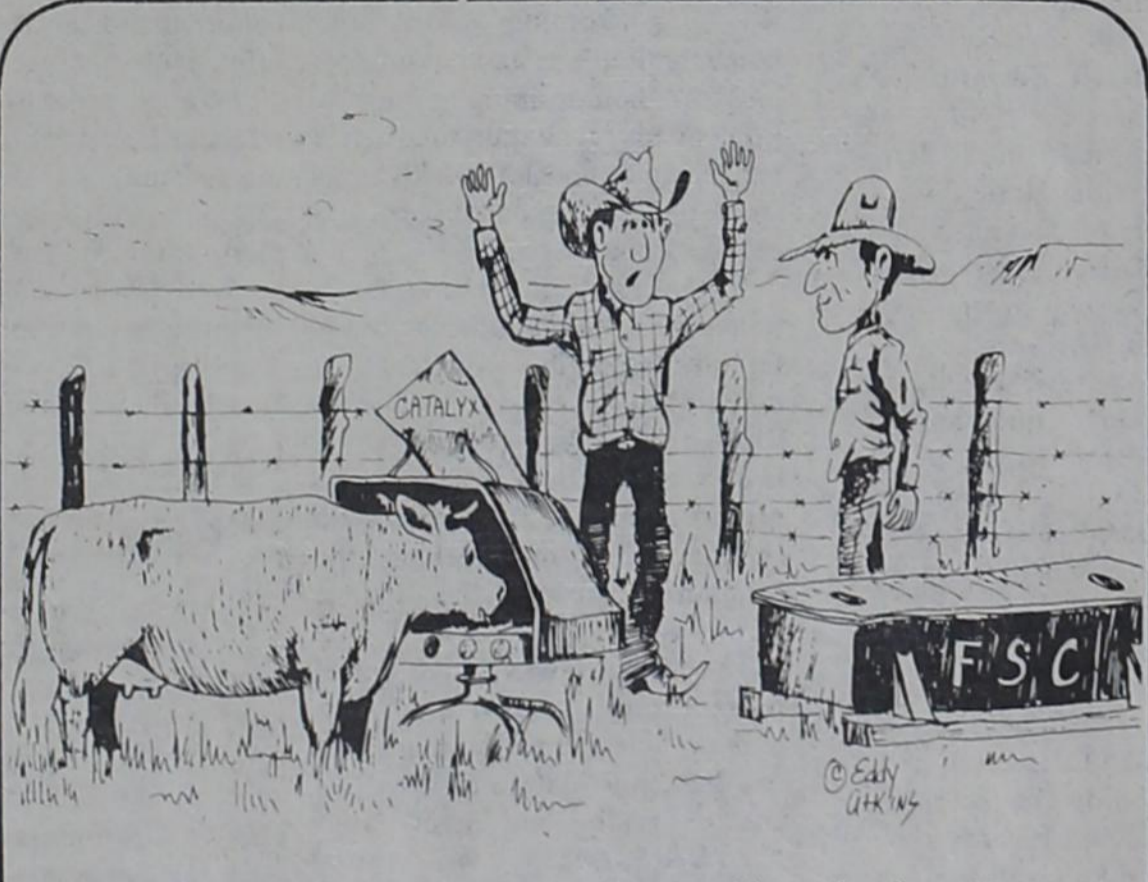

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would: —Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and —Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
 - To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
 - To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
 - To prescribe procedures; and
 - To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars.

All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

Siphoning Gasoline Potentially Deadly

Gasoline poisoning has increased "tenfold" recently, according to Mike Ellis, director of the Texas State Poison Center, and Ellis says the upsurge seems to be directly related to the gasoline shortage in the area.

Ellis says his department is receiving an average of 10 calls a day about gasoline poisoning. "This time last year," he admits, "we were only getting about one call a day for the same thing."

The increased practice of siphoning, Ellis thinks, is a major connection between the rising number of gasoline poisoning cases and the gasoline shortage. He says adults, because of the shortage, are siphoning gas from car to lawn mower, from car to car to other car, and he calls this practice "dumb at the very least."

Gasoline siphoning can cause a person at least two major problems, he says. Ellis says a person can swallow gas while transferring it, and the effects can be serious, even deadly. "Gasoline can go into the stomach," he says, "if the epiglottis slams shut and does not allow it to go into the lungs." In the stomach it will be nauseating and may cause vomiting, he says. "Once it is in the stomach," Ellis says, "it is absorbed, the aromatic hydrocarbons can sensitize the heart to any catecholamine, such as adrenaline.

"What this means," he continues, "is with gasoline in the stomach and the heart sensitized, if a person becomes startled or afraid or experiences any sudden emotion that causes adrenaline release, that adrenaline can potentially cause the heart to go into ventricular fibrillation. That person can be dead in four minutes, unless remedial methods, such as countershock, are performed."

A second potential problem of gasoline siphoning is that of aspiration or getting it into the lungs. "If a person coughs or chokes after sucking on the hose, he may possibly have gotten some of the liquid into his windpipe and a set of new and different problems will occur," Ellis says.

Upon entering the trachea and lungs, the gasoline is quite irritating. "The lung tries to take care of the irritating liquid by diluting it.

The most severe effect of gas aspiration, however, is that the oil-based product physically spreads out and coats the lungs. "Depending on how extensive the coating is," Ellis says, "will determine how much lung tissue is spared. It will determine if life can be maintained." In simple terms, aspiration can mean death.

"Children," Ellis says, "are more likely to aspirate petroleum products than adults." Ellis recently watched two 15-month-old girls, in unrelated cases, die of petroleum distillate aspiration. "We put them on respirators," he recalls, "but only about one-third of their normal body oxygen was getting through.

"Once a child ingests a petroleum product," Willis says, "they're not out of the woods for 18 hours. We don't know whether they're absolutely clean for 18 hours."

Ellis says if gasoline ingestion does occur in the home, the first thing to do is call the Poison Center at 713-765-1420. "If there is a lot of coughing or choking, we'll send the person in for an X-ray to see what the gasoline looks like. If there's no coughing or choking, we'll put the person on an 18-hour watch for fever, coughing, chest congestion or any signs that we may have an aspiration problem.

"Sometimes it may be that we tend to overreact," Ellis says "but we would much rather be safe than sorry."

Music Aptitude Test for Pupils

Students of the fifth grade in Wheeler School were given a Music Aptitude Profile last week to help determine musical talent for students interested in the school beginning instrumental music program. The mean score of tests administered to these students was five points over the national average for students of the same age. Band director Mike Trussell explains the above average scores should be credited to the excellent teaching Wheeler students receive in music in the elementary music program. The elementary music program is taught by Ms. Elizabeth Boring.

Students and parents interested in participating in the new beginner program are urged to attend an organizational meeting on Thursday, Sept. 20 at the high school music room any time from 7:30 until 9:00 P.M. At this time any questions that parents might have concerning the beginner program may be answered on an individual basis.

Band director Mike Trussell would also like to invite the community to contact him if they have any used instruments that might be used by beginners starting in the beginner band. Only used instruments of good quality will be considered for possible purchase by individual members.

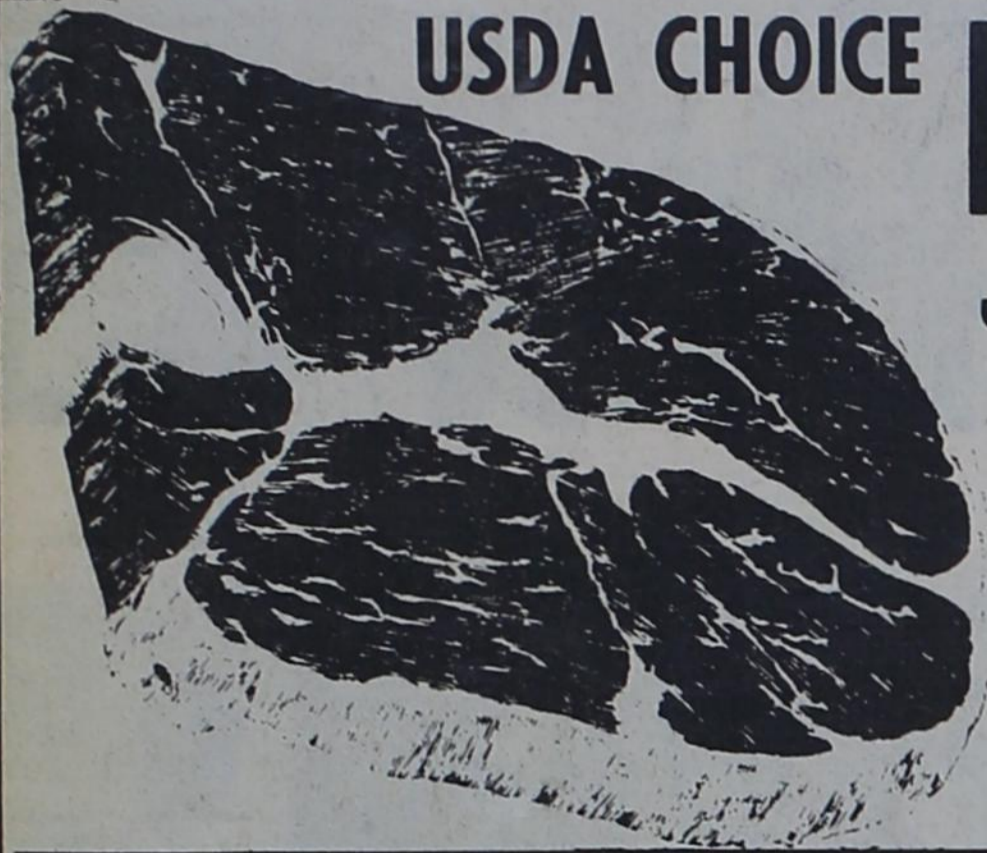

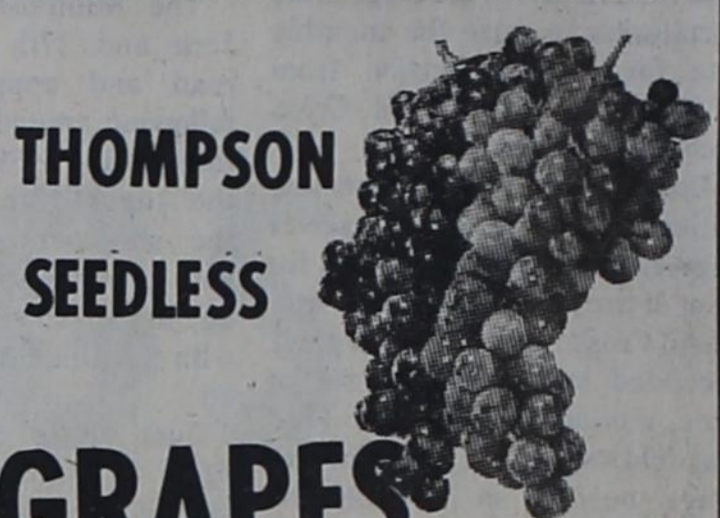
