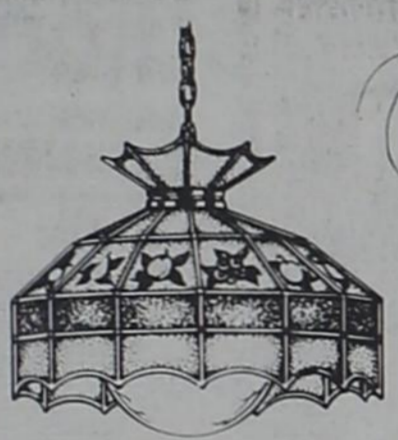

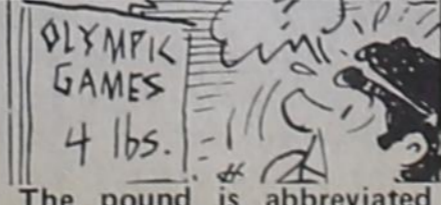

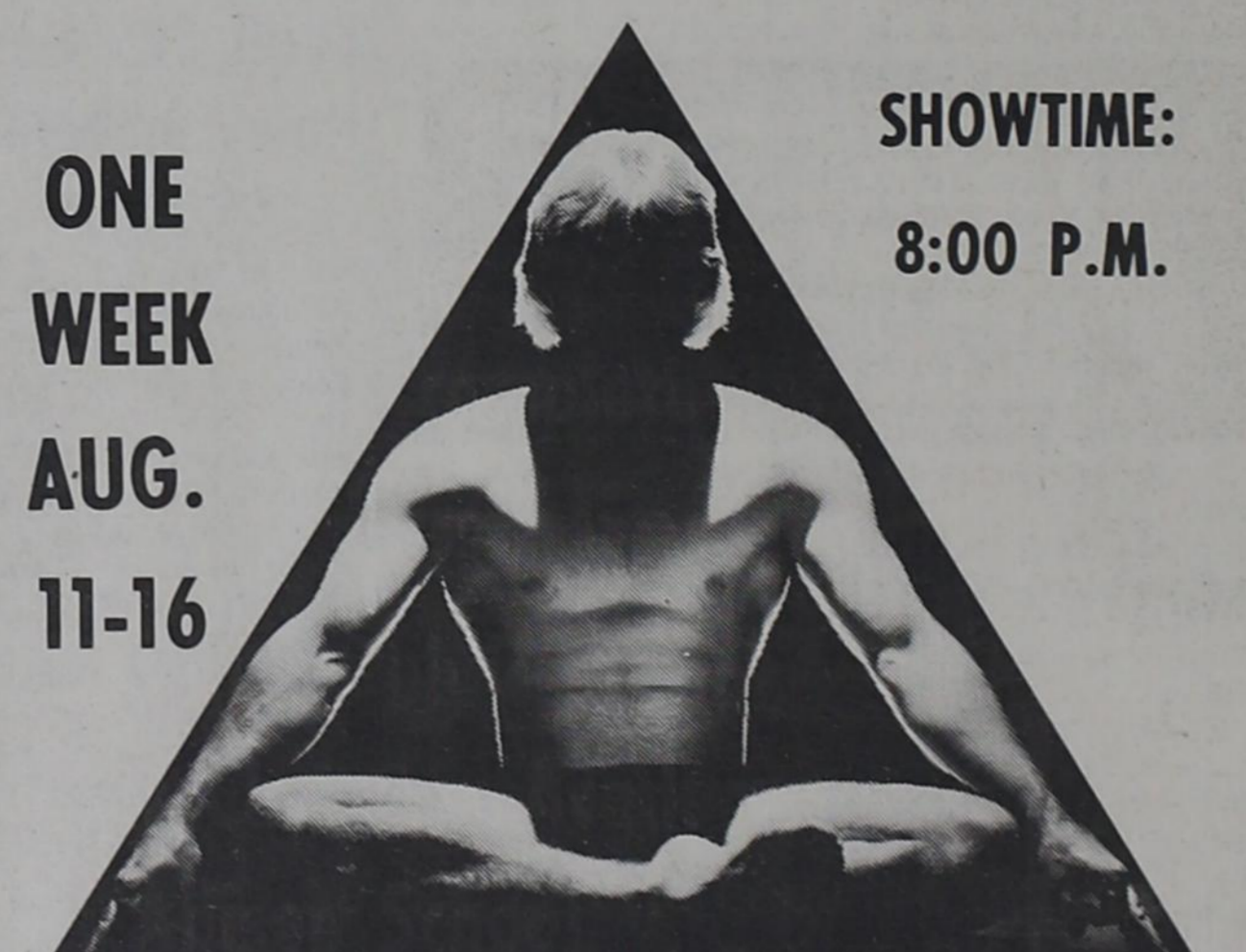

# LINES from LINDA

**FURNITURE ARRANGEMENT**  
Be your own room designer—with two interior-decorating basics.

Determine the traffic patterns first, and then develop zones of activity before placing furniture in a room.

**TRAFFIC PATTERNS**  
Look for the natural line of movement from room to room—and throughout the central space of a room. Because traffic flows along these paths, keep them free of obstacles. Furniture should not force people to squeeze through a space, and it shouldn't hamper free passage along any of the traffic lines.

One exception: Sometimes it's advantageous to block off a traffic path. For example, to create an intimate space within a larger area, you might want to block off a traffic path. Or to gain more flexibility in furniture placement, you might block a path. A room with lots of windows or doors—and limited wall space—might require this. A sofa makes a good traffic "blocker." Place the back of a sofa in the middle of a room to re-direct the flow of traffic around it. The sofa arrests traffic both physically and visually—and serves as a partial room divider.

## BASIC DATA ON CANCER

**What is cancer?**

Cancer is a large group of diseases characterized by uncontrolled growth and spread of abnormal cells. If the spread is not controlled or checked, it results in death. However, many cancers can be cured if detected early and treated promptly.

**How is cancer treated?**

By surgery, X-rays, radioactive substances, chemicals and hormones.

**Has there been any progress against cancer?**

Yes. In the early 1900's few cancer patients had any hope of long-term survival. In the 1930's less than one-in-five were alive at least five years after treatment. In the 1950's it was one-in-four. Now the ratio is one-in-three. The gain from one-in-four to one-in-three currently represents about 64,000 people each year.

**Who gets cancer?**

Cancer strikes at any age. It kills more children 3 to 14 than any other disease. And cancer strikes with increasing frequency with advancing age.

**How many people alive today will ever get cancer?**

Over 55 million Americans now living will eventually have cancer; one-in-four according to present rates. Over the years,

cancer will strike in approximately two of three families. In the 70's, there were an estimated 3.5 million cancer deaths, over 6.5 million new cancer cases, and more than 10 million people under medical care for cancer.

**How many people alive today have ever had cancer?**

There are over 3 million Americans alive today who have a history of cancer, 2 million of them with diagnosis five or more years ago. While some of these 2 million people still have evidence of cancer, most of them can be considered cured.

The decision as to when a patient may be considered cured is one that must be made by the physician after examining the individual patient. For most forms of cancer, five years is the accepted time. However, some patients can be considered cured after one year, others after three years, while some have to be followed much longer than five years.

**How many new cases will there be this year?**

In 1979, about 765,000 people will be diagnosed as having cancer.

**How many people are being saved each year?**

About 255,000 Americans, or about one-third of all people who get cancer this year, will be alive at least five years after treatment.

**Could more people be saved?**

Yes. About 128,000 people with cancer will probably die in 1979 who might have been saved by earlier treatment. Of every six people who get cancer, two will be saved and four will die. (This excludes non-melanoma skin cancer and carcinoma in situ of uterine cervix). But of the four who will die, one might have been saved with earlier diagnosis and prompt treatment. The other three of the four will die of cancer which cannot yet be controlled. Only the results of research can save these patients. This means half of those who get cancer could and should be saved. Thus, the immediate goal of cancer control in this country is saving 383,000 lives, or half of those who get cancer each year.

Planning a room with traffic patterns in mind will automatically create sectioned off areas—to divide each room into zones. In a living room, the largest zone is often the best place for a major

conversation grouping of furniture. Then the smaller zones might be ideal for reading chair with an ottoman, a desk or a game table. Once you've marked off "activity zones" in each

room, you're ready to arrange furniture within each zone. Situate the largest pieces of furniture first. This might be a sofa, piano, armoire or a store wall. Then arrange the smaller items around the large ones. For example, you might put an occasional chair near the sofa—with the necessary table between them. Avoid lining up furniture against the sides of a room. For the most imaginative arrangements, place furniture in the room's center. Here's one way to do that: let two loveseats face each other in front of the fireplace. This kind of "central furniture arrangement" creates psychological space, giving a room the quality of lightness or airiness and making it seem larger.

**HOW TO GROUP ITEMS**

Place furniture in logical groupings. Let small, separate groups of furniture create small informal areas within the room. In doing seating areas, provide plenty of surfaces for setting things—glasses, ashtrays, magazines and books. Give lounge chairs an ottoman, a reading light and a table.

**MIX 'TALL, SHORT' ITEMS**

Alternate between tall and short furniture. Avoid placing too-tall objects side by side. Instead, put a horizontal piece (a shorter wide item) between two tall pieces.

For instance, don't put a grandfather clock next to a tall armoire—that will make them compete for attention. Rather, place a loveseat or chair between the two—even leave blank wall space between them.

**MIX WOOD, UPHOLSTERED**  
Plan a half-and-half mix of upholstered and wood furniture. This decorator's trick lets you keep the scheme in balance. Separate upholstered furniture from each other with wood tables or chests, for example. This kind of mix allows the upholstered pieces to give the room softness, while the wood pieces provide architectural solidity.
