Could more people be saved? Yes. About 128,000 people with cancer will probably die in 1979 who might have been saved by earlier treatment. Of every six people who get cancer, two will be saved and four will die. (This excludes non-melanoma skin cancer and carcinoma in situ of uterine cervix). But of the four who will die, one might have been saved with earlier diagnosis and prompt treatment. The other three of the four will die of cancer which cannot vet be controlled. Only the results of research can save these patients. This means half of those who get cancer could and should be saved. Thus, the immediate goal of cancer control in this country is saving 383,000 lives, or half of those who get cancer each year.



## 1979-80 Hunting Guide Is Out

The new Guide to 1979-1980 Texas Hunting and Sport Fishing Regulations will be available Friday, August 10 at license vendors and P&WD offices across the state.

The 24-page guide for sportsmen will contain a summary on various licenses, permits and tags, fur-bearing animals, protected and endangered species, lake regulations, general saltwater sport fishing regulations, and general hunting and freshwater sport fishing regulations.

Each of the 254 counties across Texas are listed alphabetically with the various hunting dates and fishing rules affecting the sportsman in each county.

The counties are also listed as being either regulatory (governed by P&WD regulations established by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission) or nonregulatory (Governed by general law or special statute both established by legislative action).

Each county is also designated by a number and letter so it can be located on the state map in the centerfold of the guide.

P&WD regional and district law enforcement offices are listed on the back cover for sportsmen to visit or call information or to report a game, fish, or water safety violation.

Included on the back cover is a pictoral guide showing the white bass, striped bass, and the hybrid bass. These fish have become so popular and numerous in Texas that most anglers now have a chance at catching one or more of the three species.

Hunters will note that quail bag and possession limits are not included in this guide. These regulations will be set at a later date after the current population of birds are determined by the P&WD.

Regulations for migratory game birds are also scheduled to be set by P&W Commission action later in August and are not contained in this guide. These regulations will appear in a separate guide.
