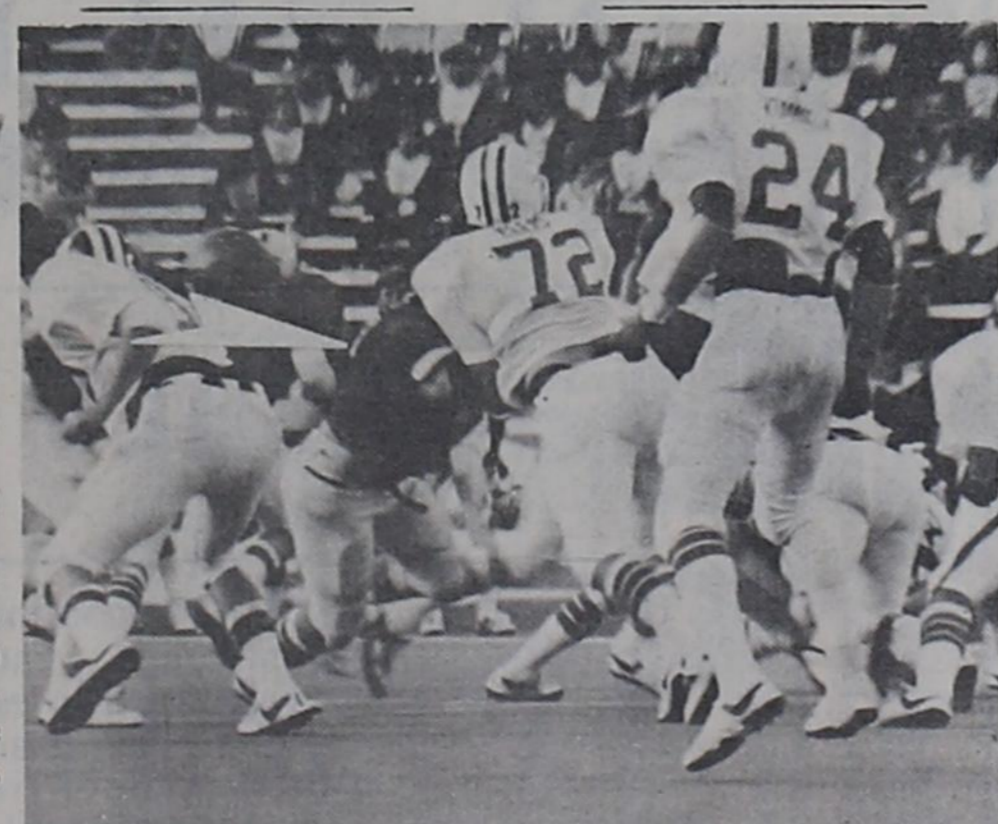
Local Firemen Train At A&M

Three local firemen, Ken Daughtry, Gary Davis, and Kevin Frankenbery, attended the 50th Annual Texas Firemen's Training School, held at Texas A&M University, July 22nd thru 27th. Courses taken were: Ken Daughtry, Fire Prevention II, Gary Davis, Fire Fighting II, Kevin Frankenbery, Fire Fighting I. These completed courses reduce the city "Key Rate" by five percent; thereby reducing Wheeler residential fire insurance premiums by the same five percent.

Your Fire Department strives to stay abreast of any improvements in fire suppression and prevention techniques. An instructor at fire school states, "There are two kinds of firemen, Professional Paid Firement and Professional Volunteer Firemen, there is no difference. Both are required to have the same skill and knowledge of fire suppression."

Volunteer Fire suppression is inherently less expensive than the alternative - a Paid Department. In the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department, no individual receives any financial reimbursement, all monies received by the department (including Donations) are used for the purchase of needed equipment or repairs of presently operating fire apparatus.

The principal goals of WVFD are preservation of life and property. With the moral and financial support of Wheeler Citizens we will hold losses to a minimum.

LANCASTER DEPARTMENT STORE SELLS, HILLS NEW OWNERS

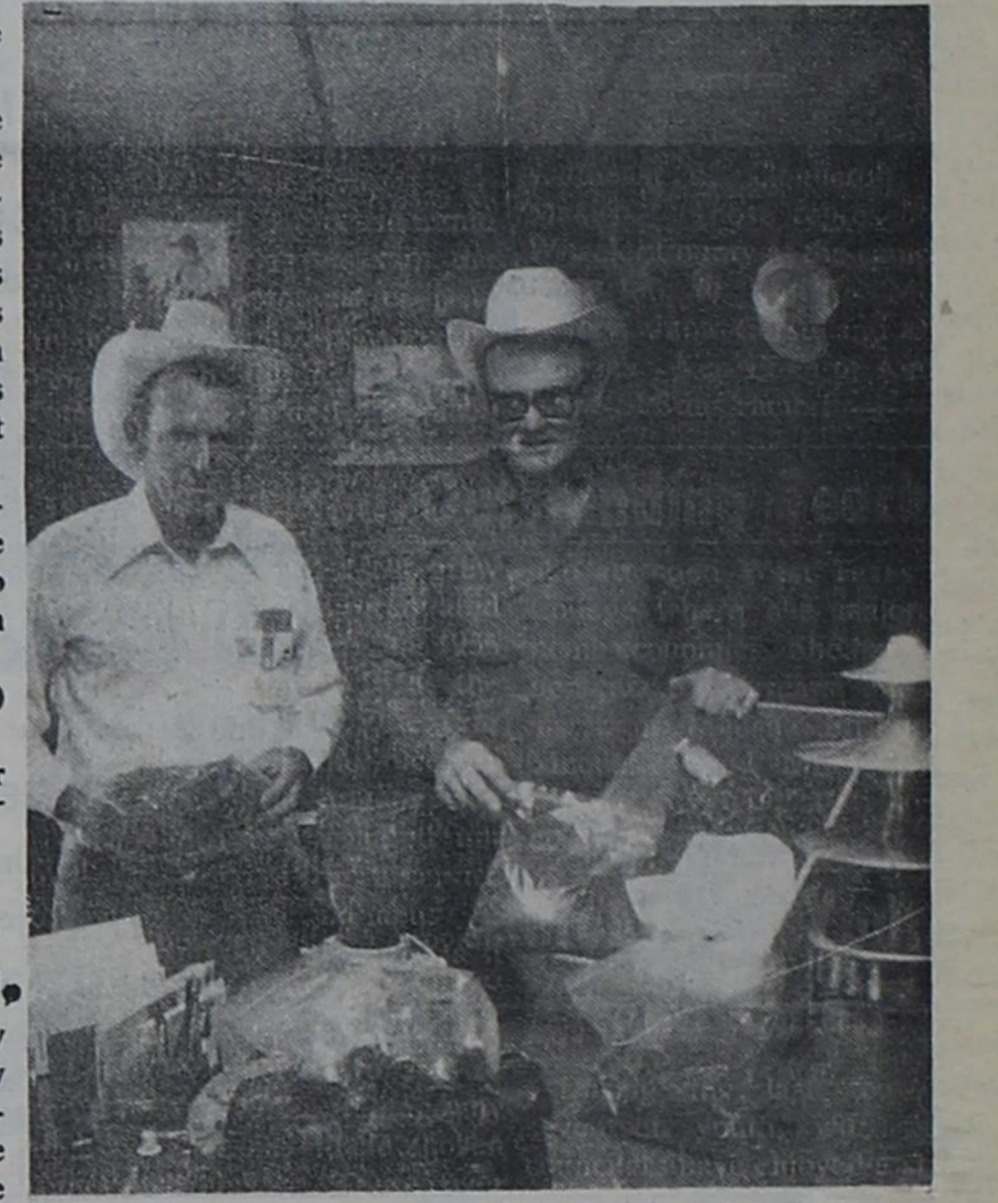

For peak flavor, the cantaloupe should be well netted. The netting is the raised, grey-brown pattern over the surface that stands out above the green or yellow skin color. The best-eating melons have high, raised netting over some part of the surface. And, it will not have large areas that are "slick" without any netting—except for the side that lay on the ground. You may also see "stripes" of green or yellow—or in riper melons, even stripes of a brownish color.

SLIP

Look for a "full slip." This is a circular scar where the stem was detached when the ripe melon was picked. A stem scar that retains part of the stem or has been gouged out of the melon indicates that the melon was not ripe when picked from the vine.

COLOR

A cantaloupe is usually at its tastiest when the skin color is yellow or turning yellow. Green color on a well-netted melon with full slip indicates that the melon is not ready to eat.

FIRMNESS

To check for firmness, squeeze the melon gently. You may need to use both hands to keep from bruising it. If it yields a little, it is ripe. But avoid a really soft melon or one with large, soft bruises.

AROMA

Aroma may or may not be present. If it is present, and in combination with the other points for good cantaloupe eating, you can expect a tasty melon.

STORAGE

Store cantaloupes in the refrigerator in a closed plastic bag or container. The melon's odor is taken up by other foods if not stored in a closed container during refrigeration storage.

FREEZING

You may wish to freeze a few melon balls for later use while they are in peak season and at their lowest price. Use only top-quality fruit. Cut into cubes or melon balls. Cover with a cold sugar syrup using two cups sugar to four cups water or pack in bags with no sugar. Expel as much air as possible from the bag, seal and freeze immediately.

When using frozen melon balls, serve them partially thawed, especially those frozen with-

out sugar. Melon frozen in sugar syrup will maintain texture better and stay firmer after thawing.

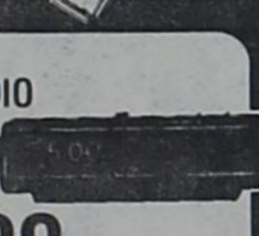

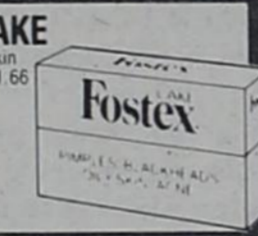

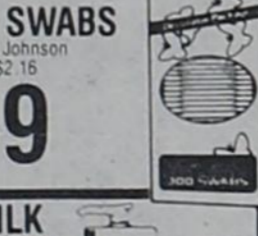

CANNING GREENS

Greens growers "can can" them—in April, harvest month for Texas greens.

Be sure to use a pressure canner, though.

Greens and all other acid vegetables must be processed in a pressure canner according to directions given in a recommended canning bulletin.

Contact the local county Extension agent (home economics) for a copy of B-194, Canning—Fruits and Vegetables."

Suitable canning greens found in Texas include mustard, tender greens, turnip tops, spinach, Swiss chard, kale and some wild greens.

Here are a few guidelines to follow when canning Texas greens:

- Wash all standard mason jars in hot, soapy water and rinse well. Jars need not be sterilized when canning in the pressure

remove the screwband. The jar lids make a popping sound when they are sealed.

- Label the greens. Store in a cool, dry place for later use. These greens will maintain high quality for up to a year.
- When serving any home canned vegetables always boil them 10 minutes for pints or 15 minutes for quarts.

This is recommended to destroy botulism toxin if present.

Shoplifting Cost Stores, customers.
 Shoplifters cost not only a store but all of its customers as well.

Crime Tax
 From three to fifteen percent of the cost of goods supports shoplifters. This "crime tax" is the cost passed on to consumers by stores for money lost directly due to expensive security measures used to combat shoplifters.

Arrest Rate
 About one out of ten customers is a shoplifter. Unfortunately, only one out of thirty-five shoplifters is arrested.

Who Shoplifts?
 Who are these shoplifters? Some stores report that juveniles make up about half of their shoplifters. Others say the median age is around twenty. Equal numbers of males and females steal. All occupations and income groups are represented in shoplifting numbers.

Combat
 Retailers use various techniques to combat shoplifting numbers. Many stores station uniformed guards at exits and strategic points, and most large department stores employ plain-clothed security officers. Two-way mirrors, closed circuit television and surveillance post built into the decor are effective in detecting shoplifters. Some stores use sensitized tags on merchandise that sound alarms if not properly removed by sales clerks.

Report Shoplifting
 Customers who observe persons shoplifting should report them to the store personnel, and remember, any unreported cases may only encourage the shoplifter to continue stealing.

Home Security for Vacationers
 Nine "safe home" precautions can make vacations less worrisome.

The following guidelines will help make a home as safe as possible:

- Ask a neighbor or apartment manager to watch your home while you're away.
- Tell the police if you plan to be away several weeks. Some Police departments will patrol homes for vacationers. Tell the Police who you expect to be in your home during the vacation—and give them departure and return dates.
- Leave several low-wattage lights on, or connect them to a timer so they are only on for the evening hours.
- Also, a radio that's on can be a deterrent.
- Stop delivery on mail and newspapers.
- Arrange to have the lawn mowed—if the vacation is longer than a week.
- Check locks on all outside doors and replace unsafe ones with a dead bolt lock. Ask a locksmith for specific information.
- Be careful about telling strangers or casual acquaintances that you'll be away.
- Inventory your possessions and have all household valuables engraved with your social security or driver's license number.
- Ask the police about borrowing an engraver.
- Consider installing a burglar alarm system.
- A wide range of devices and prices are available, so compare them to find the one that really suits your needs.

Close and process the greens in the pressure canner or saucepan under only 10 pounds pressure. Pressure pint jars in the pressure canner for 70 minutes and in the pressure saucepan for 90 minutes. Process quart jars in pressure canner for 90 minutes. The saucepan time is more because of its size. The rate of heat loss is more rapid in the smaller pan.

After processing is completed, be sure to let the pressure return to zero before removing the lid. Let the jars remain about five minutes. Remove and put on rack to cool. Do not tighten the two piece lid. When jars are cooled completely and sealed,

C.E.T.A. Contract Considered
Commissioner Henderson made a motion that was seconded by Commissioner Atherton to execute the following agreement: Motion carried.

An Agreement Between the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and Local Units of Government in the Panhandle of Texas for the Establishment of a Consortium and Comprehensive Employment and Training Program.

THIS AGREEMENT establishes a consortium of local units of government for the purpose of administering a comprehensive employment and training program under the comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) of 1973 (PL 93-203) as amended, in the Panhandle of Texas.

WITNESSETH:
WHEREAS, unemployment and underemployment are serious and persistent conditions which affect local well-being and economic growth; and

WHEREAS, employment and training programs to overcome these conditions should be planned and implemented on an economically-integrated labor market areawide basis; and

WHEREAS, the 93rd Congress enacted the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) of 1973 repealing Parts A, B, and E of Title I of the economic Opportunity Act of 1962; and

WHEREAS, the City of Amarillo as an eligible prime sponsor,

qualifying under Section 102 (a) (2) of the Act has designated the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission as the entity for the administration of the Act, for the purpose of forming a consortium consisting of the City of Amarillo and twenty-five economically-integrated counties in the Texas Panhandle to provide job training and employment opportunities for the economically disadvantaged, unemployed and underemployed persons; and

WHEREAS, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission has been established under Article 1001m of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended and has been serving as the employment and training planning agency for Region I with an organized Employment and Training Area Planning Council; and

WHEREAS, this Agreement provides a central mechanism for the administration of CETA throughout the Panhandle regions and complies with article 4413 (32c), Interlocal Cooperation Act of Texas;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of these premises, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and local units of government signatory hereto, and acting pursuant to constitutional, statutory, or implied powers, do agree as follows:

1. To form a consortium consisting of the City of Amarillo (Population over 100,000) and all signatories of local governments attached hereto which shall act as the prime sponsor, for the purpose of planning and administering a comprehensive employment and training program under CETA, to serve the economically disadvantaged, unemployed and underemployed persons.

2. That State and local law permits services under this consortium agreement to be provided within the entire geographical area covered by the agreement.

3. That each party signatory to the agreement has the legal authority under State or local law to enter into a consortium arrangement as verified by each unit's chief legal officer. (Verification attached)

4. To promote and accept the responsibility for the successful planning and operation of any and CETA programs operated in the local government's jurisdiction and all programs operated in Region I, (population 319,842) and to reserve the right to plan programs, evaluate any employment and training programs operating within its jurisdiction and to make recommendation concerning the need for programs, reallocation of program funds, or to disapprove any program not meeting the jurisdictional needs.

5. That any and all funds received under CETA shall be utilized as prescribed by the rules, regulations and guidelines of CETA, and that all grant agreements shall be reviewed and approved prior to submittal for funding and signed by the chief executive officer of the administering agency.

6. That the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission is charged as the administrative agency with the following functions and responsibilities;

a. To develop procedures for program planning, operation and assessment, insuring that all members of the consortium are presented the opportunity to express their recommendations and participate in the decision-making process.

b. To establish an Employment and Training Area Planning Council meeting the guidelines of CETA for the purpose of developing an annual employment and training plan, advising consortium governments and the administering agency of the types of programs and funding levels needed to effectively serve the disadvantaged, unemployed and underemployed, and to assess and evaluate on-going programs.

c. To modify grants, receive and expend funds, and to enter into contracts and subgrants for the operation of programs.

d. To employ, organize and train staff for the effective administration of the program.

e. To establish adequate administrative and fiscal procedures.

Atherton made a motion that was seconded by Commissioner Harrison.

7. That this agreement shall be effective upon the date of its ratification by ordinance minute order, resolution or other appropriate signification of assent by the parties hereto as shown by a certified copy of said ordinance, minute order, resolution or signification of assent under the

hand of the clerk or secretary of any signatory party.

Resolution Authorizing the County of Wheeler to Become a Member of the Texas Panhandle Employment and Training Alliance: Designating the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission as the Administrative Unit for Such Program; and Endorsing the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act Delivery System for Fiscal Year 1980.

DANGER IN BACK YARD

Just as the kitchen is the most dangerous room in the house, the backyard is potentially dangerous for the family dog, says the Gaines Dog Research Center.

While a dog isn't as likely to have an accident in the back yard as a human is in the kitchen, chances are good in many parts of the country that mosquitoes will be in the back yard—and more than 60 species of mosquitoes are known carriers of canine heartworm.

Heartworm is a killer to be feared by all dog owners, states Dr. George W. Mather, Veterinary Consultant to the Center.

"When a mosquito bites an infected dog, it draws blood containing larvae called microfilariae. In warm climates, these larvae undergo changes in the mosquito for 10 to 14 days and then are transmitted to a vulnerable dog when the mosquito draws blood. The infective

larvae migrate from the skin around the wound into the bloodstream and then normally take six to seven months to become adult heartworms," Dr. Mather declares.

"The adults usually cluster in the dog's heart and pulmonary artery, where they can block the flow of blood to the lungs and interfere with heart-valve action."

One veterinary survey of 543 dogs showed that yard dogs had an average infection rate of 63.3 per cent, while house dogs had 12.3 per cent. Another survey of 630 dogs listed mixed breeds (114) as most often infected, followed by German Shepherd Dogs (87), Pointers (84), Irish Setters (31), English Setters (27), Retrievers (26) and Beagles (23). The breeds are primarily outdoor dogs. House dogs had fewer cases.

What can dog owners do? The Gaines Dog Research Center recommends an immediate veterinary checkup. A blood test can determine if heartworms are already present. If they are, the veterinarian can prescribe treatment. If the dog is free of heartworms, very effective preventive medication—orally administered—is available and should be given according to the veterinarian's instructions.

The American Angus Association, with some 38,000 active life and junior members, is the largest beef cattle registry association in the world. Its computerized records include detailed information on nearly 10 million registered Angus.

The Association records ancestral information and keeps records of production on individual animals for its members. These permanent records help members select and mate the best animals in their herds to produce high quality, efficient breeding cattle which are then recorded with the American Angus Association. Most of these registered Angus are used by the U.S. farmers and ranchers who raise high quality beef for U.S. consumption.

Duck Hunting Prospects Good

A recent aerial count of the waterfowl breeding populations of ducks in the prairie "Pothole" country in the Dakotas, Montana and Canada by personnel of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service indicate an overall increase this summer.

A 10-to-15 percent increase over last year has been observed with much improved habitat conditions. Many of the ducks are finding ponds with good food supplies and residual nesting cover.

Breeding populations of mallards and pintails are up about 10 percent over last year, and blue-winged teal are up 20 percent according to the report.

This region of central North America furnishes most of the ducks that migrate through Texas each fall.

The U.S. Post offices in Texas now have the federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation stamp required of all persons 16 years of age and older who participate in a duck or goose hunt.

The \$7.50 stamp helps create funds for waterfowl habitat acquisitions and restoration in the U.S. The stamp became a requirement in 1934 and is also purchased by non-hunters as well as stamp collectors each year to aid in conservation work.

North Plains Electric Gets Loan

Vesta Orr, General Manager of North Plains Electric Cooperative Inc. announced a \$6,117,800 loan approval from the Rural Electrification Administration.

Mr. Orr stated that this loan will be at a low interest rate and will be for a two year work plan. This work plan will include service for 500 additional consumers, 203.5 miles of distribution line including conversions, 23 miles of 69KV transmission line, 28 miles of 115KV transmission line, and a 115/79KV interchange. Also, one new substation and the relocating of an existing substation, additional headquarters facilities and the remodeling of the existing building. This loan will also finance miscellaneous distribution equipment and various system improvements.

SPS Receives Grant To Study Solar Power

Berl Springer, president and chief operating officer of Southwestern Public Service Company, has announced that the Department of Energy (DOE) has awarded a grant of approximately \$500 thousand to the General Electric Company and Southwestern Public Service Company to study the feasibility of repowering on of Southwestern's generating units with a solar system.

"This would be one of the largest solar projects in the United States," Springer said. "The grant will fund an engineering study for repowering our No. 3 generating unit at Plant X, near Earth, Texas."

The proposed solar system would utilize a liquid metalcooled central receiver to repower the 100,000 kilowatt gas-fired unit at Plant X and would be designed to supply 60% of the thermal energy required for the full output of the generating unit.

The solar portion of the system consists of a surround field of glass, unenclosed heliostats reflecting the solar insolation to a tower-mounted cylindrical receiver. The receiver is cooled by liquid sodium with the flow rate through each receiver panel controlled by individual electromagnetic pumps, so that a constant outlet temperature can be maintained.

The impact on the existing plant is limited to piping tie-ins and controls modifications. Minimum intrusion into existing plant operating requirements and capabilities have been a

Act Now To Save Pecan Trees

Homeowners and orchardists with pecan trees need to take action in the next few days to combat a problem which annually plagues them about this time of year, causing a loss of the pecans.

"Every year in late August, there are complaints that full size pecans are turning black and dropping off the trees," said Dr. Robert W. Berry, area plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "The nut is filled with a dark liquid having a very bad odor."

The problem is stem and blight, sometimes called sticky shuck. And now — the end of July — is the time to combat it, Berry said.

The problem is treated by a fungicide program starting when the nut is reaching this susceptible "water embryo" stage, Berry said. The fungicide to use is benomyl, which is marketed under such trade names as "Benlate," "Greenlight Systematic Fungicide," and "Fertimom Systematic Fungicide," he said.

Three applications, one every seven days, is needed, the plant pathologist said. The first should be made about July 25-28, when the pecan is full of liquid; the second about August 1-3, and the final application should be made about August 8-10. Berry cautioned users carefully to follow the manufacturer's directions on the label of the brand of fungicide being used.

Prairie Chicken Population Varies

The combined census of lesser prairie chicken breeding populations on their natural habitat in the Texas Panhandle and Permian Basin regions indicate a slight increase of only one percent according to a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department spokesman.

"The Permian Basin (South Plains) chicken population shows the greatest gain of 26 percent over 1978," said David Sierra, wildlife technician.

"The Panhandle populations of birds, however, show a downward trend of 4.4 percent for the same period," Sierra continued.

The severe winter conditions and less than ideal nesting conditions in 1978 appear to be responsible for the decline.

Good nesting conditions are being reported this year and a rise in the chicken populations is predicted.

The annual Texas lesser prairie chicken season has been set for Oct. 20 and 21.

The overall concept of the solar system represents a highly flexible system that would allow the Plant X unit to operate on solar and gas at the same time or on gas or solar alone. The concept is based on the General Electric Alternate Central Receiver Program solar plant design and will benefit from its past and future engineering experience.

It is expected that contracts for the feasibility study will be signed about September 1 and the project completed in approximately 12 months.

"We at SPS are very excited at the prospects of working with General Electric on this project and we feel that this could very well be the break-through we have been waiting for as an alternate source of energy," Springer concluded.

Start Early To Find Hunting Area

The Texas sportsman that finds good places to hunt each year starts the search in the summer as nearly all of the private hunting areas are spoken for on the opening day of season.

Hunters know it is impossible to pull off the road and hunt without first getting permission from the owner. Nearly all of Texas is owned and operated by private enterprise with the exception of some federal and state lands scattered across the state.

If the hunter fails to get permission to hunt and goes onto private property to pursue game, chances are excellent that the irate landowner will call the local game warden or county sheriff to file trespass charges against the hunter.

Finding a new place to hunt takes both time and luck. Many sportsmen spend as much time locating the landowner and getting permission to hunt as they spend in the field enjoying the hunt.

Many areas of northwest Texas are not inhabited and a sportsman can drive for hours through good hunting country without seeing anyone to ask for permission or who owns the land.

Summertime will find most landowners cultivating crops or working livestock on their property making it more convenient for the hunter to talk about hunting opportunities on their land.

Many landowners do not allow any type of hunting on their property due to bad experiences from past hunters. A few landowners will allow hunting for certain species such as ducks, geese, cranes, doves, and pheasants. However, most property owners are protective of their quail, turkeys and deer with family members or friends allowed to hunt these popular Texas species.

There are an increasing number of Texas landowners turning to lease hunting in northwest Texas. These landowners now look upon wildlife on their property as a cash crop comparable with grain and livestock. These landowners charge the hunter a fee to hunt for a day or season.

Normally, a hunting lease agreement is reached between the landowner and the hunter spelling out what species can be hunted on what property and how many hunters can participate in the hunt.

These important items should be written down prior to the hunt to eliminate a misunderstanding later in the season.

If you are looking for a place to hunt, the most logical place to start will be the game warden, soil conservation office, chamber of commerce or hunting shooting club in that county. These people will either know of places to hunt or who to contact for permission to hunt.

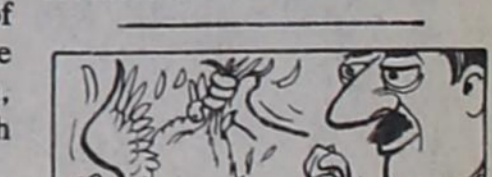
Infant Buried
