Standing Grass For The Winter
 How to have plenty of standing grass during the winter is an important question to be answered by stockmen. This is a good time of year to be planning for standing forage for this winter. If we wait to the end of the grazing season it is to late. We are stuck with what we have at that time.
 A system of rotation grazing best answers this need. This type system also is the best for the health of the grass plants. There are many different types of systems but all allow for rest during the growing season. This allows the stockmen to go into the winter with some pastures that have not been grazed that growing season.
 These systems depend on a number of things, such as number and size of pastures, kind of grasses and water. These things must be looked at and some adjusted before the system can be started. These systems generally mean greater production and usually more cattle than before.
 The Wheeler Soil Conservation Service assisting the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District are willing to assist in any problems related to

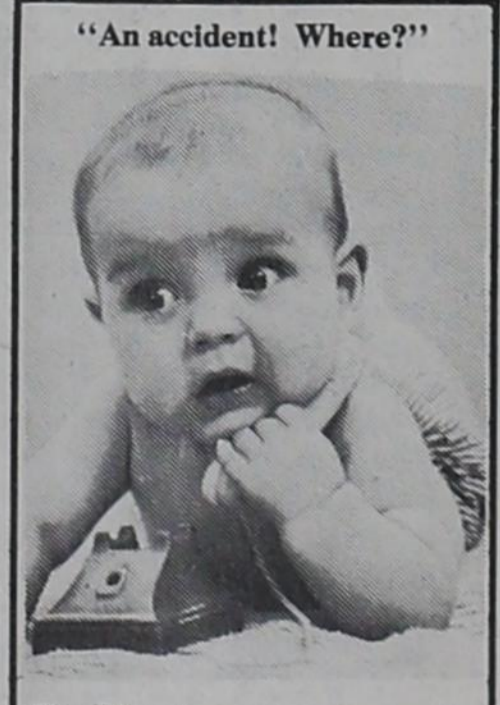



LEARN TO READ YOUR ELECTRIC METER AND SAVE!!!




It will let you determine how many kilowatt hours you use in a given period of time... an hour, a day, a month or a year. That's how electricity is measured — by kilowatt hours (kwh) used.



Your residential electric meter will have either 4 or 5 dials. Electric meters are easily read from right to left as you look at the meter. If the pointer on a dial is between two numbers, write down the smaller number. When the pointer is directly on a number such as one (1) (see center dial above) then read it as 1. If the pointer on the next dial immediately to the right has passed zero (0), however, read it as zero (0) if the pointer on that dial to the right has not reached zero. The dials above read (from left to right) 9-3-1-1-5. If, however, the pointer on the second dial from the right above was between 9 and zero then the center dial would read as a zero.

Now let's read the same meter 24 hours later



The later reading is 9-3-1-3-8. Subtracting the first reading 9-3-1-1-5 from the new reading of 9-3-1-3-8 — the answer is 23. Thus you would have used 23 kilowatt hours in the 24 hour period. Each kwh costs approximately five cents.

When you learn to read your electric meter, you will be able to see where your energy dollars go... then learn to use energy wisely & save!

WHEELER PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

REEL LOWDOWN ON FILMS
What is the "reel lowdown" on how to obtain 16mm films in this area of the world?
Well, you could buy them. You could rent them. Or... you could borrow them through your own local public library.

More than one thousand films are available to users of the Wheeler Public Library. The films are housed in the Amarillo Public Library and sent to public libraries in the Panhandle as a service of the Texas Panhandle Library System. The service is free of any charge of library users except for the return postage back to Amarillo.

How can you best make use of this service?
Suppose you are charged with arranging a program and you want to show a film. First of all, begin planning early. Over 250 films a month are borrowed by persons outside Amarillo alone, so the chances that you'll be able to get the film(s) you want are higher the earlier you put in your request.

Talk with the librarian and explain what you'd like to do. She will be able going to charge admission to see them. You must also provide an experienced operator to run the projector.

The Wheeler Public Library has a copy of the Amarillo Public Library's film catalog. Browse through it and note down the film(s) you'd like to receive. It's a good idea to choose a couple of alternates in case your first choice isn't available on the date your program is planned.

The librarian will contact the Amarillo library and make the request for you. In about a week, the library will let you know what film has been reserved and when you can pick it up.

After you've shown the film, return it to the library promptly, pay the return postage costs, and the librarian will send it back to Amarillo.

Remember that this service is available only through your local library. If you go to Amarillo and try to borrow films, you will have to pay a \$3.00 per film non-resident fee.

This film program is only one of the many services that the Wheeler Public Library, as a member of the Texas Panhandle Library System, provides people in your community. Libraries are a lot more than they used to be... if you don't believe it, just go to 306 South Canadian and check it out!

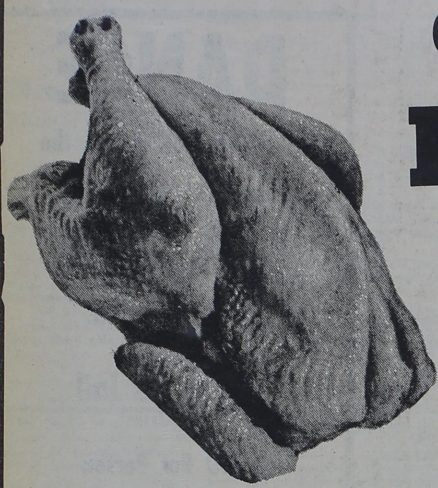
