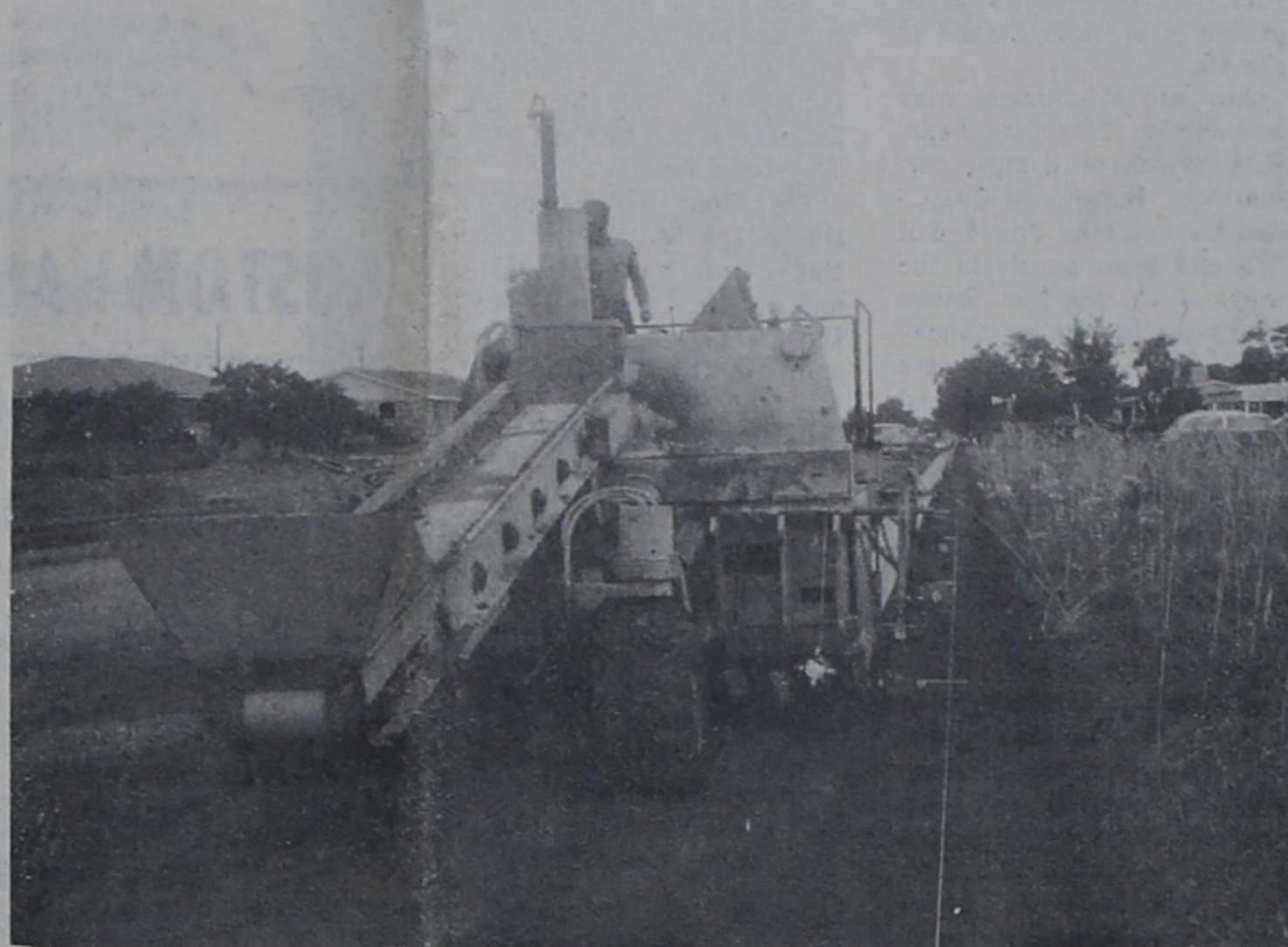
The cafe, located just east of the cross roads signal light on highway 152, is owned and operated by Sandra Randolph of Mobeetie.

A museum specialist, Ed Benz, of Canyon is to do the construction and art work of this very historic project and we hope you will want to make a generous donation for the project, that will take several months to complete. An exact replica of Fort Elliott will be a boom to the entire Panhandle of Texas on display in the old jail. This will automatically bring business to the area as tourists come to view the display.

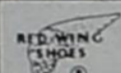

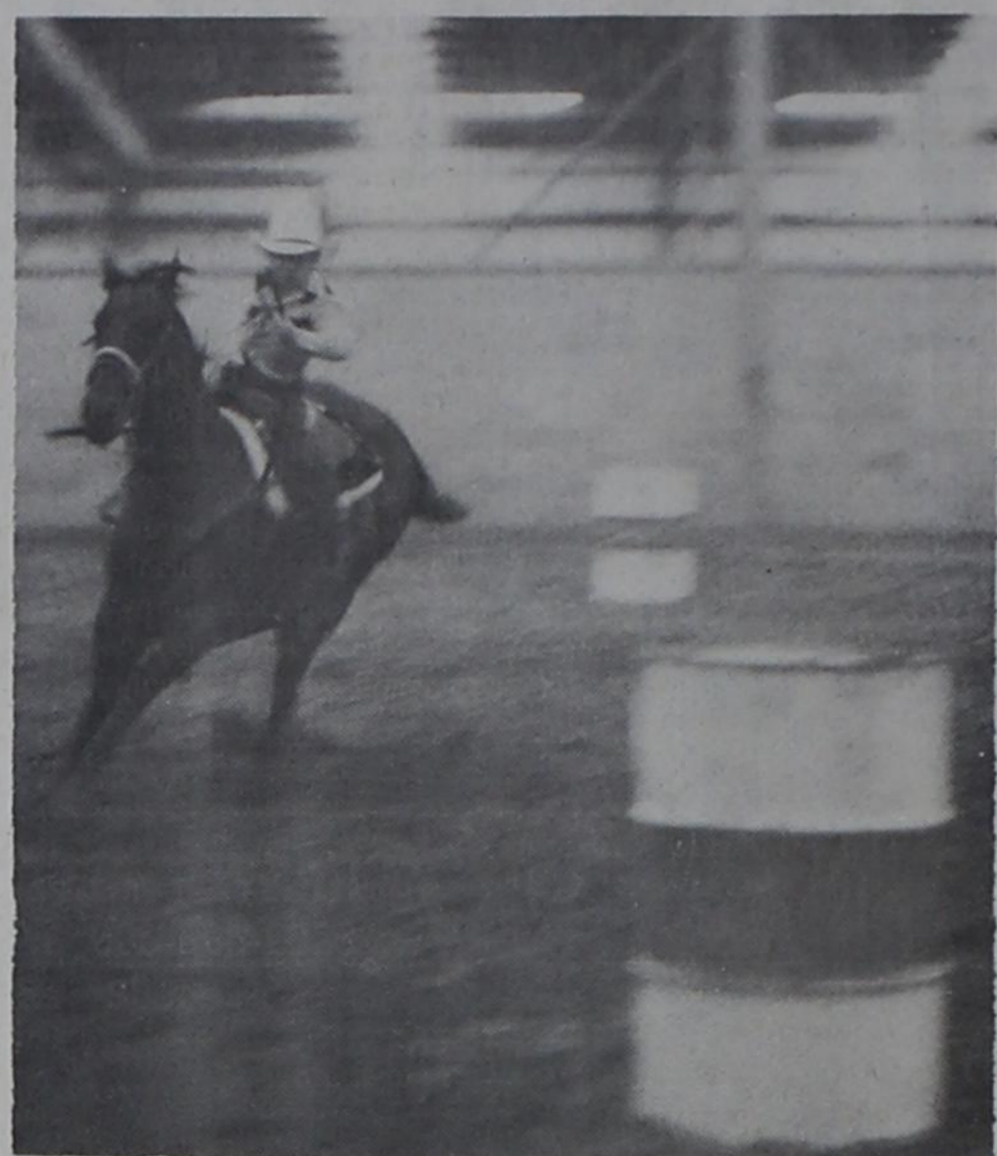

Today's Sewing Trends

TOPSTITCHING WITH TWIN, TRIPLE NEEDLES

Use a twin or triple needle to sew two to three rows of top stitching or other decorative stitches perfectly parallel.

A twin or triple needle has one top shank to insert into the machine just as any other needle, but it has either two or three needles joined to the shank by a bar.

Refer to the sewing machine manual or local dealer to see which machines can use a twin or triple needle. Machines that have a zigzag stitch are required since on bobbin thread is used.

To reduce tangles when threading, thread each needle one at a time from spool to needle eye.

Each thread follows the same threading procedure except at the tension discs where they are separated one on each side for a double needle and for a triple needle, one thread on one side and two on the other.

If the sewing machine doesn't have enough spool pins for each supply of thread, wind thread onto separate bobbins and stack together. Use the same type of thread for all top and bottom threads.

Twin and triple needles vary in the amount of space between the points of the needle. For example, the space between two twin needles may be millimeters or four millimeters.

Needle spacing will determine how wide the stitch width can be.

To check for maximum width, slowly turn the hand wheel, adjusting the stitch width so that each needle just clears the holes in the pressure foot and throat plate.

Don't try to turn corners with the needles in the fabric. To turn a corner, follow these steps: Stitch to within two stitches of the corner.

--Turn the hand wheel to make one more stitch.

--Lift the needles slightly out of the fabric.

--Pivot the fabric to form an angle.

--Take one stitch diagonally.

--Again, lift the needles slightly out of the fabric.

--Pivot the fabric into place and continue stitching.

HEMS

Today's hems are as varied as today's fashions and fabrics.

In general, the trend is toward narrow hems that let the fabric float freely and do not add weight.

Choose a hemming method that's compatible with the fabric and style of garment for a well-done look.

For a professional look, make a straight hem two and one-half inches or less except for unusual or decorative effects.

On flared skirts, two inches is the maximum hem width that allows the skirt to drape and swing as it should.

Remove bulk from seams by trimming seam allowances to one-half their width in the hem.

Hem many of today's fabrics without finishing the raw edges since they will not ravel or fray. This eliminates the possibility of the edge finish showing through to the outside.

For variety, try hemming with a fusible material that bonds fabrics together.

Test fabric first to obtain best results.

Then, follow the manufacturer's instructions carefully, fusing a strip at least three-fourths inch wide.

Hem by machine for a truly fashionable look this summer.

Topstitch hems with one or several rows of stitching for a decorative effect.

The number of rows of stitching determines the width of the hem. For one or two rows, use a one-half inch hem.

Why Jars Don't Seal

Sealing failures in home canning can result from some common mistakes.

Avoid making mistakes in home canning by following these suggestions:

1. Read and follow package instructions for using caps and lids. Don't take it for granted that all home canning caps are used exactly the same way.
2. Leave correct amount of head space when filling jars.
3. Take time to "knife out" air bubbles before sealing the jar.
4. Remove particles of food, seeds or seasonings from jar top

of threads with damp cloth before putting on lid. Particles left on jar can cause lid to seal, then, loosen.

5. Screwing band too tight can cause lid to buckle. A band must be tight enough to hold the rubber sealing compound closely against the jar top. However, if the band is forced as far as it can be turned with a strong hand, the jar cannot vent. When the jar cannot vent, pressure within the jar causes the lid to buckle. Therefore, tighten bands only comfortably tight to prevent buckled lids.

6. Screw bands tight enough.

7. Heat sufficiently to seal the lid. Follow recommended processing time and method.

8. Exhaust (vent) steam-pressure canner for a full 10 minutes, or until a steam of "blue steam" is visible, before closing petcock. If steam is not exhausted, there is an uneven amount of steam pressure in the canner. As a result, some lids may seal while others in the canner load may not.

9. Don't let pressure in canner fluctuate, this can cause food particles to be forced between jar and lid which will cause sealing failure. The same thing may happen if steam is released too quickly after processing. Let pressure in canner reach zero degrees naturally before removing cover. Do not run cold water over canner to reduce pressure.

10. Don't reuse jars in which commercial foods are sold. These jars are designed for use on high speed packing machines and with caps developed especially for that product, but not for home canning.

11. Don't use warped, rusty, worn bands, or old commercial caps.

12. Don't reuse lids. The lid of

a two-piece metal cap should not be used more than once. This applies to all brands.

The compound is not guaranteed to seal a second time and the lid itself is often bent or warped when removed the first time.

13. Don't use old jar lids. If a jar lid is old, the sealing compound may harden and not soften sufficiently to obtain a good seal. As long as the sealing compound is resilient when mashed with fingernail, the lid will probably seal. It is preferable to use jar lids the same year as purchased. When kept longer, they often stick together and must be heated in boiling water to separate them. If jars do not seal, you may reheat and process over again. However, the pro-

cedure will be over-cooked and lose refrigerator and use them within food value, flavor and texture. a short time instead of repro- You may keep a few jars in the cessing.

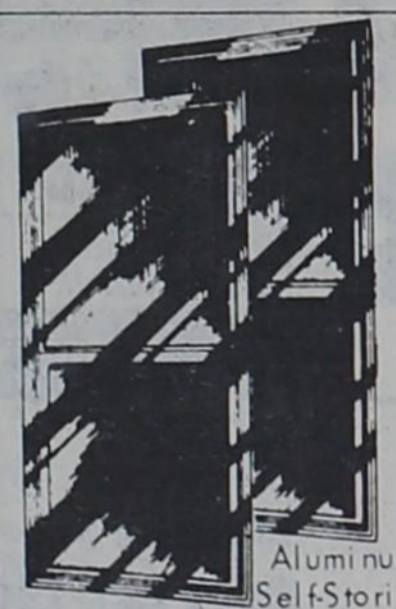

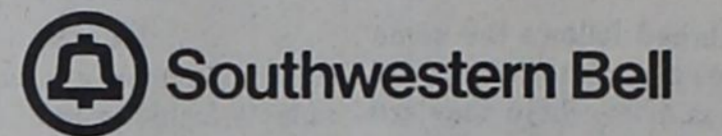

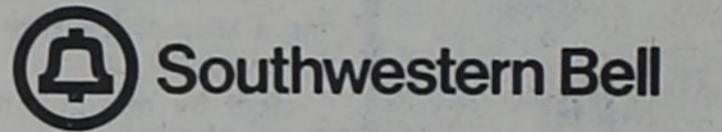

Illegal Trotlines Being Confiscated

Over 75 percent of all trotlines examined by Texas game wardens the Lubbock region have been confiscated due to one or more violations of the Texas trotline rules.

"Our officers pulled up over 60,000 feet of illegal trotlines last year and they have already confiscated over 49,000 feet this year," said Weldon Fromm, Lubbock regional law enforcement director.

"This job is dirty and time-consuming for the P&WD wardens with most of the illegal trotlines seized during the summer months when this type of fishing is in full swing in north-west Texas," Fromm continued.

All trotlines must have the name, address of the owner, and date it was put in the lake to comply with the rules and nearly all trotlines lack one or more of these requirements according to Fromm.

The trotliner has 90 days to use the trotline before it must be removed or redated. This rule was meant to eliminate the hundreds of trotlines found scattered throughout most lakes, some having been in the lake for years with rusted hooks.

P&WD defines a legal trotline as a line with more than five hooks and includes rubber band lines and sail lines with all hooks at least three horizontal feet apart. All trotlines in regulatory counties must be identified with a legible tag, constructed of a material as durable as the trotline, bearing the name and address of the angler and the date it was set out. All trotlines which remain in public waters shall be redated at the expiration of each 90 day period.

No such trotlines may be placed or set in the vicinity of any public boat dock, public bathing pier, public bathing beach or any public place commonly used as a swimming or bathing area.

Trotlines may not be placed in any body of water 500 acres or less lying totally within any state park or in that portion of any stream bordering a state park.

All lakes in the region are normally checked twice a year by game wardens and any or all of these illegal devices are removed from the public waters.

For those running an illegal trotline when contacted by a Texas game warden, the law states that a fine from \$25 to \$200 is possible.

Fishermen should check each county regulation concerning trotlines as many counties restrict the number of hooks and lines. For instance, Lake Meredith in the Texas Panhandle has a limit of 40 hooks on the trotline with a one trotline limit.

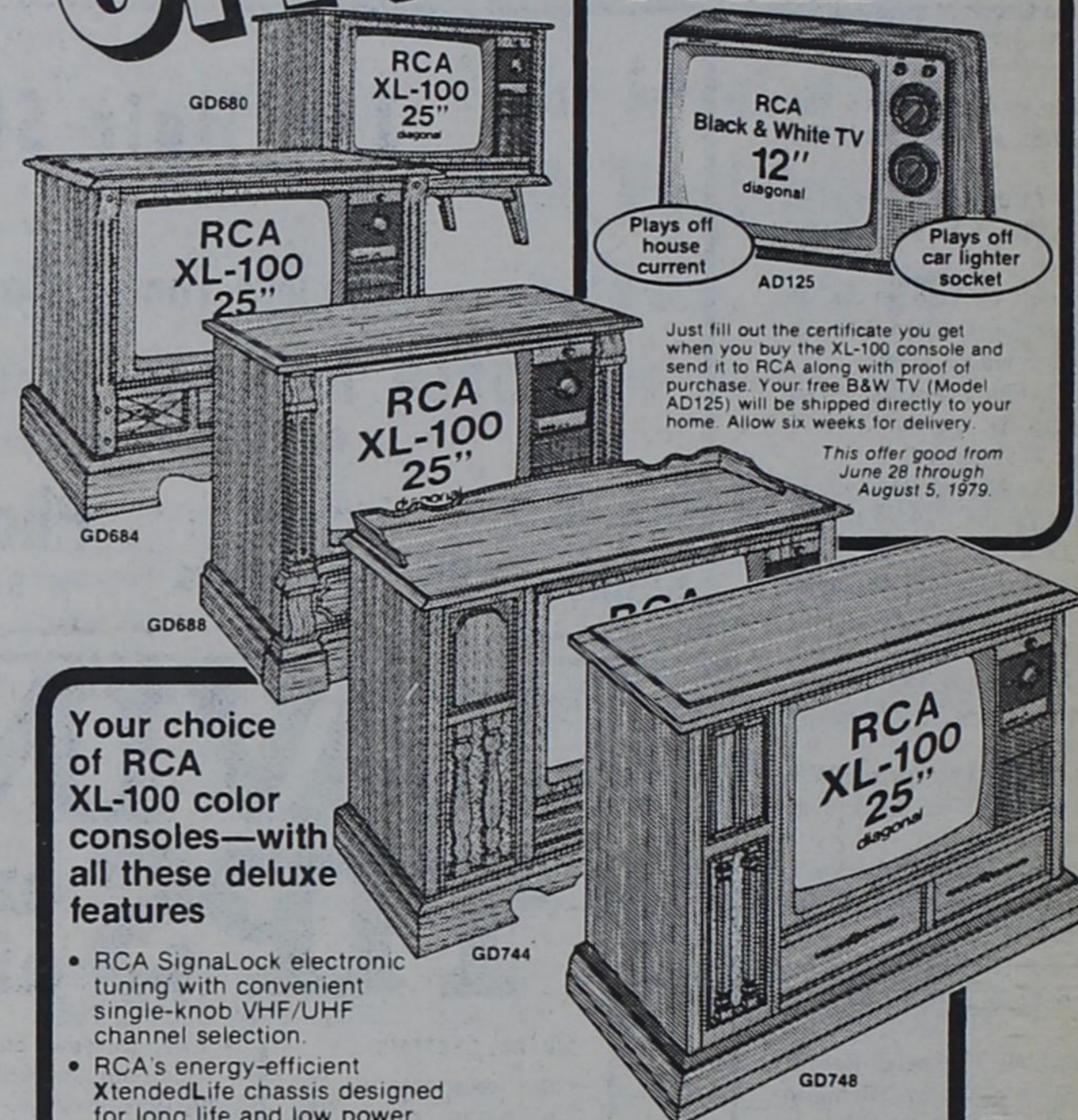


