## Car Wreck Claims Life Of Local Man

Lelburn Paul "Cotton" Horton, 41, of Wheeler, died late Monday when his car ran off Oklahoma 152 three miles east of Sweetwater in Roger Mills County.

Oklahoma Highway Patrol troopers said the Horton car struck a guard rail, went across the road and hit a bridge railing, recrossed the road and plunged down a 30 foot embankment.

Services will be at 2 p.m. today in the First Baptist Church in Wheeler. The body will be taken to Hennepin, Okla., where services will be conducted at 3 p.m. in the United Pentecostal Church. Burial will be in Hennepin Cemetery.

Arrangements are under direction of Wright Funeral Home of Wheeler.

Mr. Horton, an oilfield worker, was born at Hennepin and served in the U.S. Navy from 1954 through 1958. He had resided in Wheeler since 1973 and was a

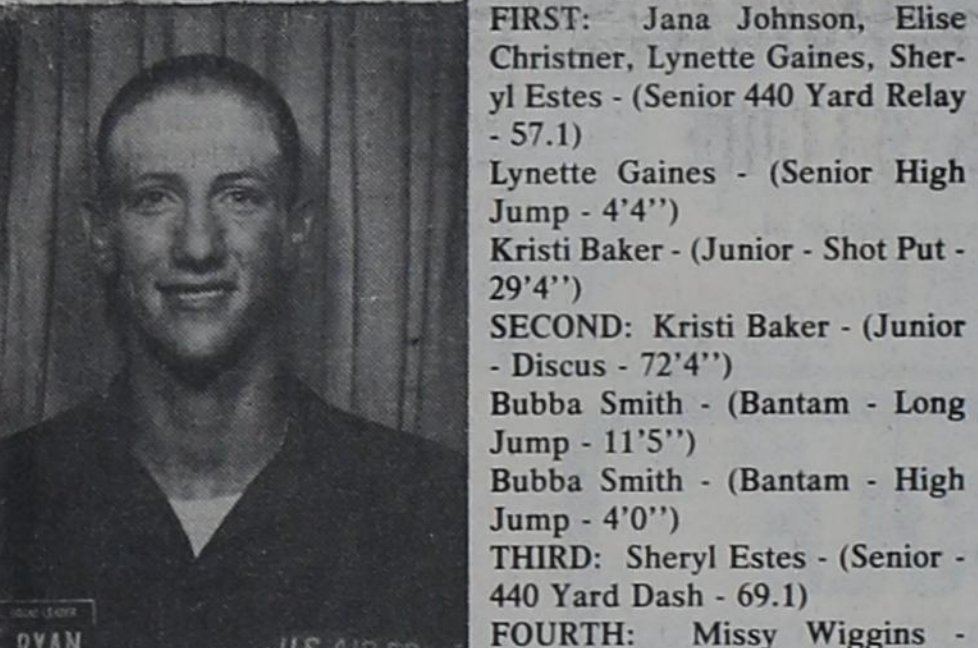
## BLOOD PRESSURE Clinic

## SEWING TIPS

### HOW TO MITER CORNERS

Miter the corners on garments for a finished, flat appearance.

Corners where front facings and hems meet can pose problems to homesevers, because they tend to be bulky and do not lie flat.

Mitered corners are easy to do, and they reduce unwanted bulk.

To miter a corner, follow these steps:

Step A: Press the hem allowance and facing into place, making a sharp crease. While they are in place, mark the raw edges where the hem allowance and the facing intersect.

Step B: Open flat. Fold and

crease a diagonal line between the marks.

Step C: Trim to within about one-half inch from the diagonal fold line—depending on fabric weight and tendency to ravel.

For fabrics that do not tend to ravel, trim to within about one-fourth inch from the diagonal fold line.

Step D: If the fabric does not ravel easily, cut a notch into this folded part—to remove even more bulk.

Put the notch in the center of the folded part, cutting toward the fold line. Notch to within

about 1/8-inch of the fold line.

Step E: Unfold everything and then fold the fabric with right sides together. Machine stitch through both fabric layers—along the still-visible fold lines. In other words, the corner-to-be seems "wrong side out" at this stage. This step will allow you to actually sew the "two halves" of the mitered corner together, so the corner will have a regular finished seam look once you turn it "right side out".

Step F: Next, press the seam open and turn the corner "right side out". This will automatically turn the hem and facing back into place.

Note: If you prefer to finish by hand—rather than machine, omit Step E. Instead, after Step D, simply fold the facing and hem into place and slip-stitch along the folded edge.

### UNDERLINING

#### SOLVES SLIP PROBLEM

Underlining is the perfect homesewing solution to today's fashion problem of what type of slip to wear with slit hemlines.

The slit for dresses and skirts is frequently seen either on one or both sides, center front, center back and varied in depth.

Depending on the garment design and fashion fabric selected, underlining all or part of the skirt section will eliminate the slip "dilemma".

This dilemma consists of seeing contrasting colored slips across from the slit or slip fabrics peeking out at the slit edge.

Wearing a slip shorter than the top of the slit usually leaves a tell-tale shadow line.

Underlining is a fabric layer that serves as backing for the fashion fabric. In addition to solving the slip dilemma, underlining adds body and durability, reinforces seams and other con-

### TEXAS PARKS & WILDLIFE

#### TEXAS LAKE MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

A cove sampling of fish populations in Lake Meredith in the Texas Panhandle provided no surprises for Texas Parks and Wildlife Department fishery personnel last week.

"Lake Meredith continues to lose water due to the lack of natural runoff and this lack of water is having an affect on the fish," said Joe Kraai, P&WD fishery biologist.

"We completed a cove sample last week in Meredith and found few small fish which is an indication of a lack of survival of the recently spawned fish," Kraai continued.

The fish biologist pointed out that as the lake level drops, the natural cover necessary for the survival of fish is eliminated. This decrease in the population of fish including bass and forage fish such as shad will not necessarily affect fishing this year or even next year, but will reduce the number of catchable sized game fish in two or three years.

Another aspect of the recent survey was to determine the impact of smallmouth bass in Lake Meredith. The smallmouths were first introduced into the lake in 1974. The cove survey last week turned up approximately 1,500 smallmouth bass with nearly all of them this year's spawn.

Even though there was a good spawn of smallmouths this spring, most of them will not survive due to the reduced water level.

These facts gathered by the P&WD fishery division is part of the management program to provide optimum recreation for the state's fishermen. The important cove sampling surveys that are scheduled for other north-west Texas lakes will help the P&WD determine the standing crops of fish and their management needs.

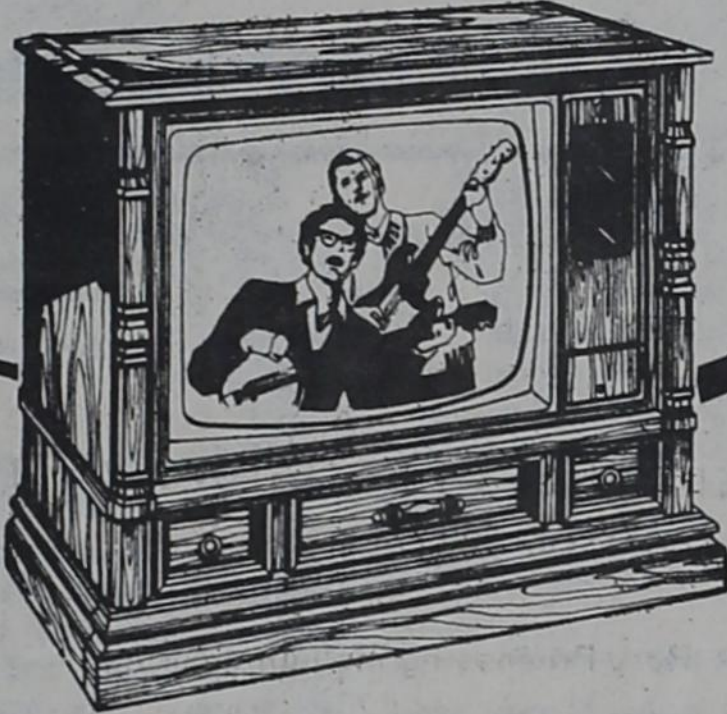

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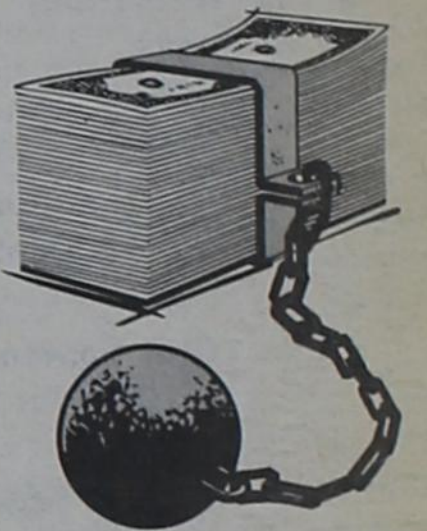
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# Water Important Factor

Water is a very important factor in the growing of productive crops in the Texas Panhandle. The present irrigated acres are estimated at over 7,000,000 acres. To irrigate this acreage, the water supplies have been taxed to the limit in some areas, and nearly exhausted in other parts of the state. Although there are many unirrigated areas that are well adapted to intensified farming under irrigation, the expansion of irrigation depends on unproven and unde-

veloped water supplies. Irrigation is a means of supplying water for plant growth when rainfall is inadequate. Irrigation may also help to control soil temperature and to reduce wind erosion by making it possible to produce more vegetative cover.

The main objective of irrigation is to effectively and efficiently distribute water over an area so the soil moisture may be brought up to field capacity. The water should be applied in such a manner that losses will be held to a minimum. The losses include deep percolation below the effective root zone, evaporation and surface runoff. Keeping these losses to a minimum offers plants a better chance of obtaining its share of moisture and plant food from the soil.

and foresight. It requires the farmer to do sound planning, have the knowledge of when and how much fertilizer to apply, and develop and carry out a coordinated soil and water conservation plan to fit the soil capabilities and crop requirements. Most important of all, a farmer must have the initiative to study, evaluate and improve his own farming operation as time goes on. Research and experience have shown that controlled amounts of water efficiently applied at the proper stages of plant growth will help maintain soil

productivity, increase yields, make crops adapted to a locality, help control quality and time of maturity of crops, lessen the effect of droughts, aid in controlling wind erosion, and provide greater profits. Irrigation farming has many disadvantages as well as the advantages listed. The greatest of these is an adequate dependable water supply. During the recent droughts, ground water supplies were reduced at an alarming rate. With increased demand for water and diminishing supply, the need for the best

in physical control of rainfall and irrigation water on each farm becomes more important each year. Only by coordination of effective control of irrigation water application and the best soil management practice can the farmer expect to get optimum production per unit of water available to crops.

Additional capital is required to establish and operate an irrigation farm. Increased cost of labor, fertilizer, control of insects, weeds, and diseases, tillage methods, and factors of operation are intensified and increased with installation and operation of an irrigation system. These make it necessary that potential irrigators give due consideration to all sides of irrigation farming before planning his course. Irrigation includes a lot more than watering.

Each soil is different in its physical and chemical properties in their reaction to irrigation water. Irrigation of shallow soils on steep slopes is very dangerous, as it may cause erosion. Deep soils on flatter land permits tillage that affords better distribution and control of irrigation water. Inefficient application of irrigation water may very easily be a hazard to production. The hazard arises through waste by surface runoff and deep percolation below effective root zone, and setting up conditions that may be inductive to starting or increasing a drainage problem. The farmer may have ample irrigation water of good quality and ideal soils for irrigation, but the efficient use and management along with other factors, determines whether or not he will have a permanent and profitable irrigation operation on his farm.

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# LEARN NOT TO BURN

By Ken Daughtry—Fire Marshall

## GASOLINE SAFETY

There is no guaranteed safe way for the public to store gasoline in their homes.

This warning comes from the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and the Fire Marshals Association of North America (FMANA), as reports of injuries and death mount because people are stockpiling fuel in the face of gasoline shortages.

"People are going to spectacular lengths in an effort to hoard gasoline," reports Charles S. Morgan, President of NFPA. Unfortunately, the results are equally spectacular, in the most tragic way. Recently, seven members of one family were burned badly from ignition of gasoline stored in a plastic trash container in a bedroom closet.

"No one should keep gasoline within a residential structure of any kind," Morgan emphasizes.

"If you feel you must have a very small amount of gasoline on hand to fuel a lawn mower or other equipment, keep the fuel in a secure storage shelter well away from places where people live," he advises.

Even in a secure storage place, detached from residential buildings, store gasoline only in an approved safety container, says the NFPA President. Never keep flammable liquids in a glass jar, plastic bottle, or other makeshift container. Place the safety container where it can't be knocked over accidentally, and where children can't reach it. And make sure there is good ventilation in the storage area—this prevents the buildup of gasoline vapors.

Many accidents occur when gasoline-fueled equipment is stored in a garage or utility area which also contains hot water or room heating apparatus, NFPA studies show. "Even one spark generated when an electric switch goes on or off is enough to

ignite gasoline vapors," Morgan warns; so is the pilot light on any gas-fueled appliance.

Never bring a motorcycle or a gasoline-powered bike into your house or apartment for storage or

repair work, he adds.

One final reminder from NFPA: Never smoke or permit anyone else in the vicinity to smoke while using, fueling or working on equipment that is powered by gasoline.

"We're all used to thinking of gasoline as part of our everyday lives," Morgan observes, "but no one should ever forget that gasoline is an extremely volatile flammable liquid that must be handled with utmost caution at all times."

In addition, all persons who are 65 or older or under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance are also entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 from the market value of their residence homesteads for the purpose of school taxes.

To qualify for these exemptions, an application MUST be filed with the school district tax office by July 16, this year only and by April 30 of each year thereafter.

Application forms are available at the school tax office located at the Mobeetie School Building.

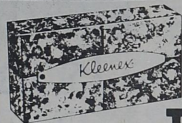
