GRASSHOPPERS WILL BE TOPIC AT MEETING TODAY

The grasshopper problem will apparently be severe in portions of the county this summer. Personnel of the USDA Animal & Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) have been making counts of the grasshopper at various sites in the county this spring. Last Monday, June 6 counts indicated 18-60 nymphs (young grasshoppers) per square yard with most counts in the 40-60 nymph range. The hatch was about 50% complete. Eight per square is considered to be the economic level. It is estimated that over 280,000 acres will be infested in Wheeler County.

P.M. in the District Courtroom in Wheeler to discuss the grasshopper situation.

Representatives of APHIS and the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) will be at the meeting to discuss the cost share program for grasshopper control. Under the program the land owner, the state government and the federal government each pay 1/3 of the cost of spraying. The cost to the landowner will be about 60¢ per acre.

Since time to get the program underway is short, landowners interested in participating should be prepared to pay at the meeting for the acreage they want sprayed.

The cost-share program is for rangeland only. No cropland can be sprayed under the program. Blocks of approximately 10,000 acres or more are needed to qualify for the program. Because of this, it is important that every one who can attend this meeting.

Rangeland operators should keep in mind that the meeting will probably be the only opportunity Wheeler County will have to get in the program. It will take several land owners in each area to qualify for the program.

These do not remain effective long enough to prevent grasshoppers from migrating into fields. Grasshoppers baits are most effective for preventing migration.

A grasshopper bait can be made by following this formula.

* 100# - Mill run bran

* 7-8 gallons Water

* Sawdust can be used to replace up to 75% of the bran

Mix the Toxaphene, water and molasses and then mix with the bran to form a crumbly mash. The bait should be uniformly moist and scatter into small flakes when broad cast. It should be applied at the rate of 10 - 20 # per acre. The most effective applications are made in the morning hours and when the bait is still wet.

The bait should be applied to roadsides, ditch banks field margins and idle areas bordering fields. Care should be taken to keep the bait away from animals and humans.

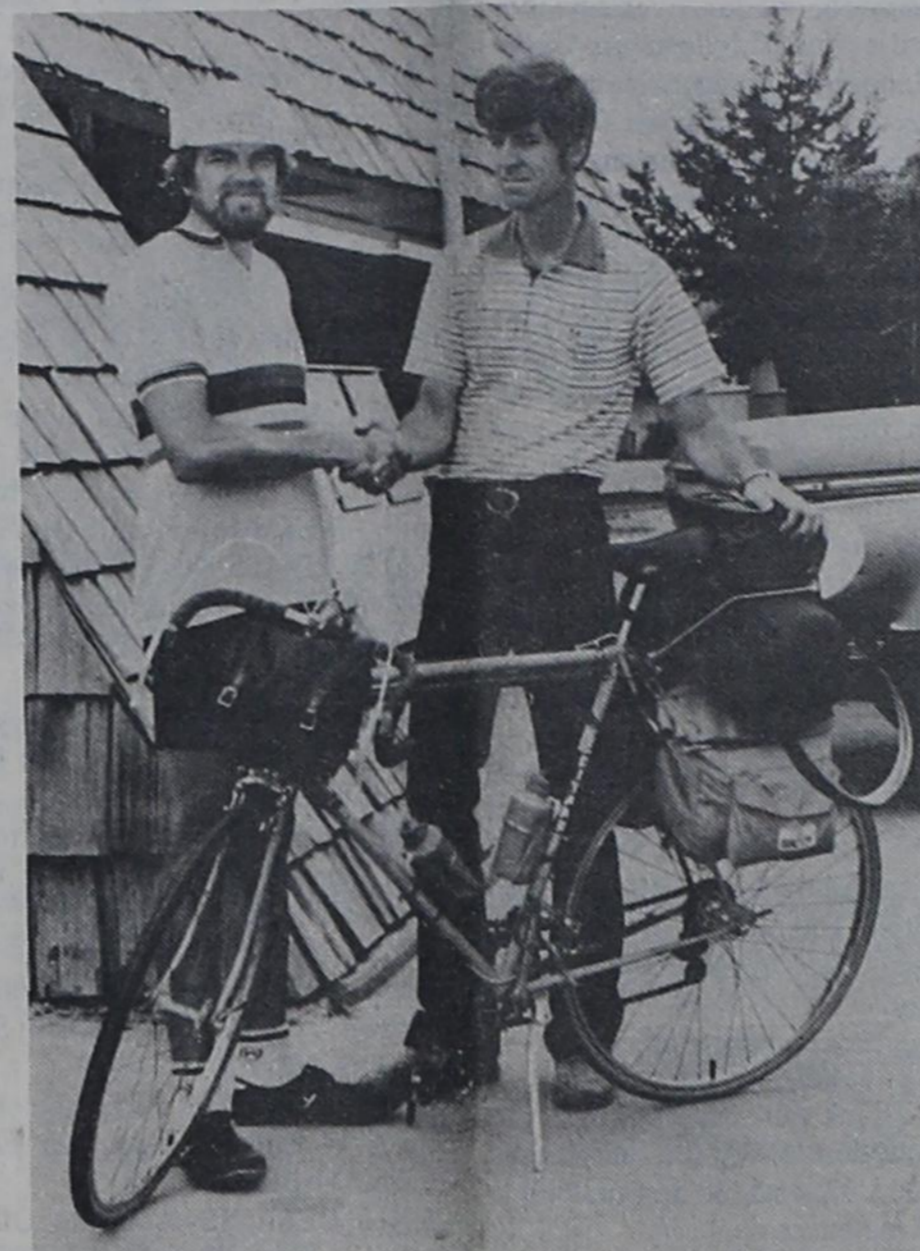

LEARN NOT TO BURN

FIRE DEPARTMENT ROOTS (Part Two)

It is difficult for us today to believe it, but these early volunteers resented and opposed any new improvements for fire fighting. They said the first rubber hose put too much distance between the man and the fire, and that steam engines were in themselves as dangerous as the fire. Cincinnati, Ohio, has the honor of being the first city to have a paid fire department, and of introducing the first successful steam engine. This engine was called "Joe Ross" and required a permanent force to keep steam up in it. Many cities followed the lead of Cincinnati, while others clung to the volunteer system until some great fire showed how weak this system had become. Early pay arrangements provided regular salaries only for the fire chief and drivers of apparatus, while the firemen were given two dollars for each alarm answered. Study this early history of fire

companies and then think of the great progress made through the years. Today, fire fighters have aerial ladders which are used to rescue people from burning buildings and can reach a height of 125 feet. They have blowers to aid in ventilation, lighting plants for illumination, oxy-acetylene for cutting through metal, air drills, special dewatering pumps to prevent flooding of cellars, besides equipment for fighting the blaze itself. Any improvement is not only welcomed but constant research on better means of preventing and combating fires is being conducted.

With all this progress, we must never forget that the human element, the fireman himself, is still very important. Firemen must be strong, brave, well-trained men who keep clear-headed and always alert. Every year many of them are injured, burned or even killed in the line of duty. Know them. Appreciate them. Cooperate with them. They will always be our first line of defense in "what to do in case of fire".

JACK MEEK IS IMPROVING FOLLOWING FARM ACCIDENT

Jack Meek of the Briscoe Community is in intensive care at St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo following a farm accident on Monday. Jack received serious neck injuries in the mishap.

Meek and his son, Mark, were working on the header of a combine at the "home" place, 17 north and 1 west of Wheeler. The men had the header raised and were under the piece of equipment when it dropped; as it fell, it struck Jack on the top of the head, causing a "whip-lash" injury

to the neck. Jack was pinned under the implement; Mark received minor scrapes and bruises on the back from the accident.

The North Wheeler County Ambulance was called to the scene and after treatment at the site, Jack was taken straight to St. Anthony's.

As a result of the accident, Jack was paralyzed from the neck down and had no feeling in the lower part of his body. Mark reported Tuesday evening that Jack has regained some feeling in his chest and has some use of his leg

muscles. The improvement is a good sign the paralysis is temporary, but Jack will have to remain in traction until the fractured vertebrae are healed.



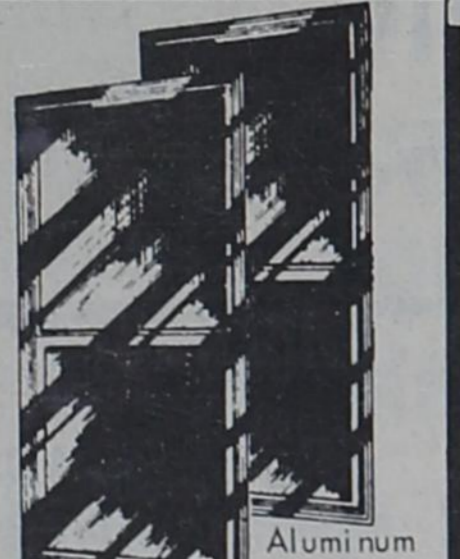

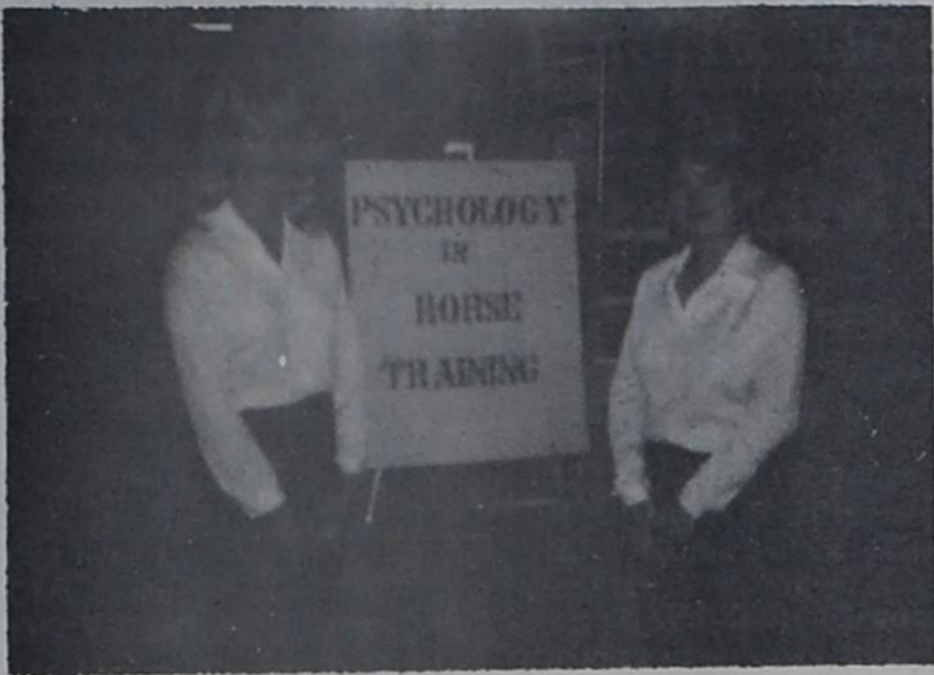
