EX-STUDENTS, TEACHERS TO GATHER SAT.

ECA CLASS IS NOW BEING OFFERED HERE

The Emergency Care Attendant course being offered by the North Wheeler County Ambulance service will get underway this morning, June 7. The 40 hour course will be taught each Thursday morning from 8 to 11 a.m. It is not too late to register if you are interested in learning how to treat victims of heart attack or accident.

Benefits of taking the classes for personal knowledge include the learning of CPR—the action taken when a person suffers complete heart failure, the care of accident victims and bandaging and splinting. Your knowledge of any of these actions may mean the difference between life and death or recovery permanent damage. A person whose heart stops has only 4 or 5 minutes before brain cells begin to die; the quick response of a trained person would mean life or death. The victim of an auto or home accident might have back or neck injury; proper removal or handling could mean the difference between recovery and permanent damage and possibly paralysis.

Those interested in the course are asked to meet at the Ambulance Barn Thursday morning, June 14 at 8:00. There is no charge for the course and books will be furnished.

The ECA course involves 40 hours classroom instruction. This includes 1½ hours lecture and 1½ hours practice of skills each week for a period of 13 weeks. At the end of the course, students will be tested with a written test and application of skills. Certificates are awarded upon successful completing of the course; these are good for a period of 2 years at which time a refresher course is required. The completion of the course qualifies you to work with the local volunteer ambulance service. This will also be an opportunity for ECA's and EMT's whose certificates are about to expire to renew.

Ambulance Serv. Has Anniversary

The Wheeler County Ambulance Service has been in existence for three years. The completely volunteer organization began furnishing ambulance service for the citizens of Wheeler on June 1, 1976.

Presently the number of regularly scheduled men and women serving on the ambulance is ten. The people serve for one week, either night or day, or both, for a period of one week and the next crew takes over.

During this three year period, classes have been offered in the surrounding areas and citizens in the surrounding communities are trained and equipped to render aid until the ambulance arrives. These people receive their notification at the same time the ambulance is dispatched by radio.

From January 1, 1979, 260 man hours have been spent in operation of the service in North Wheeler County. Over the three year period, each volunteer has spent an average of 1,348 hours in the ambulance.

Arthritis Found. Elects Officers

At a recent meeting of the Wheeler County Arthritis Foundation new officers were elected for the coming year. Officers for the new year are Glen Markham as chairman of the Wheeler County Chapter; Geneva Snellgroes, Chairman of Living Memorials; Verna Bell Markham, Closet Chairman, in charge of dispersing equipment; Violet Knight as Secretary-Treasurer and Wilber Beck as Publicity Chairman. The organization, established just over one year ago, is at this time made up of five members of the Medical Board and 20 board members. These members come from all over Wheeler County—THIS IS A COUNTY WIDE EFFORT. The WCAF held a fund drive in late 1978 and at that time netted more than \$2,000.00 This money was used in the following way; after sending 455.00 to the District Arthritis Foundation for research, four wheelchairs were purchased, four walkers and fourteen therma-bath were also bought. During the year a pair of crutches and an elevated comode seat have been donated to the Foundation. Most of this equipment is in use at this time by arthritic patients, however one therma-bath with the medicated paraffin is not in use, neither are the crutches and the elevated comode seat. The thirteen therma-baths that are being used are in Wheeler, Mobeetie, Kelton and Allison. These therma-baths are to be used in private homes only, not in nursing homes. Anyone needing assistance of any of this equipment may contact the Parkview Hospital in Wheeler.

Living memorials and donations seem to be coming into the Foundation regularly, according to spokesmen for the WCAF.

LEARN NOT TO BURN

FIRE DEPARTMENT ROOTS [Part One of Two Parts]

The first organized fire fighting was in London, England, in 1666. Two-thirds of this great city had been burned in what was called The Great London Conflagration. This aroused the people to form fire brigades, subject to call in case of fire. Fire insurance companies financed these first fire fighters and made a serious study of the problem of preventing fires.

Early in the nineteenth century, there were five London insurance companies with fire brigades whose members were called "Water Men". Strange as it may seem these firemen would not fight a fire which was not insured by the company they were employed to represent. To identify the special property under their protection, each insurance company used a "fire mark" in the doorways or in some prominent place on the

front of a building to guide the firemen. If a fire brigade arrived at a fire and found that the premises were not insured by their company, they would actually withdraw or wait until the proper firemen arrived, even though the entire property burned before their very eyes! Their equipment was crude but their work was surprisingly effective. Hand pumps were invented and they also used a huge syringe, flexible hose and leather water buckets—all forerunners of modern equipment.

Fire companies were very jealous of one another, but in 1865, most of the companies in England were merged and known

establishment, financed and directed by the City of London.

In America, our fire prevention dates from 1669, when the Dutch Colony of Nieu Amsterdam placed a tax of one quilder on every chimney in the town, and organized fire companies, equipped with ladders, hooks and leather buckets. These organizations were called "Fire Societies" and their membership was entirely voluntary. The office of Fire Chief was created to direct the fire fighting in this little town, which we now know as the great city of New York.

As population and property increased, fires increased. Soon these select societies gave way to larger volunteer systems with engines, hose and bucket men. They were to fight fire wherever they found it, regardless of ownership.

George Washington was a volunteer fireman. He purchased the first fire engine for the town of Alexandria, Virginia, a few miles from Mt. Vernon. The old engine is still preserved. In the small towns merging into Washington, D. C., there are many old houses wearing the early fire marks on their quaint aging fronts.

Benjamin Franklin was a volunteer fireman. He was a member of a club, composed of young men who were interested in the welfare of the good city of Philadelphia. At a meeting one evening, Franklin asked this question: "Friends, what would you say is the greatest enemy of safety in our town?" Several voices answered at once, "Fire!"

In those days, people had only open fires for heating their houses and cooking their meals. Coal was not known and all homeowners were afraid of fire.

Franklin and his friends went to work to arouse the interest of the people and soon a volunteer company of thirty men was organized. At the first meeting, it was decided that each fireman must have a leather bucket to dip into a well. Also, each must take with him a big basket for carrying property out of a burning home. These men studied how to handle fires and were so much admired and praised that more fire fighting groups were formed. Within a few years, Philadelphia had thirty volunteer fire companies and was called the safest city in America.

In 1835, there was a great conflagration in New York. The Franklin Fire Engine Company of Philadelphia hauled their engine through mud, ice and snow for three days in an attempt to help the New York Fire Department. They arrived a day late but their heroic efforts were so appreciated that the New York firemen entertained them lavishly and gave them a pair of fine carved engine panels, upon which were paintings of Benjamin Franklin.

Electronic sewing machines - some with a "brain" (computer) and pre-programmed touch buttons - have advantages and disadvantages, so shop carefully before buying.

Not all are fully electronic. Many are a combination of mechanical and electronic parts, but if a machine has just one electronic feature, the company may label it "electronic."

Electronic features on these machines range from simple electronic needle power to the complex touch-button pre-programmed stitches.

Advantages Advantages of electronic machines start with their having more reliability and cooler-running motors than mechanical machines.

Electronic machines have more sensitive foot power. Also, they generally have full needle power at all speeds - enabling you to sew through several thicknesses of heavy fabric, such as denim, without speeding up the machine.

In addition, electronic machines with touch-button stitch control let the homesever change from straight stitching to zig-zag to decorative stitching with the simple touch of a finger.

These machines almost "sew for you."
