

Tomatoes Like to be Caged West Texas in spring can be a hostile place for young tomato plants. Newly set plants suffer a severe setback, sometimes death, when exposed to wind and cold. However, there is a way to set out tomato plantmin May and protect them until the wind calms

down and the nights warm. Enclosing tomatoes in plasticwrapped cages gives them much needed protection during May. Caged plants will grow much

Allow four to five feet between plants to give you plenty of room to work around your caged plants. Select tomato varieties well adapted to caging such as Spring Giant Hybrid, Big Set Hybrid, Small Fry Hybrid, Jack Pot Hybrid, or Sun Ripe Hybrid. After transplanting the tomatoes and watering them in with a starter solution, place a cage over each plant with the plant centered inside the cage. Anchor the cage to a stout stake driven into the ground and tied to the cage with wire or string. This is about all there is to it.

As the days grow warmer and daytime temperatures rise into the 80's, slip the plastic wrap inward to allow cool air to enter the cage, thereby preventing excessively high temperatures around the plant. When the night temperatures stop going below 55 to 69 degrees, you can remove the plastic wrap entirely. Cages will cost about 50 cents







Ask the child to tell about the picture or art object. Also, make positive comments about the collors, designs or processes he used. Do NOT ask "What are you making?" Do NOT guess what the child has made. Do NOT say "That's very nice, but why didn't you make a 'so and so'?" Finally, do NOT tell a child, "We don't draw that sort of thing." Adults who criticize in these ways retard a child's growth four ways - the same four ways in which he could have grown, if they had allowed the art experience to live.

The postmaster's said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3 1/2inches high or 5 inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmasters said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new standards, few retailers should still be selling undersized pieces.

Many consumers, however, are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of stationery.

The regulations also prohibit flimsy cards. In the future they must be at least seven-thousandths (.007) of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of nine thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, the letters of others can also be damaged.
