



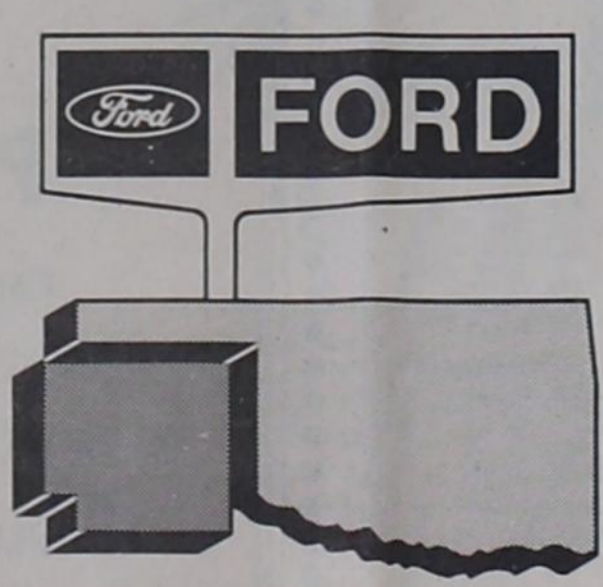

I keep it as clean as I possibly can. The new pavement will be in front of my house, more people will be passing my house. I'm ashamed for people to know I live here." Why? because right beside this lovely pocket-handkerchief size lawn there is a gasty, vacant lot that is a disgrace to the town and should be to the owner.

Do I get any sympathy with my ideas?

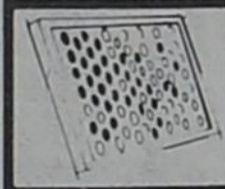

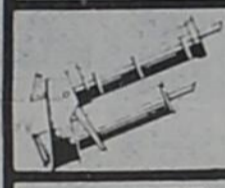

Seventeen sets of civil papers were served by the Sheriff's office.

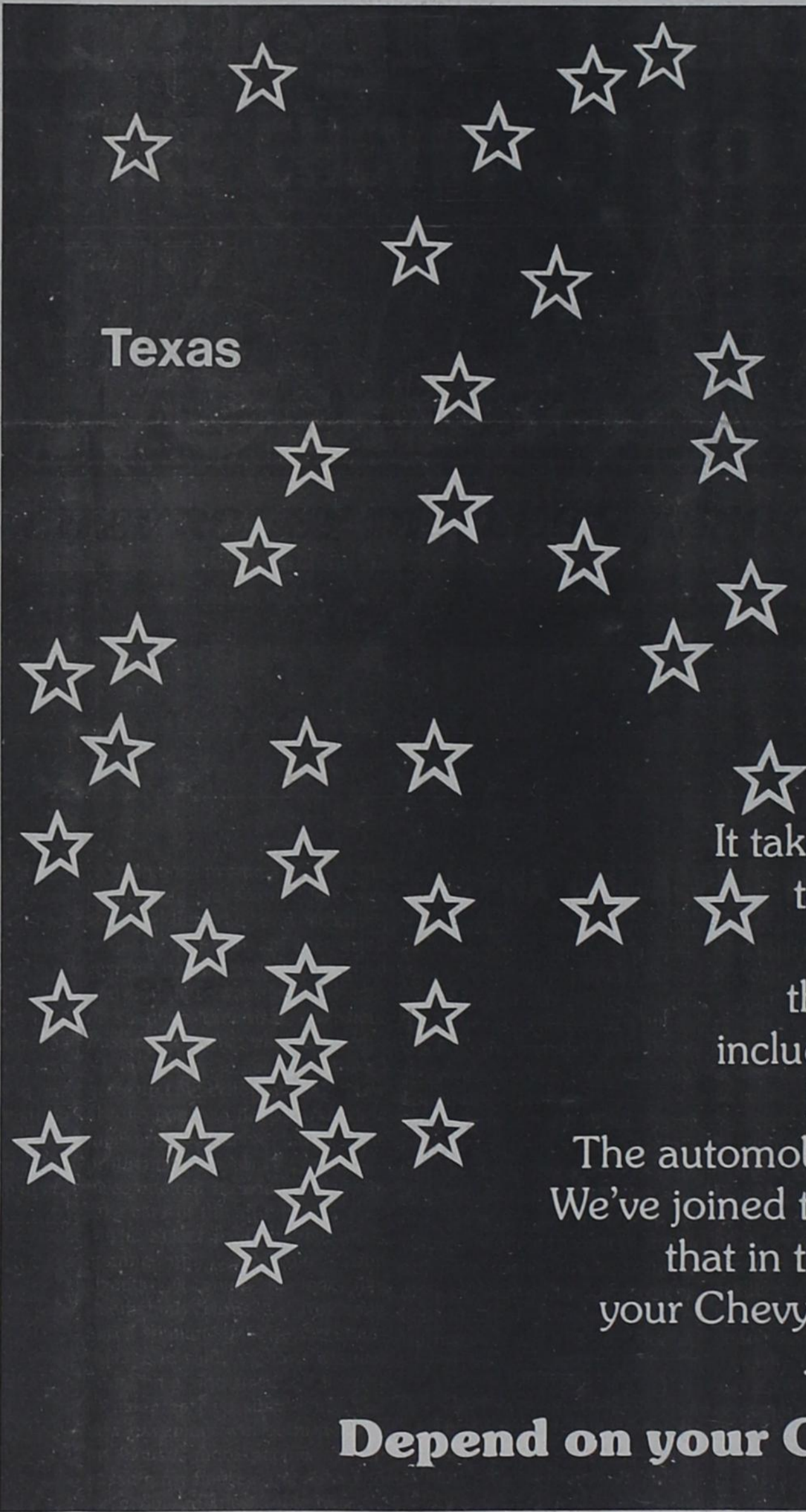

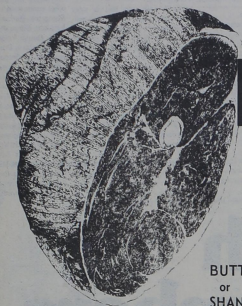
