## **BOOK REVIEW**

'Bendigo Shafter' was written by Louis L'amour,. Bendigoeighteen, tough yet idealistic, and filled with hope-begins his story with the arrival of his raggedy band of pioneers in a small Western settlement. All about them is Indian Territory: winter is approaching. Bendigo grows with the tiny settlement as he tells its story. But the winters are hard, and the hours long. Bendigo goes forth from the settlement, first on an adventure filled overland ride west to buy cattle, later to New York where he meets Horace Greeley, pursues his writing career, and finds once again the beautiful young girl who has loved him from the start. Louis L'amour's loyal readers will find the strong idealism that are the hallmarks of America's favorite frontier writer.


