WHEELER TRACK TEAM WINS SECOND IN DISTRICT

The Mustang Track Team gave Miami a good scare as Miami outpointed the young Wheeler team 140 to 130. With only one race left, Miami had a narrow 2 point lead. Even though the Mustang mile relay team of Boyd Waldo, Benny Watson, Kevin Andis and Mike Gallagher ran their best time of the year, 3:42.6, it was only good enough for 3rd place. Miami ran a very good 3:33.1 to easily win the event and the team championship. The Mustangs placed people in every event and nearly all times were individual best for the year, Coach Allen stated. In the field events, the Mustangs came away with 53 points compared to 37 points for Miami.

Annual Bass 1st Fishing Tourney

The Wheeler Key Club will hold the first annual Wheeler County Bass Fishing Tournament. The all day event will be Saturday, May 5; prizes will be awarded for the largest catch—(total weight and the largest fish (bass) caught.

The State of Texas also requires that you bring a copy of your child's birth certificate when you enroll your child. If you do not have this you need to get a copy before school starts in the latter part of August.

year the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department divides their men into storm watch crews; these men go on duty each time Wheeler is placed under storm alert. The crews position themselves at different location around Wheeler and watch the clouds for threatening conditions. Radio contact with the fire station allows the immediate sounding of the siren if they feel it is necessary.

The alarm will be sounded when the men feel the citizens should take shelter. The warning, as it has been for a number of years, will be two 30-second blasts of the fire siren; this is not to be confused with the fire whistle which is a series of 10-second blasts. (Note: In case of fire during severe weather, it is the policy to not sound the fire siren; the firemen are notified of the fire with their individual scanners.) In threatening weather, if the alarm sounds, two long blasts indicate shelter should be taken.

Where should you go for shelter? Storm cellars are all over Wheeler; check if the neighbors have a cellar and ask permission to use it in case of a storm. Your second choice would be the basement of the courthouse. The south door of the courthouse will be open for those wishing to take refuge in the basement. When the construction project of the school is completed, the basement of the gym will be available; at the present time, it is a little dangerous to try to use this facility.

If the storm alert sounds during school hours, DO NOT GO TO THE SCHOOL AFTER YOUR CHILD! The school has a plan

for the protection of your children and they are safer at the school than in car or on the grounds trying to take shelter elsewhere. The basement of the gym will soon provide room to provide shelter for the entire school—students and faculty.

Again, you are advised to plan now and don't wait until the alarm is sounded to look for shelter; this plan of action may save you life. If the neighbors have a cellar; don't be afraid to ask permission to use it; time spent in the cellar away from TV and phones is a good time to get to know your neighbor.

LESSON IN SURVIVAL

Like an unwanted mother-in-law, Jim Verden arrived early. The unexpected became commonplace in the Texas Tech football program last year, and defensive tackle Verden is characteristic of the positive situations which resulted in a successful season.

The 6-3, 240 pound sophomore from Wheeler had the physical tools to become an excellent defensive lineman, but the consensus opinion was that it would be at least a year before he blossomed and realized his full potential. But Verden became one of the top defensive linemen on the team; however, his past gave some indication of that occurrence.

He competed in football, basketball, and track at Wheeler High School, winning the state Class B Championship in the shot put and discus (he threw the discus 183-5 feet to break the

Class B record by more than 20 feet and put the shot 54-4 1/2 to win the state meet by almost 2 feet.) Verden also played in the Texas High School Coaches All-Star Basketball Game.

Last season, he missed part of spring training, but returned for the spring game, and played a large part in the White team pullin off a 16-0 win. His importance to the team escalated as the season progressed.

According to Tech coaches, Verden has good size, quickness, and strength. But Verden states, "It was my size that determined my playing football in college. I compete in track and field now and then, but I don't have the size for basketball."

Attending Tech was almost natural for Jim.

"I lived next door to Don Reeves, who played for Tech, and my dad wanted me to come here," says Verden. "Of all the schools that recruited me, this was really the only place I considered attending."

Verden played in a limited role for the varsity as a freshman, and

feels he developed most during that year.

"I think I developed most as a player during my freshman year," says Verden. "I completed the things that were needed to play and grew as far as strength, fundamentals, and lateral quickness, which I feel is my major asset."

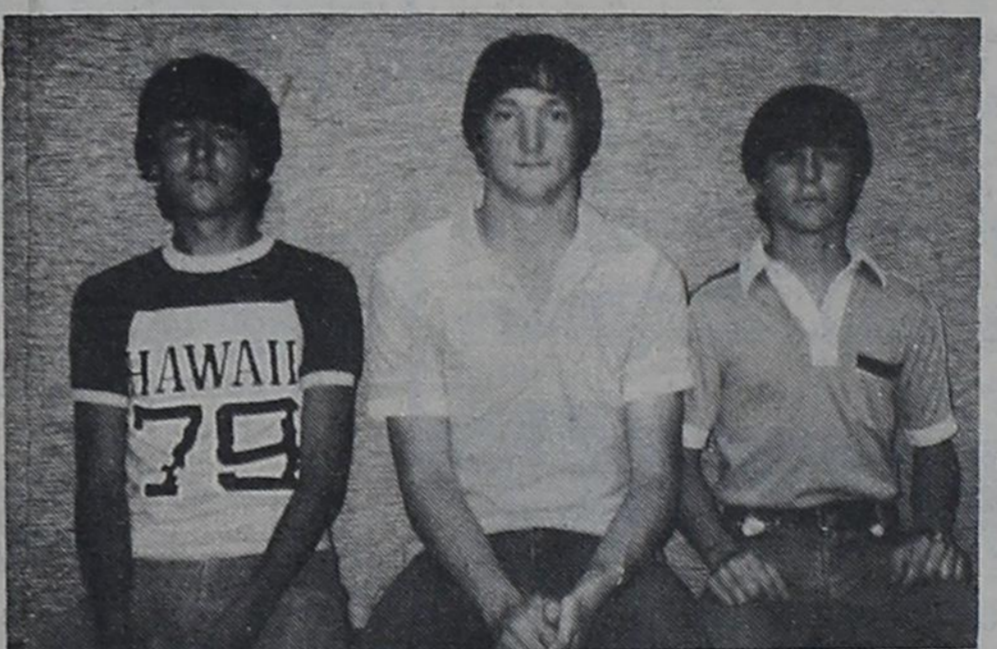
He is most comfortable at defensive tackle, but was tried at noseguard last fall.

During his first season as a Red Raider, Verden had to make a big adjustment to college ball. "There are a lot more quality athletes here than in Class B," says Verden. "College was a big step—I was used to pushing my way around, but had to learn technique here, which I didn't need in high school."

This will be Jim's second spring training, and like most players, he thinks only of surviving it.

"Spring training is something we must go through to get ready for the season," says Verden. "I didn't come into this spring in great shape because I didn't do a lot of off season work; so I'll work on getting in shape, becoming a better player, and learning fundamentals."

Verden sees a definite opportunity for Tech to reach the Cotton Bowl this year.

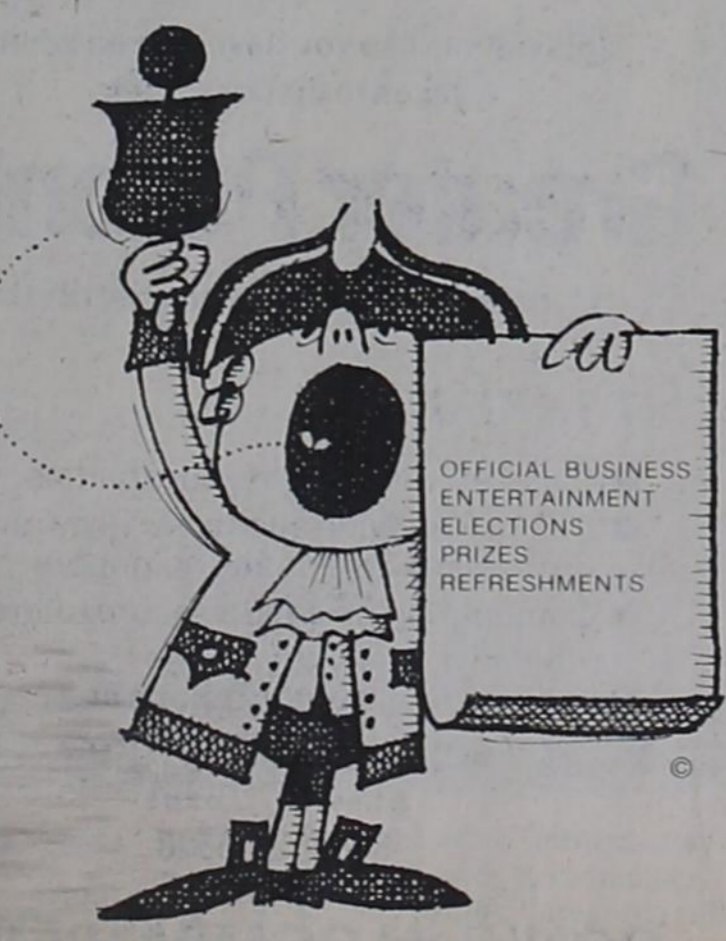

Verden has half his college career ahead of him, but visions of pro football dance in his head. "I have thought about pro ball," says Verden. "But I'm not worrying about it. If I get the opportunity, I'll play."
Whether he does or not, one thing is certain—Jim Verden has arrived.

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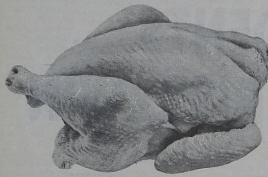
