

# ELECTION RESULTS

Area voters turned out in large numbers to vote in the election Saturday in Wheeler and surrounding towns. Elected to office were mayors, aldermen, school trustees and hospital directors.

Mobeetic voters voted in races for mayor, aldermen, school

trustees and hospital directors. Two men ran for the office of mayor, Glenn Sherrell, (inc) and Carroll Langley; Sherrell was elected for a second term with 60 votes and Langley received 46. Two places were to be filled on the council with six candidates;

the results were: Floyd Morris, 85; Bobby Maddox, 35; Doug Vaughn, 29; Charlene Sherbourne, 27 and Dale Corcoran (inc.), 25. voters cast ballots in the hospital election and Melvin May was elected to serve his first term on the parkview Hospital Board.

Wheeler citizens reported to

the polls to vote in city and school elections. Three places were to be filled on the city council with each race being contested. Place 1 was won by Kervin Roper, 137 votes; Leon Moore (inc.) received 56. Berniece Hall, (inc.), was elected to her first full term on the council, receiving 126 votes in the race for Place 3;

her opponents and the number of votes they received were Johnny Baird, 46, and Mark Frankenberg, 18. Place 5 went to Bob Roark with 123 votes; Daryl Snelgroves received 68. For the Wheeler Public Schools board of trustees, Tom Christner was elected to position 4 with 205 votes; in the race for position 5, Larry Jennings (inc.) received 114 votes and his opponent, Perry Elliott, received 96—Jim Montgomery received two write-in votes in this position.

Allison voters had two elections in which to cast their ballots. In the contest for school trustee, three seats were to be filled; voting tallies were as follows: Hiram Begart, 49; Larry Elmore, 47; Domer Miller, 40 and Terry Grayson, 24. Lewis Grayson was re-elected to serve on the hospital board; he did not draw an opponent in the race.

At Briscoe had four places on the school board to be filled and on hospital director to elect; one person filed for each position. Elected to the school board of trustees were David Hefley (inc.), J. P. Meek (inc.) and Dan Gatlin; Dean Tipps will fill the one-year, un-expired term. David Zybach was elected to serve another term on the hospital board.

Kelton voters did not have a contest in their race for the school board. Elected to serve were Gary Clemens (inc.), Billy Buckingham (inc.), Thurman Calcote for a one-year un-expired term, and Glen Waldo for a two-year un-expired term.

## HOME GARDENING CLINIC TUES

As spring approaches many people begin to think about planting a home vegetable garden. At this time, several questions arise as to how to plan, plant, fertility and care for the garden.

In order to help answer these questions the Wheeler County Program Building Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will sponsor a Home Gardening Clinic Tuesday, April 17. The meeting will be held in the Shamrock High School Cafeteria. The Shamrock Chamber of Commerce will also help sponsor the meeting by making the cafeteria available.

The public is invited to attend this meeting free of charge. Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of social economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Dr. Roland Roberts, Area Vegetable Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock, will present the program. He will discuss planning the home vegetable garden, fertility, diseases and varieties of vegetables suited to this area.

Dr. Roberts has been the Area Vegetable Specialist at Lubbock since 1970 where he specialized in vegetable production and marketing, with both commercial producer and home gardeners.

Anyone interested in vegetable gardening is invited to attend the meeting. Dr. Roberts will be available to answer questions concerning vegetable production.

## LIVING HISTORY

By Jeanna Stephens  
 Living History interview with Mrs. Laura Guthrie by Jeanna Stephens. Mrs. Guthrie, husband and child, came to Wheeler in 1930 about 48 years ago. The county seat was already here in Wheeler. The court house was rather new. When Mrs. Guthrie and her family moved here they bought the movie house from the late Dr. H. E. Nicholson. They remodeled the theater and put in the first talking pictures that had ever been in Wheeler. The Guthries got a great deal of business from the surrounding towns, but it was a struggle the first few years. Then it was not long until the depression came along. It was a struggle during that time. The business was not just confined to only Wheeler people. Their trade came from Kelton, Allison, Briscoe, Mobeetie and all the county people between. People came on Saturday nights for the most part. The Guthries always had a concession stand with popcorn and candy. popcorn cost ten cents. Later in years came the soda dispenser. The cost of the show varied. A child paid ten cents, adults a quarter, but children under twelve did not pay. That was as high as the prices got until about 1960. The Guthries also built the Drive In theater. They called it the Mustang Theater. Corky Guthrie, her son, owned the theater, but they still helped out. "Corky operated the Mustang Theater until about 1963." The Depression hurt the number of people coming to the show very much. Kids tried sneaking into the show, but it was not a great problem. Children old enough to pay the adult price could easily get by Mrs. Guthrie. The Guthries closed the theater because of lack of business. They installed the cable TV system in 1958. That was the year Mr. Guthrie died. The business was left up to Mrs. Guthrie and Corky. Mrs. Guthrie realized she could not take care of a business and her big house at the same time. In 1976 they sold the cable system business. Since then, Mrs. Guthrie has been semi-retired, but she keeps very busy. She writes a column for the Wheeler paper, she works part time at the theater. "I have gone a circle you see and I'm back into the theater". Mrs. Guthrie's philosophy of life is: "Keep busy, do something constructive. Think of others, be alert to the needs and change in people and circumstances. make an endeavor to honor what is going on. Never mope or complain. There is no excuse for boredom, read or learn a hobby, trust in God." Also Mrs. Guthrie's attitude toward Wheeler people is "Wheeler people must be the friendliest, best, most gracious, and hospitable people in the world. I have always thought

that from the very first. People began to call on me when I first came to Wheeler 48 years ago. They were very friendly and very easy to get acquainted with. Most of the people in Wheeler have a conscienceness of God and ambition for our country and community and loyalty for our Nation."

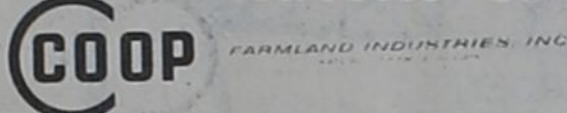

### Easter Eggs—Before And After

Eggs become an important holiday food with Easter just around the corner. In ancient times, eggs were sacred symbols and, later, were glorified in paintings and sculpture.

Today, eggs are honored around Easter and can be dyed, painted and trimmed. Be imaginative—use paper, lace, buttons, even ribbon—there is no end to the fun of decorating.

Before decorating, cook the eggs properly following these steps:

First, select top-quality eggs—Grade A or AA.

Place selected eggs (not too many) in a medium saucepan.

Add enough cold water to come at least one inch above the eggs, and heat to boiling.

Remove from heat, cover and let stand 15 to 20 minutes.

TIP: To prevent an egg from cracking while cooking, add a few drops of vinegar or lemon juice to the water.

Cool immediately in cold water for about 20 minutes.

To properly dye Easter eggs, follow these steps:

(1) Prepare the egg dye as directed on the package.

(2) Or, use a few drops of food coloring in custard cups or muffin tins.

(3) Dye only uncracked eggs.

(4) Cover the eggs fully with hot water while dyeing, and spoon dye over eggs with a tablespoon.

(5) Let stand, turning occasionally, until evenly colored.

(6) Spoon out eggs, and place on paper towels.

For some economical variations in dyeing eggs, cut designs from cellophane or adhesive tape. Paste on eggs before dyeing. Remove tape when dry for white designs.

Refrigerate Easter eggs promptly after dyeing—use the eggs within a few days. Discard all cracked eggs after the Easter egg hunt or use immediately—exposure to harmful bacteria can be dangerous. Here is a quick-and-easy recipe for those after-Easter eggs:

### SIMPLE DEVILED EGGS

6 hard-cooked eggs  
3 tablespoons mayonnaise  
2 tablespoons hot dog relish  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Paprika, if desired

Remove shells from hard-cooked eggs, and slice eggs in half lengthwise. With a teaspoon, remove egg yolks and place in a mixing bowl. Mash egg yolks with mayonnaise, relish and salt. Fill center of egg white with egg yolk mixture. Sprinkle paprika over egg, if desired. Chill and serve. Makes six servings.
