## FILING DEADLINES PASS FOR AREA ELECTIONS

### Wheeler Council Has 3 Openings

Each race in the April 7 City Council election will be contested. With three places on the council to be filled, seven people filed with the city secretary to have their names placed on the ballot.

Leon Moore is presently serving on the council in Place 1. He is seeking a second term on the council and has Kervin Roper as an opponent.

Berniece S. Hall, incumbent, has placed her name on the ballot for place 3 on the council. John M. Baird and Mark Frankenbery are also running for election to Place 3. Berniece will be seeking her first full term on the council.

Needed will be a one year term to be filled due to a resignation. Four candidates, Paul Hathaway, Jim Hamilton, Joe Darnell and Randy McCurley have placed their names on the ballot for the three places in the three year term.

Richard Watts has placed his name on the ballot for the one year term.

A change has been made in the position of Judge. Austin Caldwell will be the election Judge as Maurita Stribling will not be available.

Absentee voting will be conducted at the Mobeetie School building in the office of Bob Mickey, who will be absentee clerk and W. F. Howard, Jr., serving as deputy.

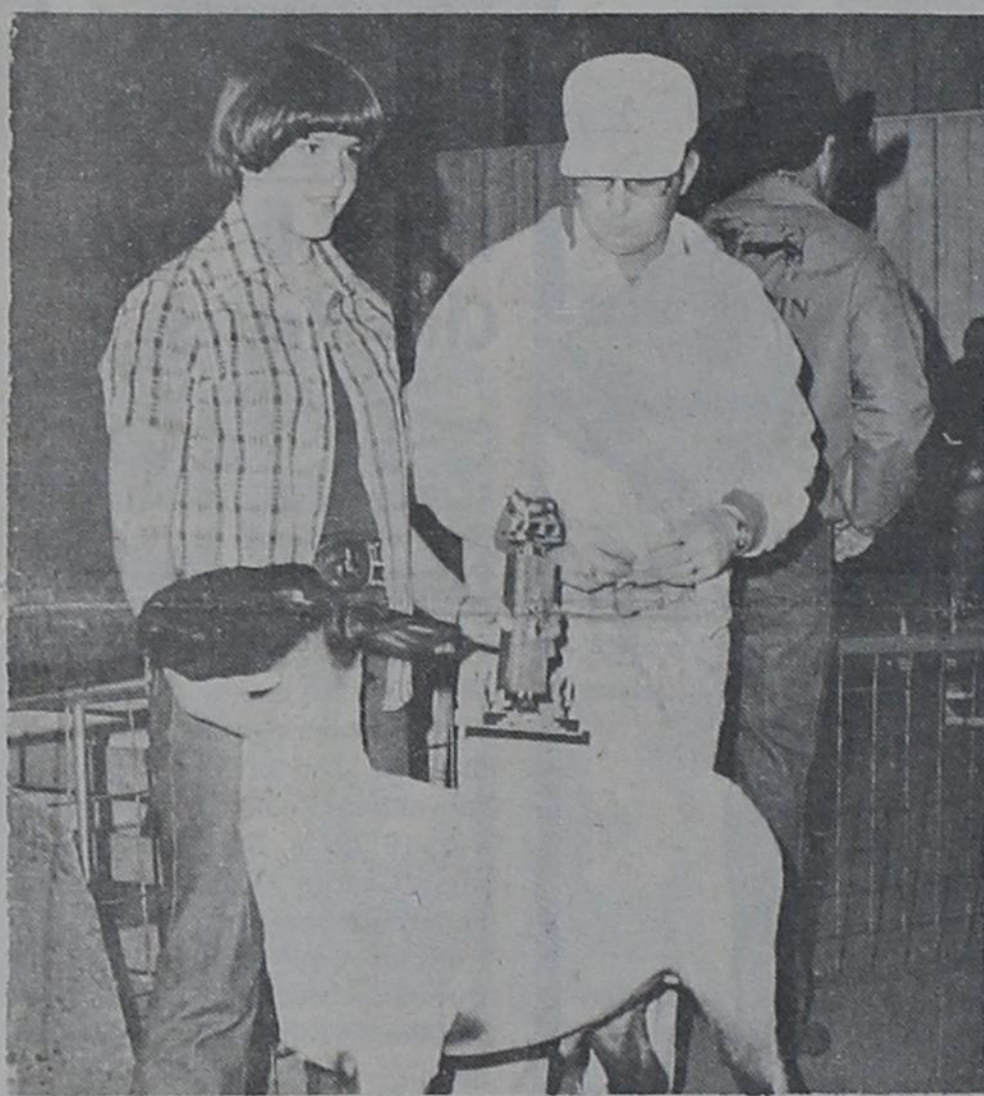

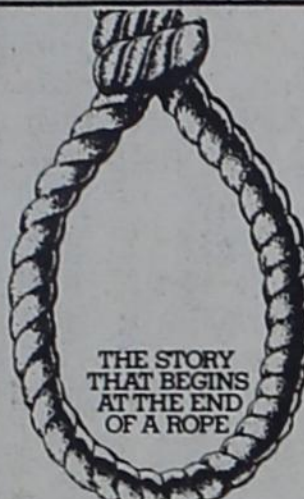

**Check Outdoor Playground Equipment For Safety**  
Help children play safely and happily by providing them with safe playground equipment.

Playground equipment related injuries send about 118,000 children to hospital emergency rooms each year, according to U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates.

Most injuries occur to children under 10 years old with falls from slides and climbing equipment the most frequent hazards. Parents can use the following suggestions to help safeguard their children from playground injury:

Select equipment wisely and take care with placement to help reduce the severity of injuries from falls, place equipment on a grassy or soft ground surface never on hard surfaces such as concrete, blacktop, brick or cinder.

Locate equipment at least six feet from fences, walkways, walls or other play areas.

Set equipment legs in concrete below ground level to prevent a tripping hazard.

Place metal sliding boards to prevent burns from sun-heated sliding surfaces.

Construct a landing pit in front of slides from sand or similar materials.

Place a block under each end of the seesaw so that children will not catch their feet if the board decends too rapidly.

Make maintenance checks at the beginning of the play season and at least every two weeks

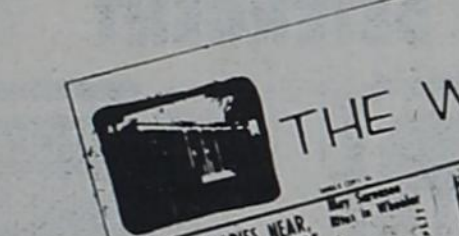

WHAT IS THE CHURCH? IS IT NECESSARY? IS IT A DENOMINATION? IS IT AN INVISIBLE FEDERATION OF ALL DENOMINATIONS? CAN A PERSON BE SAVED WITHOUT BEING A MEMBER OF ANY CHURCH? WHAT DOES CHRIST HAVE TO DO WITH THE CHURCH, IF ANYTHING? IF CHRIST IS THE SAVIOUR, WHY BELONG TO A CHURCH ANYWAY? ACTUALLY...

**IS THE CHURCH  
Really  
IMPORTANT?**

Only one book in the world, the Bible, can teach us accurately and fully about this widely misunderstood subject, the church. To clearly understand the church one must first clearly understand two principles relating to the church.  
The *first principle* is that Jesus Christ, and not man, was the builder, founder, head, and foundation of the church (Matthew 16:18); Ephesians 1:22; 1 Corinthians 3:11).  
The *second principle* to understand is that the word church means "the called out"—referring to those individuals who have been called out of the world through the gospel and have been redeemed by the blood of Christ (Acts 2:47; 2 Thessalonians 2:14; 1 Peter 1:18,19).  
The church is therefore the spiritual domain made possible, or purchased by, the blood of Christ (Acts 20:28; 1 Corinthians 6:19,20). This relationship is also described as the spiritual body of Christ (Ephesians 1:23; Colossians 1:18,24) and also as the kingdom of Christ (Colossians

1:13; Hebrews 12:28).  
When a person is baptized "into Christ" (Romans 6:3), he is at the same time baptized into the church of Christ (Acts 2:38-41), the body of Christ (1 Corinthians 12:13), and the kingdom of Christ (John 3:3-5). These are not three different organizations, but simply three different designations of the same spiritual fellowship in which Christ saves.  
**Therefore, all who have been redeemed by the blood of Christ are, without any choice, members of Christ's church or body or kingdom.**  
Does, then, one have to be a member of Christ's church or spiritual body or kingdom to be saved? While many will say "No" through misunderstanding, the Word of God teaches plainly that the church is that spiritual body which Christ will save (Ephesians 5:23). It necessarily follows that if a person wants to be a part of the spiritual body which Christ will save he must, therefore, be a member of Christ's church.

**Attend Meeting**

Clarence Zybach, Chairman of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District and Darville Atherton, member, recently attended the semi-annual meeting of the Panhandle Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts which was held in Spearman. The Association holds the meetings to get the Directors of its 25 member SWCD together to discuss common problems and possible solutions. Resolutions are taken at the meeting to be presented to the state wide meeting to be held in October in El Paso. Distinguished speakers included notable personalities in conservation highlighted by the appearance of David Firor, Southern Representative of the National Association of Conservation Districts. Of prime concern at the meeting was the deep trouble the very successful Great Plains Conservation Program faces today in Washington. Lavon Williams, District Conservationist for the Wheeler Soil Conservation Service accompanied the pair to the meeting.



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**Brush Control Range Seeding**

The ideal time is approaching to begin brush management activities to control shinnery and sagebrush according to Gary Briggs, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Pampa. "Brush control along with rang seeding, sound grazing systems, and proper range management provide the greatest opportunity that many ranchers have to increase production and income."

Briggs states that most of the brush control in Wheeler County is done by one of two methods, spraying or deep plowing. The spraying cost about 4.50 per acre while plowing cost 25.00 per acre. Plowing is a one time job usually while spraying takes several times to get good control.

"One very important item which should be considered when undertaking any type of brush management is its effect on wildlife," states Briggs. Wildlife such as deer, quail, and turkey are not only valuable from an aesthetic and recreational point of view but also provide a good source of income for area farmers and ranchers. Controlling brush in patterns and leaving brush along draws and hillsides provides travel lanes and cover for wildlife. Also, leaving desirable plants such as Oak, Elm, and Hackberry provides good wildlife food."

Briggs emphasizes, "A good brush control program will not only improve forage resources for domestic livestock but also will maintain or improve wildlife habitat."

For more information on how brush management will fit in your ranching operation contact the Soil Conservation Office located in Wheeler.

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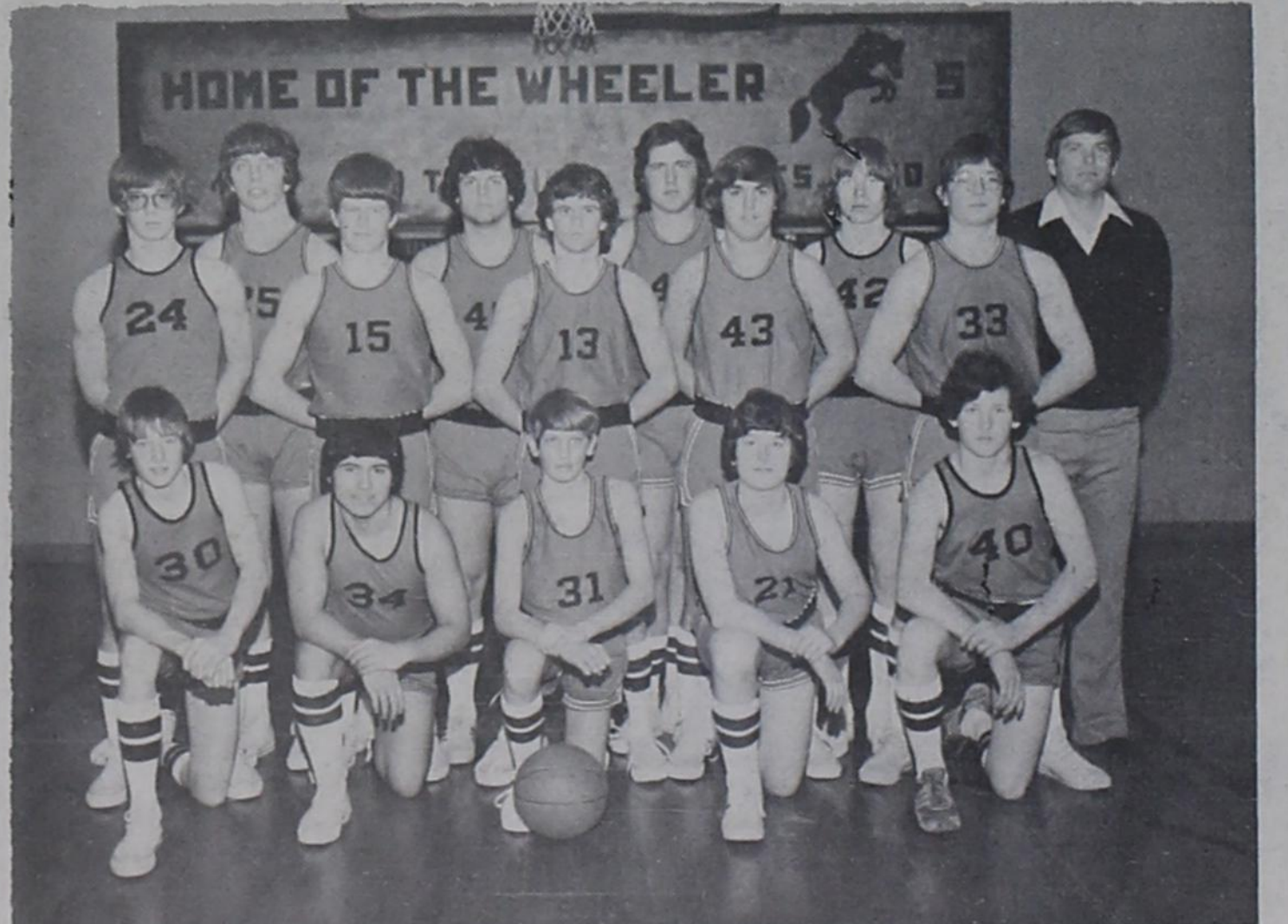

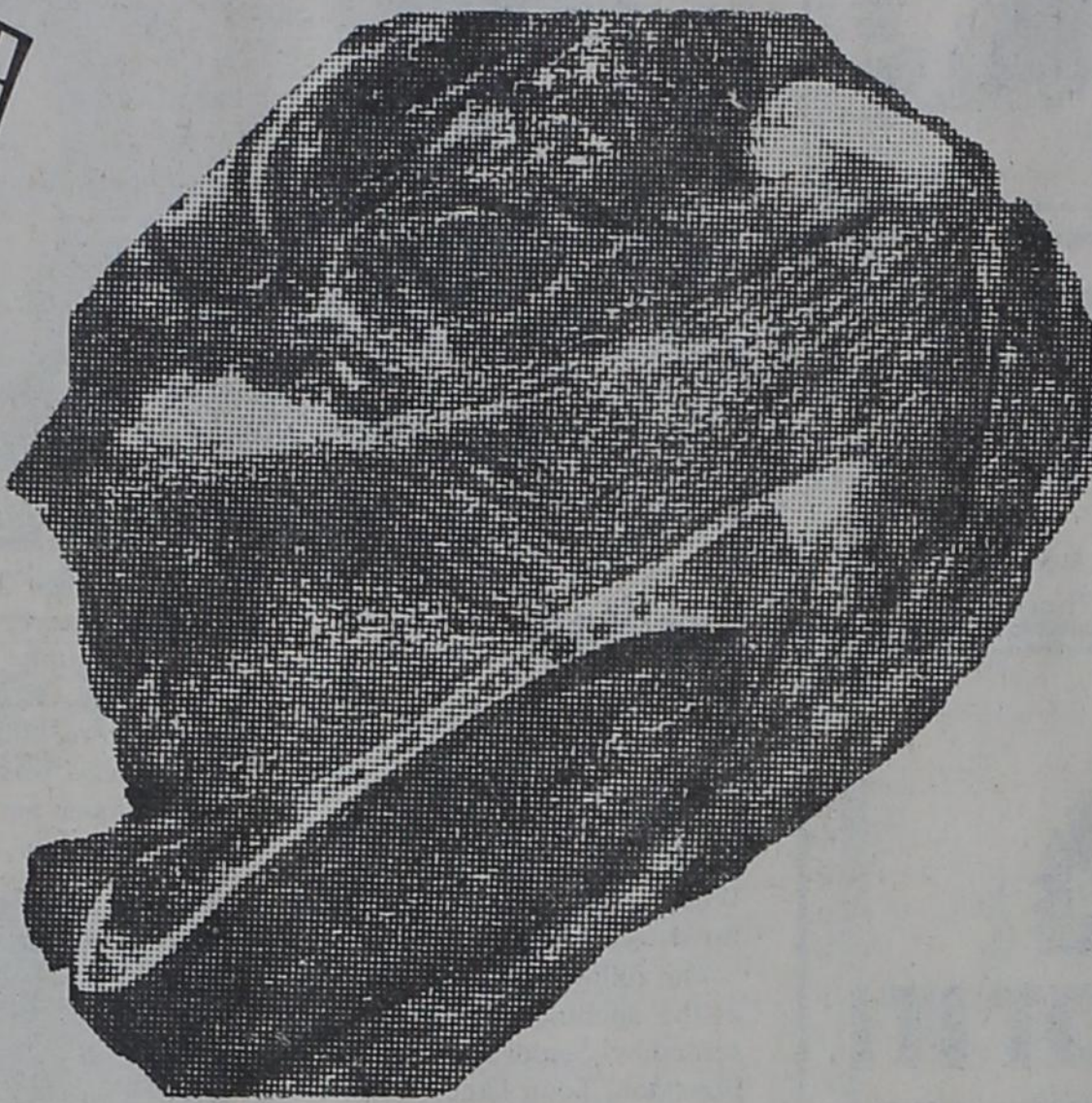
