

# FIRST NATIONAL BANK TO BE MOVED BY MONDAY

Monday, March 5, 1979, will be the first day of business for the First National Bank in Wheeler in their new building at 405 S. Alan L. Bean Blvd. The new building, located on 3/4

block has a floor space of 9,600 sq. ft. with a basement area of 2,232 sq. ft.—accessible through an outside entrance, this space will serve the community as a storm shelter.

With the opening of the new facilities, the First National Bank can offer their customers a complete line of services. Added services are: drive-in window, community room, and automatic

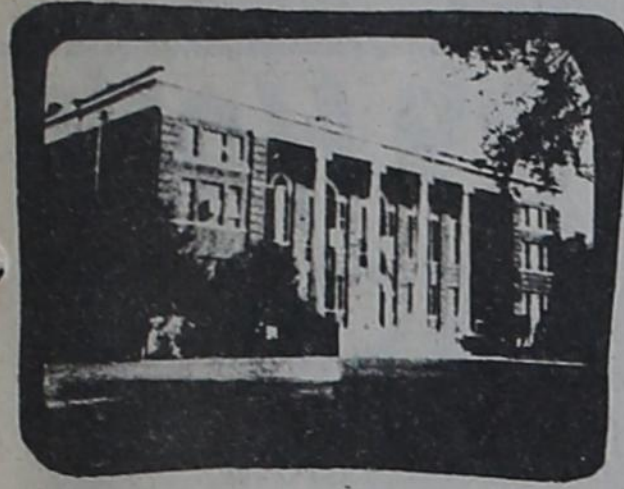
transfer—savings/checking. The bank will continue to offer night depository; safe deposit boxes (new and larger boxes are available); certificates of deposit, IRA, savings; official checks

(cashier's); travelers checks; installment loans; commercial loans; purchase of securities for individuals and demand deposits.

A greater amount of privacy will be offered in the new building. Each loan officer will have their own private office. Individuals or groups of individuals will have an area for viewing the contents of safety deposit boxes.

The completion of the bank is the realization of a dream formulated with the purchase of the

bank in 1970. At this time it was determined to build a new building when the deposits reached 10 million; the goal was reached in 1975. Some time was required to find a suitable location and then the purchase of the property and clear of old buildings required additional time. The ground breaking ceremonies were held June 14, 1977 with the building being completed for opening Monday.

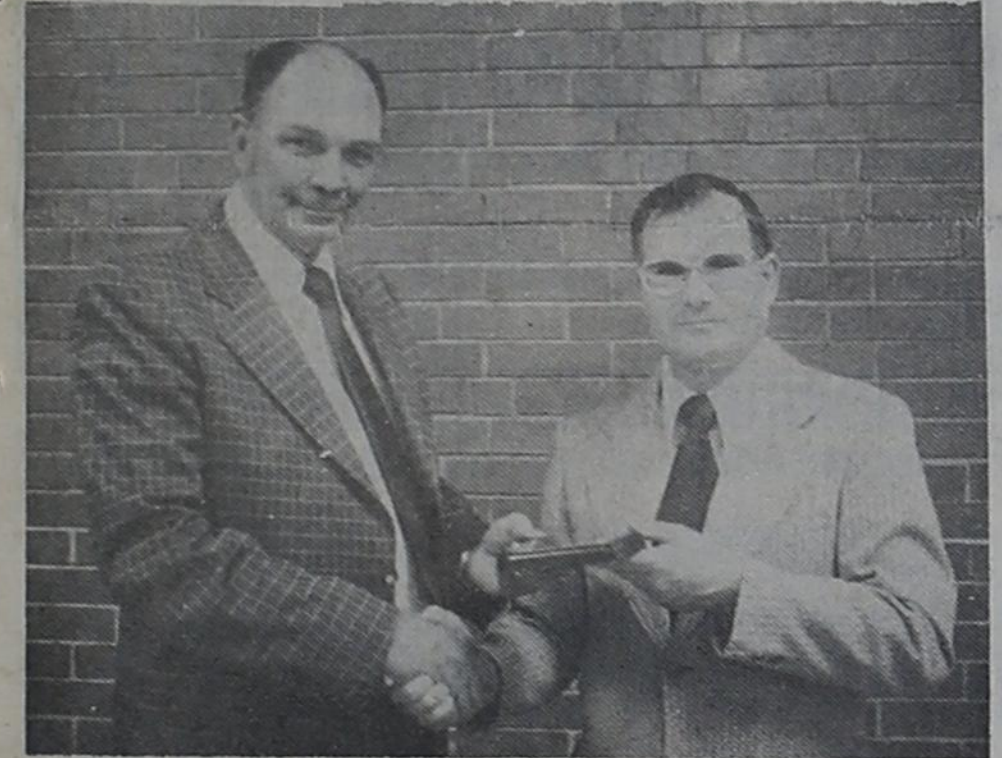

The annual Chamber of Commerce Installation Banquet was held Saturday, February 24, at the school cafeteria. Thomas



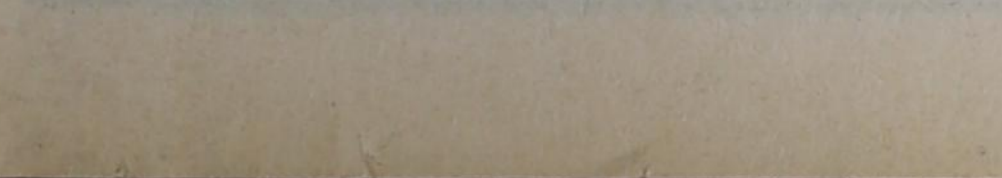

Roper, District Attorney Investigator, has placed his name on the ballot for place 1 on the council.

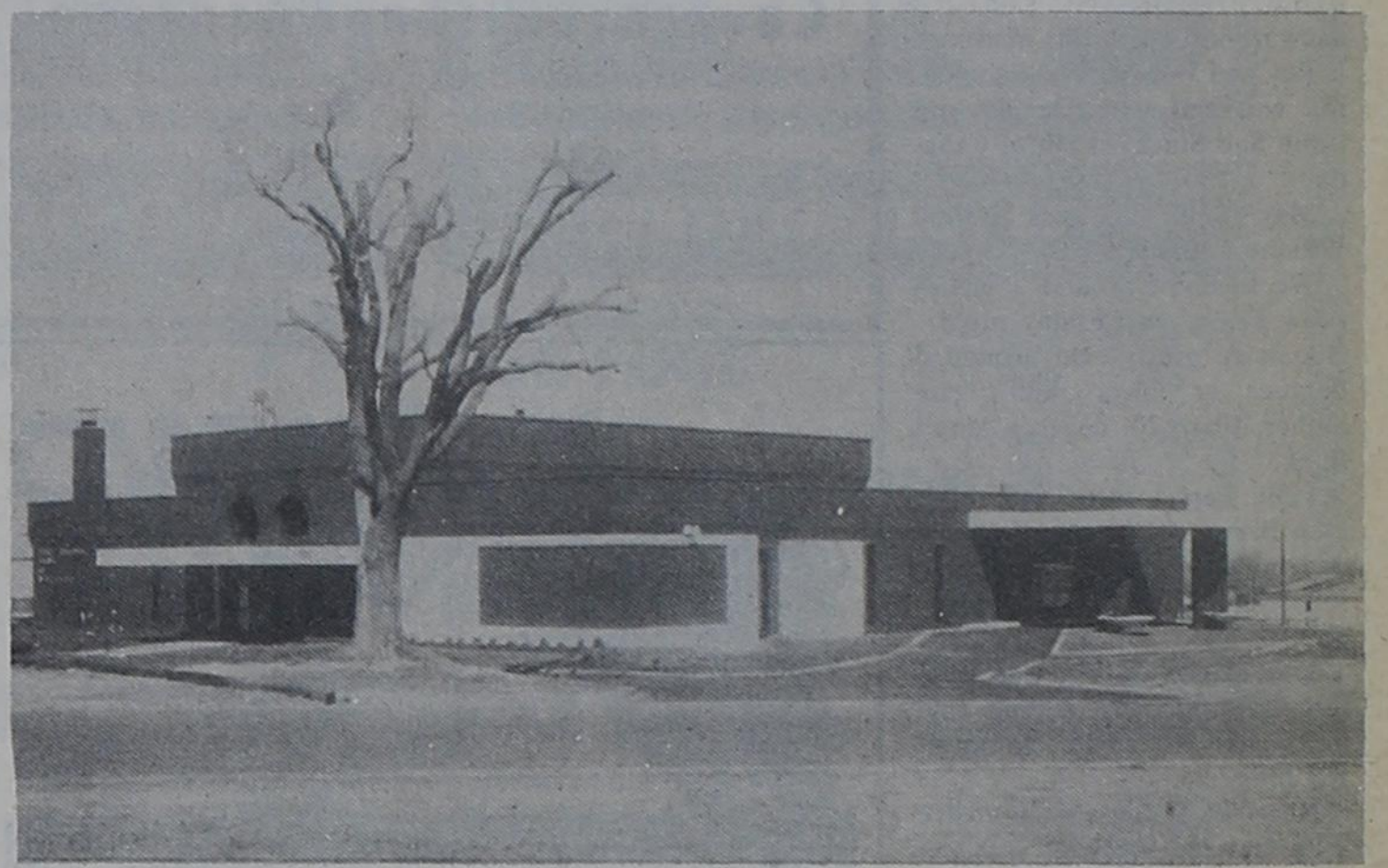

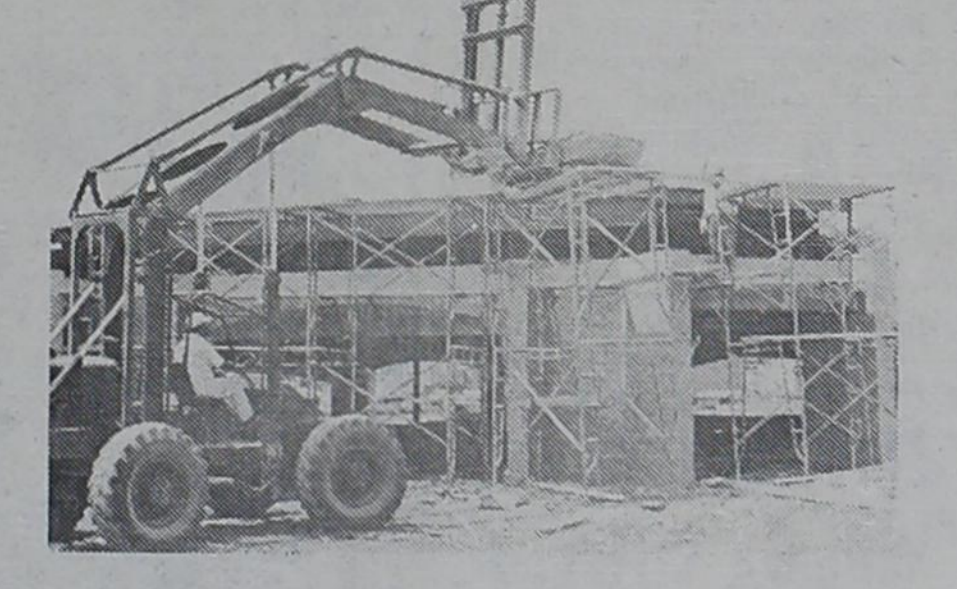

**LEARN NOT TO BURN**  
 By Ken Daughtry—Fire Marshall

- How can we make our homes safe from fire
1. The oven should be cleaned regularly to avoid an accumulation of grease, and grease containers should be kept away from the stove.
  2. If a grease fire starts on the stove it should be covered with a large flat lid or a wet towel. Ordinary baking soda or salt sprinkled on the fire will also smother it.
  3. If a gas range is used, it should be kept clean. Care should be taken that window curtains or hanging towels cannot blow over the flames.
  4. If a coal or wood stove is used, there should be sufficient clearance between the stove and walls. If there isn't sufficient clearance, the wall behind the stove should be covered with sheet asbestos or some other insulating material. This is especially important if plastic tile or tile board covers the kitchen walls. An insulated metal base should be on the floor beneath the stove.
  5. Stove pipes pipe collars and flues should be checked periodically for defects.
  6. Kerosene or gasoline should never be used to start or "quicken" the fire.
  7. Ashes should be placed in covered metal containers - never in woden or paperboard boxes.
  8. If an oil or kerosene stove is used, the following precautions should be observed: Keep main storage of oil outside. Take stove outside to fill oil reservoirs, if possible. Never refill when the stove is burning. Keep stove clean and free of dirt at all times. Never use gasoline, crank-case oil, or any oil containing gasoline. Operate the stove according to the manufacturer's instructions.
  9. The electric iron should always be disconnected when there is a phone call, or a caller at the door.
  10. When buying a new iron, one should be selected that is listed by Underwriters' laboratories, Inc. Such irons will have thermostatic control.
  11. Never keep flammable or explosive cleaning fluid, such as gasoline, in the house. Only safe cleaning fluids should be used.
  12. Gasoline should never be used as a cleaner.
  13. Oily rags or cloths saturated with furniture polish, paints, or wax should never be kept in closets or cupboards. The ones that are used should be kept in covered metal containers. Others should be disposed of. Waxers and floor mops should be kept in a cool, open place, such as the porch.
  14. Flour, uncooked cereals or dust from a vacuum cleaner or dust pan should never be thrown into a stove fire. Dust is explosive. It should be wrapped up and disposed of safely.

course is taught, a person interested only in ECA need not take the 40 hours in hospital. Benefits of taking the classes for personal knowledge include the learning CPR—the action taken when a patient suffers complete heart failure, the care of accident victims and bandaging and splinting.

For those interested in working with the Ambulance service, an ECA is all that is necessary; however, the EMT is recommended. The 40 hours in hospital time gives the individual an opportunity to be around sick people and become accustomed to working with them. Included in the 40 hours are 16 hours in the emergency room at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

If the EMT course is offered, those people who already are certified as ECA's will have to take the course to become EMT's. The class will serve as a refresher for these people.

If interested in either of these courses, please make contact by Tuesday, March 6.

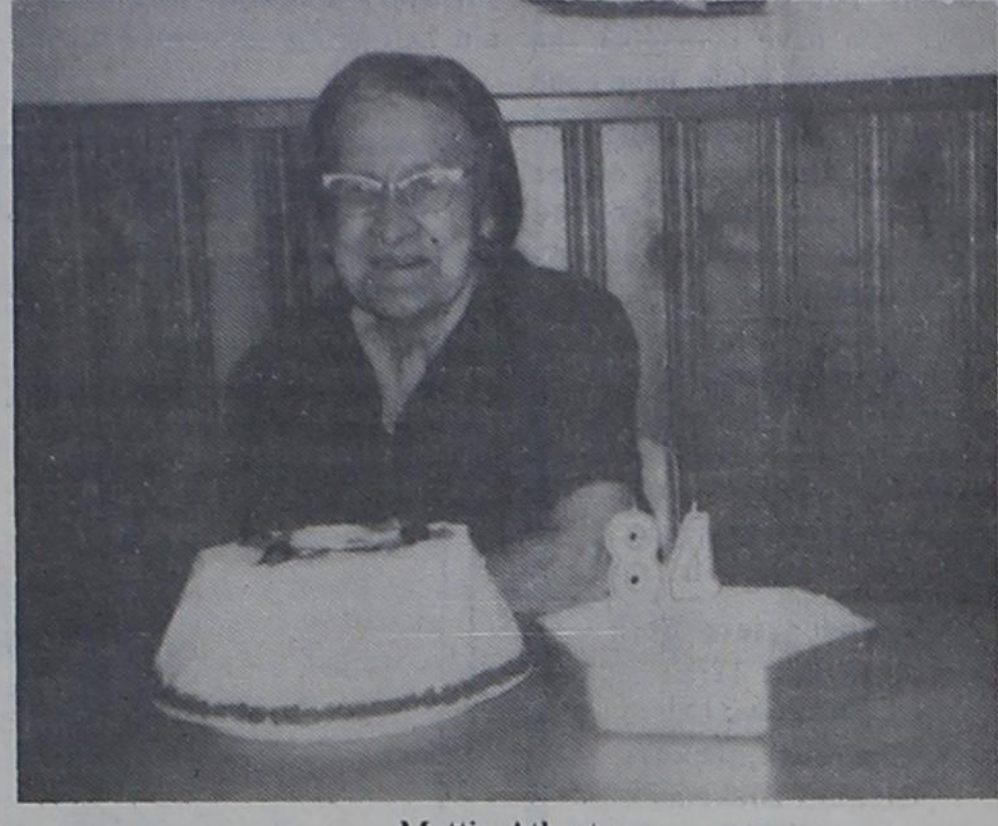

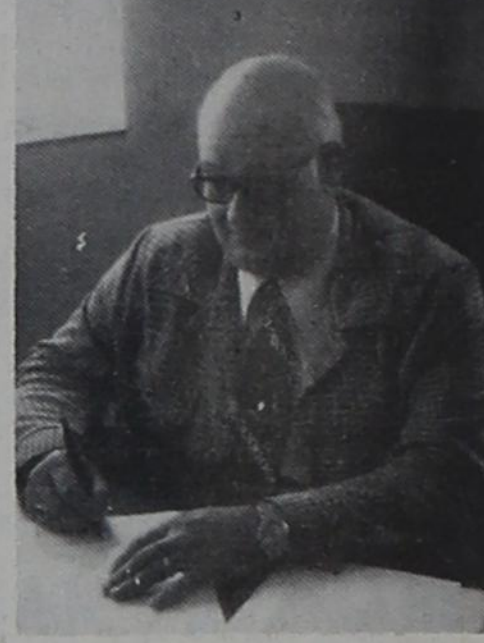
