## SPECIAL MEETING

### CITY COUNCIL PASSES PROPERTY, USE ORDINANCE

Special meeting of January 5, 1979 opened with Councilwomen Berniece Hall presenting and reading a proposed ordinance to regulate spacing of residential structures in the limits of the City of Wheeler.

After discussion of ordinance (being Ordinance #108) Councilwoman Berniece Hall motion to pass same. Louis Stas second, motion carried.

Louis Stas motion the meeting adjourn, Johnny Velasquez second, motion carried.

#### ORDINANCE #108

An Ordinance establishing and providing for and regulating the use of land, buildings and structures, and establishing minimum required distances between residential structures and providing the penalty for violation of the provisions of such ordinance not to exceed \$200.00 for each violation and providing injunctive relief to persons effected by the violation of said ordinance. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas:

WHEREAS, under the laws of the State of Texas authority is conferred on the City of Wheeler to establish certain requirements within the city for the purpose of regulating the use of land and controlling the density of population to the end that the public health, safety, convenience and general welfare be promoted, now therefore, Be it ordained by the City of Wheeler, Texas:

That no building or structure or part thereof shall be erected, altered or converted for any use within a residential district in which it is located, including all trailer houses located within said residential districts, unless said residential buildings or trailer houses are a minimum distance of at least fifteen feet (15') apart. That, except for trailer houses, no more than four (4) residential dwellings under separate roof shall be located within a 300 foot street frontage or highway frontage. No structure or portion thereof shall be built closer than 10' to the property boundary line.

That any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined any sum, not exceeding \$200.00; and each and every day that the provisions of this ordinance are violated shall constitute a separate and distinct offence. In addition to the said penalty provided for, the right is hereby conferred and extended upon any residential property owner within the city of Wheeler, Texas, to bring suit in such Court or Courts having jurisdiction thereof and obtain such remedies as shall be available at law and equity in the protection of the rights of such property owners.

The Wheeler Basketball teams met their first opponents in district play for the 1978-79 season Tuesday evening. The teams met Quail on the home court. Both teams were victorious with the boys' final score 58-44 and the scoreboard for the girls game read 35-32 at the end of overtime play.

Beth Willis led her Mustangettes with 8 points earned in the game with Quail. She was followed by Missy Wiggins, Elize Christner and Tammy Moore, each earning 5 points for their team.

The Mustangs score by quarter in the Quail game was 7-10, 25-18, 43-36 and 58-44. Earning the most points for their respective teams were Myron Jolly with 26 and Alston with 18. Recovering the most rebounds

for the Mustangs was Jolly with 17 and Kevin Andis with 11.

In commenting on the Wheeler boys, Coach Simpson had these comments: "Our full court press is beginning to come around but our shooting from the floor is terrible. In last nights game, in the first quarter, we shot 15% (3-19) but for the final 3 quarters we shot 34%. In order for us to be successful we need to shoot 40% from the floor.

This Friday we go to Allison and next Tuesday we host Samnorwood which will be a key game for the district standings. At this point in the season Samnorwood is the best team in the district and it will be a must win for the Mustangs if we are going to contend for the district title. The Wheeler teams traveled to Canadian over the weekend and

In "The Love Child" by Philippa Carr, Priscilla Eversleigh fights off the man who ravaged her, who is attempting to possess her daughter, and who separates her through a dark secret they share from the man she truly loves. During the turbulent period of the "Popish Plots", fourteen-year-old Priscilla lives untouched in the haven of Eversleigh, the family estate, with her illegitimate sister, Christabel. Danger and romance push their way to her doorstep. A refugee stumbles into their midst—Jocelyn Frinton, a young man haunted by a pursuer. Later Priscilla discovers she will bear his child. A daughter, Carlotta, is born and the family returns to Eversleigh again.

"A Woman Of Quality," by Jan Westcott, is the sweeping romance of a great family and the servants bound to it in loyalty and illicit love. **Employers To File  
W-2 Tax Forms**

"Beginning with the tax year 1978, employers are to file Federal Forms W-2 with the Social Security Administration," stated Howard L. Weatherly, Branch Manager of the Pampa Social Security Office. "These reports for 1978 are due by the last day of February of this year," Weatherly continued. Annual reporting will eliminate the need for filing of quarterly detailed reports with the Internal Revenue Service by employers. However, employers will still have to file quarterly summary reports with the IRS. People who employ domestic workers will still have to file Form 942 on a quarterly basis. The requirements for these people have not changed. Most employers will have to send their Forms W-2 to the Social Security Administration on paper forms. The form that will be used, will be the revised Form W-2 or W-2P Copy A. This copy of the Form W-2 will be sent to the Federal Government for screening and scanning operations prior to each individual's work record being credited with the reported amount of wages. It is, therefore, extremely important that all employers make completely legible copies, typed if at all possible, to avoid errors in postings.

"Large employers with computer capabilities are encouraged to file their reports on magnetic tapes, diskettes, or disk cartridges," concluded Weatherly.
