ORDIANCE #108

An Ordiance establishing and providing for and regulating the use of land, buildings and structures, and establishing minimum required distances between residental structures and providing the penalty for violation of the provisions of such ordinance not to exceed \$200.00 for each violation and providing injuctive relief to persons effected by the violation of said ordinance. Be it the City of Wheeler, Texas:

WHEREAS, under the laws of the State of Texas authority is conferred onthe City of Wheeler to establish certain requirements within the city for the purpose of regulating the use of land and controlling the density of population to the end that the public health, safety, convenience and general welfare be promoted, now therefore, Be it ordained by the City of Wheeler, Texas:

That no building or structure or part thereof shall be erected, altered or converted for any use within a residential district in which it is located, including all trailer houses located within said residential districts, unless said residential buildings or trailer houses are a minimum distance of at least fifteen feet (15') apart.

That, except for trailer houses, no more than four (4) residential dwellings under separate roof shall be located within a 300 foot street frontage or highway frontage. No structure or portion thereof shall be built closer that

10' to the property boundry line. That any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined any sum, not exceeding \$200.00; and each and every day that the provisions of this ordinance are violated shall constitute a separate and distinct offence. In addition to the said penalty provided for, the right is hereby conferred and extended upon any residential property owner within the city of Wheeler, Texas, to bring suit in such Court or Courts having jurisdiction thereof and obtain such remedies as shall be available at law and equity in the protection of the rights of such property owners.





Employers To File W-2 Tax Forms

"Beginning with the tax year 1978, employers are to file Federal Forms W-2 with the Social Security Administration," stated Howard L. Weatherly, Branch Manager of the Pampa Social Security Office. "These reports for 1978 are due by the last day of February of this year," Weatherly continued. Annual reporting will eliminate the need for filing of quarterly detailed reports with the Internal Revenue Service by employers. However, employers will still have to file quarterly summary reports with the IRS. People who employ domestic workers will still have to file Form 942 on a quarterly basis. The requirements for these people have not changed.

Most employers will have to send their Forms W-2 to the Social Security Administration on paper forms. The form that will be used, will be the revised Form W-2 or W-2P Copy A. This copy of the Form W-2 will be sent to the Federal Government for screening and scanning operations prior to each individual's work record being credited with the reported amount of wages. It is, therefore, extremely important that all employers make completely legible copies, typed if at all possible, to avoid errors in postings.

"Large employers with computer capabilities are encouraged to file their reports on magnetic tapes, diskettles, or disk cartridges," concluded Weatherly.
