Windbreaks For Conservation

Severe windstorms can make life difficult in rural areas such as Wheeler County. One of the best ways, and certainly the most beautiful way, to help tame these winds is thru the installation of a windbreak.

Farmstead headquaters is the one area where windbreaks are most beneficial. The trees effectively block the speed of the wind. It is estimated that a well planned and established windbreak can also save up to 30 percent of heating and cooling costs. The windbreak also improves the beauty and privacy of the area.

Wildlife cover is another benefit derived from windbreaks as the trees provide cover and in some cases food for many species of small wildlife.

A windbreak consisting of two rows of evergreens such as Eastern Red Cedar or Ponderosa Pine can provide year round wind protection. Additional rows of other trees such as ash, plum or pecan will provide wind protection plus delightful shade during the summer.

The cost of establishing a windbreak is surprisingly small. Potted evergreens cost one dollar each with bare root seedlings costing less. 
