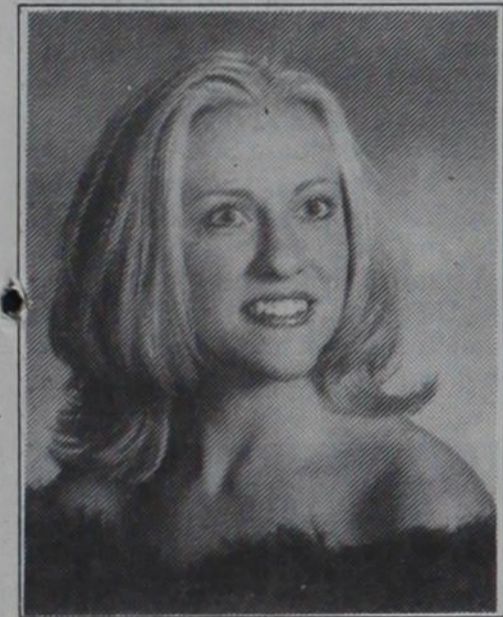

Bret Goad

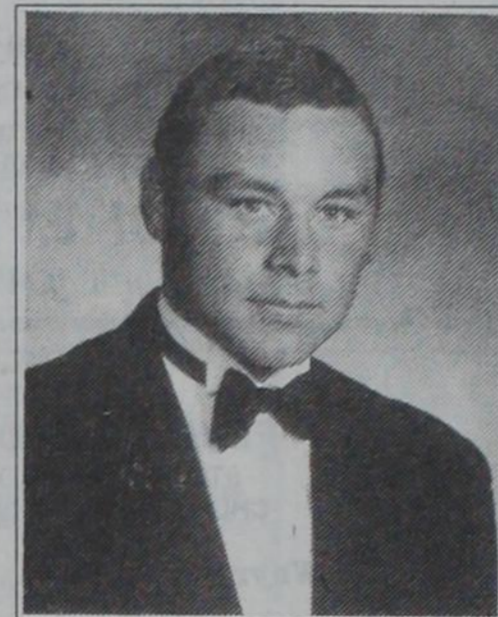

Brad Frame

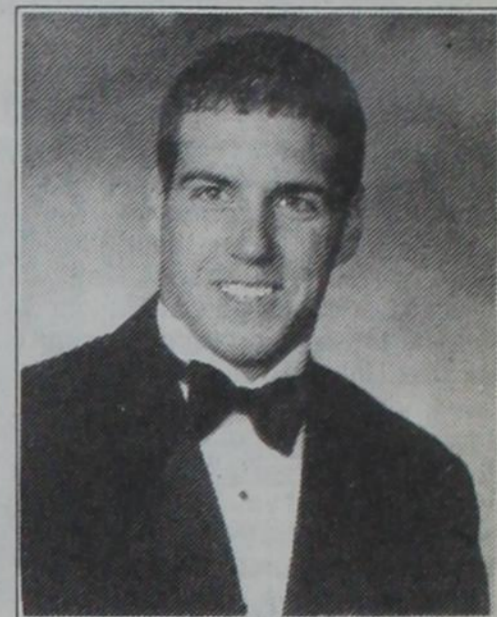

Kelby Ledbetter

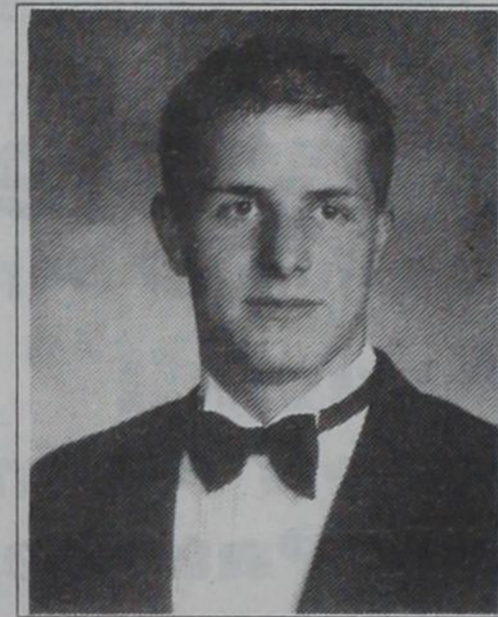

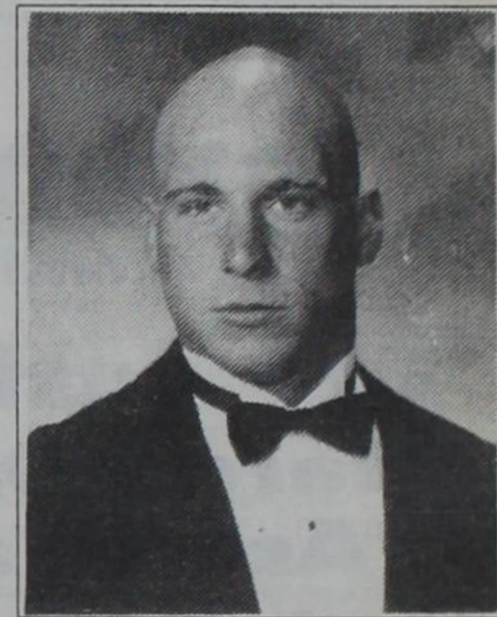

GRASS FIRE ON UNKNOWN ORIGIN BURNS 150-180 ACRES OF GRASS

The Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene of a fire 11 miles north of Wheeler (west on County Road C) on Tuesday afternoon. The fire was reported on the Olaf Siviage property. Wheeler county fire departments, Briscoe, Mobeetie, Allison, Kelton and Wheeler were called out to help fight the fire. Canadian also was called to the scene.

The fire was self starting. The point of ignition was the middle of a C.R.P. lovegrass field, 200 yards from FM 1046, between Briscoe and Mobeetie.

There were no tracks in the field; the flames just flared up. Possibly a piece of glass in the field was catching the rays from the sun just right.

Burned was approximately 150 to 180 acres including some land belonging to the Finsterwald family. One old abandoned house was burned.

The fire was spotted between 2:30 and 3:00 p.m. The Wheeler department remained on the scene until around 7:30. The Briscoe Fire Department was called back to the scene. (Continued Page 8)

MUSTANGS FALL TO SUNRAY 14-7

The Wheeler Mustangs traveled to Sunray last Friday to tangle with the Bobcats. It was a game in which momentum would swing from side to side. It was also a game of big plays for the Sunray offense and the Mustang Defense.

The Mustang defense would shine in the first quarter as they would keep Sunray's offense pinned deep in their own end of the field. But the Mustang offense could only capitalize once as James Chapman hit Caleb Finsterwald for a 23 yard TD at the start of the second quarter.

The Mustang Defense would have it's ups and downs throughout the night as they gave up some big plays, but also had three goalline stands that prevented the Sunray offense from putting more points on the board. One goalline stand ended as Bret Goad knocks the ball loose from a Sunray back on the Mustang 2 yard line. Another Sunray threat is halted as James Chapman picks off a pass at the Mustang 5 yard line. The final stand came late in the fourth quarter as the Mustang defense would force Sunray to settle for a field goal, but a roughing the kicker would give the Bobcats 4 more downs inside the Mustang 5 yardline. The defense would hold again and force a field goal which the Bobcats would miss.

The offense continued to improve, but could not put any long drives together that would enable them to put more points on the board.

Program Introduces D.A.R.E. Program Tues.

David Watson, D.A.R.E. Officer with the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department, presented a program for the parents and other citizens to show what the D.A.R.E. program teaches the fifth and sixth grade students in Wheeler School.

Watson was hoping for a better response to the supper and program. D.A.R.E. does not teach students about drugs, it helps youths resist peer pressure and build self-esteem. The youngsters are going to learn about drugs, they need to learn how to say "NO". The instructor only "touches on the subject of drugs and moves on" to the building of self-esteem and the resistance of peer pressure.

The 18-week course offers the students to get to know an officer of the law and build a trust in him. Too often officers are pointed out by parents and told "If you don't behave, he is going to put you in jail." Youngsters need to think of officers as their friend, someone they can turn to when they need help.

One D.A.R.E. lesson is presented each week for a period of 17 weeks. At the end of this time a graduation program is held.

The D.A.R.E. program is trying to reach the youngsters before they are faced with the temptation. The program tries to "Give them the tools to make the right decision."

There is a drug problem in Wheeler. We need to face the problem and begin working to prevent it's growth. To the parents of D.A.R.E. students, show an interest in the program. Take the time to attend at least one class during the semester. When something is brought home, look at it, and discuss the program with the children. The classes are open to the public; in fact, the public is urged to attend.

Books and pamphlets are available through the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department. Get a copy and learn about the program. The public needs to show their support in order for the program to continue.

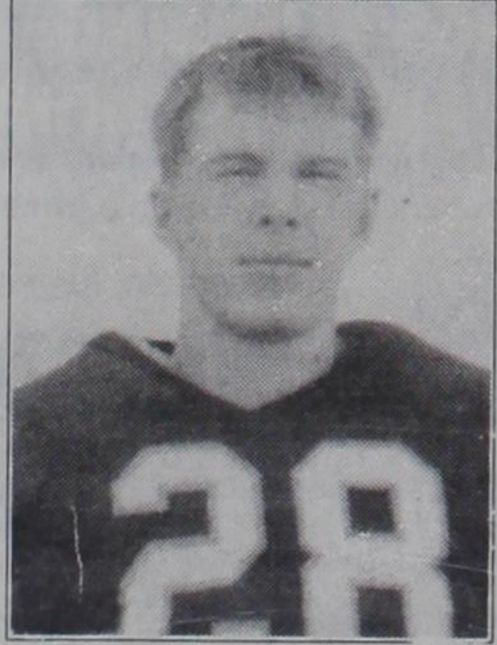

From The Minister's Desk:

One of this nation's most famous philanthropist was John D. Rockefeller who made a fortune in the oil and transportation industries during the late 1870's. However, after he retired in the 1890's, Mr. Rockefeller established several foundations, giving more than \$50 million dollars for public use.

Following his retirement, Mr. Rockefeller was interviewed by a newspaper reporter and was asked: "Mr. Rockefeller, how much money does it take to make someone happy?" The reply of Mr. Rockefeller simply was: "A little bit more."

I think that Mr. Rockefeller's answer was very perceptive. In this materialistic world, it has become very difficult to find people who are characterized by contentment. Perhaps the reason for this lack of contentment is that many people fail to recognize the real values of life. These values can be pinpointed by at least three observations. These observations are:—

1. Do not overestimate material possession. Jesus said: "Beware and be on your guard against every form of greed; for not even when one has an abundance does his life consist of his possessions." (Luke 12:15) Material abundance is not the abundant life.

2. Do not worry about what you do not have. Satan's most effective

temptations is to convince people that they must be in a constant pursuit of things if they are to be happy. When it is reduced to its lowest level, this temptation suggests that contentment depends upon the amount of things that people possess.

Yet the New Testament says: "—Godliness actually is a means of great gain, when accompanied by contentment. For we have brought nothing into the world so we cannot take anything out of it either. And if we have food and covering, with these we shall be content. (1 Timothy 6:6-8)

Simply put, contentment is not found in the amount of things that people possess.

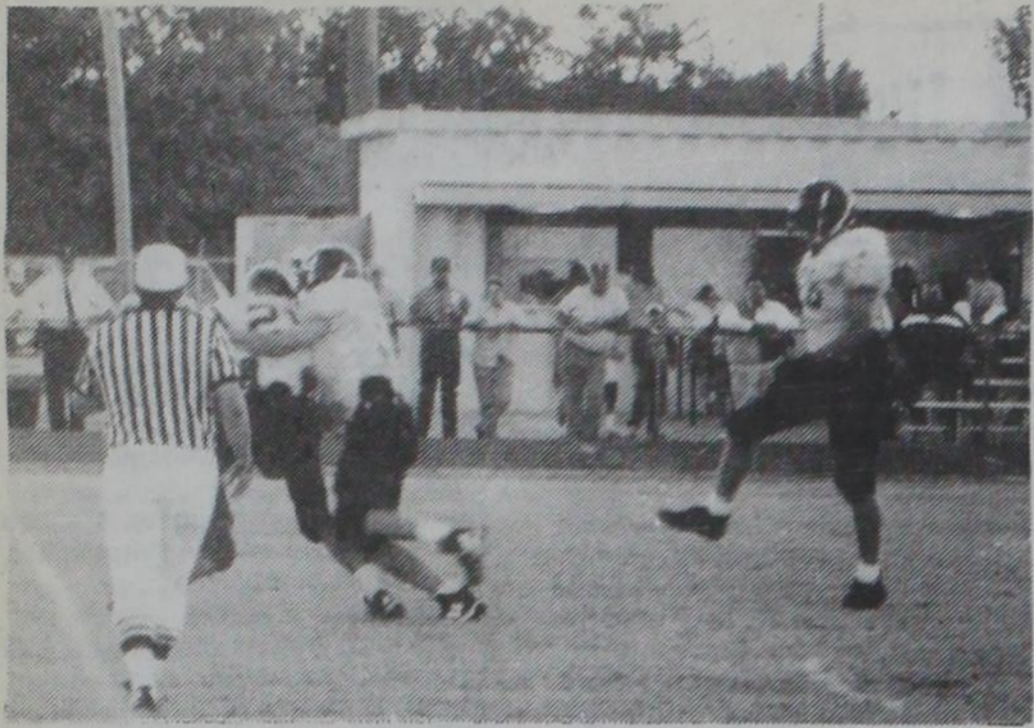

D.A.R.E. Program

5th and 6th Grade Curriculum
The following outlines the D.A.R.E. curriculum, one lesson is presented each week throughout a grade school semester.

1. Introducing D.A.R.E. - Acquaints students with role of police and practices for student safety.

2. UNDERSTANDING THE EFFECTS OF MIND-ALTERING DRUGS - Helps students understand harmful effects of drugs.

3. CONSEQUENCES - Helps students understand the negative consequences of drug use and the positive consequences of saying no to drugs and avoiding violence.

4. CHANGING BELIEFS ABOUT DRUG USE - Makes students aware of kinds of peer pressure they may face and helps them learn to say no to offers to use drugs.

5. RESISTANCE TECHNIQUES - WAYS TO SAY "NO" - Teaches students ways to say no in resisting various types of pressure.

6. BUILDING SELF-ESTEEM - Helps students understand that self-image results from positive and negative feelings and experiences.

7. ASSERTIVENESS: A RESPONSE STYLE - Teaches that assertiveness is a response style that enables a person to state his or her own rights without loss of self-esteem.

8. MANAGING STRESS WITHOUT TAKING DRUGS - Helps students recognize stress and suggests ways to deal with it other than by taking drugs.

9. REDUCING VIOLENCE - Helps students identify nonviolent ways to deal with anger and disagreement.

10. MEDIA INFLUENCES ON DRUG USE AND VIOLENCE - Helps students develop the understanding and skills needed to analyze and resist media presentations about alcohol, drug use and violence.

11. MAKING DECISIONS ABOUT RISKY BEHAVIOR - Helps students apply the decision-making process in evaluating the results of various kinds of risk-taking behavior, including that of drugs and violence.

12. SAYING 'YES' to POSITIVE ALTERNATIVES - Helps students find out about activities that are interesting and in which they can achieve success.

13. POSITIVE ROLE MODELING - older student leaders and other positive role models that do not use drugs talk to younger students to clarify the misconception that those who use drugs are in the majority.

14. RESISTING GANG AND GROUP VIOLENCE - Helps students identify situations in which they may be pressured by gangs and evaluate the consequences of the choices available to them.

15. DARE SUMMARY - Helps students summarize and assess what they learned from the program.

16. TAKING A STAND - Students take a positive stand to be drug-free and to avoid violence by putting their commitment in writing and reading it aloud.

17. CULMINATION - Student graduation from the D.A.R.E. program.

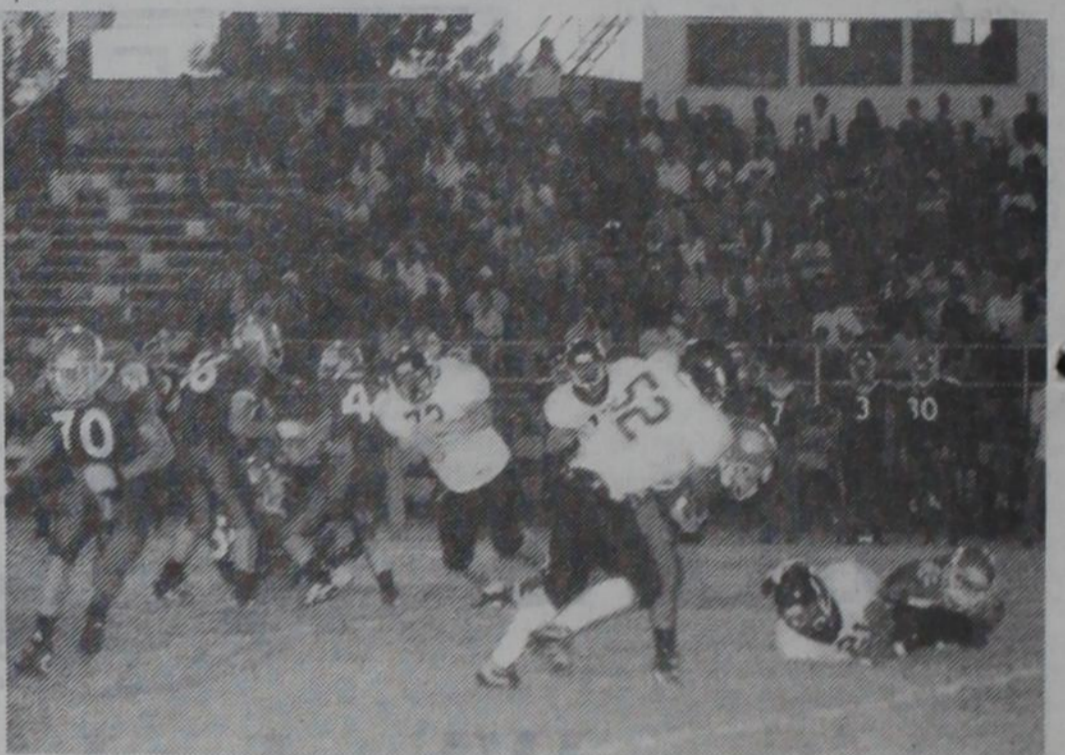


TOUCHDOWN: Caleb Finsterwald, #24, carries the pigskin across for the 6 point score. Gavin McQueen, #28, follows him across the line.

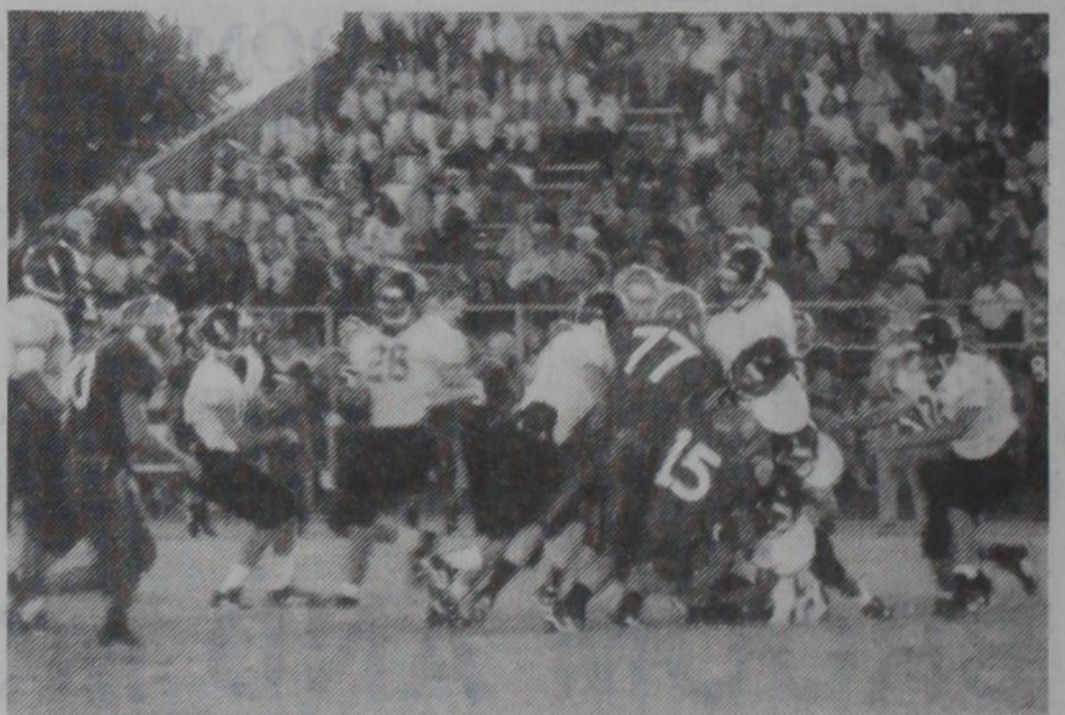
BSA Hospice Grief Education & Support
