

# MUSTANGS AND ITALY IN SEMI-FINAL CONTEST FRI.

And now it is down to four teams remaining in the chase for the coveted state crown and the

Italy Gladiators are the semi-final opponents of the Wheeler Mustangs this Friday night in Iowa

Park. Iowa Park is a familiar place to the Mustangs as that is the site of

their state championship victory in 1977 and this year's edition of the Mustangs hope that it is a good omen as they continue on in their battle to bring another silver trophy back to Wheeler.

The road gets rougher each week and Friday night's 7:30 kickoff promises to be the Mustangs greatest challenge of the year.

Italy is no stranger to winning as the Gladiators have only a tie in last year's playoff action and a loss to Class A Meridian this year to mar their two year record. Italy advances to the semi-final game by virtue of a 27-13 bi-district win over Prosper and a quarter-final victory last week over Robert Lee, 26-14.

The Gladiators bring a 11-1

record into the game and possess the state's premier 100 yard dash man in Class B in the person of Ed Jackson, a legitimate 9.7 sprinter.

Like the Mustangs, Italy is a ground oriented team that uses a great blocking line with good quickness to break Jackson into the open. If an opponent keys too much on Jackson, the Gladiators effectively use running back Rod Pyburn and quarterback Balde-

mar Vargas to take up the slack. "Italy has an outstanding Class B football team and there is no doubt that they are the best ball club we have faced," Coach Joe Allen said this week. "To beat them we have to stop Jackson because he has killed everybody they have played but they also have the best quarterback we have faced so it will take a super defensive effort for us to come out on top."

Coach Allen went on to say, "I hope we can move the football on them and keep the ball away from them enough to get us some points on the board."

The head mentor of the Mustangs reported that Benny Baker is coming around following an injury in the Jayton contest and hopefully the big fullback and defensive tackle will be able to play. Several of the Mustangs have been bothered with colds this week but shouldn't be slowed down Friday.

Italy thinks that they can whip the Mustangs and a big reason for this belief is that they are playing 15 seniors who are experienced in playing the big game.

The Gladiators use the I formation along with a tandem set and have stayed in a 5-2 defense as their basic defensive alignment.

Wheeler is the home team in the game and for the first time in the playoffs will be suited out in solid black. The home stands at the stadium in Iowa Park are on the north side and the stadium is located just to the right of highway 287 on the west side of Iowa Park.

The Wheeler Mustangs combined the double tough running of tailback Marvin Grimes and fullback Kent Vise and a hard-nosed defense to gain a 26-0 victory over the Jayton Jaybirds last Friday night in Vernon in a Class B quarter-final matchup.

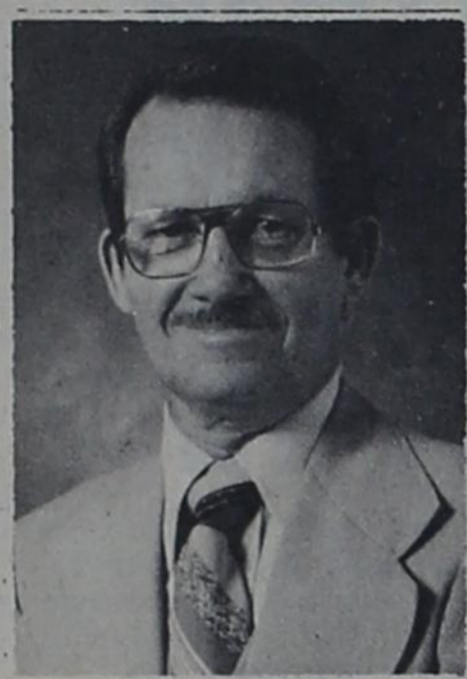
The Jaybirds probably played the Mustangs tougher than anyone so far this year but still were really no match for the state's number one ranked team.

Grimes and Vise gained all but 24 of the Mustangs yards on the ground as they ripped and slash-

ed on traps and power plays behind devastating blocking by the Mustangs forward wall.

Vise had 188 yards for the game and Grimes 146 yards as the Mustangs did what they do best and that is just run right at people.

Grimes got the call on third down and there was no stopping the bruising tailback as he rode a lead block by Benny Baker to get his first of four touchdowns. Mike Evans booted the extra point squarely through the uprights and the Mustangs led by 7-0.

Miles Farnsworth pounced on a loose ball on the Jaybird 29 as time was running out in the opening quarter and Wheeler was quick to jump on the break.

Grimes sped 21 yards at left end and after Vise picked up 5 more, Grimes went up the middle from 3 yards out. Evans booted his second straight extra point and the Mustangs were ahead by 14 just 10 seconds deep into the second period.

Trailing by 14, Jayton saw their hopes dashed when the Mustangs drove 71 yards on the ground in 14 plays and used up 8 minutes of the clock to muster

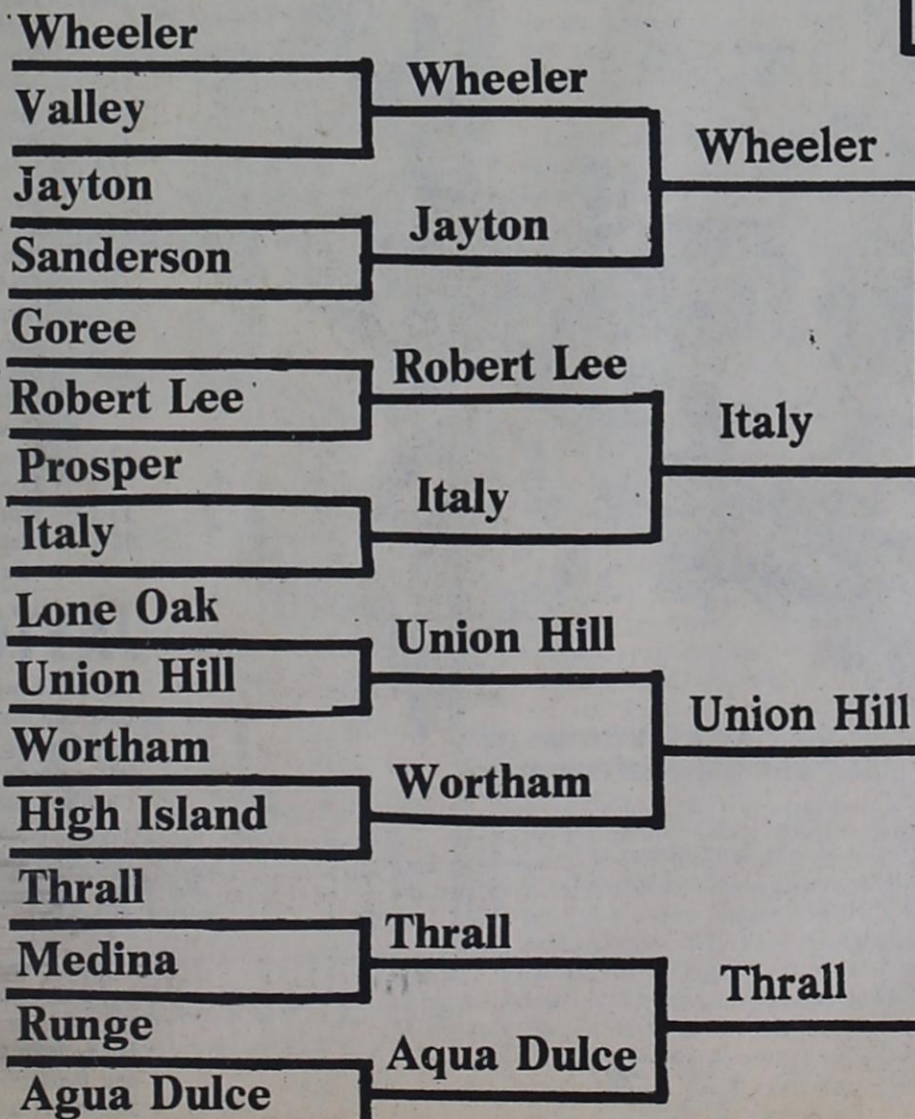

**Joe Don King — CEA Management of Small Grain Pest:**

The following information comes from Emory Boring, Area Entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Vernon.

Insecticides, although effective, are not the only way to control small grain pests. Cultural practices such as rotation, following, or grazing can reduce small grain pest damage. Small grains that are well-fertilized can withstand heavier pest infections than small grains suffering from the lack of plant nutrients.

One of the most effective controls for the winter grain mite is to rotate small grains with warm season crops. Winter grain mites are heaviest in fields that are planted to small grains year after year.

Grazing of small grains is an effective way of reducing greenbug population. Greenbug populations will be lighter in fields that are being grazed. However, heavy infestations do occur in grazed fields. Grazed fields should be inspected regularly to make sure the greenbug populations remain below damaging levels. Greenbug populations often increase rapidly and cause excessive damage during the spring after cattle are taken off small grain pasture. Therefore, fields should be inspected closely for several weeks after cattle are removed.

Wheat planted on fallowed ground, like wheat that is well-fertilized, can withstand heavier greenbug populations due to increased plant vigor. Larger, faster growing plants can withstand large numbers of greenbugs before excessive damage is caused. The damage caused by greenbugs is related to the number of aphids present, plant size, the growing conditions.

Other than cultural and insecticidal control measures, naturally occurring predator and parasite populations are important in suppression of pest populations. Spiders, nabids, lady beetles, and other greenbug predators are found in small grain fields during much of the growing season. These predators can be important in reducing pest populations during periods of warmer weather.

As temperatures warm up in spring, greenbugs and oat bird cherry aphids increase rapidly. An increase in aphid populations is usually followed by an increase in the number of parasitic wasps. These parasitic wasps deposit their eggs within greenbugs and other aphids. The wasp larvae develop inside grain plant. After maturing, the wasp cuts a hole in the rear of the aphid and emerges. Wasp populations increase rapidly during the spring. Once 15 percent of the greenbugs present in the field have been parasitized, it will only be a matter of days until the wasps control the entire aphid population.

Insecticides are very effective for control of small grain pests. However, some difficulty has been experienced in control of greenbug populations that are below the soil line. Generally, greenbug populations develop at or below the soil line, when dry, cold conditions are prevalent. Heavy rain or snow often reduces pest populations. Weather factors such as these can reduce damaging pest population to the point that insecticidal control is no longer needed.

Pest populations, plant size and vigor, and growing conditions should be considered when evaluating the pest situation. Information available in the publication, "MP-339, Suggestions for Controlling Insects and Mites on Corn, Sorghum, and Small Grains" at your County Extension Agent's office, will be helpful in management of small grain pests.

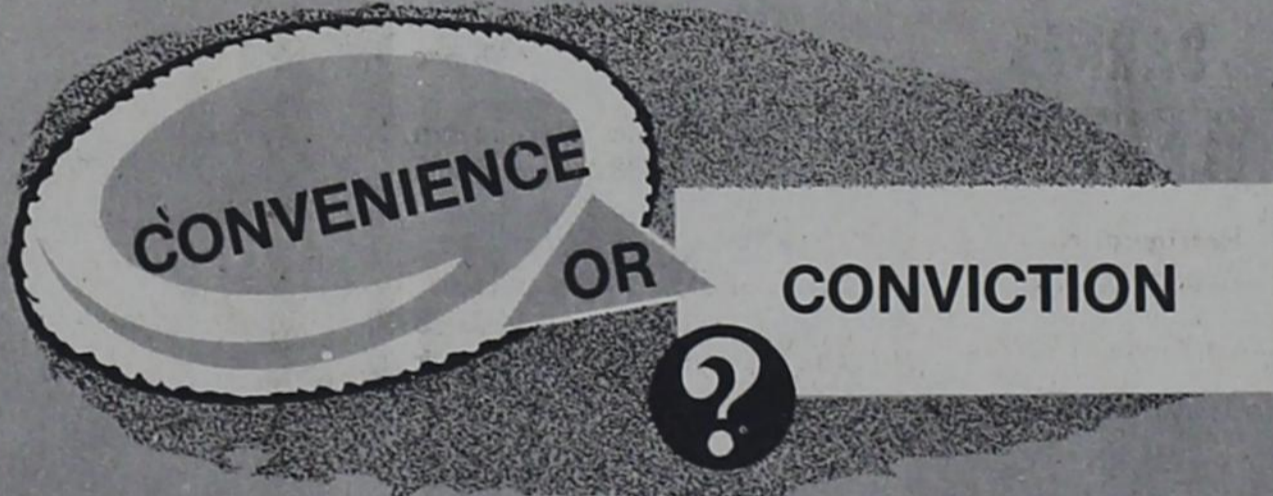

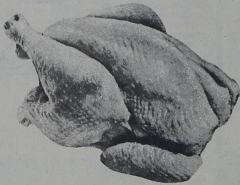

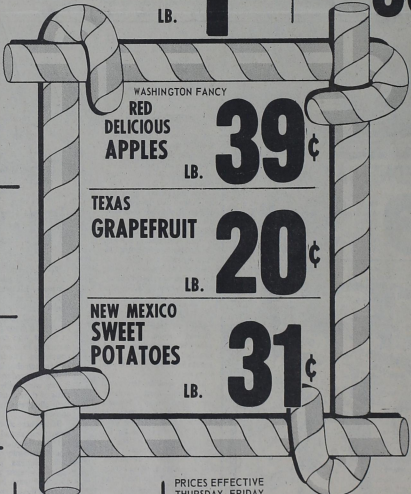
