All profits from these Senior sponsored activities will be used to finance the senior trip.

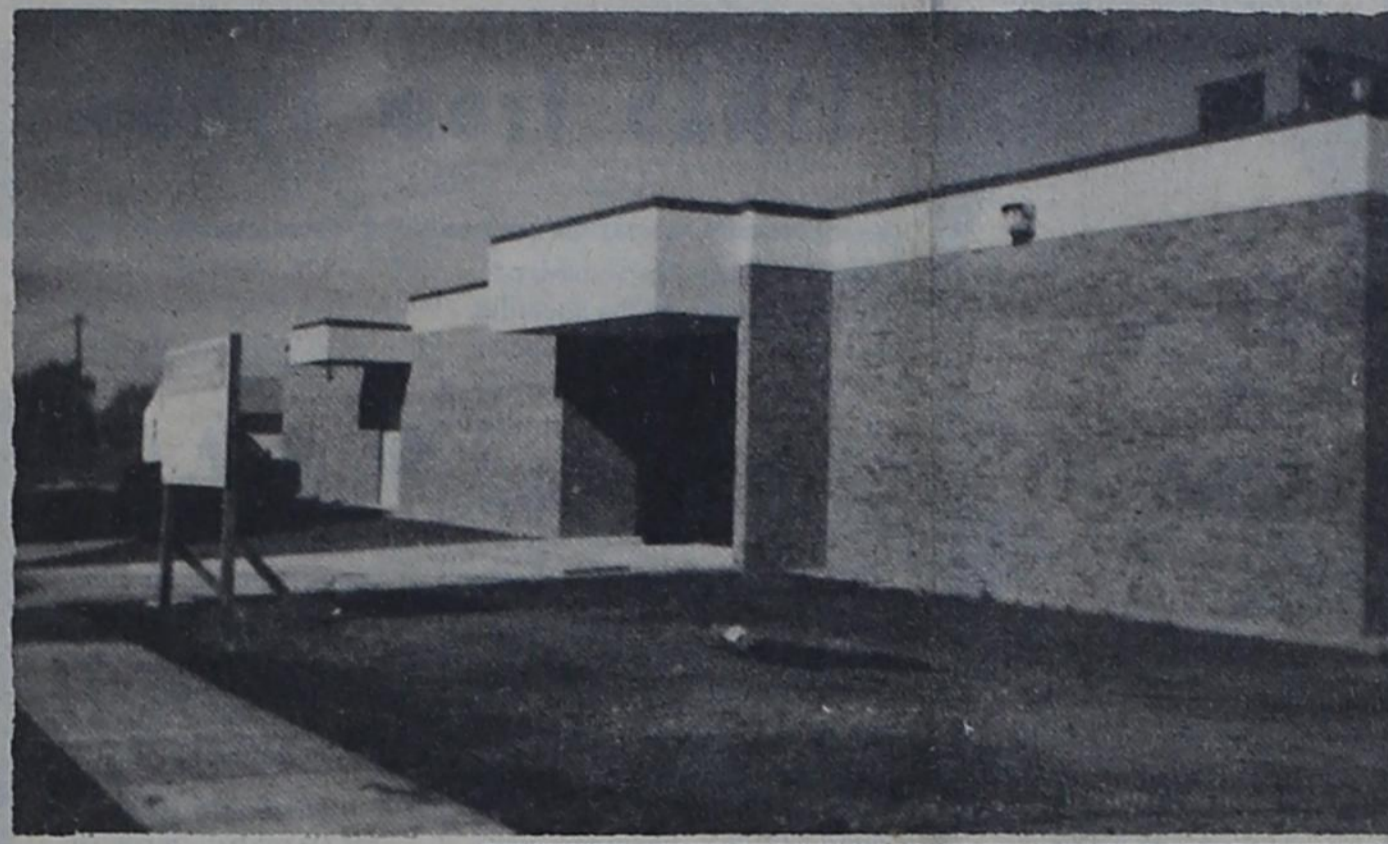
Reservations for the meal is not required, but it would be helpful to the seniors to be assured of having enough food.

One outstanding 4-H member from Wheeler County will be honored at the District 1 4-H GOLD STAR AWARD BANQUET at 6 P.M. on Saturday, November 18 at the INN, 601 Amarillo Boulevard West, Amarillo.

Donna Quarles, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Quarles of Mobeetie is the 1978 Wheeler County 4-H Gold Star Girl that will attend the banquet.

Paul Gross and Sue Farris, District Agents for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said the pair will be among 37 youths to receive the Gold Star honor.

A boy and a girl from each of the 20 counties in District 1 are eligible to receive this highest county award each year. It recognizes outstanding achievement, leadership, and contribution to the county 4-H program.

The event is sponsored annually by Deaf Smith, North Plains, Rita Blanca and Swisher Electric Cooperatives.

Mrs. Becky King, Dallas County Judge will be the banquet speaker the theme is "The Future Is Ours."

After a weekend off caused by the dropping of football by Lefors, the Wheeler Mustangs crank up their Black Machine for another tuneup this week against the McLean Tigers.

Friday's game at McLean will pit the undefeated Mustangs against a Tiger team that sports a 2-5 record.

Wheeler not only will be attempting to extend the state's longest winning streak to 27 but

will be trying to take another step toward their second straight trip to the state playoffs.

"McLean has a better ball club than their record shows and they do a pretty good job offensively," Coach Joe Allen said this week. "I think that the kids realize that they have to take these games one at a time."

McLean runs the Veer T and some slot T and I formations

offensively and will throw a four deep secondary at the Mustangs which will be somewhat unfamiliar to the horses as most clubs have used 3 deep in their secondary coverage.

The Mustangs have had good workouts in preparation for the McLean game and are in good physical condition with just Russell Gibson on the doubtful list and this not from injury but from sickness.

Wheeler will close out their regular season next week on Nicholson Field when the up to now undefeated Booker Kiows come to town.

HEFLEYS ARE RECOGNIZED

AMARILLO—A select group of farmers from the Texas Panhandle were honored here Tuesday, October 31, in observance of Farm Demonstration Month.

Honored from Wheeler County were J. R. Hefley, Jr. and Richard Hefley of Twitty.

The Program at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center here commemorated the 75th anniversary of the first successful farm demonstration in which a volunteer producer applied new scientific methods to improve local production.

The introduction of this teaching method in 1903 on the Walter C. Porter farm near Terrell, east of Dallas, led to the formation of the nation's Cooperative Extension Service. It has been credited with making America's agriculture the most bountiful in the world and has been adopted by countries around the globe.

Honored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Tuesday were farmers in each of the 20 counties of Extension District 1. They have been leaders in conducting agricultural demonstrations to introduce new methods to their communities.

J. R. Hefley had his first result demonstration in 1957. Since then he has conducted many demonstrations on varieties and fertility of wheat, cotton and grain sorghum. Richard Hefley has been helping with the demonstrations show county producers how the latest production developments work under local conditions.

Each honoree received a

plaque. Presenting them were State Representatives. Bob Simpson and Danny Hill.

Kenneth Holloway, Moore County Extension agent and director of the Texas County Agents Association, was master of ceremonies. The recipients and guests were welcomed by Gaines Franks, Potter County Extension agent and vice president of the TCAA.

District Extension Agent Paul Gross related the origin of the farm demonstration method and its history in the Texas Panhandle. A documentary film, "I Am Thinking of the Harvest," traced the history of the Porter farm demonstration and the organization of the Extension Service.

Reporting on research and demonstrations conducted in the Panhandle were area Extension specialists Dr. Frank Peter, agronomy; Dr. Ray Sammons, economist-farm management; Dr. Gene Cope, animal health; Dr. John McNeill, beef cattle; Dr. Carl Patrick, entomology, and Dr. Tommy Welch, range management.

Gross and Holloway noted that the farmers being honored were representing the hundreds who had assisted Panhandle agriculture over the years.

"This is a two-way street," responded Carl Jahnel, honoree from Hemphill County. "There hasn't been a demonstration carried on at the Jahnell farm that we haven't gotten more from it than anyone." He also noted that it was an early Extension agent who had encouraged him to go to college.

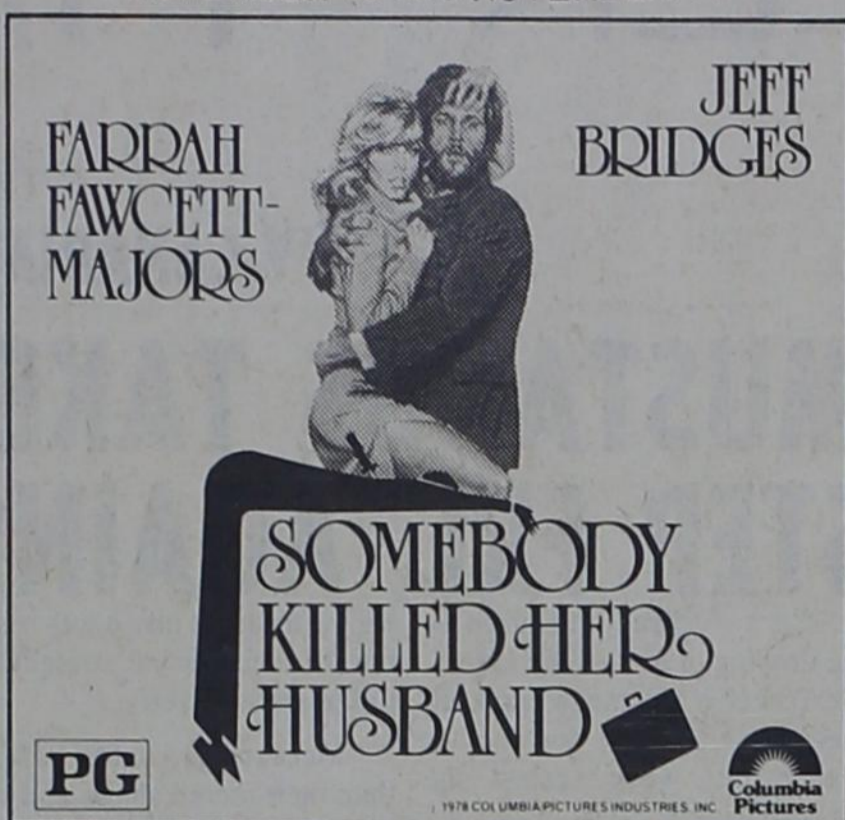

Fashion Focus On Shoulder

Fashions focus on the shoulder this season. From the popular drawstrings, tucks, embroidery and other detailing currently popular, fashion is adding an exaggerated shape with shoulder pads.

The look ranges from the more extreme "football" effect to a slight shoulder modification.

Besides pads in jackets and coats, women will see them also in blouses and dresses. Considered a basic home-sewing notion, shoulder pads were primarily used in outerwear and suit jackets or blazers.

However in line with an increased fashion emphasis, notion companies are expanding shoulder pad varieties and quantities. Some of the types available include blouse pads, iron-ons, press-on/peel-offs, heavy designer necks and covered pads.

Some companies distinguish between shoulder pads and shoulder shapes with the shape being a thinner version.

Many interfacing companies provide information for making shoulder pads.

For a set-in sleeve, the armhole seamline of the garment is traced between front and back armhole notches. The width along the shoulder seam and number of padding layers needed depends on the garment, figure and look intended.

Before sewing any shoulder pad into a garment along armhole and shoulder seam allowances, first pin the shoulder pad in place and try the garment on. Placement, size or amount of padding is easiest altered at that time.

Figure-wise, exaggerated shoulders usually have a shortening and broadening effect on the figure but can also balance a heavy hipline.

Slight to moderate padding often makes garments fit better, maintain their shape longer and even correct some fitting problems such as sloping shoulders.

WINTER FASHION NOTES

Energize the family's wardrobe for colder temperatures indoor and out.

Winterize by wearing garments that are close fitting garments are not warm because they reduce circulation as well as comfort.

Natural fibers—cotton, wool, silk, mohair—polyesters with special comfort finishes, furs, and wool-like fibers such as many acrylics are warmest.

Garments worn in lightweight layers that trap insulating air pockets are warmer than one heavy-weight garment.

Full length and multiple layers of socks, mittens and gloves, mufflers and scarves and snug hats or caps warm the extremities.

Extremities such as feet, hands and the head—especially for those with circulatory problems may feel cold faster since the body works to keep vital organs warm and may at times sacrifice other areas.

Infants and young children, older adults, the handicapped and those with cardiac and circulatory conditions have greater need when adapting comfortably to cooler temperatures.

Infants feel temperature changes more rapidly than adults and rely on adults to dress them properly.

Young children need guidance in choosing garments that don't weigh them down too much to hinder posture or active movement or interfere with personal safety.

Older adults and the handicapped may not be as active and

since body activity warms the body, they may feel cooler and need to dress more warmly.

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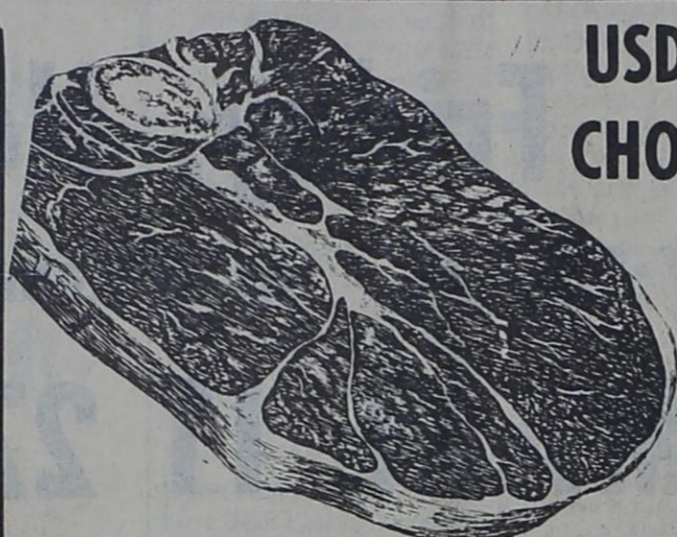

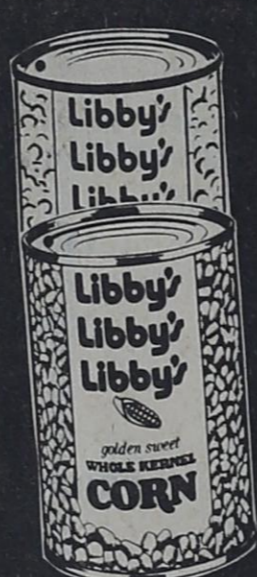
