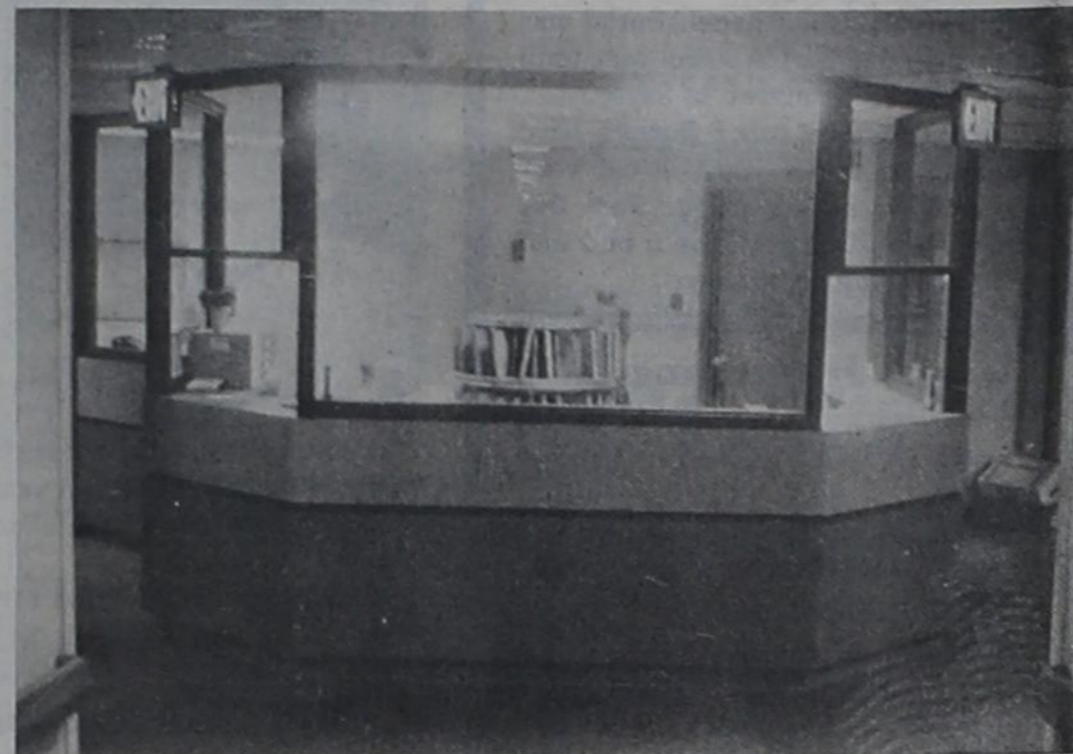

### Paul Howard Receives Master's Degree

Among the 125 to receive master's degrees from West Texas State University, Canyon, at the Spring Commencement, May 18, 1985, at Amarillo Civic Center Coliseum was Paul K. Howard, Mobeetie graduate, who received a Master's of Science Degree in Math, with a GPA for graduate school of 4.0 on a scale of 4.0. He has a 3.96 GPA for all college work on the same 4.0 scale.

Howard earned an Associate of Arts Degree in Math from Frank Phillips College, Borger in 1981, a Bachelor of Science Degree in Math with a minor in Computer Science from West Texas State University, Canyon in 1983, graduating with honors "Magna Cume Laude" with a GPA of 3.94. He was a member of the math honor society, Pi Mu Epsilon and the computer honor society, Epsilon Delta Pi.

He received the Carl B. and Florence E. King Foundation Scholarship for four years, renewable on a yearly basis if requirements are achieved. This is one of the Texas University Interscholastic League Awards which are available to students who meet specific requirements.

In April, 1985, Howard tied for the Hollis L. Cook Scholarship for outstanding second year graduate students and received \$180.

Paul Howard has been employed by the Pantex Plant in Amarillo as a computer programmer/analyst beginning June 3. He will reside in Panhandle.

Dennis Howard, Mobeetie graduate was among the 766 to receive his diploma, having completed degree requirements December 21, 1984. He earned a Bachelor of Business Administration Degree in Management with a GPA of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale.

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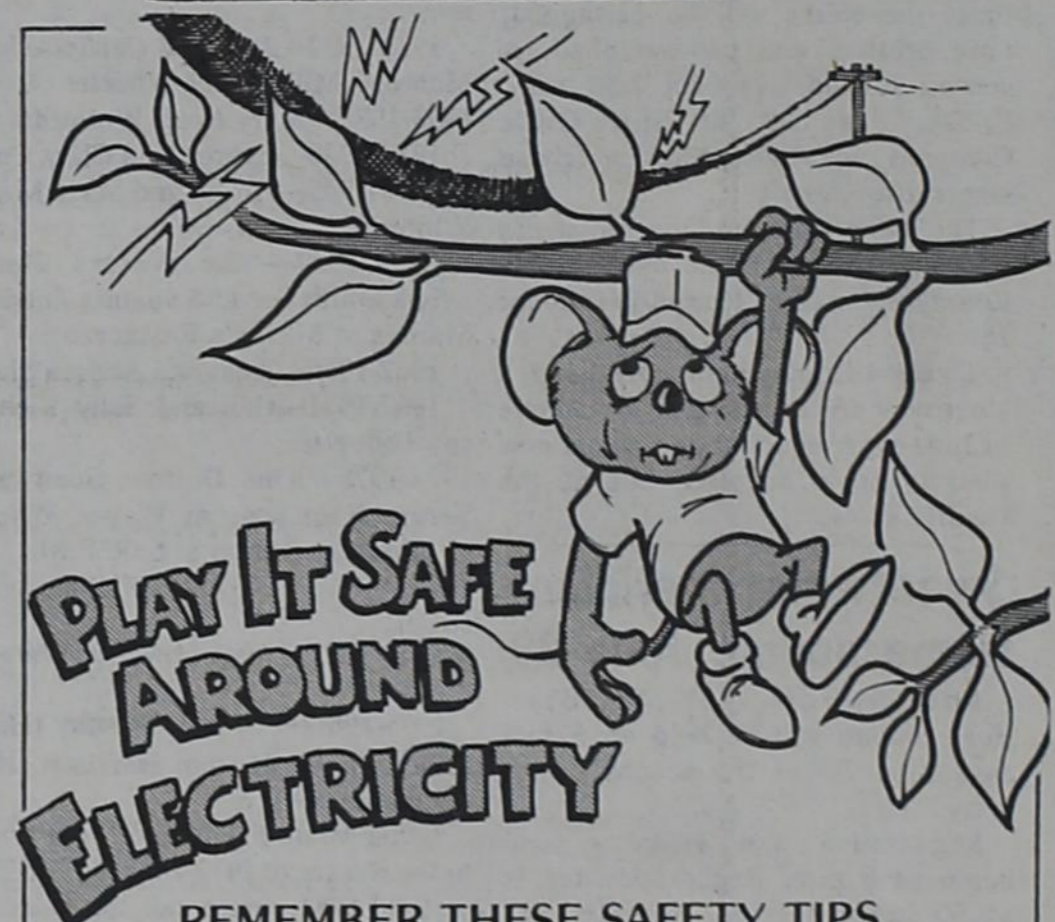
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### REMEMBER THESE SAFETY TIPS

- Watch for power lines when climbing in trees.
- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.
- Do not trim trees near power lines.
- Do not set ladders or scaffolds near power lines.
- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

**Lightning Safety**

When it comes to a brilliant display of lightning in Texas skies, "better safe than sorry", is a good motto. Deaths from lightning may be rare, but it's shortsighted for anyone to ignore the simple precautions and slight inconvenience of safety measures, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service health education specialist Dr. Mary Ann Heussner.

She says the first rule of lightning safety is to get away quickly from any open space — a field, golf course, hill-top, beach or pool. Get away before the rain starts, since lethal bolts sometimes strike during the muggy lull before a storm.

"If you're caught outside, the best kinds of shelter are buildings equipped with a lightning protection system (steel-framed buildings, and cars, buses or tractors with metal tops and

closed windows". "But don't trust a flimsy shelter on a golf course."  
 When you can't take cover, you can better your chances by taking refuge in a ravine, culvert or ditch — keeping away from pipes and staying alert for flash floods.  
 When none of this is practical, crouch as low as possible with no part of your body except knees and toes touching the ground. Also remember to avoid tall isolated objects, like a lone tree, staying twice as far away as the tree is high.  
 Just being indoors doesn't entirely protect you from lightning. Stay away from open doors and window, fireplaces, radiators, stoves, metal pipes, sinks, bathtubs, shower stalls and plugged-in electrical appliances. Electricity of lethal strength can enter a home not only by a direct strike, but also by a side flash from another object like a tree, and through pipe lines and wiring.  
 "Unfortunately, when someone is struck by lightning, by standers often don't know what to do", remarks the specialist. "Others won't touch the victim for fear he is still electrically charged."  
 But a lightning victim can be safely touched, and often revived by mouth-to-mouth resuscitation.

Adults who work outdoors or enjoy outdoor sports may have a healthy respect for lightning, but children are often unaware of its danger. The specialist recommends that parents review lightning safety precautions with their youngsters along with safe bicycling and swimming rules for the summer.  
 Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

**Ways of Controlling Pond Weeds**

Many ponds have problems with weeds. Spring is the ideal time to control weeds with herbicides. Treating weeds in the summer can cause an oxygen depletion resulting in a fish die-off. Oxygen depletion can occur during the spring, but the risk is greatly reduced.

The major factors contributing to a fish die-off are:

- (1) the amount of aquatic vegetation
- (2) the water temperature,
- (3) the numbers and weight of fish in the pond,
- (4) and the weather conditions.

Water temperatures are cooler in the spring and weeds are generally less abundant. These conditions reduce the chance of a fish die-off. The ideal time to treat weeds would be after the wind has been blowing for several days and the temperature is cool.

Personnel at the USDA Soil Conservation Service and county extension offices can provide you with information about approved herbicides for aquatic use. They will advise you of precautions when using aquatic herbicides and can assist you in locating chemicals.

**Peach Leaf Curl Damaging Peach Trees**

I have had several calls lately about peach tree leaves that are puckering, thickening and curling. Diseased leaves become pale yellow to light before falling off. Blossoms and fruit are also affected and shed, but may not be noticed. The fungus makes small, seldom noticed swellings on tender twigs.

Peach leaf curl is caused by a fungus that over-winters in the bark and bud scales of infected trees. The disease cannot be controlled after the symptoms are visible, but can be prevented by spraying the tree with a copper fungicide such as Kocide 101 in the fall. Make the application as soon as the leaves have fallen.

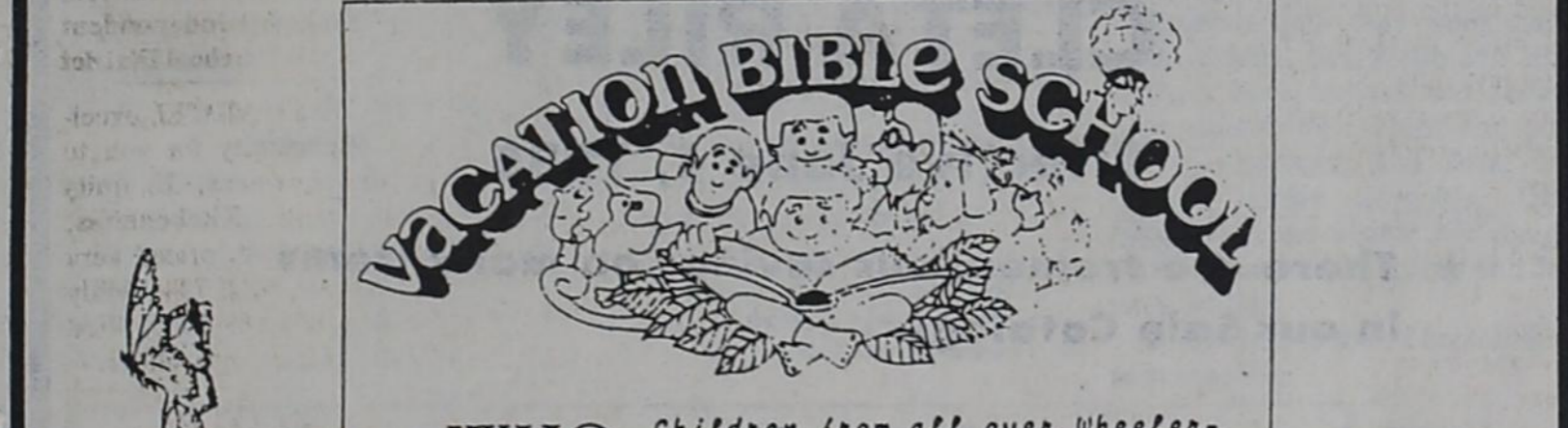

### "Take the Grain To the Train"

"Take the grain to the train" again is Farmrail Corporation's marketing theme as the harvest approaches. The local railroad company hopes to make 1985 its fourth consecutive year of increased wheat loadings.

Abandonment of other lines in western Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle has left Farmrail as the only rail carrier accessible to farmers in Beckham, Roger Mills and Wheeler counties. Management expects that the railroad's ability to move large volumes of grain in a short time and at competitive freight charges will attract offerings at on-line elevators from a larger gathering area.

A company spokesman said that industry deregulation has helped the railroads to become much more aggressive and flexible. "Both of our connecting lines—Santa Fe and Burlington Northern—are working hard to recover business from the highways," he noted. "Rates and rules on wheat have been adjusted considerably in the past two years, resulting in good rail traffic gains."

Farmrail has been assembling large-capacity covered hopper cars for the past month and expects to have an ample supply on line by the time the new crop starts to move. The railroad handled about 1.7-million bushels last year, when grain accounted for more than 40% OF ITS CARLOADINGS.

### A REALISTIC VIEW OF AGING

May has been declared Older Texan's Month. As we live longer, we are more likely to experience physical, social, financial or mental changes that make us less self-reliant. Yet, Major research studies show that the fear of "dependence" is the primary cause of low morals among older people.

The opposite of "Dependence" is "independence", yet a few of us are totally independent of others at any age. As children and young adults, we struggle to become independent from our families. Perhaps that's why we may cling to the illusion of independence through old age.

But the simple fact is that "independence" doesn't mean the same thing at every stage of life.

Consider the case of "Mary", a lady in her mid-eighties. Even though Mary's arthritis is now so debilitating that she needs help with everyday tasks like laundry and cooking, she won't ask her children for help. For Mary, the fear of "being a burden" is ingrained and she would think less of herself for seeking assistance.

Sometimes families sustain the fiction that their elderly relative remains strong and independent by ignoring physical and other changes. Or sometimes they try to help, are turned down and then have guilt feelings. As a result, the family may "back off" from providing minimal assistance when it's needed until their relative requires medical or even institutional care.

Neighborhood, church and community groups may also assume that unless an elder seeks help, he or she is self-sufficient.

Complete independence is rare for a person of any age. We all need other people—our families, friends, neighbors, and those who provide us with the things we buy and the services we use. So it's probably more accurate to say we're "interdependent". This is the idea that we need to get across to our elders—and ourselves.

They need us and we need them. The elder can be pleased that family and friends care enough to help rather than feel ashamed when help is needed.

## TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

### Crepe Myrtle: A Tree For All Seasons

The crepe myrtle, a deciduous shrub or small tree with striking blooms in the spring and summer, has become one of the most popular and beautiful plants grown in Texas. Few plants can offer the gardener so much for so long and yet demand so little.

It is easy to care for and can grow in nearly every type of soil. Sometimes called the "Lilac of the South," crepe myrtle gets its common name from its crepe-like, crinkled and ruffled petals and the resemblance of its leaves to the true myrtle.

The crepe myrtle makes outstanding contributions to a landscape in each season of the year. The flowering season begins in June or July in most of Texas and continues through fall. Each bloom, or panicle, is composed of hundreds of red, pink, white, lavender or purple flowers. In the fall,

Deep watering is required during dry spells in summer when it is growing and flowering. Insufficient watering may result in premature leaf drop.

Crepe myrtle requires little pruning to maintain its naturally graceful form, but you should tip prune to remove old flower clusters and promote more growth. Small, twiggy growth should be thinned out from underneath the canopy to keep the trunk clean and to allow free air circulation.

Another big plus for the crepe myrtle is its high resistance to insects and disease. In fact, it can be one of the most pest-free landscape plants available when located in a good growing site.

Crepe myrtle can be planted nearly year-round when using container-grown plants. Balled-and-burlapped plants, however, do best when planted during the dormant season or in very early spring.

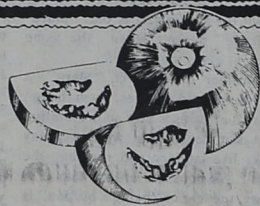

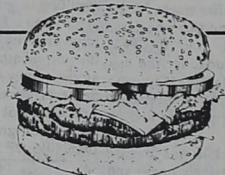
