To The Voters of Wheeler County:

The Wheeler County Water District Board has worked for two months to find out what is the true picture of our water supply and what can be done to assure a water supply for the future. The following is our finding and what we recommend to the people.

The mayors of Wheeler and Shamrock and a member of the water Board met with nine members of the State Water Board for two hours and discussed Wheeler County water.

Q. Where is the underground water source and how much is there?

A. The Ogallala Aquifer which is the main source of water lies in the West-Northwest part of the county. Wells that are of record run from one gallon to several hundred. To find a field of water large enough to furnish water of any amount would be done by using the logs and existing wells then drilling test holes and evaluating how much water can be pumped. Then a study will need to be made to determine the reserve and how long it would last.

Q. Is the water table rising in Wheeler County?

A. There are a few wells in the County that have risen depending on how much they are pumped before and after they had been pumped from one year to the next. But, over all the water table is falling and will continue to fall because more water is being taken from the ground than is being replaced.

Q. Does the State Water Board have funds for municipal water projects or personnel to assist in a water study?

A. No, they have neither the money or the personnel. The State Water Board has hundreds of logs that can be used to find where the thickest part of the Ogallala is, but they will not show how much water will be found. This cannot be determined until test holes are drilled and tested.

Q. What is the present water supply in Wheeler County in regard to municipal supply?

A. Any town that does not have more than one field of water should be looking for alternate fields. Shamrock has practically depleted its two north fields and due to heavy usage the west field is in trouble. Wheeler wells being on the north side of its field and having to compete with irrigation plus thousands of head of cattle in the feed yards are also in jeopardy.

Q. Do you know of any water rights for sale? We have been told there are thousands of acres in our part of the country for sale.

A. No

After talking with the State Water Board; and at the suggestion of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, the District Engineers; the Wheeler County Water Board talked to a hydrologist, Joe Reed of Ed. L. Reed and Associates.

Following this discussion, the Board decided to go into contract with his firm for a hydrological study; if the funding could be made available

The following is taken from the minutes of the February 28, 1985 meeting of the Wheeler County Water Board:

The only source of revenue available to the district seems to be the adoption of a maintenance tax. Some mention had been made of a cap of five cents (\$0.05) on the \$100.00 of valuation but a closer examination of the probable taxable values of the

County indicates that this cap could be established at three cents on the \$100 of value.

A general discussion with all present participating then ensued. It was explained that an election would grant to the Board the authority to levy a tax, not exceeding three cents (\$0.03) on the \$100.00 of value. This would be a continuing authority but the levy must be made on a year-to-year basis. Any levy made by the Board must be supported by the District's budget setting forth the need for any such levy that might be made. If approved at the election, the Board would be authorized to levy any amount within the three cent limit; but, in no event could they levy more than the amount authorized by the election. The levy must be justified by the district's annual budget.

At the close of the discussion, motion was made by Mr. Macina that the necessary documents, resolutions, orders, etc. be prepared to submit at a Special Meeting of the Board to be held on March 11, 1985. These documents would call for an election to be held on April 6, 1985, proposing a maintenance tax of not more than three cents (\$0.03) on the \$100.00 of valuation of all taxable property within the district. This motion was seconded by Mr. Sims and unanimously approved.

We, the Wheeler County water Board, have been told in public meeting, on February 19, 1985; February 28, 1985 and March 11, 1985 that T. G. Puryear approved the Board's action and that there would be no opposition. He was present at every meeting, heard every motion and discussion and saw every vote.

The Board supports that article in the Shamrock Texan of March 14, 1985 which, according to board members, would not exceed three cents per \$100 of assessed value and would be used in large part to fund the first-ever hydrology study of Wheeler County.

The article also quotes Mr. Puryear, the spokesman for the opposition, as saying, "I'm not going to write one letter to the newspaper or say anything about this election. When people call me to ask me about this, I will tell them that we need to have this study made and the only way that the District can pay for it is through this tax. That's what I'm telling people who call me."

The Board has done its best, the cards are on the table. We ask you to support this tax for the underground study.

Rabies Reported In Allison

Seven Residents Are Taking Shots

SPECIAL VACCINATION CLINIC

The staff of the Wheeler Veterinary Clinic and two Allison residents are currently undergoing post-exposure rabies immunizations after being exposed to a confirmed Rabies positive dog from the Allison area. Because of this incident Drs. Ben Ed and Lee Ann Hillhouse of the Wheeler Veterinary Clinic in conjunction with Dr. Pat Crouch of the Canadian Veterinary Clinic will be at the Allison fire station from 2:30-4:00 p.m. Saturday, March 30th for a special vaccination clinic where vaccinations will be made available at reduced rates.

Rabies, Distemper combination and Parvovirus vaccinations will be available for dogs, and Rabies and Feline Distemper combination vaccinations for cats. Animals must be over four months of ages to receive their Rabies vaccinations, but other immunizations can be given as early as six weeks.

The State of Texas requires that all dogs and cats be vaccinated yearly for rabies, while other vaccinations are optional.

Minimum Tillage Program

Producers who are considering conservation tillage or extending its application in their farming program will have two opportunities to hear about research results with the concept.

An educational program is scheduled for April 3 at 7:00 p.m. in the Coin & Copper room of the First National Bank in Wheeler. This meeting is being sponsored by the Wheeler County Agriculture Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Conservation tillage is a farming system that reduces the number of tillage operations performed for each crop. This does not necessarily mean no-till farming. Herbicides are then used to control weeds. The reduced plowing leaves more residue on top of the ground which reduces wind erosion and reduces soil moisture loss. The increased soil moisture results in increased yields in dryland operations.

Several cropping sequences involving minimum tillage will be described. Dr. Frank Petr, Agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will discuss cropping systems involving wheat and sorghum and the use of herbicides to control weeds in place of tillage. Dr. Wyatt Harmon, Research Economist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, will discuss research results with minimum tillage and present the economic analysis of conservation tillage versus conventional tillage for various cropping sequences.

The need for efficient use of rainfall and irrigation water will always be with us. The conservation of energy through reduced tillage is also of major importance to conserve our natural resources. Of equal importance is the need for increasing profits by reducing unnecessary tillage operations.

Major changes in cultural practices in crop production have many ramifications. These must be understood and considered in making conservation tillage work successfully.

A Conservation Farming Seminar is scheduled for April 11 from 8:30 a.m.

NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF HEALTH STUDY MISINTERPRETED

The National Institute of Health recently released a study on cholesterol that has been widely misinterpreted by the media.

The study shows that people who suffer from high blood cholesterol can benefit from the use of drugs that inhibit the body's synthesis of cholesterol. What the newspapers did not point out is that high blood cholesterol is a metabolic disorder (even has its own medical name - hypercholesterolemia). This is why the study looked at the effect of drugs, not diet. These people have a dysfunction that keeps the body's own mechanisms from regulating cholesterol, so synthetic drugs must do it for them. (The study used hypercholesterolemic patients for subjects not a cross section of the normal public).

Drawing dietary conclusions from a study like this, is like studying a group of diabetics on insulin...and then making wholesale dietary recommendations for the entire general public. It just does not make sense.

The truth of the matter is, cholesterol in the diet has relatively little effect on the cholesterol level in the blood. This is why the NIH study did not look at diet (previous studies with diet had been inconclusive). The liver synthesizes 60 to 80 percent of the cholesterol in the body, and when this process goes haywire it takes more than soybeans, corn oil, and margarine to turn it around.
