Born in 1912 at Portales, New Mexico, Hill owns a ranch in Twitty, with primary interests in breeding and racing American Quarter Horses. He also is a breeder of Hereford cattle. He and his wife, Mae, have two children and Hill is a former president of the Golden Spread Quarter Horse Association. He has been a AQHA Director since 1961, and currently serves on the AQHA Membership Committee.

The Director of Emeritus was established just this year to recognize those individuals who have served the Association as a regular director for a minimum of ten years or more, and who are at least 70 years of age. Twelve men were promoted to this position at the 1985 Convention.

With headquarters located in Amarillo, Texas, AQHA has more than 156,000 members and its registry includes 2.3 million Quarter Horses, the largest such association in the
