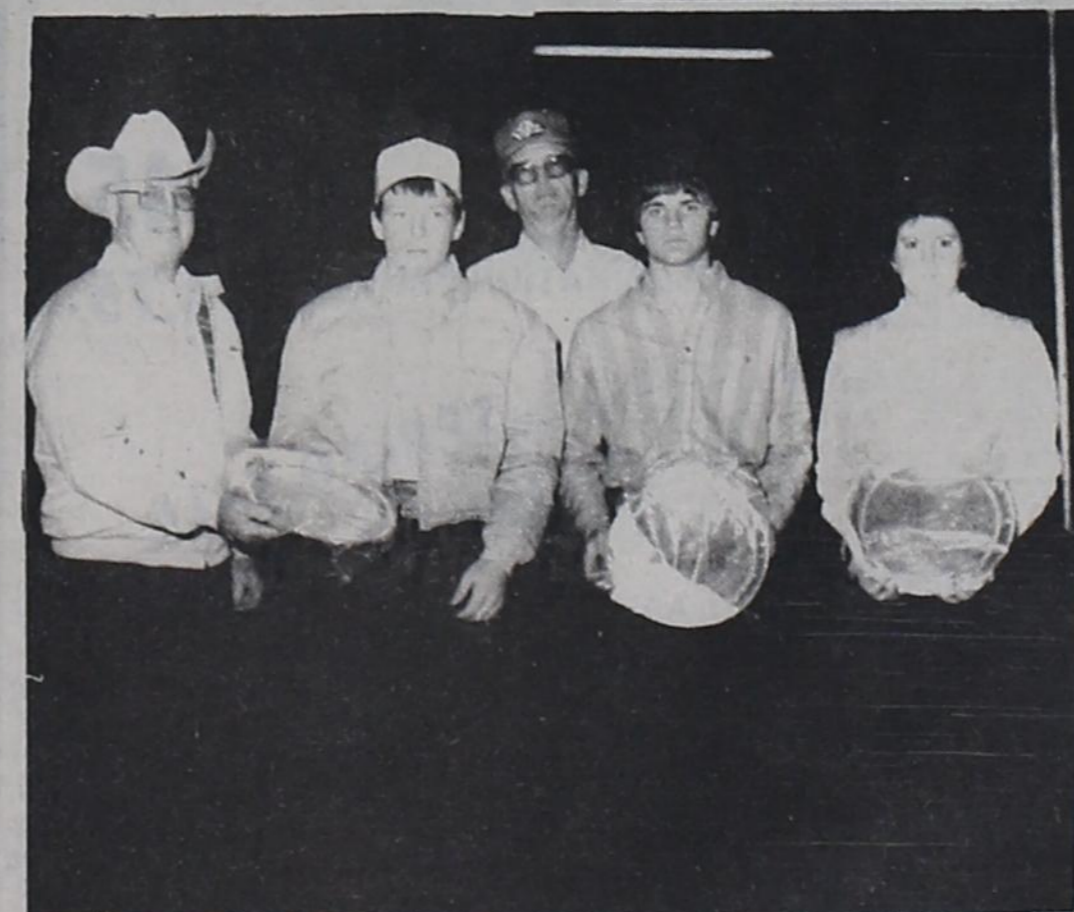

Water Supply Dist. Meets Tuesday

The Wheeler County Water Supply District Board met Tuesday afternoon; the purpose of the meeting was to determine the next step for the board in assuring a future water supply for the county. Meeting with the board were Chester Green and Mack Woford with Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, Inc. of Lubbock and Joe Ree of Ed Reed and Assoc., ground water hydrologists from Midland.

At the start of the meeting, Harrison Hall, board chairman, explained to those in attendance that there is a need for water; Shamrock will be needing an additional supply of water within the next few years and Wheeler will be needing another source of water around the year 2003. After checking available information on the underground water situation, the board feels the only way to get a true picture is by hiring a hydrologist to do a study of Wheeler County's underground water supply.

Mr. Reed gave a brief history of the firm and explained their position in

doing water studies. Ed Reed and Assoc. will serve as a "fact finder" and works on a "per job" basis. The firm studies available information reports their finding back to the board. At this point the board would decide whether it was necessary to continue into a more indepth study, which would include drilling of test holes.

The local board will need funds before any study can be undertaken. An estimated cost of the first phase—the study of existing information—would be \$10,000 to \$15,000. The length of time needed would be 2-3 months. If the second phase undertaken, an additional 4-6 months would be needed with the cost estimated to be \$100,000 to \$200,000.

If a sufficient supply of underground water is found, it is still going to cost in the millions of dollars. Besides the cost of the pipelines,

Mobeetie Bank Gets Depository

The First State Bank of Mobeetie was named the Wheeler County Depository at the regular meeting of the Wheeler County Commissioners Court on Monday, February 11. The commissioners received bids from the First National Bank in Wheeler, First Bank and Trust of Shamrock and the First State Bank of Mobeetie.

First Bank and Trust has been the county's depository since 1937, a total of 48 years. The bank's name was "Farmers and Merchants State Bank", but was known throughout the county as "Fathers and Mothers Bank".

In submitting their bid, the Mobeetie bank submitted the following statements:

We offer to carry all accounts and funds of the Trust Funds without charge of any nature.

We offer to furnish at no charge, business check books and deposit slips, necessary for the County's use during the period for which the bid is submitted.

We offer to lend money for normal operational needs to the County at the rate of 2% interest per annum.

We offer to pay interest on regular funds you leave on time deposit as follows:

For time deposits of \$1,000.00 or more, we offer the current six month money market rate program: 182 day Current Money Market Rate

For time deposits of \$100,000.00 or more, we offer to pay interest at the following rate: 14 days or more Current Money Market Rate or More.

For Checking accounts with a daily balance of \$10,000.00 or more, we offer to pay an interest rate of 5.25%.

Should any changes be made by Banking regulations, any renewals of time deposits thereafter would have to be made to conform to such regulations.

Warren A. Funderburk Services Wednesday

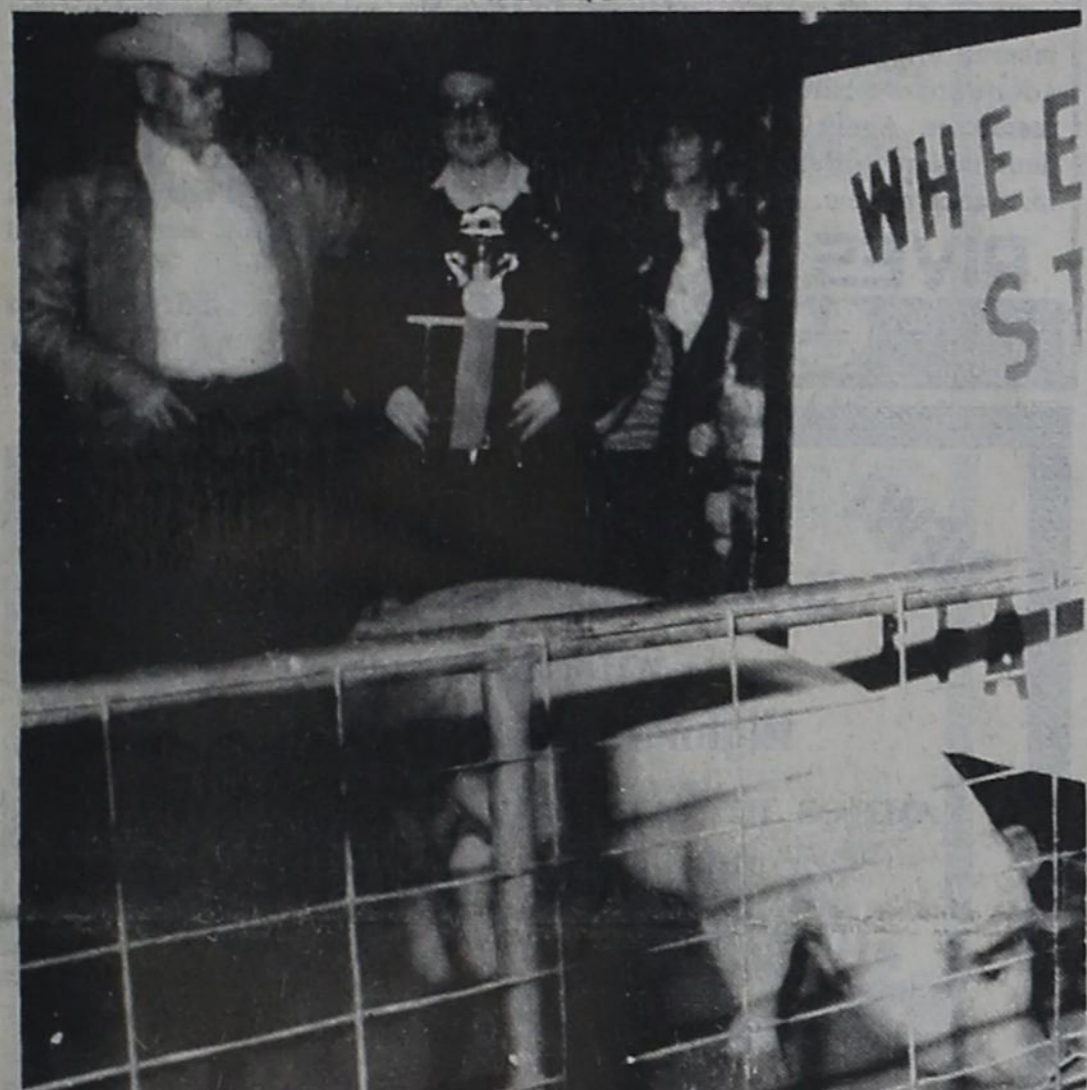
Warren A. Funderburk, Jr., 70, died Sunday.

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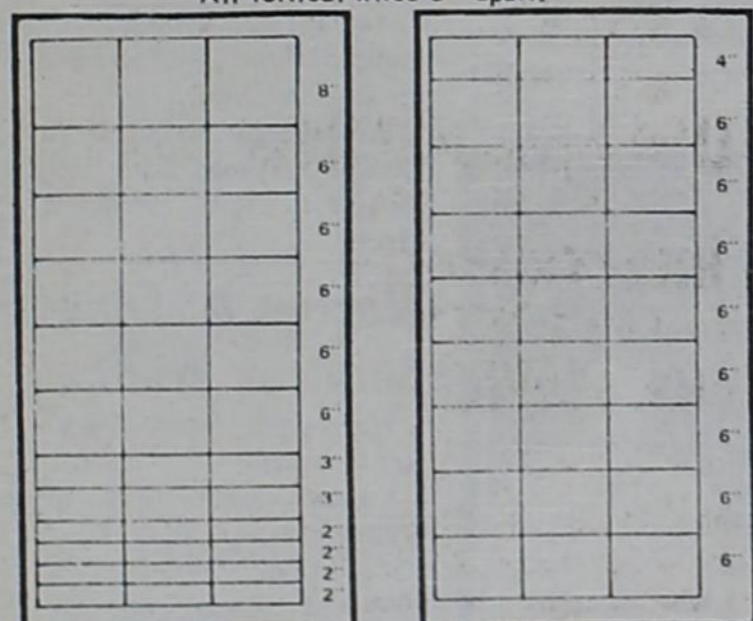

AT&T Communications has filed restructured tariffs designed to more closely recover access and other costs for private line, DATAPHONE* Digital Service, OCC Facilities, WATS and 800 services.

Also proposed is the institution of a charge for directory assistance to begin to recover access costs incurred for such service, and increases in rates for operator assisted AT&T Long Distance calls.

AT&T Communications is proposing to restructure its AT&T Long Distance Service and to reduce its overall revenues from basic long distance approximately \$25 million.

While long distance rates will, in most instances, be reduced, certain AT&T Long Distance rates are proposed to be increased to more nearly recover the access charges approved by the PUC for such service.

The proposed new rates for all services would result in an increase in adjusted test period revenues of \$123.4 million, or 11.3 percent.

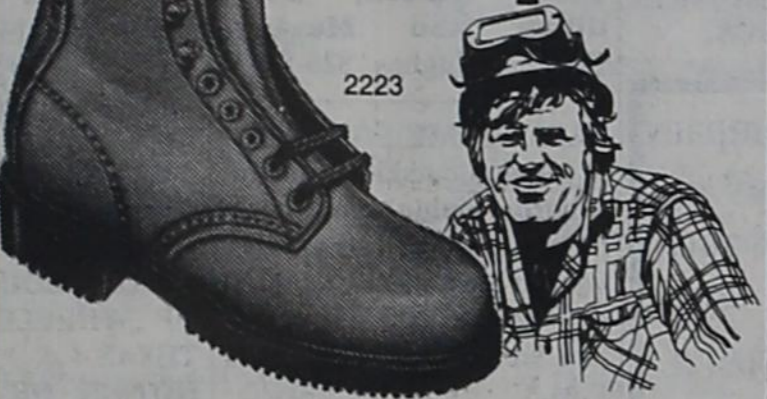

Availability of "D" Stamps
An adequate supply of "D" stamps and other nondenominated items is available at the Wheeler, post office to help customers make a smooth transition after the February 17 postal rate change. Postmaster Walker says that the nondenominated "D" stamps in sheet, coil, and booklet formats represent the new 22-cent first-class rate. There are also nondenominated postal cards and plenty of two-cent stamps that, when added to 20-cent stamps, make up the new first-class letter rate.

"Nobody likes to see higher postal rates, but this increase is moderate and justified," Postmaster Walker said. "Since the last increase in November 1981, the cost of living in the United States, as measured by the Consumer Price Index, has gone up

almost 13 percent. The 22-cent stamp is only a 10 percent rise."

"The nondenominated items are available because we estimate that stamp inventories in post offices at the present will fall short of public demand and, we want to avoid customer inconvenience," he said.

Commemorative stamps, beginning with the Jerome Kern stamp, and other 22-cent stamps, are expected to replace the "D" stamps by the end of March, the Postmaster said.

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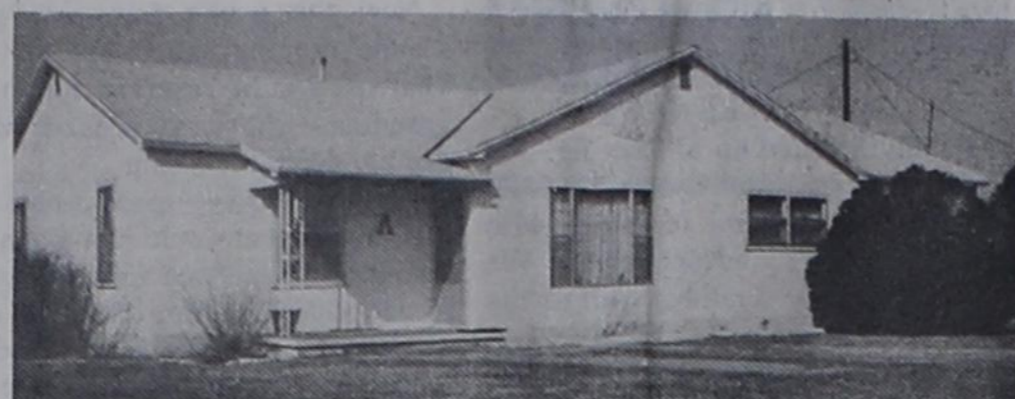

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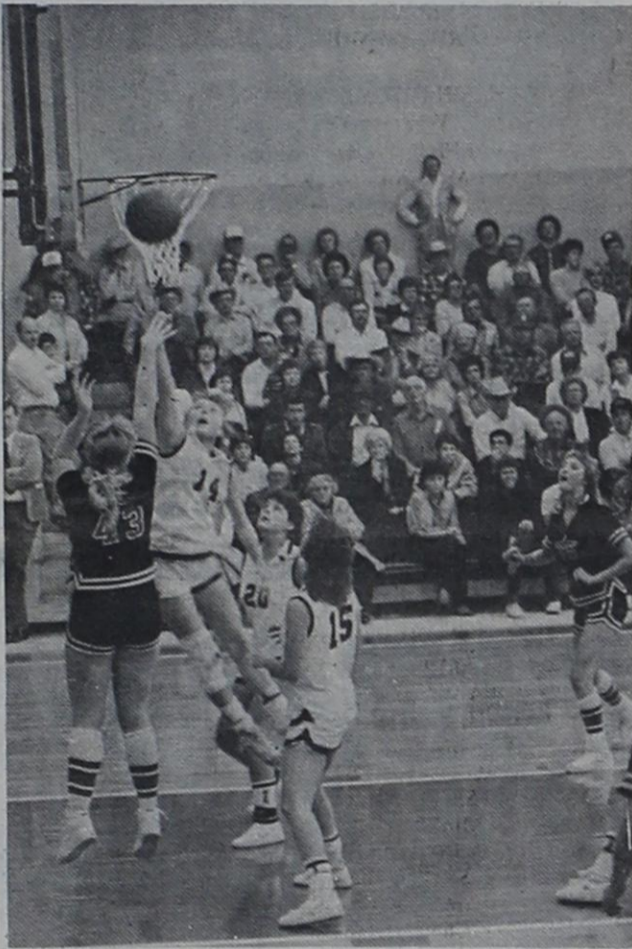

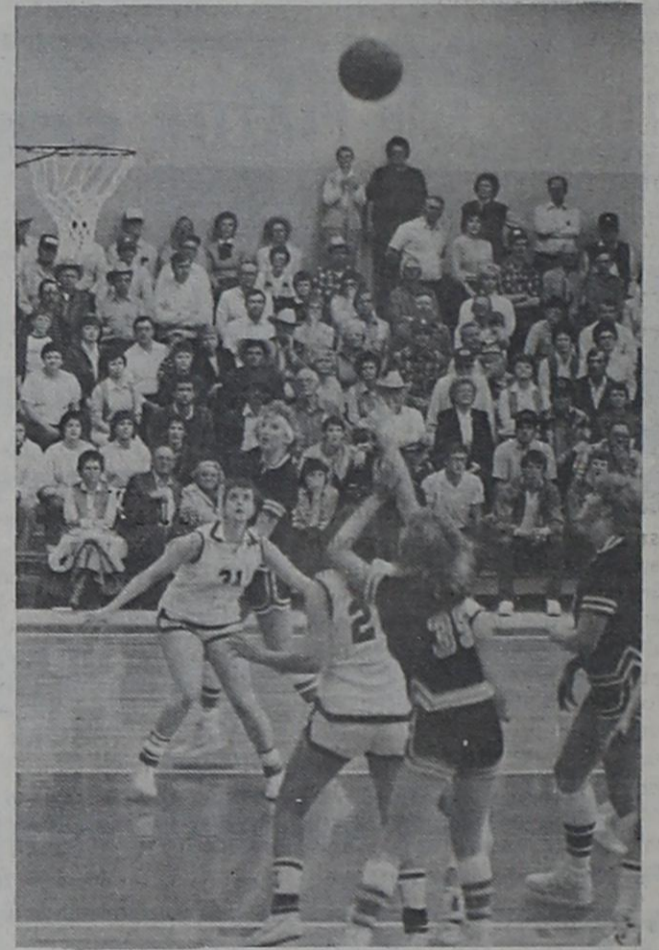
