MUSTANGS WIN HOMECOMING TILT, 62-0

There were more scouts than Texline fans on the visitors side Friday and what they saw kept them busy writing as the Wheeler Mustangs completely demolished the Tornados by the count of 62-0.

Starting off slowly, probably due to all of the homecoming activities, the Mustangs finally put points on the board minutes

before the first quarter ended. As has been the case in most of their games to date, the Mustangs just had their opponents outclassed and the young Tornados were just no match for the Mustangs as they got their first district win of the year.

It took a 65 yard punt return for a touchdown by Myron Jolly at 3:33 in the first quarter to break

the scoreless tie and start the scoring onslaught.

Mike Evans toed the extra point and Wheeler led by 7-0 but were quick to get another TD before the quarter ended.

Just over a minute remained in the opening period when Texline was forced to punt and Wheeler took over on their 43.

Jolly hit Evans on a pass good for 29 yards down to the Texline 28 before Marvin Grimes' number was dialed 3 straight times and the Mustangs all-state running back responded with runs of 13, 2, and 13 and a touchdown to put the Mustangs on top by a 13-0 count going into the second quarter.

A short 29 yard drive that was set up by a fumble recovery netted the Mustangs their third touchdown of the night and Grimes got his second TD with a 12 yard burst off left tackle. Kent Vise rammed home the two pointer and the Mustangs had jumped into a 21-0 lead in the space of just over 3 minutes.

Another fumble recovery, this time at the Tornado 47, gave the

Mustangs their next opportunity and in just two plays the Mustangs covered the distance.

Vise got 13 and then Benny Baker stormed over right guard and did a nifty job of running once into the secondary to get the last 34 yards to paydirt.

Texline hadn't made a first down up to this point and were not successful after receiving the kickoff and were forced into a punting situation. The Tornados punter was forced into

running and was downed at the Texline 25 and the Mustangs were quick to take advantage of the break.

Jolly passed to Vise for 13 and a first down at the Tornado 12. Vise then went up the middle for 11 before Jolly scored on a quarterback sneak. Evans kicked the extra point and the Mustangs led by 34-0 and took this lead to the dressing room.

Coach Allen substituted liberally throughout the contest and scouts must have wondered how many running backs the Mustangs had in their stable.

Nine different players toed the ball for Wheeler in the game with the leading ball carrier being Jimmy Ryan with 108 yards on 12 carries. Grimes finished with an even 100 yards and was closely followed by Baker who notched 78 yards in just 7 carries.

Wheeler took up where they left off at intermission as the Mustangs took the second half kickoff and marched 59 yards for the touchdown after Jolly had returned the kickoff 33 yards to the Wheeler 41.

Overcoming a five yard fine, the Mustangs moved the then 64 yards in four plays. Bret Mosley got the drive going with a 13 yard run and then Jolly passed 24 yards to Sam Schaffer, who was making his first appearance since the Shamrock game. Grimes got 5 and then sped 20 yards behind excellent blocking to the end zone. Evans booted the Mustangs into a 41-0 lead with less

than two minutes played in the third quarter.

Another fumble recovery, their third of the game, by the Mustangs, this one at the Texline 31 gave the black clad gridders another shot at tacking points on the board.

Five plays after the fumble recovery, the Mustangs were in the end zone again with Ryan doing most of the dirty work and scoring from 15 yards out. Another successful kick by Mike Evans put the Black Machine on top by 48-0.

Getting desperate, the Tornados chose to run on fourth and one from their 34 shortly after Ryan's touchdown but got nothing for their efforts and Wheeler took over at the Texline 34.

Ryan picked up 9 and the Mustangs had a mixup in the backfield and saw Rich Brown downed for an 8 yard loss back to the 33.

The Mustangs called on Baker and the big sophomore fullback was up to the task as he broke for the distance. Evans booted the Mustangs into a 55-0 margin and there was still 11 minutes left in the game.

Mercifully, the Mustangs closed out the scoring for the night with a 69 yard drive that saw the scoring play come from the wishbone formation as Jolly optioned to Mosley for the TD. The play covered 32 yards and Russell Gaines tacked on the final point.

THURSDAY REVIEW WILL SPONSOR BLOOD DRIVE

Why are blood centers always asking people to give blood anyway?

It's simple really. There aren't enough donors to adequately meet the demands for blood.

Blood isn't an "unalienable right" you know. It is a community service provided by volunteer blood donors, and if all of us who are able don't give blood, then who says it will be there later in case we need it.

Your efforts will soon be reflected by a successful blood drive, which will produce many pints of life-saving blood for patients in our area hospitals.

It is the responsibility for all of

us who are able, to support the volunteer blood program in our community because without the volunteer blood donor, we would all suffer from a lack of fresh blood which must be available at all times in our hospitals.

About 10 million pints of blood will be used in the United States this year. Just the area served by Coffee Memorial Blood Center will require almost 14,000 pints. That's nearly 60 pints of blood for every working day of the year.

All this blood will come from Volunteer Blood Donors. Blood is no longer purchased from individuals for a cash payment. It is the community's responsibility to support its own blood program.

There is no substitute for human blood. When it is needed, it has to be there for the physician to utilize in helping to save a life.

Each person who donates a pint of blood may receive, if he wishes, a type of family blood insurance, called BLOODPLAN. This BLOOD PLAN costs the donor nothing except one pint of blood per year, and it will pay 100% of any blood bank charges that the donor, his spouse, or any dependent children might incur during the year following the donation.

This coverage is good at any hospital and could save hundreds of dollars if you should have need of it. This blood insurance covers any pre-existing medical condition except hemophilia and there is no limit to the amount of reimbursement or the number of claims.

SPS Rate Hike Dispute Settled

Brac Biggers, Panhandle Division Manager for Southwestern Public Service Company, has announced that after considering all alternatives, SPS has decided to accept the \$15.9-million rate increase granted by the Public Utilities Commission of Texas.

"We feel that to pursue the matter further would be an unnecessary added expense to the cities, our customers and the company," Biggers said. "However, the \$15.9-million is not enough to cover our expenses as they were presented to the regulatory bodies.

In order to continue to build coal-fired plants to take care of our customers' needs and comply with Texas Docket 600, I'm sure it will be necessary to request another adjustment to our rates in the near future.

Docket 600 mandates that SPS curtail their use of gas as a boiler fuel by ten percent by 1981 twenty-five percent by 1985.

"Of course, we will make every effort, as we have in the past, to hold the line on expenses and continue providing the highest quality of service to our customers," Biggers concluded.

Trailing by 14 at halftime, the Colts made some adjustments and were able to shut down the Little Buck offense in the second half but could get no offense generated themselves.

Lack of speed hurts the Colts cause as they have to get most of their offensive output inside and at times they were able to move the pigskin but the lack of an outside threat enabled White Deer to shut them down.

Scott Wright picked up 62 yards in the losing cause that saw the Colts cross midfield just once.

The Wheeler Mustangs JV kept their record clean last Thursday night but did give up their first TD of the year in the 35-6 win over the Claude JV.

The win was the Mustangs second of the year over Claude and extended their record to 4-0 and this was accomplished with 4 regulars not playing.

Three of the JV had been promoted to the varsity for the Texline game and one was sick but these absences didn't slow

the Mustangs down much. Willie Valencia and Loyd Remy once more led the Mustangs ground attack with Valencia picking up 84 yards for his nights work and Remy putting 62 yards onto the JV's rushing total.

Only 19 seconds remained in the third quarter when the Wheeler JV gave up their first points of the year and two passes that covered 45 yards broke the Mustangs JV record of having held their opponents scoreless for 14 quarters.

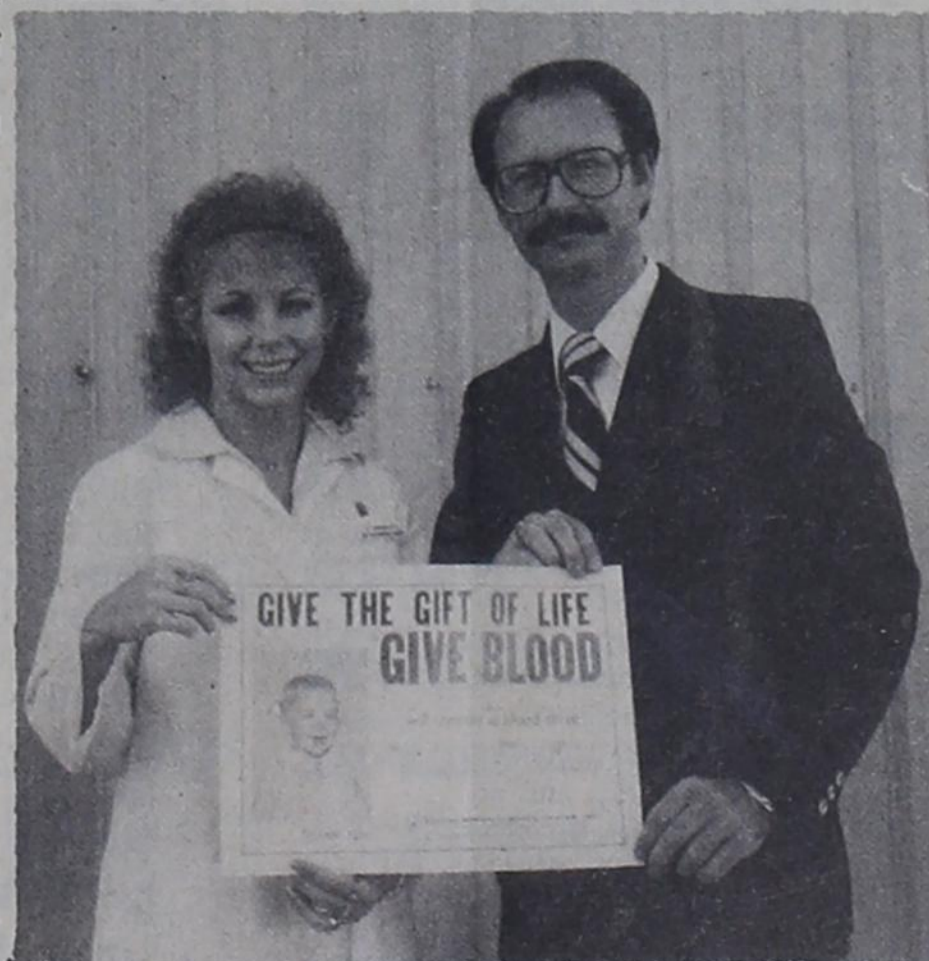
Margaret Bryant Gets Nursing Cap

"Thursday The Rabbi Walked Out," by Harry Kemelman, is about Rabbi Small; who serves a synagogue in the small New England town of Barnard's Crossing. Compassionate and steadfast in his beliefs and views of Judaism, Rabbi Small does not shun the controversial issues of the day. This time he is faced with the question that has caused upheavals in temples across America: the demand by women to participate in the same fashion as men in religious ceremonies and services. As is often the case, Rabbi Small's response may prove as controversial as the issue itself. While he deals with the demands of the women, he must also solve the most interesting murder ever to occur in Barnard's Crossing.

Eula Johnson Hosts Study Club

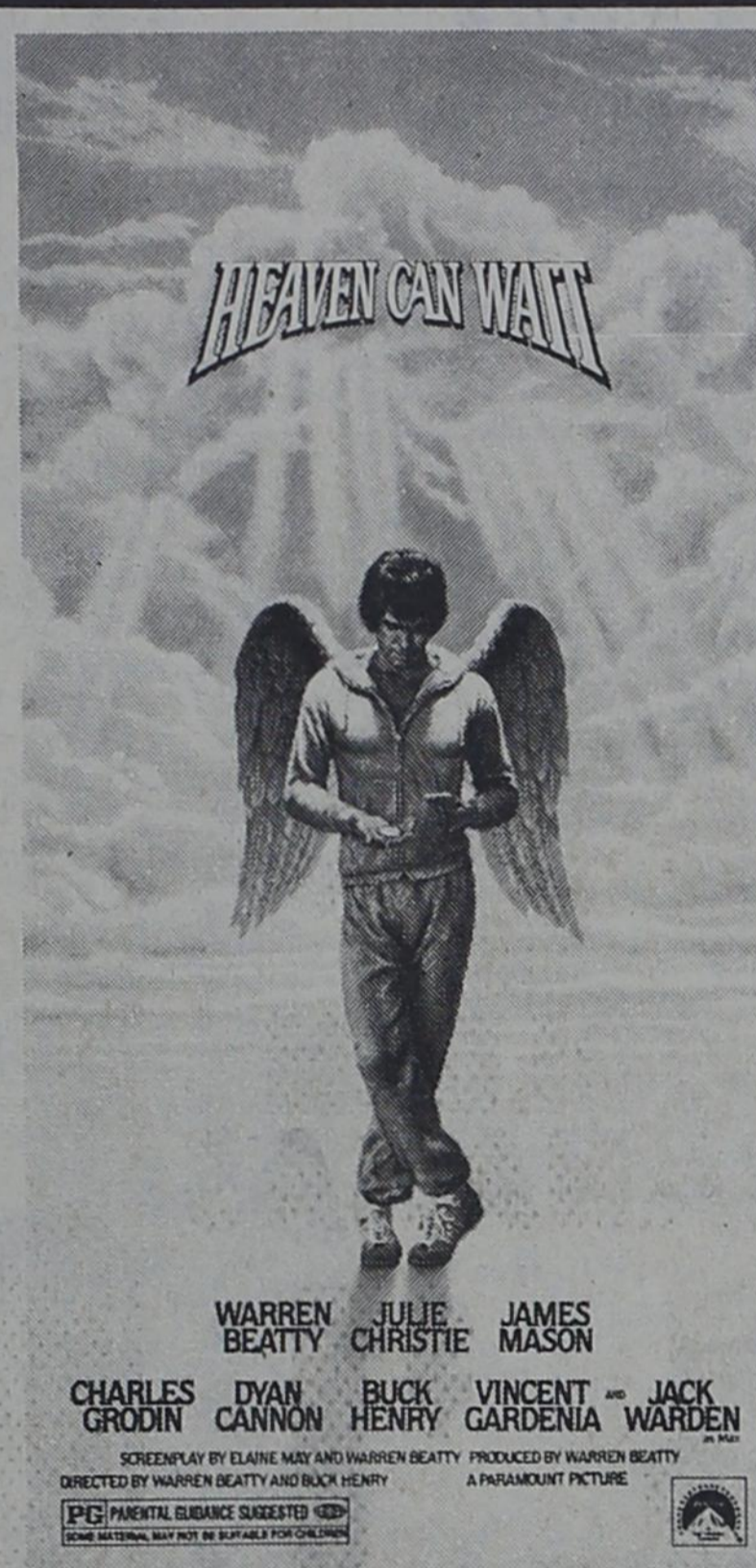

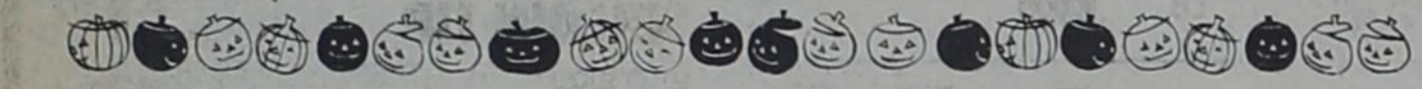

FIBER NEWS

NYLON
Consumers can "unravel" any confusions about nylon by knowing some basic nylon facts. Nylon's exceptional strength and elasticity make it useful for a variety of products.

It is often used in blends with wool and other fibers to give a fabric greater strength and shape-retaining properties.

Other advantages are nylon's ability to stay strong when wet, resist damage by mildew and chemicals and to resist abrasion. Also, it can be heat-set in permanent pleats, and it washes and dries easily and quickly.

However, nylon can be damaged by exposure to sunlight and by body oils or perspiration, unless it is laundered frequently.

NYLON
Nylon care is usually simple. Most items are machine washable and require drying at low temperature.

Delicate items may need special care or hand laundering.

Nylon absorbs color from wash water and from other fabrics, so always launder nylon fabrics with similar colors.

this is especially important for whites.

Also, nylons require whitening occasionally with special nylon whiteners or by bleaching.

If nylon items need pressing, use a warm iron.

In all cases, for best results, follow the care label instructions, since special finishes may need special care, too.

ACRYLIC

Acrylics "stand-in" for wool in some fashions because they are soft, warm and lightweight.

Fashions they make include sweaters, socks, caps and anything you like from a hand-knitting yarn.

Acrylic can stand alone or team with other fibers in blends for dresses, skirts, slacks, lounge wear and ski wear.

ACRYLIC "PRO'S"

Acrylic is resistant to sunlight, weather, oils and chemicals. That makes it useful for sportswear and work clothes.

Other positive qualities include

color-fastness, pleat retention, easy-washability and moderate abrasion resistance.

ACRYLIC PROBLEMS

Two problems with acrylic are heat sensitivity and tendency to "pill"—form tiny balls, especially when knitted.

TRADE NAMES

Four popular trade names for acrylic fibers and yarns are Acrilan, Creslan, Orion and Zefran.

ACRYLIC CARE

Wash most acrylic fabrics in warm water. Then dry them flat. Some will machine dry at low temperatures—but remove them immediately when the dryer stops.

To reduce static build-up, use a fabric softener in every third or fourth load.

Be sure to squeeze—not wring hand laundered items. Dry them flat, unless the care label says otherwise.

Since care instructions may be different for each acrylic fabric or garment, be sure to follow directions exactly.

MEDICAL "ID" CARD

A medical identification card could save a life.

In emergencies, a medical "ID" card can speak for the patient who cannot tell doctors about special needs or problems.

People who need a medical "ID" card can and need one those with certain diseases or drug allergies and those who take medicine regularly along with those who have any other problems that might affect medical treatment.

To prepare a medical "ID" card, make clear, direct notes about needs or problems.

DISEASE

Among diseases that require notes on a medical "ID" card are diabetes, asthma, epilepsy and heart or kidney disease.

For example, if a person is diabetic, that note is necessary, because of the possible need for

insulin in case of injury.

Also, an insulin reaction can be mistaken for drunkenness and result in improper medical attention.

Regularly Taken Medicines
Notes about medicines taken regularly are important for two reasons.

First, lack of this medicine may cause serious problems, such as for persons who regularly take insulin, cortisone or special eye drops for glaucoma.

Also, emergency medical peo-

ple can prevent serious drug interactions when they know what the patient has already taken.

OTHER PROBLEMS

Other information for a medical "ID" card might include a note such thing as wearing contact lenses, deafness, not being able to speak English or any other medical problem or condition not easily recognized in case of emergency.
