## WHEELER WINS 71-7 IN MISMATCH

### COUNTY FARM BUREAU PLANS ANNUAL DINNER

The Annual meeting of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau will be September 21, 1978 at the Wheeler High School Cafeteria starting at 6:30 p.m., according to John Vermillion, president. The main purpose of the meeting will be to adopt policies and resolutions for next year. Mr. Vermillion said major issues expected to be discussed and voted on include the following:

1. Adoption of New By-laws.
  2. Resolutions.
- A. We go on record to petition the Congress for the elimination of OSHA, also to eliminate the program to save predatory wildlife such as the coyote.
- B. The law 208 regarding non-point pollution affecting farmers to be exempt.
- C. A person who does not devote the major portion of his productive time to farming shall not be allowed farm expenses in excess of his farm income on a year to year basis in determining income tax liability.
- D. Revenue-sharing to cities, states, and counties should be eliminated in order to give local

residents the opportunity to vote if expenditures are necessary. All members are invited to attend.

Adopted resolutions dealing with local matters will become county policies for next year. Other approved resolutions will be forwarded to the state convention as recommendations for state and national policies.

#### Bonds Sold For Paving Project

Regular meeting of September 18, 1978 was opened with Mayor Burton asking if minutes and payment of bills had been reviewed. Each member had done same and Berniece Hall motion the minutes be approved as circulated. Leon Moore second, Motion carried.

Louis Stas motion to pay bills as presented, except the one presented by the Volunteer Fire Department. David Cross second, motion carried.

Kenneth Smith with Rauscher Pierce Securities Corporation met with Council to open bids on the \$300,000.00 bond issue. There were ten bids submitted. After reviewing bids it was determined to accept the bid of Mercantile National Bank of Dallas, Texas. A copy of the bids and resolution accepting the low bid is on file in the City office. Also a copy of Ordinance #104 awarding the bonds to Merchante National Bank of Dallas, Texas.

Bill Owen reported on meeting in Canyon on the rate increase request of Southwestern Public Service Company and presented an ordinance for adoption to require Southwestern Public Service Company to meet with Council to request a fuel adjustment increase.

Delbert Thomas motion the ordinance be adopted, Leon Moore second, motion carried. This ordinance being #105 in the ordinance book #4 of the City of Wheeler.

Delbert Thomas motion to pay bill of meetings and base pay to the Fire Department, but table paying of bill for radio repairs until more information on same is received. Berniece Hall second, motion carried.

Mayor Burton presented a bill from Senior Citizens for repairs they had done on sewer at Nicholson Memorial Hospital. Berniece Hall motion the labor cost only on this bill be paid by the City, Louis Stas second, motion carried.

Louis Stas motion to advertise for bids on extending sewer line on West Oklahoma Avenue from Bryan Street to Wheeler Vet. Clinic. David Cross second, motion carried.

David Cross motion the cost of 3/4 inch water taps be raised to \$135.00 per tap and 1 inch taps to \$275.00. Louis Stas second, motion carried.

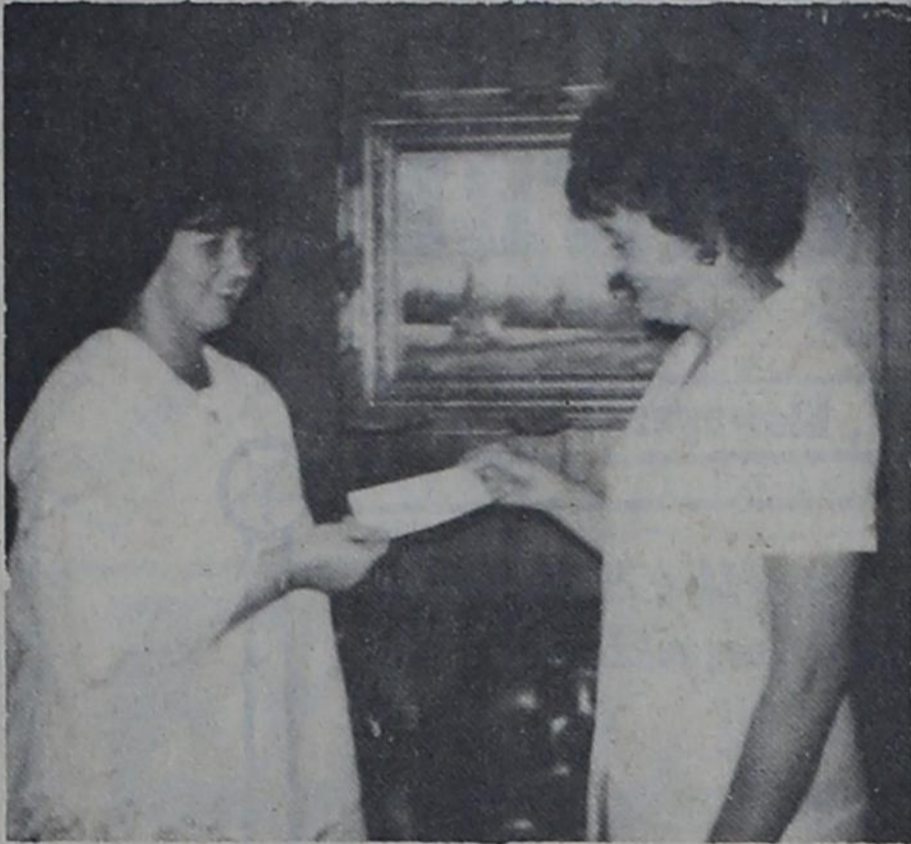

### 1978 KISS-OFF: KISS A BABY CAMPAIGN

More than 20 volunteers for the 1978 Kiss a Baby Campaign will call on their neighbors, Sunday, Sept. 24 to encourage them to kiss their babies and ask their help in the fight for the millions of children across the nation who suffer from lung-damaging diseases.

The campaign's Door-to-Door drive will be conducted in Wheeler for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation as part of the annual effort to raise funds for programs benefiting children with cystic fibrosis and other lung-damaging diseases.

According to Mr. and Mrs. Wills, contributions to the Kiss A Baby Campaign will help support a national network of over 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers, research projects around the world and various educational programs.

Cystic Fibrosis Centers, most located at teaching hospitals affiliated with leading medical schools and universities, provide diagnosis, treatment, and referral to children suffering from cystic fibrosis, asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, "child hood emphysema" and recurrent pneumonia.

Hospitals dealing with gastrointestinal disorders related to C/F are located in Dallas, Houston and San Antonio.

"Most of the funds that are raised in the Kiss A Baby Campaign go to these very important national programs," he said. "But, almost 50 percent of the monies stay in this Chapter area to support services for local children with cystic fibrosis and other lung-damaging diseases."

### Railroad Comm. Meets With Wiley

Representatives of Consolidated Utilities, Inc., whose home offices are in Miami, recently returned from a conference with members of the Safety Division of the Railroad Commission of Texas.

Bill Wiley, president of Consolidated, said the company feels that the meetings were productive and, because of them, each organization understands problems facing the other more completely.

Some of the detailed records on safety operation and maintenance, more commonly referred to as Consolidated a Color Book Work, have not been as complete as the Commission deems necessary. These records will be more thorough in the future. Also, more specific records will be kept on valve checks and room odorant test even though these tests have been made by the company for the protection of its customers long before they were a requirement of the Commission.

Consolidated feels it has very possibly saved its customers a large increase in rates by obtaining a waiver on cathodic protection, if continued negotiations work out. Although some of the requirements will eventually be seen on the customers bill, Wiley says the large cost of cathodic protection could have jumped the gas rate as much as a third. Consolidated monitors its lines regularly, with its Mobil Hydrogen Flame Ionization Gas Detection Unit, finding little leaks before they become big problems.

The Commission has also agreed that Consolidated will not have to prime and paint all structures above ground if proved that deterioration is not caused by our atmosphere. It seems that this blanket rule to make everyone paint because salt air on the coast rust pipes, if unfair.

Wiley wishes to let those who are served by Consolidated know that the company is constantly doing everything it thinks necessary to provide for their safety. He said it has been his policy over the years that a utility company should provide adequate service for the least possible cost to the customer, still giving a fair return to the company. He feels that most large utilities welcome expenditures that help increase their rate base, which is the investment determining their allowed earnings, but, small utilities, because of their high cost per customer served, have a rough time existing much less earning a fair return.

I came home via Perryton. I had two nights there and on

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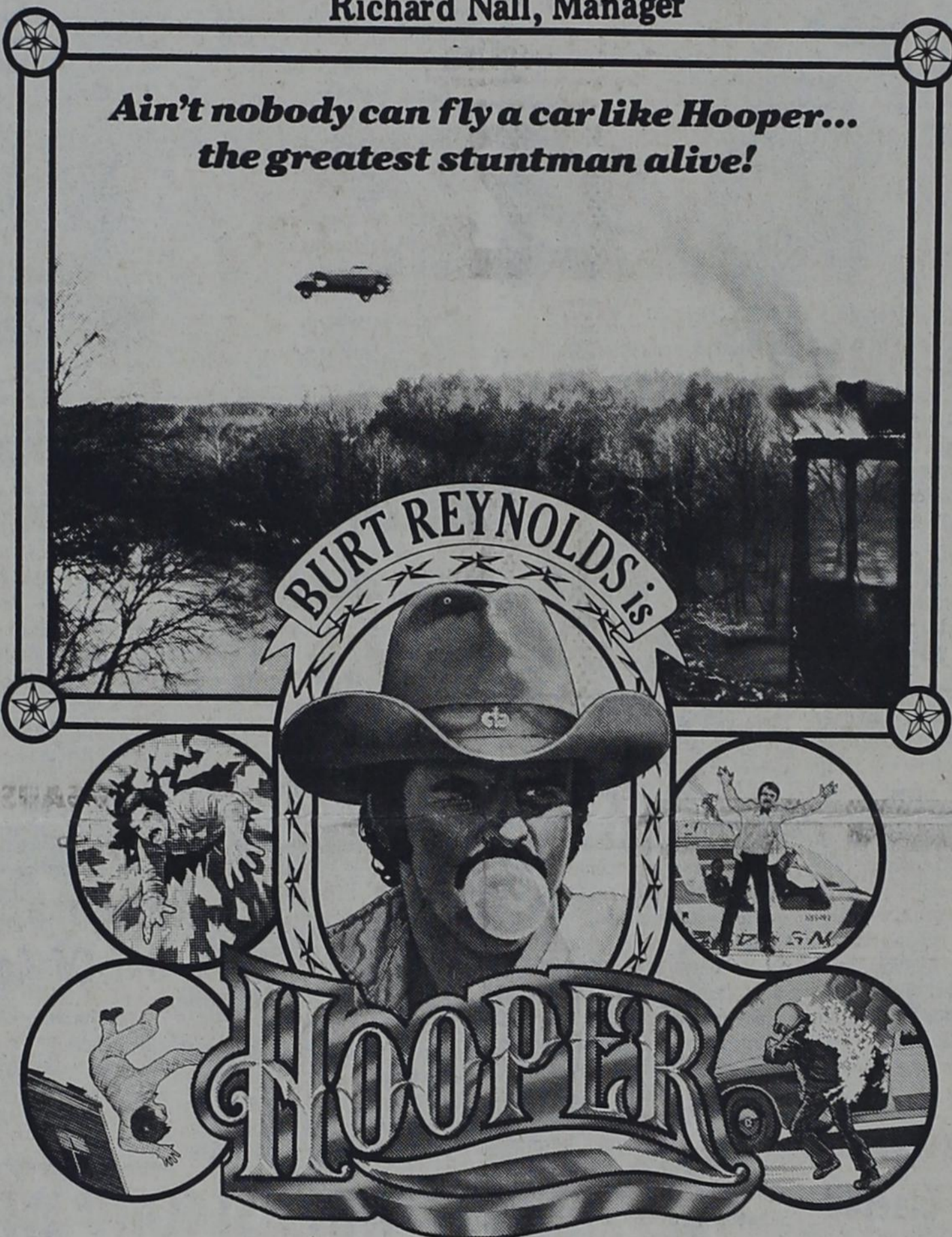

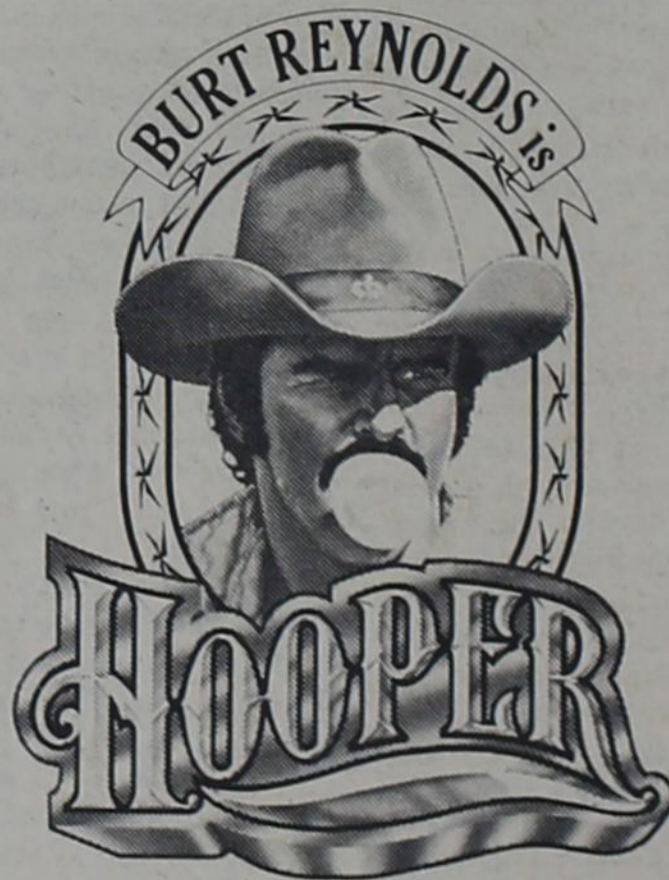
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## LINES from LINDA

CEA—Linda Daughtry

**microwave.**  
Trout Olive-Amandine  
1 pound trout fillets  
1/2 cup sliced almonds  
5 tablespoons margarine  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
2 tablespoons white wine or sherry  
1/2 cup pitted ripe olives, (quartered lengthwise)  
1/4 teaspoon dill weed  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Lemon slices

**MICROWAVE OVEN METHOD:** In a two-quart baking dish, combine almonds and margarine. Cook, uncovered, two to three minutes or until butter and almonds are golden brown.

Stir in lemon juice, wine, ripe olives, dill and salt. Arrange fillets in margarine mixture, turning under thinner end pieces to insure uniform cooking. Spoon sauce over fillets.

**PREPARE TROUT:** Cook, covered with wax paper or plastic wrap, five minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork.

Let stand, covered, two minutes before serving. Garnish with lemon slices. Makes four servings.

**CONVENTIONAL OVEN METHOD:** Salute almonds in margarine over medium heat until margarine and almonds are golden brown.

Combine and assemble according to above directions. Bake, uncovered, at 350 degrees F. for 12 to 15 minutes, or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork.

**Shrimp Creole** Prepare Shrimp Creole—an old-time favorite easily and economically at home. It can be prepared economically because—though the price per pound of shrimp seems high—it can be stretched to serve six people.

When the French invented cuisine a la Creole, they began a whole new era of dining.

Old cuisine artists developed methods of cooking that have stood the test of time and are well-loved today.

For example, try this recipe for

**Shrimp Creole;**  
**SHRIMP CREOLE**  
1 pound cleaned and deveined shrimp  
1 large chopped onion  
2 cloves chopped garlic  
1 chopped green bell pepper  
1/2 cup chopped celery  
6 slices cooked bacon, reserve fat  
1 can (6 oz.) tomato paste  
1 can (1lb.) tomatoes  
1 bay leaf  
1 can (13 oz.) chicken broth  
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce  
1/4 cup chopped parsley  
1 teaspoon chili powder  
1 teaspoon sugar  
1 teaspoon liquid hot pepper sauce  
1 teaspoon gumbo file  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
Saute onion, garlic, green

pepper and celery in fat until vegetables are tender. Add crumbled bacon and remaining ingredients except shrimp and file. Simmer for 20 minutes. Add shrimp and file and cook for three to five minutes. Serve over hot rice. Makes six servings.

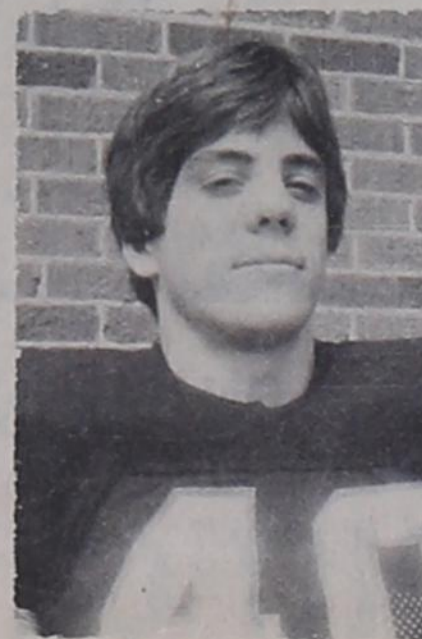

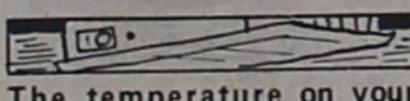

## Book Review

"Notorious Eliza" is Basil Be-yea's marvelous and long-awaited sequel to "The Golden Mistress." When she comes to New York at the end of the

eighteenth century, Eliza Capet is still compelled by the same insatiable drive for fame and wealth that took her away from the docks and brothels, dazzling all the men she meets with her beauty and cunning. Eliza becomes the manipulative mistress of some of the leading men of New York society--Alexander

Hamilton; Stephen Jumel, the wealthy French wine merchant and the most eligible bachelor of the day; and eventually Aaron Burr himself.

Many an expert writer has given us his own version of that most enduring of English legends the story of Arthur, and in the process enriched it. Add now the name of Victor Canning, whose new novel about Arthur, "The Crimson Chalice," is as innovative as it is delightful. In those years, the Roman influence long dissipated, the Britons stood with their backs to the wall under pressure of the Saxon invaders. The day of the hero was at hand, and Arthur, born in relative obscurity rose to the challenge. Except that Merlin was there at critical moments to attest to his specialness, it was the time-old struggle of the young undaunted against the vested interests.

## SCS Announces Field Day Sept. 27

A field day will be held at the Soil Conservation Service Plant Materials Center at Knox City on September 27, 1978.

Lavon Williams, district conservationist for SCS at Wheeler said the public is being invited to the event. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma.

A. C. Spencer, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, will be the principal speaker. Spencer will speak at 12:30 p.m.

Guided tours will be conducted through the 90-acre center from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The center is located on FM 1292, 2 miles north and 2 1/2 miles west of Knox City.

Seed or rootstock from native plants that show potential for solving specific soil and water conservation problems are collected, then grown and evaluated at the Knox City Center. The more promising ones are then tested under field conditions on farms of soil and water conservation district cooperators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections which prove superior to commercial varieties are then released to seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

More than 1100 strains of grasses, legumes, forbs, and woody plants are being tested at Knox City.

About 9,000 pounds of seed were produced at the center last year, mostly for trial plantings across Texas and Oklahoma. Some 5,000 woody plant seedlings were also produced as well as 250,000 rhizomes of plants that have to be propagated by planted underground shoots.

Two new plant varieties — 'Alamo' switchgrass and 'Aztec' Maximilian sunflower — were certified and released earlier this year as a result of work done at the center.

## PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

### "The Tax Relief Amendment" (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

### authority where the property tax is imposed.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration."

### NUMBER ONE (S.J.R. 50)

S.J.R. 50 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to delete an archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum." The amendment would allow the State of Texas to purchase products and services done by handicapped individuals in nonprofit rehabilitation facilities without complying with bid requirements applicable to other state contracts. The amendment also would eliminate the formality of the approval of certain state contracts by the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment deleting the archaic reference to the 'Deaf and Dumb Asylum,' allowing certain products and services of handicapped individuals to be used by agencies and departments of state government, requiring the procurement of other products and services required in the operation of state government to be made under bids awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, making all such procurement processes subject to laws enacted by the legislature, and eliminating the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller of Public Accounts of Texas be personally involved with such transactions."

### NUMBER TWO (S.J.R. 55)

S.J.R. 55 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit local governments to issue bonds for the reconstruction or acquisition of facilities (land, equipment and improvements) designed to develop employment opportunities. These

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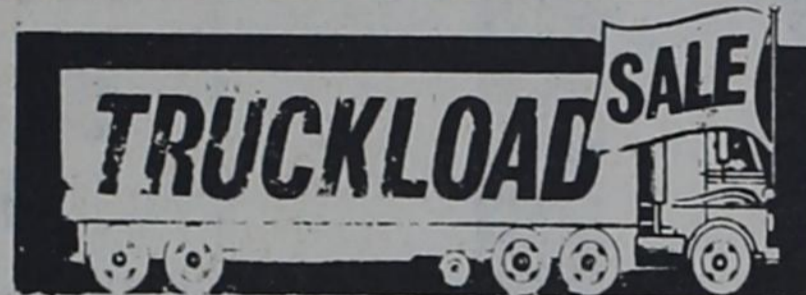
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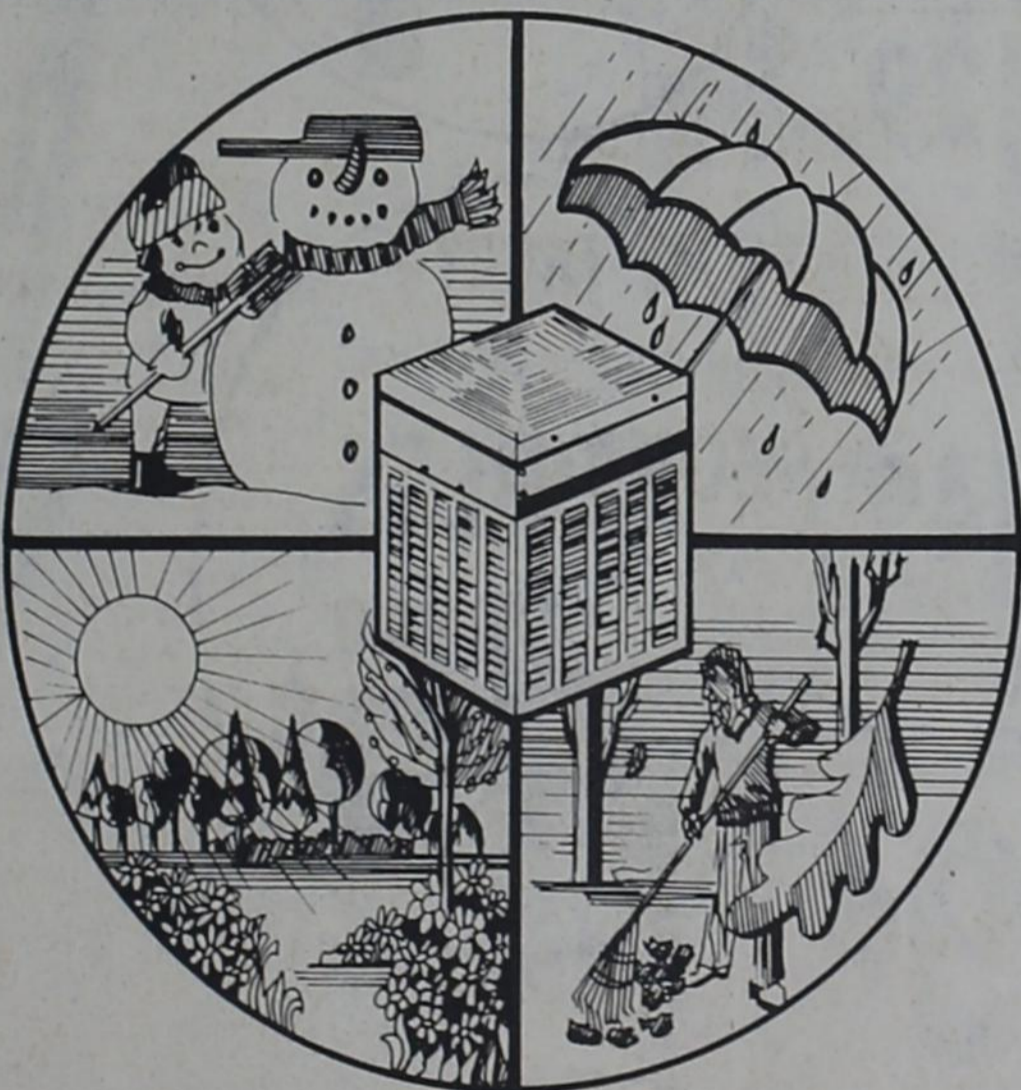

Any person who believes himself, or any specific class of individuals, to be subjected by this organization to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and the Rules and Regulations issued thereunder may, by himself or a representative, file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250, or the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D.C. 20250, or this organization, or all, a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 180 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture of the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time of filing. Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations.

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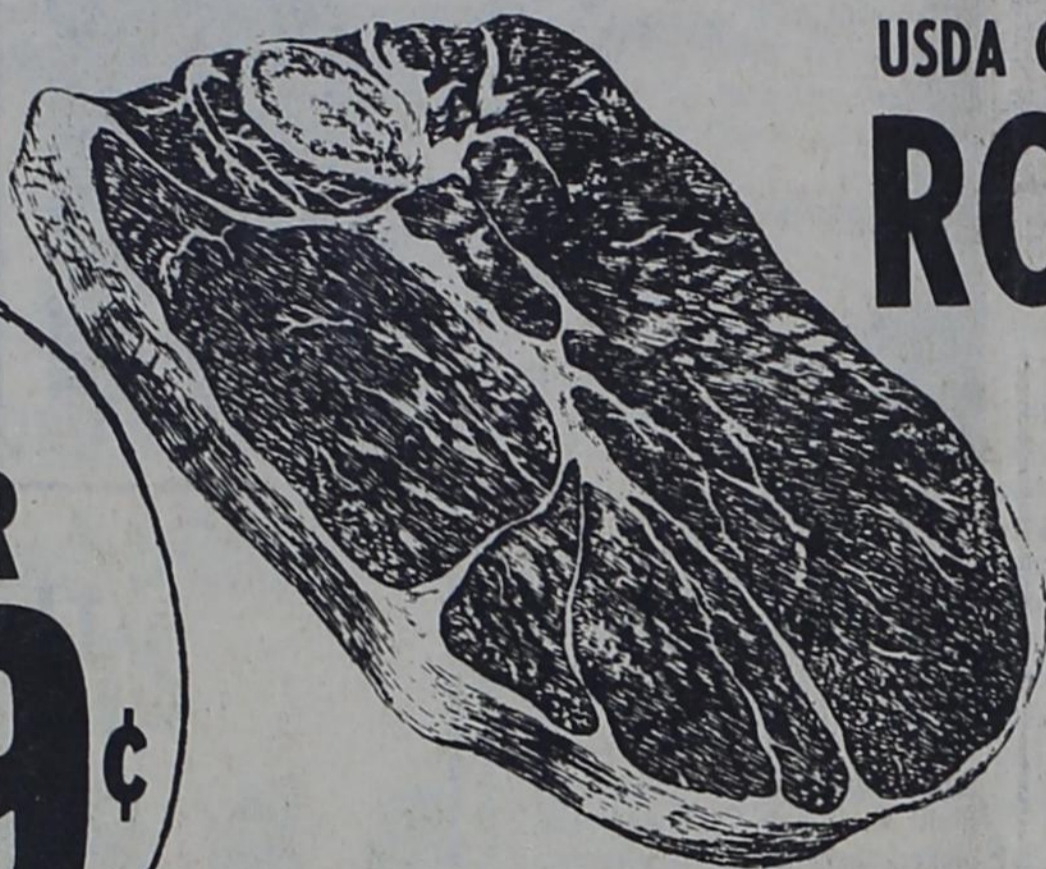
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
