BACK TO SCHOOL

ENROLLMENT UP IN WHEELER; OTHERS VARY

The summer has ended and the youngsters are back in school. Some north Wheeler county schools gained students and others showed a loss in number enrolled. Records show 692 enrolled this year compared to 689 last year. Wheeler I.S.D. has gained 28 pupils in the grades; 386 students are enrolled for 1978-79. The first eight grades received 19 of these students. With nine over last year's enrollment, the high school has 16 more students than were enrolled at the end of the 1977-78 school year.

The Seniors have the largest enrollment with the other high school classes being larger than the elementary. The Juniors have an enrollment of 38; Sophomores, 35 and the Freshman, 34. The Seniors have the largest enrollment of 44 with the other high school classes being larger than the elementary. The Juniors have an enrollment of 38; Sophomores, 35 and the Freshmen, 34. In the Junior High and Elementary enrollment is as follows: Kindergarten-32, First-24, Second-30, Third-32, Fourth-24, fifth-18, Sixth-30, Seventh-21 and Eighth-23.

Allison School showed a decrease in enrollment by 7 students; they have 63 students enrolled this year. Four students are enrolled in Kindergarten and 7 are in the first grade. BRISCOE

Helen Singleton will teach fourth grade and Gayle Leyallen will serve as teacher's Aide.

MOBEETIE

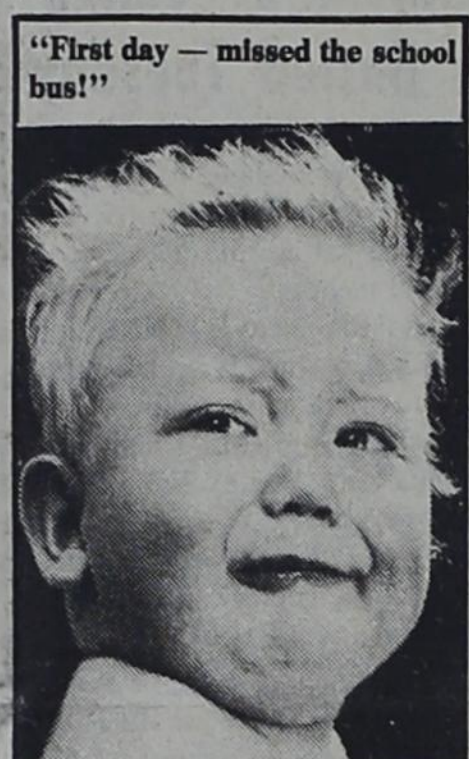

The FOOLISHNESS of GOD

Why do fireflies have lights in their tails? Why do "doodle-bugs" crawl backwards? Why do giraffes have such long necks? Can you find an explanation for everything you observe? No? Then you would not say that everything you do not understand is foolishness.

Yet man often does that very thing with God. Sometimes man tries to judge God. He listens to God's testimony, considers the ways of the Lord, and then decides where God is right and where He is wrong. Sometimes he says, "I think that is foolishness!"

But who is man to judge his Creator? Paul, facing the same problem in the first century, said: "The word of the cross is to them that perish foolishness, but unto us who are saved it is the power of God. . . the foolishness of God is wiser than men; and the weakness of God is stronger than men" (1 Corinthians 1:18,25).

The "foolishness" of God is seen throughout the Bible. For instance: **THE TAKING OF JERICHO**
God, through Joshua, directed the Israelite nation through the wilderness of Sinai, across the Jordan River and into the promised land. But the land was inhabited by enemies. In order to take the city of Jericho, he told them to walk around it once each day for six days, and on the seventh, seven times (Joshua 6:3,4). This seems

foolish. Yet they had faith in God and obeyed his commands, whereupon the city walls fell, and Israel took the city.

THE STORY OF NAAMAN
"Now Naaman, captain of the host of the king of Syria, was a . . . mighty man of valor, but he was a leper" (2 Kings 5:1). In seeking a cure he was directed to the house of Elisha, the prophet of Israel, that he might be miraculously healed. He was instructed to "Go and wash in Jordan seven times, and thy flesh shall come again to thee, and thou shalt be clean." Now this seemed like a foolish thing to Naaman. In fact, "Naaman was wroth" and in his anger he said, "Are not Abana and Parpar, rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? May I not wash in them, and be clean?" Then he left in a rage. But his servant pleaded with him: "If the prophet had bid thee do some great thing, wouldest thou not have done it?" Whereupon Naaman obeyed God's word, and upon coming out of the Jordan the seventh time his flesh was completely cleansed from leprosy.

It is no different today. Preaching the gospel, obeying the Lord in baptism, observing the weekly memorial feast of the Lord, and other commands of Christ — these are foolishness to many. Yes, but "the foolishness of God!"

Buying Upholstered Furniture
When shopping for upholstered furniture, remember to question and test. Home furnishing sales this month offer excellent money-saving opportunities, so shop around to get the best values. Remember, a high price does not necessarily indicate high quantity. Examine Tailoring. Look by examining the tailoring. Check that seams are straight and securely stitched. Pull on each side of a seam gently they should not give. Look for straight—not wavy welt cording. Check that plaids and stripes are well-matched and that prints are centered on each cushion. If the piece of furniture has a skirt, be sure it is sewn on straight and hangs evenly. Read Labels. Look for labels to see if the fabric is treated to repel water and stains. Some furniture carries a warranty that indicates the fabric has been performance-tested for color fastness and durability. Bounce in Furniture. Bounce in the chair or sofa. The springs should not hit the frame. Seat construction should feel soft but provide good support. The furniture should allow your feet to rest on the floor. Squeeze the arms of sofas and chairs. If padding between the fabric and the wood is sufficient, the frame can't be felt. Ask questions. Some features are not visible, so ask the sales-person questions about the quality. First, ask about the frame. Better quality will have frames of steel or kil-dried hardwood Maple, ash, birch, mahogany, alder or oak. Be wary of soft wood, fir, cedar or pine. The joints where the frames are put together should be double dowel or triple dowel with reinforcement blocks at points of stress. Next, ask about the springs. Two types of springs are used in well-built furniture, coil spring and convoluted springs. Finally, ask about the type of filling used in the cushions. Polyurethane foam, foam rubber and man-made fiber fill are non-allergenic, odorless, moth-proof and mildew proof. Filling of down or down and feathers is usually used in expensive furniture.

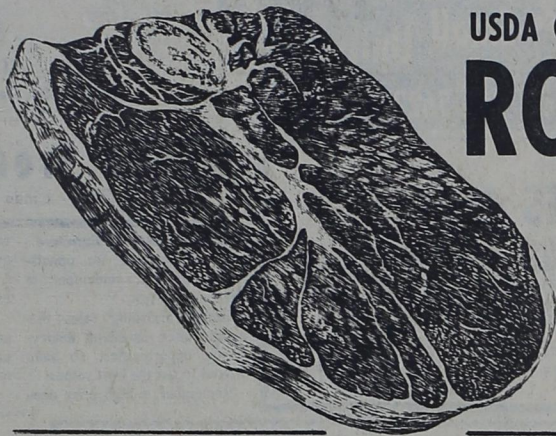
