## WHEELER STUDENTS WILL ENROLL FRIDAY, AUG. 25

Wheeler Public School students are to report to school Friday, August 25, for registration.

Kindergarten through Junior High students will register from 9:00 to 10:30. Thomas Helton, grade school principal reminds parents that kindergarten students and some grade students will be required to have their birth certificates and immunization certificates on the day of registration.

The registration schedule for high school students will be as follows: Seniors, 9 to 10:30; Juniors, 10:30 to noon; Sophomores, 1 to 2:30 and Freshmen, 2:30 to 4.

The buses will not run and lunch will not be served Friday, August 25.

## FOUR KILLED MONDAY IN ACCIDENT AT THE LINE

Four men were killed Monday evening in a traffic accident 18 miles east of Wheeler in the edge of Oklahoma. The car-truck collision occurred when the auto driven by Casey apparently pulled in front of a truck hauling hanging beef; the truck driver was not injured.

The four victims, passengers in the car, were thrown from the vehicle at the time of impact. The truck's gas tank ignited immediately and one victim was burned beyond recognition after being pinned under the truck.

Three men were pronounced dead at the scene and one was dead on arrival at Parkview Hospital.

The Wheeler Fire Department was called to help extinguish the fire.

The Erick Ambulance Service was called to the scene of the accident. The victims were from Perryton and Booker.

## 2 Men Injured In Cycle Mishap

A motor cycle accident on the curve at the east edge of Briscoe Tuesday afternoon resulted in the injury of two young men from Mobeetie. Mike Klinklesmith and Billy James were brought to Parkview Hospital where they were treated for injuries.

Billy James, 16, was treated for a deep scalp laceration and transferred by ambulance to High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo for further treatment of the injury. James was a passenger on the bike.

Klinklesmith, 18, was treated for pavement burn and kept for observation at Parkview.

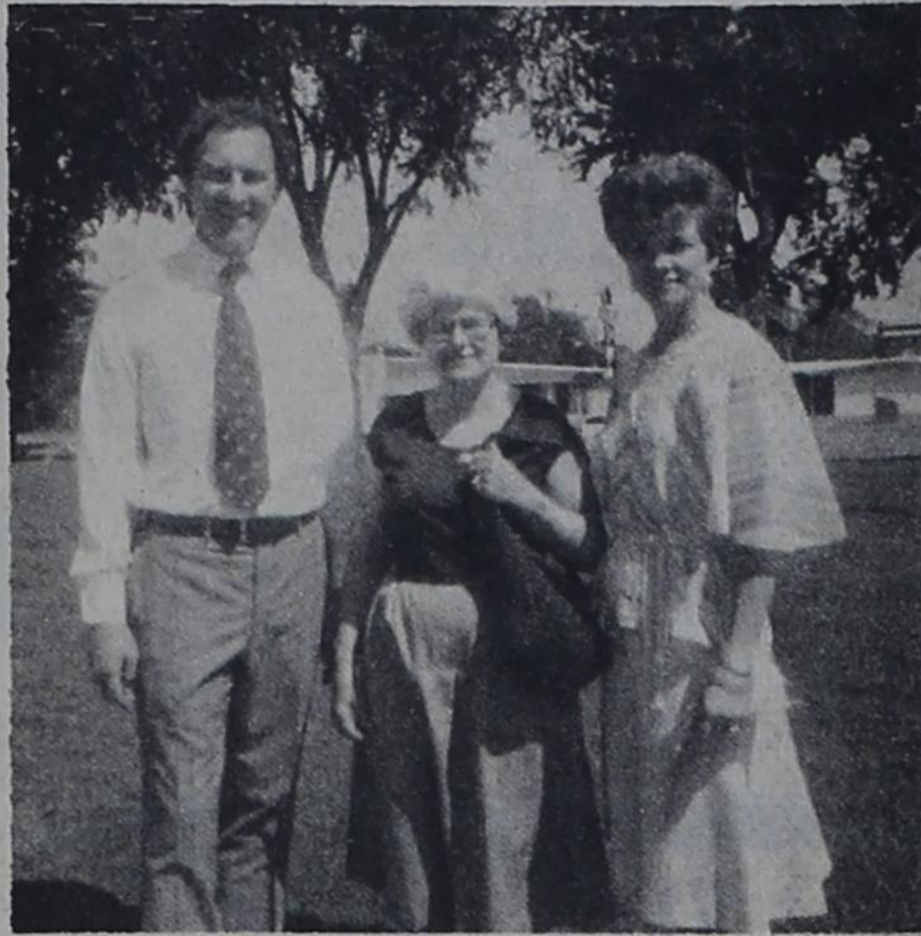
## Vandiver Is WTSU Summer Graduate

## MUSTANGS IN FULL PRACTICE TO DEFEND STATE CHAMPIONSHIP HOST WHITE DEER BUCKS FRIDAY IN SCRIMMAGE

Forty eager candidates greeted new head coach Joe Allen last week as the Wheeler Mustangs began preparations to defend their district and state championships.

Fans will get an opportunity Friday night at 7 p.m. to witness the 1978 edition of the Wheeler Mustang footballers as they play host to the White Deer Bucks in a controlled scrimmage. Both the varsity squads and the JV squads will take part in the scrimmage.

Not only has the Mustangs coaching staff been hunting for

replacements for graduated starters in their pre-season drills but they have been drilling the Mustangs in new offensive and defensive alignments.

"The kids have responded real well to the changes we have installed and this bunch has a great attitude and they want to uphold that winning tradition in the worst way", Coach Joe Allen said this week.

The White Deer scrimmage will be the first of two scrimmages for the Mustangs. Next week the Mustangs visit Wellington for their final tuneup before opening the season at Nicholson Field on September 8th against the rival Shamrock Irish.

## 4-H Horse Show Set For September

The first annual Wheeler County 4-H Open Youth Horse Show is scheduled for September 16 at the Wheeler Riding Club Arena. The show, sponsored by the Wheeler County 4-H Texans Horse Club will be open to all youth 18 years of age and younger.

The show will begin at 10:00 a.m. with the halter class. Halter classes will include registered mares, grade mares, registered gelding and grade geldings.

The halter classes will be as followed by the performance classes which will include showmanship, trail horse, reining, polebending and barrel race. There will be age divisions for 13 and under and 14 and over for each performance class.

Books will close at 9:30 for halter and at the conclusion of the halter class for all the performance classes. There will be a 30 minute break between halter and performance. Each contestant may ride as many horses as he or she wishes but the horses must be owned by the contestant or his parents, brother, sister or grandparents. A contestant may ride only one horse in a class and must designate when entering which horse he will collect points on, the high point awards. Also a horse may be ridden only once in a class.

Prizes will consist of tack given to the top three places in each class. The grand and reserve champion mare and gelding will receive trophies. The high point performance horse will receive a saddle blanket with tooled leather corners and the overall high point horse will receive a stable sheet. A horse must be entered in halter to be eligible for the all around award.

The entry fee will be \$2 per class. Proof of contestant age, horse ownership and registration papers should be available. Following the horse show there will be several jackpot breakaway roping for ages 13 & under and 14 and over. Entry fee will be \$7.50 plus a cattle charge of \$2.50.

There will be a jackpot ster roping for ages 18 and under and a parent-child team. Each contestant may enter each division one time. Entry fee will be \$1.50 per team plus a \$2.50 cattle charge.

The jackpot barrel race will have divisions for 18 and under and adults. Entry fee will be \$7.50 for the youth and \$10.00 for adults with 100% being paid back.

The board approved the proposed budget for the 78-79 school year and set the tax rate at \$1.30 for local maintenance and .25 for Bonded debt fund. This reflects a .10 decrease over the 77-78 tax rate for the Wheeler Schools.

In other action, the Board employed Mrs. Rhonda Blanchard as Spanish and Speech teacher and approved the purchase of a language lab for the 78-79 school year.

**CHECK IMMUNIZATION RECORDS**

Before sending the children back to school, check their immunization records.

The Texas School Immunization Law requires immunization of children before they enter school.

However, preschoolers also need immunization.

Younger children are sometimes left unprotected because parents wait until the child is ready for school before starting the immunization series.

Most doctors, however, recommend that infants of two months begin the basic series against DTP (Diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis) and polio.

These immunizations are given in a series and just one or two shots will not give the child full protection.

The Texas Department of Health recommends the following as a suggested immunization schedule:

Basic series: 2 months—DTP, polio; 4 months—DTP, polio; 6 months—DTP, polio; 12-18 months—DTP, polio; 15 months—measles, mumps, rubella.

Booster doses: 4-6 years—DTP, polio; 14-16 years—Td (tetanus-diphtheria); thereafter—Td every 10 years.

Every year in the United States, children die of diseases they should have never contracted. Others are disabled, even though the means for prevention is readily accessible.

Don't let this happen in your family. Check with the family doctor or local health department to make sure your children are fully protected.

## KINGS KOMMENTS

**Beef Cows Need Phosphorous The Year Round**  
Many Texas beef cattle herds may be deficient in an important mineral—phosphorous—and there performance may suffer for this reason.  
Dr. Steve Hammack and Dr. George Alston, specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, say many cow-calf operators realize that dietary phosphorous is one of the important factors in reproductive efficiency.  
"It is fairly well recognized that the phosphorous content is inadequate for food animal reproduction on most pasture and ranges in the Southwest except for periods of lush growth," Alston says. He is an area argonomist with the Extension Service.  
A considerable number of herds breed during the soring when phosphorous may be adequate. So it is tempting to believe that phosphorous supplementation is unnecessary on a spring breeding program.  
What producers don't always realize, however, is that the mineral is important in many other functions including growth, appetite, feed efficiency and mild production.  
"Borderline deficiencies may reduce performance of cows, calves and stocker cattle without producing effects which can be seen," says Hammack, an area beef cattle specialist.  
For this reason, the specialists have found that most good operators provide a mineral supplement at all times. There is little unnecessary consumption, they emphasize, if salt and other minerals are offered separately since cattle will generally eat little mineral when forage is lush.  
The Extension Specialist suggest cattlemen use a mineral with about 8 to 15 percent phosphorous and no more than this amount of calcium. The phosphorous content of the mineral is the important factor. Cheap, high-calcium minerals are not beneficial, and these generally have a high cost per pound of phosphorous.  
**Post Planting Care of Young Shade Trees**  
Hot, dry weather can cause

serious damage to recently planted shade and ornamental trees unless they get a little special care.  
The main thing is to make sure they get adequate water since hot summer days and drying winds take a great deal of moisture from the leaves and stems. Since a transplanted tree has a small root system, the only water it can utilize is that which is in the soil close to the tree. If this soil area becomes dry, the leaves wilt, turn brown and drop. Branches or even the entire tree may die.  
Water at regular intervals all trees planted within the past year. If the soil is sandy, water about once a week; if it is clay or loam, through watering every 10 days to two week; should be enough.  
Using an open-end hose, regulate the water flow so there is no run-off and saturate and soil around the tree. To determine whether or not you are supplying the proper amount of water, take soil samples between waterings at depths of 12 to 18 inches; the soil should be moist but not muddy.  
Insect control is also critical for transplanted trees. A few insects can cause severe damage to newly planted tree, so control measures should be applied promptly when insects are found.  
Also, for steady vigorous growth, fertilize the tree once it is established.  
If the tree was worth planting it is certainly worth the little extra effort required to keep it in good growing condition.

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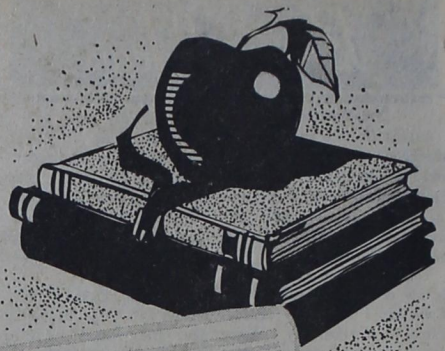
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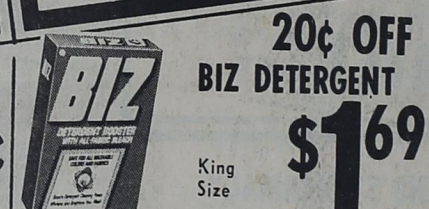
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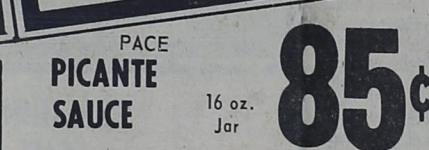
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
