Ft. Elliott Ft. Elliott had one contested race; two full term seats were to be filled in the election. Incumbents re-elected to their places on the board were Gorden Estes, 89 votes, and Richard Meadows, 73 votes. Charles Crownover

nt It The Truth By Ab Gunter

I've heard my mother say many many times that each of us is responsible for what we do. I've tried to analize just what she meant and I feel she was using the singular WE. I think she meant what I do. I have to tie my own shoes, brush my own teeth, shave my own face and hopefully be responsible for my own actions. I have listened to different people on TV that are hatefully critical of our government and the folks we have elected to run it. I've heard people that claim they have no remorse as to the human loss in the terrible bombing in Oklahoma City. I can't for the life of me believe that anyone in their right mind can feel this way. As a soldier in World War II I have seen many on both sides loose their lives in battle and now I look back and realize each of the casualities were human beings, someones son, brother or father. Heros, yes we had many that were heros and many that weren't ever decorated. Why? Well, any of them did what they had to do and that was that. I served with a fuzzy faced Swede recruit in the battle of Okinawa that I bet never even got the Bronze Star and he never shirked his duty in any way. I wish I could personally thank this boy from Lodi, California for his bravery but likely won't.

I have a nephew that was one of the Rangers that was in the Pacific area during the war and never have I heard him mention his service nor what a great hero he was. I have a brother that was in more than one action in the Pacific and hardly ever will he mention it. One first cousin was killed in Vietnam. He was a chopper pilot and was told not to try to recover any more wounded, but he tried just one more time. He likely got no more than the Purple Heart but he was a hero.

At this minute I am listening to TV in the other room talking about all the people that are working in the Federal Bldg. in the City trying to get the rubble removed so they can recover the remaining bodies that are under this mass of cement and steel and metal that is hampering their work. The mass of damaged steel and cement above and around them could at any minute come shattering down and take many more lives. Heros, yes sir, to me they are heros too. I bet if the truth were known many of them were members of one or the other forces that risked their lives in Vietnam, Korea or some other combats we have been involved

These groups that are using the Waco tragedy or the Idaho incident or maybe the Montana situation to justify their actions ought to get them a Visa to go to Bosnia or maybe Russia or one of them countries where they would be welcomed with open arms.

One time in Okinawa we had an officerto tell our tank commander, Joe Lominaco, to take this trail down this way and then turn that way and destroy a Jap 150 that hampered our movement. Joe looked at the officer and said Sir if you will jump in our Ole Black Widow and show us the way we will take out that 150 that's given us so much trouble. The officer asked the Sqt. why he felt his idea wouldn't work and Joe showed him. Them Japs had that road targeted and any dust from our tank track would alert them enemy to bombard this area with round after was married April 22nd. From The Minister's Desk: Joe Slater, the minister of the Augusta Church of Christ in Augusta, Kansas, recently wrote an article that taught an important truth about Christianity. This article was entitled, "Patches and Wineskins" and it said: -

"From the the very first, people have struggled to understand the difference between the gospel and Judaism. Even today people tend to mix the two, resulting in a sort of hybird that doesn't really fit either mold. Jesus dealt with this issue when He was asked why his disciples didn't fast like John's."

"Mosaic Law required but one fast, but many Jews fasted more frequently. Jesus, however, taught His disciples no regular pattern of fasting. Naturally people wondered why. Jesus used two illustrations to explain. First, "No one puts a piece from a new garment on old one; otherwise the new makes a tear, and also the piece that was taken out of the new does not match the old. (Luke 5:37)"

"If you patched a hole in your old jeans with a new piece of material, the patch would shrink and pull a new hole in the jeans. Likewise, Jesus never intended for His gospel to be a patch to "fix" Judaism. Rather, the gospel is an entirely new garment. It is not made from the same laws and traditions, but is of different material—it does not match the old. There are some similarities, even as different bolts of cloth have some likenesses. But as a whole the gospel is a new system."

"Second, Jesus said," And no one puts new wine into old wineskins; or else the new wine will burst the wineskins and be spilled, and the wineskins will be ruined. But new

wine must be put into new wineskins, and both are preserved. (Luke 5:37-38) Impurities in an old wineskin would cause fresh grape juice to ferment, releasing great quantities of carbon doxide gas which would explode the skin. New skins, on the other hand, would prevent fermentation, thus preserving both the new wine and themselves. In like manner, the gospel was not merely remodeled Judaism; it was "new wine" which would not be contained in the old wineskins of Jewish tradition." and

"Let us add that Jesus was not talking about "updating" God's word to fit the desires of contemporary society. Modern change agents are demanding that "new wineskins" be used to make the gospel more appealing and "relevant" to the world."

"Jesus made this observation: "And no one, having drunk old wine, immediately desires new; for he says, "The old is better. (Luke 5:39) Our Lord knew people would be slow to let go of the old Jewish ways and hesitant to embrace the gospel. Change is always difficult. In one way that is good because not all change is for the better. But even beneficial change may come slowly. At first, most Jews who became Christians still held to many of the old ways. God tolerated a certain amount of this, but when they bound those traditions on others as a test of fellowship, trouble precipitatedthe patch tore, as it were, or, to use the other illustration, the wineskin burst. The gospel simply is not the same as the Old Law, and the two must not be confused."
