

GREENBELT BOWL FOOTBALL CLASSIC TO BE HELD IN CHILDRESS FRIDAY, AUG. 11

TWO MUSTANG GRIDDERS WILL PLAY FOR WEST

The weather may be warm but football season is upon the scene once more and area and local fans will be able to witness one of the three schoolboy all-star foot-

ball games held each year in Texas this Friday night. The 29th Greenbelt Bowl Classic will be played in Fair Park Stadium in Childress with kickoff at 8 P.M. and fans of the 1977 state champion Wheeler Mustangs will be able to witness two griddeers from that team perform for the last time in a high school contest.

Dell Ford and Tim Patterson, both all-state honorees, have been selected to play for the West Team which will be coached by Southwest Texas State University head mentor Bill Miller.

This will be the second appearance for Ford in an all-star game this year as he was a participant in the Texas High School Coaches Association all-star game played in the Astrodome in Houston two weeks ago.

Both Patterson and Ford played big parts in the Mustangs capturing the Class B crown in Texas last year.

Patterson, a 210 lb. tackle, was a bulwark in the Mustangs

forward wall both offensively and defensively and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dub Patterson won all-state honors at his tackle position.

The 185 lb. Ford, the son of Mrs. Roy Ford, won all-state honors as a defensive back and played full back on offense.

Misty Muse of Clarendon is Ford's nominee for Greenbelt Bowl Queen and she will be presented at the game along with the other queen nominees.

Other activities of Greenbelt Bowl week will be a nine-hole Golf Tournament for all high school and college coaches at the Childress Country Club beginning at 9:30 A.M. Friday and a mini coaching clinic for coaches beginning at 1:30 P.M., also at the Childress Country Club.

LEARN NOT TO BURN

LEARN NOT TO BURN Even if it's Summer time, don't "tune out" your children by leaving them without proper supervision.

Studies by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) show that about one of every four children who die in fires — or at least 500 youngsters a year—are unattended at the time of the tragedy.

When summers pleasant weather makes it tempting to go out and leave the children alone, don't do it—even for a few minutes—warns NFPA President Charles S. Morgan. Take the youngsters along while you shop or visit, or leave them with someone who is a competent and reliable babysitter.

Also, start when the children are young to teach them to have healthy respect for fire, adds Morgan. It's important that they learn the danger of playing with

matches, lighters and ranges, and the need to stay well away from all flames and sparks whether or not someone is keeping an eye on them.

Clothing can burn. Summer-time freedom from the restricting bulk and weight of Winter clothing means anything but freedom from danger of clothing fires.

Quite the opposite, reports the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). In fact, the lighter-weight clothing worn during the warmer months in many instances burns more readily than coldweather garments.

Clothing fires are a major factor in the 6500 deaths from fire in U.S. Homes each year, NFPA studies indicate. Children and the elderly are the most frequent victims.

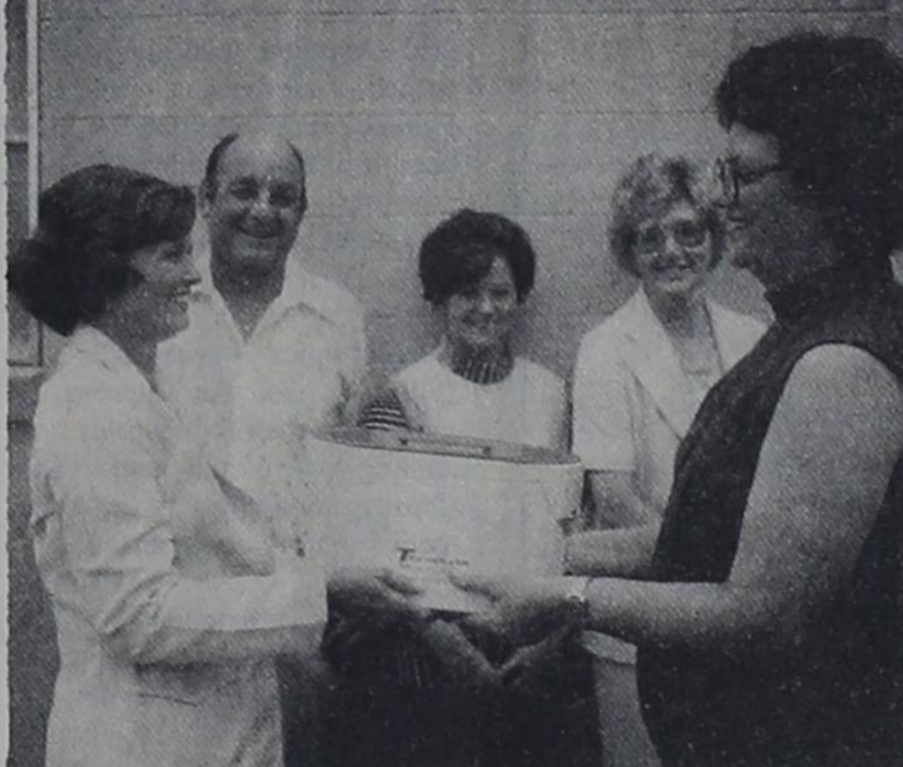
BRANCH OF ARTHRITIS FOUNDATION IS FORMED IN WHEELER MEETING

Book Review

"Time In Its Flight", by Susan Tromberg Schaeffer, is a stirring story of epic proportions about passion, love and a families will to survive. When Edna Dickinson and Dr. John Steele marry, they embark on a perilous journey. Time, in its endless flight, takes many things from the Steeles. They and the children they raise battle against the ravages of nature and disease and the anguish of seemingly unbearable loss. But through the silent touches of time, their courage and love for each other are resources that allow them not only to endure the burdens of life, but to find their way to contentment in what seems an antagonistic world.

"Copsi Castle", by Norah Lofts writing as Juliet Astley expresses a wonderful sense of pride, passion, and undeniable pathos underlying "civilized" English country life that has long been it author's hallmark in the great bestsellers. Surrounded by a vast park with a maze and a pond, Copsi Castle, begun in Norman times, is now an awesome complex of great halls and galleries. For the Copseys, it symbolizes their family pride and abiding love of the land. The Copseys surviving into the nineteenth century are a mixed lot: Sir Harold Copsy—land and title proud, dependent over the death of his young wife, Lord Harry dreams impossible dreams of his heir:

Lady Copsy—his irascible stepmother, spends her waking hours as elegant pensioner;

Bertie Copsy—his unmarried, hunting and horses sister, prefers to spend her days riding the acres and consorting with shepherds.

Magnus Copsy—Lord Harry's son and heir, is the great hope of the Copsy line.

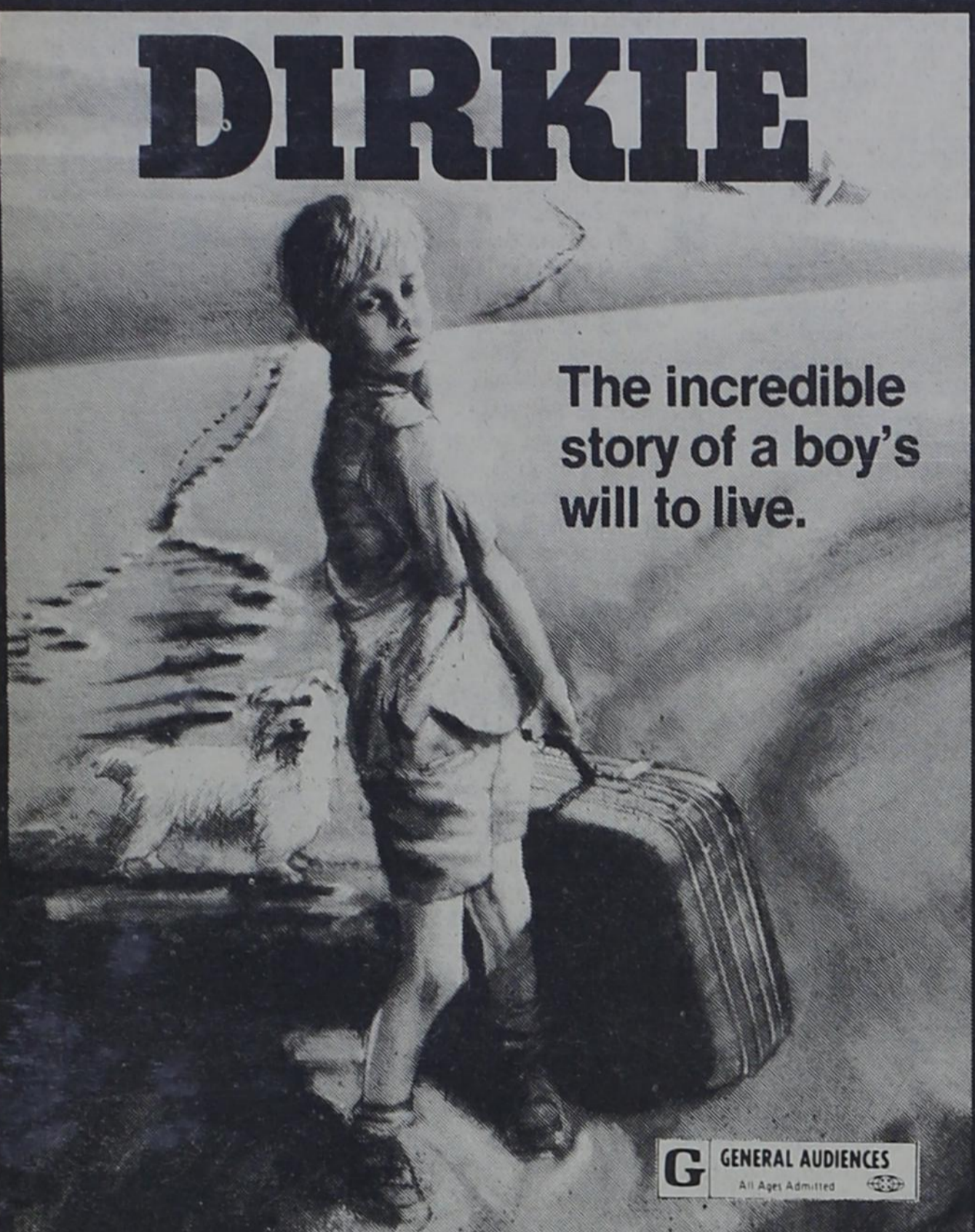
