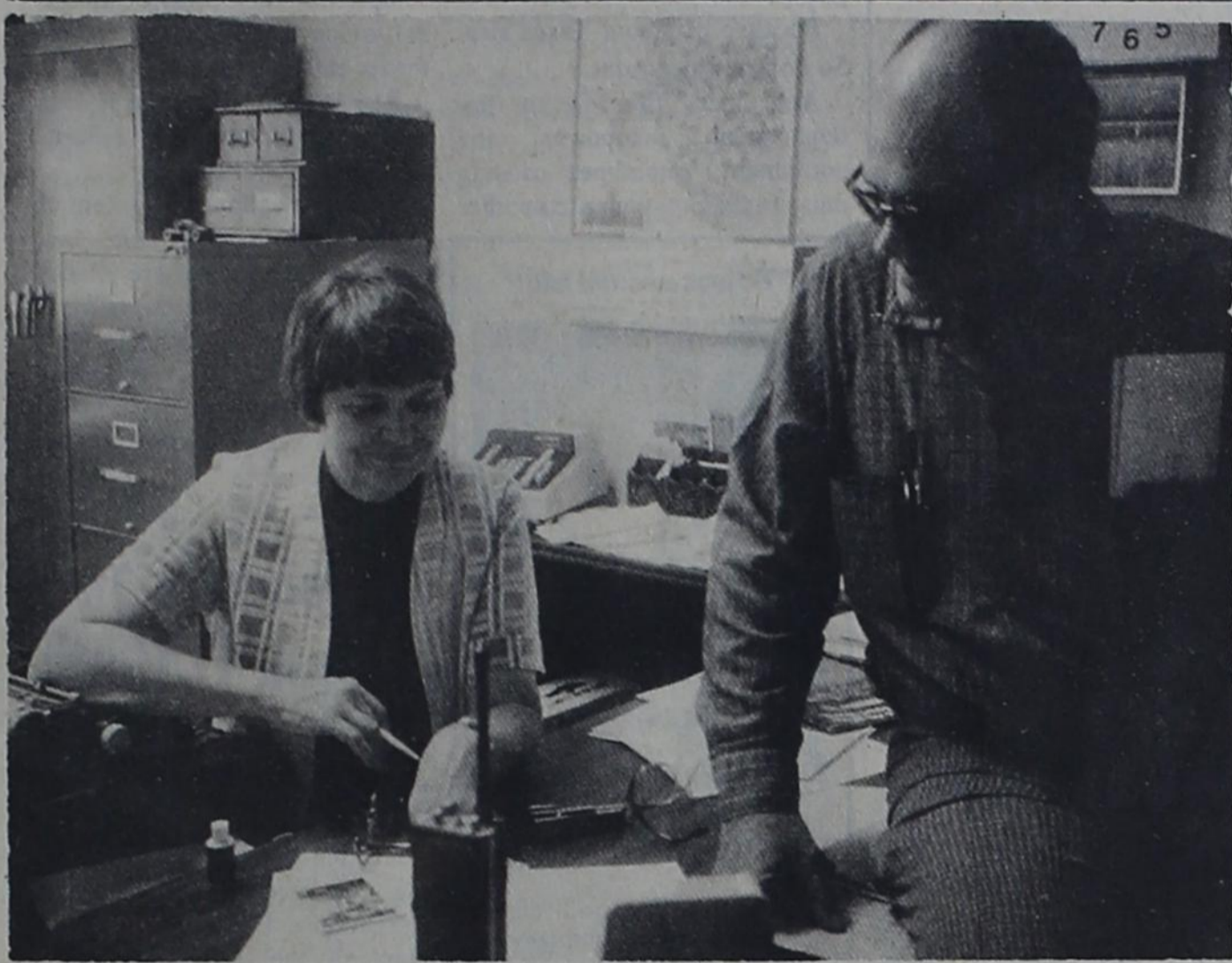

"OPERATION LIFELINE"

Increasing concern for the community's elderly living alone has provided the impetus for a new Thursday Review Club project called "Operation Lifeline". With the cooperation of the Sheriff's department, this public service project will provide a daily telephone check from the dispatcher's office to persons living alone to be sure that no emergency has arisen that would make it impossible for them to call for aid. In the event that telephone contact could not be established, the dispatcher would call either a relative, friend, or neighbor to check on the welfare of the person called. This service can be used on a temporary basis while close family members are absent traveling or on vacation. It can also be a continuing daily service for anyone incapacitated or elderly who desires it. If you know of someone who you feel would benefit from this project, if you have a family member whom you wish to be called, or if any elderly person wishes to have this service, it can be secured by filling out the blank below and mailing it or taking it to Betty Hennard whose address is given. This will insure an initial

contact. It must be clearly understood that continuing calls will be made only with the recipients permission. It is hoped that this project will not only provide a health care check but will also serve as an additional window to the world for the elderly of the community. WHEELER COUNTY 4-H JUNIOR RODEO AUG. 11-12

The Second of two Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo is scheduled for August 11-12 in the Wheeler Riding Club Arena. The rodeo is being sponsored by the Wheeler County 4-H Clubs and the 4-H Texans Horse Club, according to Don King, County Extension Agent. A prize for \$200.00 will be presented to the top cowboy and top cowgirl. To be eligible for the \$200 prize, contestants must have entered both rodeos and compete in at least 3 events in each rodeo. All age groups, except pre-school will be competing for the prize which will be awarded on the basis of total points earned.

Bill Hext, Canadian, Texas, will furnish the stock. The following age divisions and events are scheduled. Ages will be as of June 1, 1978. Pre-School—Boys and Girls Stick Horse Barrel Race, Boot Scramble, Goat Ribbon Race, and Sack Race. Ages 6-9—Boys Barrels, Poles, Calf Riding, Flag Race, and Golfett. Ages 6-9—Girls Barrels, Poles, Flag Race, Golfett, and Walking Lead. Ages 10-14 Boys Steer Riding, Breakaway Roping, Bareback Ponies, Barrel Race and Calf Daubing. Ages 10-14—Girls

Flag Race, Calf Daubing, Walking Lead, Barrel Race, Pole bending. Ages 15-19—Boys Calf Roping, Ribbon Roping, Bull Riding, Bareback Riding, and Calf Daubing. Ages 15-19—Girls Steer Undercutting, Calf Daubing, Flag Race, Pole Bending, and Barrel Race. There will be a steer saddling event open to boys and girls 15-19. This event will not figure in the all around. Trophies will be awarded to first place in each event and ribbons will be given through 6th place. Books will close at noon August 9. A Queen's Contest will be held in conjunction with the rodeo. The contest is open to all girls 19 years of age and younger. The Queen will be picked on horsemanship ability (75%) and appearance (25%). The contest will be held prior to the rodeo on August 11 and the Queen will be crowned August 12. Deadline for entries in the Queen Contest is August 8. 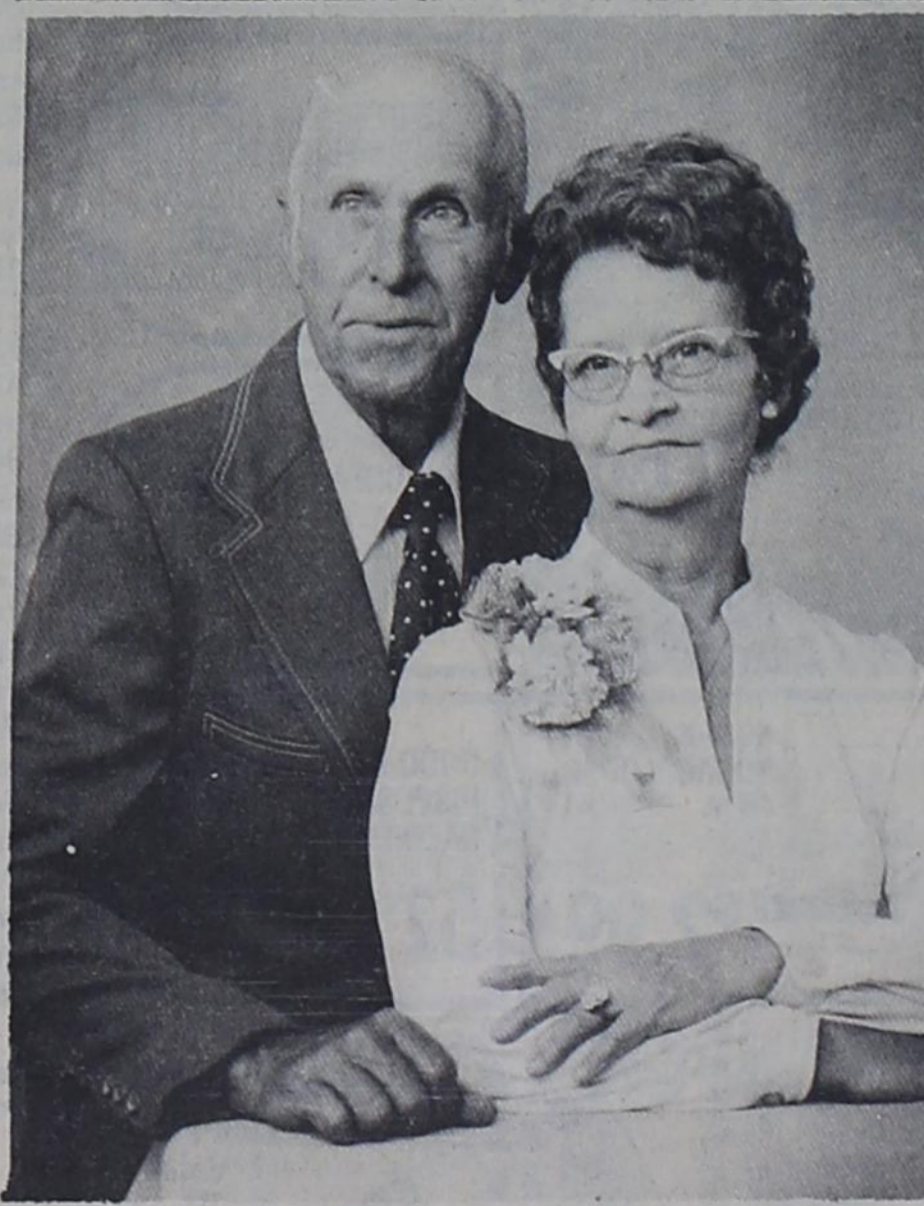

CITIZENS CAN HELP CONTROL ARSON'S RISE
Arson—a serious crime involved willful and malicious intent—has increased 285 percent in the last decade, reports the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

Each year about a thousand lives are lost in incendiary fires, and many more people are seriously injured.

Arson also causes destruction of property, and subsequent loss of jobs.

Because of arson, Taxes rise. So do insurance rates.

And "set" fires tie up fire department manpower and equipment, sometimes causing delay in their response to another

emergency alarm. NFPA, the nation's center of information on all phases of the fire problem, urges citizens to help control arson in their communities by these means:

Support creation of an Arson Squad—a highly trained fire service and police team—to investigate suspicious fires, detect signs of arson, and help obtain court convictions.

Encourage local government, state legislatures and insurance companies to promote strong anti-arson legislation and monitor its enforcement.

Report in detail all suspicious activity observed right before, during or after a fire.

"Citizen vigilance is essential if the fire service and law enforcement agencies are to succeed in turning back the current national wave of arson," emphasizes NFPA President Charles S. Morgan.

ORDERING MERCHANDISE BY MAIL

Read the advertisement, consider the time and give proper information before ordering merchandise by mail.

Each year, consumers purchase many items—books, records, accessories, plants, and garden articles, clothing, home furnishings and novelty items—by mail order.

In the list compiled by the office of Consumer affairs, consumers ranked mail order complaints second, with automobiles receiving more complaints.

Failure to deliver, long delays in delivery, failure to provide

refunds for undeliverable goods and failure to answer letters of complaint are common problems.

To avoid problems, consumers have certain responsibilities before ordering merchandise by mail. These include:

Read advertisements carefully before ordering. Know the exact size and complete information.

If the advertisement does not give complete information, write and inquire before ordering.

Find out if the merchandise is returnable or exchangeable before ordering. This is especially important in ordering clothing items.

Consider the purchase carefully. Is the item really needed and desired? Could the consumer purchase the item locally?

Know what kind of plan is involved when the mail-order purchase includes joining a book or record club.

After carefully reading the advertisement, and considering the item, the consumer should take care to give the proper information.

Mail-order companies often complain that consumers fail to give a complete address. The complete address of the buyer is necessary for delivery.

The consumer should keep the copy of the order and the advertisement being answered and a note of where it was sent.

Never send cash with an order.

A cancelled check is proof that the seller received the order.

Make a notation on the check of the name and address of the firm to which the check is sent and securely fasten the check to the order.

Consumers possess certain rights when ordering merchandise by mail.

A federal Trade Commission regulation regarding the mail-order industry states the following:

Goods must be shipped within 30 days of receipt of the order or within the time disclosed in

fully. Is the item really needed and desired? Could the consumer purchase the item locally?

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advertising.

Companies that cannot deliver within the time period must offer the consumer the option of a refund or an additional waiting period.

Following the second waiting period, the order is to be automatically cancelled and the money refunded unless the customer notifies the company of the willingness to wait longer.

A mail-order company must adjust or refund a credit within one billing cycle.

Cash, check or money-order purchases must be refunded within seven days of a legitimate demand.

Consumers do not have to accept their refund in the form of "credit" such as photo-finishing, magazines and other serials,

such as book sets, except for initial shipments, seeds and growing plants, and C.O.D. orders.

When ordered merchandise has not been received, first see if the check sent with the order has been cashed. If not, stop payment on the check and cancel the order.

To cancel the order, first write to the company, explaining that since the check was not cashed, the order was not accepted by the company and the consumer has stopped payment on the check and cancelled the order.

If the check has been cashed, this means that the consumer has paid for the merchandise.

Since the consumer has paid for the merchandise, she needs to decide whether she wants the merchandise sent or wants the money returned.

Then, the consumer can make a demand for the merchandise or the money.

If the merchandise or refund is not received within the proper time, file a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission, Dallas Regional Office Room 452B, 500 South Ervay, Dallas, Texas 75201.

Also, send a copy of this complaint to the mail-order company.

If, after a reasonable time, there is no satisfactory response

from the firm involved, write to Direct Mail Advertising Association (DMAA), Inc., 921 National Press Building, Washington, D. C. 20004.

In addition, the consumer might contact the publication which carries the advertisement or the local district Attorney's office.

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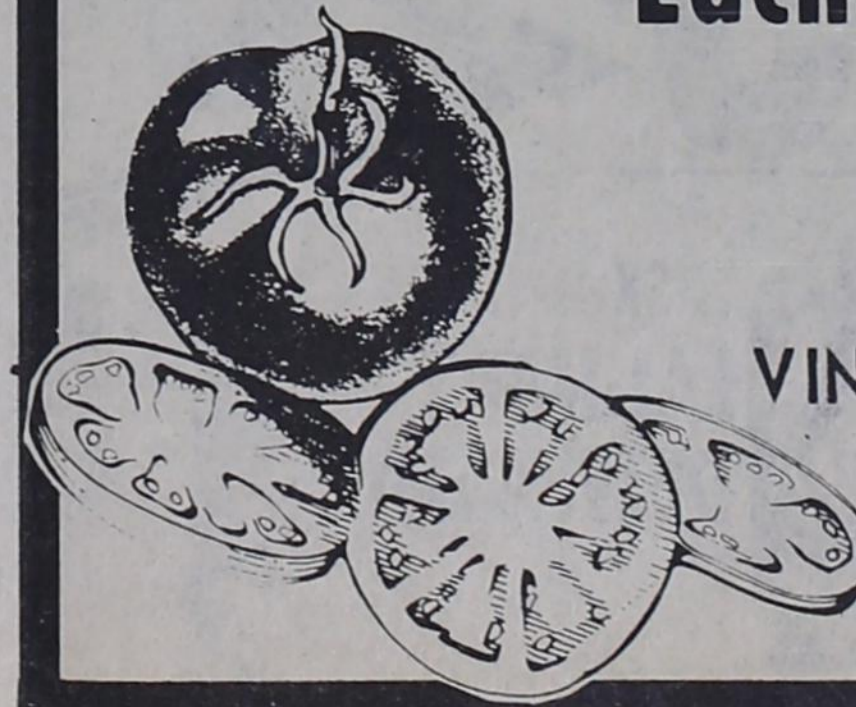
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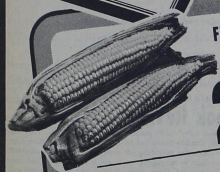
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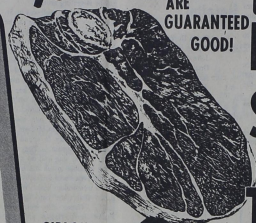
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
