

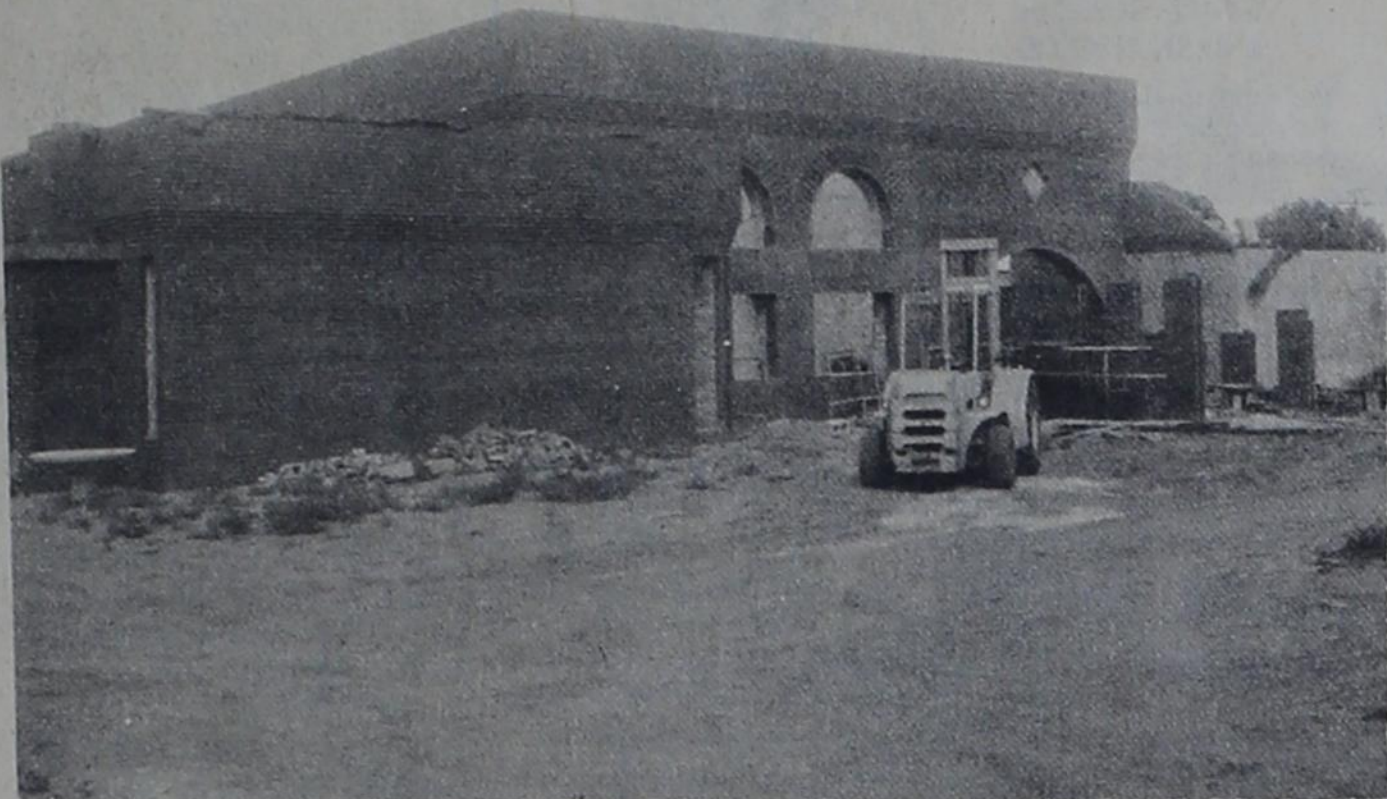

\$300,000 BOND ELECTION SAT., JULY 8 55 BLOCKS PAVING PROPOSED BY COUNCIL

On Saturday, July 8, 1978, the citizens of Wheeler will have the opportunity to approve a street improvement program that will provide for the paving of approximately 55 blocks of streets in all portions of our City.

It is estimated that the entire street improvement cost will total over \$585,000. However, you will be voting on the approval of only \$300,000 in bonds which will be used to finance the City's share of the cost. The remainder of the cost will be paid by the property owners who adjoin the streets which will be paved.

This is the same procedure that has been followed in past years for paving streets in Wheeler. The approval of this

program will solve Wheeler's most urgent street problems and at the same time will create needed areas for new housing development in our growing city.

The election will be held in the Wheeler School Cafeteria. Laura Guthrie will serve as election judge. The polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Letter To The Editor

THINK BEFORE YOU VOTE ON THE PAVING BOND

1. Consider your taxes being raised. The paper stated two weeks ago that the tax rate will be raised to \$1.25 per \$100 valuation, instead of \$0.85 per \$100 valuation if the bond passes. I know to some people this doesn't seem like much, but to people on fixed and low incomes this would be a lot.

2. Consider if it is hard to obtain a loan on dirt streets, how is it so many new homes are on dirt streets. Why are these homes built on dirt streets? Because these people can't afford to buy lots on paved streets. Will it help then to pave these streets?

3. Ask the people who live on these streets and find out if the majority of these people want paving. I don't believe so.

4. The paper two weeks ago states many man hours and tax dollars are spent on these dirt streets repairing and maintaining them. I don't believe who ever wrote this lives on one of these streets. I doubt these streets have been graded 5 times in the last year and a half. However before this time they were graded regular and there were no problems. When our tax dollars are spent on this machinery to maintain these roads, why isn't it used instead of raising taxes to pave these streets.

5. Consider our Senior Citizens and young people who live on fixed and low incomes, that can't pay for this paving. Also the Senior Citizens that don't even live on these streets, that the tax raise will effect. Some of them have a problem living now in this day of inflation. I personally know some who can barely buy groceries and survive. Are we so concerned with our own wants and needs that we don't care what burdens we put on our friends and neighbors.

6. They say consider the young people. I personally am perfectly satisfied with our street, and know others who also are. Ask these people before you vote.

23 Students Receive Diplomas

The old routine of snatch-and-run used by emergency medical units just isn't viable anymore in the Texas Panhandle.

That is why the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System is training paramedics. The first 23 of those highly-trained technicians were graduated from the PEMS course Thursday, June 29.

Betty O'Rourke, regional director of PEMS, said that between 1970 and 1976, 68 percent of heart attack victims in the Panhandle died in an ambulance prior to arriving at a hospital.

Prior to 1976, Mrs. O'Rourke said the Panhandle had a high-risk infant mortality rate that was tops in the nation.

That, she said, is changing with the paramedic training offered by PEMS.

Ambulances now may be equipped with intravenous fluids and some form of bio-electrical communication between ambulance and hospital. A paramedic with proper direction from a physician will evaluate the patient, provide intravenous therapy and administer some types of drugs.

As far as those who have trained as paramedics are concerned, the training is a concept long overdue.

Since the beginning of Panhandle EMS and its training programs, highrisk infant mortality is down 15 percent, deaths from attempted suicide are down 16 percent and deaths from heart attacks are down 7 percent, records show.

The paramedic graduates in this area include David Cross and Tommy Hennard of Wheeler and Donald Carlton of Shamrock, J. A. Farber of McLean, Carl Knoll of Shamrock, and Jimmy McDonald of McLean.

Sheriff's Dept. Destroys Plants

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department has found two gardens in the county which contained marijuana plants within a week.

A patch growing in Mobeetie was discovered Tuesday, June 17. The patch was planted by a juvenile and part of the crop had been harvested and sold.

A garden behind the residence at 803 S. Alan L. Bean Blvd in Wheeler contained several young plants, most of which were not over 6' high. The occupant at that address was charged by the Sheriff's Department with growing marijuana—a first degree felony. The department learned of the Wheeler crop on Sunday, July 2.

Handling Boating Emergencies

WHAT WOULD YOU DO?
How well you handle an emergency aboard a boat may mean the difference in whether or not you survive a boating accident.

Anyone can have an accident and the most common are: man overboard, capsizing, taking on water during squalls, collisions and fires.

When a person falls overboard, swing the stern quickly away from the person in the water if the boat is underway. If he is close to the boat, stop the motor so he won't get cut by the prop. Even though he can swim, throw him a life preserver, extend him a paddle or throw him a line. Act quickly and do what the situation demands.

If your boat capsizes, stay with the boat, don't try to swim to shore unless there is a good reason to do so. Modern boats will hold up passengers even when full of water. Remember, it is easier to spot a large boat than a swimmer's head in the water.

Put on a life preserver if no already wearing them. Coolers, gas can and water containers can be used to help keep you afloat. Towels and extra clothing can be used to protect you from sun and wind. Paddles can be used to wave for rescue, to rig shelters, or to reach people in distress.

Sudden storm and squalls are common in Texas and everyone should put on a life preserver and fasten it before the storm hits. Get to the bottom of the boat and stay low. Secure all movable objects and bail out water as fast as it comes in. Head for shore or the lee side of an island if it is not too far away or the water is not too rough. Use motor to head boat into the wind while moving ahead.

Collisions on a lake are more common than most boaters realize. When the hull is rammed, stop or reduce speed immediately. Stuff anything available into the opening to stop the water from coming in such as blankets, bedding or cushions. Do something and do it quickly to stop the flow of water.

Another critical situation is a fire onboard your boat. Stop the boat at once to keep from fanning the flames. When the burning object is portable, try to get it over the side without burning your hands or igniting your clothing.

When the fire is in a confined space, close all hatches, vents, or ports to keep oxygen from feeding the fire. Fire must have fuel, oxygen and heat to burn, take away any one of these and the fire will go out.

Panic should be included in any list of accident causes as it can be the biggest killer of all. Panic-stricken people cannot think, act instinctively, and many times, endanger the lives of everyone around including the rescuers.

An emergency aboard a boat can quickly become a life-or-death situation, so be prepared to handle it.

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Witnesses To Plan Convention

A schedule of 20 international conventions has been completed by Jehovah's Witnesses for the continental United States during the summer of 1978.

Spokesman Paul L. Trka said 32 persons will represent Shamrock at the Astrodome in Houston, Texas, July 12-16. A total of 55,000 delegates are expected for the convention.

The Witnesses are utilizing some of the largest sports stadiums in the country for this series of international meetings. They include four covered facilities: Astrodome, Houston, Texas; Superdome, New Orleans, Louisiana; Kingdom, Seattle, Washington; and the new Silverdome in Pontiac, Michigan.

Trka added that 760,000 persons are anticipated to attend the 20 conventions in three languages: English, Spanish and French. Five conventions are planned for Canada with an attendance estimate of 145,000.

The theme for the convention is "Victorious Faith". "There are many issues confronting society today," Trka said. "These include changing moral standards, emphasis on materialism, social problems, energy crises and an accelerating arms race. The convention program will stress the value of faith in the Bible as Christians face these issues and other problems of life."

negative pest population growth; insect hormones that throw a figurative wrench into the creatures' developmental timetable; the development of pest-resistant crops; the synthesis of repellent compounds occurring naturally in certain plants; judicious, timely and limited applications of certain toxic chemicals.

The effects of careless or indiscriminate use of toxic chemicals have been noted by wildlife experts in many areas. For example, certain insecticides used on "bad" bugs and eaten by wild pheasants can result in failure of the unhatched chick to emerge from the egg.

Results of ingestion of insects that are either sick or dying from a dose of insecticides are still being studied. Birds that have eaten these treated insects have become weak and are then more apt to be caught by their enemies such as the hawk, coyote or other ground animal. The total effect on wildlife and the environment by toxic chemicals will be difficult to tabulate due to the often subtle effects on the bird's digestive and reproductive systems.

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Check Expiration Of Fishing License

While you are packing the picnic lunch and arranging the fishing gear in the camper, be sure to check the expiration date on your fishing license.

If you bought your license on June 1, 1977, or before, you may need a new license. If you bought it after that date, your license will be good until August 31.

The reason for such double-checking is that 1977-78 was the first year of a changeover to a system based on August 31 expiration. Previously, the licenses expired one year from the date of purchase.

A resident fishing license is \$4.50 and is required of all persons who fish in the waters of Texas with the exception of those: under 17 years of age; over 65 years of age; fishing in private waters; fishing in county of residence with trotline, throw-line or ordinary pole and line having no reel or winding device attached; holding a valid Texas commercial fishing license or holder of an exempt fishing license (\$1.25) available to disabled veterans or the blind.

An annual non-resident fishing license is \$10.50 and a non-resident five-day fishing license is \$4.50.

SPRAY—INSECTS AND WILDLIFE

The high daily temperatures are producing plenty of plant growth and a flurry of insects which are on the diet of nearly all birds in the Panhandle and on the South Plains.

A wild turkey killed by a passing vehicle was examined and found to contain nearly a quart of grasshoppers in its crop in the Panhandle. Most landowners realize the importance of birds for the control of injurious insects that eat important crops such as corn, wheat, and vegetables.

Only a small percent of the million or so species of insects in the world are detrimental to the food producer, but a torrent of noxious compounds and toxic chemicals commonly called insecticides or pesticides are being released against the few plant enemies. This spread of poison, often released in areas containing wildlife, is having an affect on all life.

There is no doubt, of course, that chemical insecticides and pesticides have reduced insect-borne diseases the world over and bouyed agricultural productivity in the U. S. However, the very success of the chemicals have led to a heavier and heavier reliance on them, even though their efficiency has decreased in some areas.

These developments include public concern about the effects of chemicals on human health, wildlife and the environment; the increasing genetic resistance of insects to the chemicals; and the disruption of naturally-occurring biological control agents.

Many food producers have turned to an "integrated control" strategy which involves an array of techniques, used singly and in concert, that hold down pest populations to tolerable levels without jeopardizing human health or economic loss or wildlife.

Among these techniques are: beneficial insects that either prey on or parasitize pests; bacterial, fungal and viral infections that decimate pest populations; sex attractants that lure injurious insects to their destruction; sterilization programs that result in

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

- Q. When and where is the election?
A. The election will be held on Saturday, July 8, 1978 at the High School Cafeteria between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.
- Q. What is the amount of the bond election?
A. The election is to authorize the issuance of \$300,000 in general obligation bonds for street improvements.
- Q. Who can vote?
A. One must hold a current Voter Registration Certificate and reside within the City.
- Q. What if I need to vote absentee?
A. Absentee votes may be cast from June 19, 1978 through July 3, 1978 at the City Secretary's office at the City Hall between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. daily except Saturday, Sunday and holidays.
- Q. What streets are included in this important program?
A. The following is a list of the streets included in this improvement program which includes a total of approximately 55 blocks of paving. There may be some minor deletions or additions which could be made when engineering plans are prepared but the total is not expected to change substantially.
- Bryan Street — Northward from Oklahoma Avenue approximately 2 blocks.
 - Johnson Street — North of Oklahoma Avenue — An approximate 1/2 block extension;
 - Jackson Street — North of Oklahoma Avenue — An approximate 1/2 block extension.
 - Osage Street — Southward from Sixth Street approximately 3 blocks and northward from Oklahoma Avenue approximately 2 blocks.
 - Canadian Street — North of First Street from end of paving approximately 2 blocks.
 - Sixth Street — Between Comanche Street and Osage Street.
 - Kiowa Street — Southward from Seventh Street approximately 1 block.
 - Mobeetie Street — Between Second Street and Oklahoma Street and from just north of Sixth Street southward to Thirteenth Street.
 - Eighth Street — Between Canadian Street and Mobeetie Street.
 - Tenth Street — Between Canadian Street and Mobeetie Street.
 - Eleventh Street — Between Main Street and Mobeetie Street and between Alan L. Bean Blvd. and Red River Street.
 - Twelfth Street — Eastward from Alan L. Bean Blvd. approximately 2 blocks.
 - Sweetwater Street — Southward from Thirteenth Street approximately 1 block.
 - Red River Street — Between Ninth Street and Eleventh Street and between Second Street and Oklahoma Street.
 - Stanley Street — Northward from Oklahoma Avenue approximately 2 blocks and southward from Seventh Street approximately one block.
 - Reynold Street — Between Oklahoma Street and Seventh Avenue.
- Q. How much of the total cost will be paid by the property owners adjoining the streets to be paved?
A. As in past street improvement programs, it is anticipated that the adjoining property owners will pay approximately 60% and the City as a whole will pay 40% of the cost of improvements. This \$300,000 bond issue is to cover the City's 40% share plus incidental financing, legal, engineering and contingency costs.
- The final cost allocation will be determined after the construction bids are received, but it is anticipated that the adjoining property owners' share will not exceed \$10.00 per front foot.
- Q. How will these \$300,000 in general obligation bonds be retired?
A. The City Council has increased the assessment ratio on all property in the City from 50% of actual value to 75% of actual value. If the bond issue is approved the tax rate will remain at \$1.25 per \$100 valuation which is the same rate that has been levied for a number of years. This will produce the approximately \$20,000 additional income which will be needed to retire the new bonds plus interest over a fifteen or sixteen year period.
- In the event the bond issue for the new street improvement program is not approved, it is anticipated that the tax rate will be established at \$0.85 per \$100 valuation which will produce approximately the same total revenue as received from taxes during this current year.
- Q. What is the present indebtedness of the City?
A. The present general obligation bond debt of the City of Wheeler totals \$120,000 which will be totally retired in 1985. If the proposed \$300,000 issue is approved the total indebtedness would constitute approximately 8% of the estimated 1978 assessed valuation which is well below the recognized 10% limit.

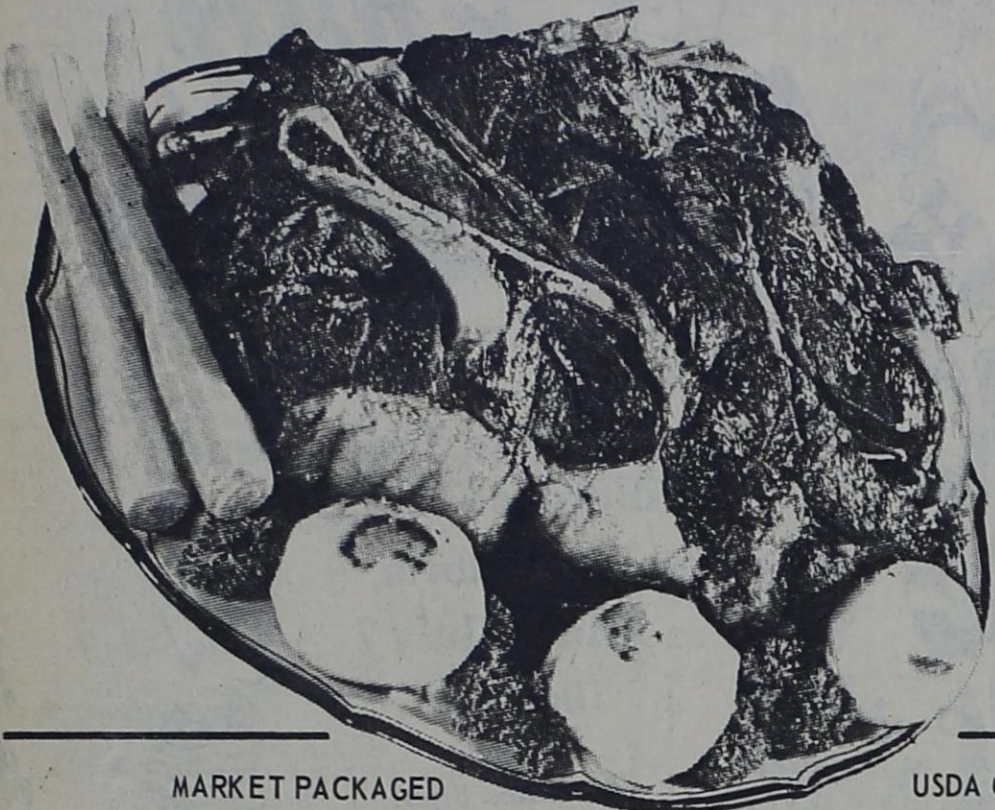
