
Rites Are Read

LEARN NOT TO BURN

LET "PROS" SHOOT FIRE-

celebrations promise to be "bigger and better than ever" this (NFPA) caution, "Let only the people who most often are vicpros handle the fireworks!"

NFPA's Model State Fireworks Law, adopted in many-but not all-states, forbids individual use of fireworks except toy paper and/or plastic caps. The Model Grayson Family Law permits use of fireworks only in outdoor public displays put on by pyrotechnic specialists.

This means, NFPA President Charles S. Morgan points out, that fireworks of all types, including sparklers, should not be used by the general public.

"There are no such things as 'safe' fireworks," Mr. Morgan emphasized. "Only when everyone knows this fact and takes it seriously will there be an end to Independence Day tragedies from these so-called toys."

Leading the list of major injuries caused by fireworks, according to NFPA studies, are impairment or loss of eyesight; deafness; and loss of fingers and hands. Other effects can be severe burns, cuts and abrasions as well as broken bones. And each year a few people lose their lives in fireworks accidents.

Young children must be told and told again never to pick up a firecracker if they find one-not even in their own yard-and never to accept one if it is offered to them, Mr. Morgan advises. Parents should know where and with what their children are playing at all times, particularly around July Fourth.

On the basis of studies made by NFPA, it's important to warn yougsters not to try to move in for a better look when others are handling fireworks. Statistics show that well over half the victims of fireworks accidents are on-lookers or merely passing by when hurt.

SPARKS TREACHEROUS Although sparklers are considered safe by many parents who let even small children play with them, Mr. Morgan notes that sparklers can approach a temperature of 2000 degrees F. > In order for both the NFPA Federal regulations to do their job of safeguarding the public, it's necessary to stop illegal fireworks traffic and reduce the number of fireworks injuries. Both have been increasing at a rapid rate.

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

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

Ground Is Alive

Did you know that the ground under your feet is alive? It is. Or it should be. Nature is very active in the soil. Why all this activity? Because it takes a lot of work to make soil productive. The fuel for all this activity is something that scientists call organic matter.

Most of us don't give it much thought, but organic matter... humus, litter, call it what you will...is probably the most valuable constituent of productive soil. Organic matter in the soil is made up of living and dead plants and animals...plant roots, manure, crop residues, fungi, bacteria, worms, and insects.

Organic matter supports these bacteria and other living organisms. It also helps bring soil minerals into solution, increases water-holding capacity, improves aeration, regulates soil temperature, helps control erosion, and serves as an important source of certain plant food elements. has some good recommendations for maintaining and replenishing organic matter. These practices include growing cover crops and turning under green manure crops, manure spreading, use of crop residues, practicing minimum tillage, and controlling erosion. With the heavy machinery

used on the farm today, cultivated soil tends to compact, and form a hard crust or "plow pan" that prevents rapid infiltration of rain or irrigation water. Consequently, a lot of water is wasted by running off the surface instead of being absorbed by the soil. Good management of soil organic matter is necessary to prevent this water waste and erosion.

The Soil Conservation Service reminds you that the soil is the basis of life. And if it keeps us alive, we must do our best to keep the soil alive.



Farmers Home Standards Change

Wheeler Texas June 26. 1978-New insulation standards for housing in rural areas financed by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will be put into effect, Billy R. Chance, County Supervisor, announced

Implementation of the standards, first scheduled for March 15, had been held up during federal court consideration of a suit by the National Association of Home Builders challenging the new code. After FmHA prepared additional environmental material and a further hearing on the case was held, U. S. District Judge George L. Hart, Jr., dissolved a preliminary injuction. While certain aspects of the lawsuit remain to be resolved, the new insulation standards can now be implemented.

The new thermal standards are designed to provide for heavier insulation and other measures to make FMHA-financed housing less costly to heat or cool, and to conserve energy. This will apply to newly-built homes and apartments financed by FmHAfinanced housing less costly to heat or cool, and to conserve energy. They will apply to newly-built homes and apartments financed by FmHA, and, insofar as is economically feasible, to existing housing purchased or repaired with FmHA loans. Better weatherizing through more effective insulation, storm doors and windows and other techniques will help families to reduce high fuel and energy expenses that jeopardize their ability to afford adequate housing.

Details of the standards, which vary by climatic zones, are available from FmHA state or county offices.

Housing loans administered by FmHA, a U. S. Department of Agriculture agency, serve all rural areas including towns of up to 10,000, and designated towns of 10,000 to 20,000 that are not in Standard Metropolitan Statistical (SMSA) Areas and have a shortage of mortgage credit for families of low and or moderate Pre-Councseling income. FmHA will finance approximately 30 homes for Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts

Space very little residual activity and require repeating at frequent intervals. Space treatment should be done during the cool hours of the night or early morning and when wind velocity is less than five miles an hour.

Many People are enjoying the springtime on picnics, while fishing, or, just hiking in Texas, but young wildlife can be harmed if picked-up or handled by the well-meaning individual.

The best reason to leave wildlife alone is state laws governing the possession, sale or barter, and confinement of both game and non-game animals, birds, and endangered species Aids Education such as the horned toad.


