BRENT CALLAN IS NAMED OUTSTANDING **WORKING SCHOLAR AT REDLANDS COLLEGE**

Three years of going to school and supporting a wife and two children has been tough for Brent Callan but payoff is just around the corner.

Callan was one of 20 Redlands Community College students and their employers honored recently at the annual Outstanding Working Scholars luncheon held during National Community College month.

Dr. Larry Devane, RCC president, said the group was a cross-section of students pursing a variety of majors while maintaining a 3.0 grade point and holding full- or part-time jobs in the community.

In some respects, the 30-year-old nursing student is not typical of the average student attending Redlands Commity College. At the same time he is not a typical — there are many just like him who combine work and study

"To you people this is a way to earn a degree. We know education pays in the long haul and you're to be commended," Dr. Devane said.

Callan attended the luncheon with his supervisor, Sue Boone, clinical supervisor at Bone and Joint Hospital. Callan works three eight-hour shifts weekly while carrying a full-time load in the nursing program. He will graduate in May with an associate degree in applied science.

"Work and study has been a challenge," Callan said. "It's hard. I constantly have to stay with it and dedicate two and three hours an evening just reading." Evening study takes time away from his children, an 11-yearold son and a 9-year-old daughter.

The Cedar Lake residents and native Texan finished high school and immediately went to work in the oil fields in Oklahoma. A hand injury on a rig put him in Bone and Joint hospital rehabilitation for several weeks at which time he made the decision to change occupations.

"I really got interested in rehab and nursing while I was there," he said. He worked as a ranch hand while finishing his basic college study and then





was accepted in RCC's nursing program. He's been employed at Bone and Joint for two years and with the help of grants and a \$2,000 loan, he and his family have gotten by.

Callan will take his state boards in June to qualify as a registered nurse and will begin full-time duties as a medical-surgical nurse at Bone and Joint.

His education will not end there. He intends to enroll at a four-year college o earn his bachelor's degree in nursng.

FmHA Has Loans To Help Disadvantaged

The Farmers Home Administration has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in WHEELER, HEMPHILL, GRAY and ROBERTS Counties, Mr. Earp, County Supervisor, said today.

Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged populations groups are Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market, Mr. Earp said.

FmHA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office in their area. Texas Property Taxes Is **Available for Residences**

Larry M. Schoenhals, chief appraiser for the Wheeler County Central Appraisal District (CAD), offers property owners a1995 pamphlet called Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers' Rights Remedies and Respnosibilities to help them better understand the Texas property tax system. There is no charge for the pamphlet.

Published by the State Comptroller's Office in Austin, the "remedies" pamphlet explains how the property tax systerm in Texas works and tells property owners about possible tax savings through the various exemptions which were published in this newspaper earlier this year. It also contains information about protesting appraised values.

Schoenhals noted that the pamphlet applies to property taxes collected by all types of local taxing units, counties, cities, school districts and special districts such as hospital districts.

"I urge all property owners in the Wheeler CAD to read this pamphlet and learn about the property tax system," Schoenhals said, adding that Notices of Appraised Value will be mailed before the end of this month marking the beginning of the 1995 30 day protest period.

The free pamphlets are available in each tax collector's office and in the CAD office, courthouse square, in Wheeler.
