boat at a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and prudent or greater than will permit him to
bring the boat to a stop within the assured clear distance ahead; operate any motorboat so as to cause a hazardous wake or wash; operate any motorboat in a
circular course around another boat who occupant is fishing or around any person swimming. Safe operation of a boat is a matter of common sense. Do not insest on the right-of-way if the
other boat seems not ready to give-way.
Sailing vessels and rowboats are normally small and less maneuverable than powerboats
