If soil moisture and growing conditions are favorable, choice forage plants make rapid regrowth due to the high vigor developed during the rest periods. This imporved vigor allows the better plants to reproduce and gradually crowd out the less platable ones. But short duration grazing systems require careful planning and close supervision, Coffman warned. "Livestock must be moved when the desired degree of forage has been used. Some systems require more cross-fencing and a few producers have found that they need more livestock watering facilities. "Most range scientist are convinced that short duration grazing is the system of the future," Coffman stressed. The problem is to plan each system carefully so it can be made to work." TEXAS WATERWAYS

Thousands of river recreationists in Texas are finding that every mile of the 13,000 miles of major waterways in the state offers a different experience.

Knowing what to expect from a particular section in regard to scenery, wildlife, excitement, hard work or danger is a chal-lenge for even the most experienced river floater.

The new pamphlet entitled "The Waterways of Texas" provides a chart with basic information concerning various waterways across the state, including the more popular sections.

The state waterways are listed by name; from highway to highway or other prominent feature; approximate length (miles); floatability level at normal flow (level 1: insufficient water for floating. Level 2: minimum water for floating. level 3: good water conditions, no lining necessary.); difficulty of rapids; known danger areas; and potential classification in the Texas waterway system as to wild, scenic, or recreational.

A Texas map with the best waterway sections which are reportedly the best for river floating is printed in the pamph-

> If death results from a boating accident, collision, or casualty, a written report must be submitted results in injury to any person pared and submitted to the P&WD by the operators of the boats involved. These accident reports shall be confidential and shall not be admissible in court as evidence. Reports must be submitted within 30 days.

It shall be unlawful for any person to: operate a motorboat or vessel or manipulate any water skis, aquaplane or similar device in a willfully or wantonly reckless or negligent manner so as to endanger the life, limb, or property of any person; operate any boat at a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and prudent or greater than will permit him to bring the boat to a stop within the assured clear distance ahead; operate any motorboat so as to cause a hazardous wake or wash; operate any motorboat in a circular course around another boat who occupant is fishing or around any person swimming. Safe operation of a boat is a matter of common sense. Do not 🔹 insest on the right-of-way if the other boat seems not ready to give-way. Firearm Accidents

Two Pandhandle hunters are officially listed as hunting fatalities by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department as the March reports from across Texas are compiled in Austin.

Texas game wardens investigating the two fatalities and one injury have found that mishandling a gun was the major factor of each shooting.

One hunter attempted to remove a loaded rifle from a pickup gun rack and was hit in the chest by the discharging gun.

Another hunter was holding a friends loaded gun when it discharged striking him in the upper leg causing fatal results.

A third hunter was injured as his rifle discharged while being unloaded, hitting him in the calf of his leg.

All three hunters wer under 22 years of age and all violated the cardinal rule of gun safety by pointing a loaded gun at someone or something they did not intend to shoot, namely, themselves.

The P&WD recorded 17 hunting fatalities during 1977 as compared to only 11 1976. This year has started with a bang and the fall hunting season will not even begin until September. The P&WD suggests that you and your hunting companions attend a hunter safety class this summer before your next hunting trip turns into a unforgettable experience that you might not read about in the newspaper. 
