## PROCLAMATION SOIL STEWARDSHIP WEEK, APRIL 30 — MAY 7

The United States annual loss of five million acres of rural land to non-agricultural use is a special concern during this year's celebration of Soil Stewardship Week April 30—May 7, Clarence Zybach, chairman of the Wheeler County Soil and Conservation District announced today.

This year's Soil Stewardship Week theme, "Compelling Ventures", also stresses the importance controlling water pollution caused by run-off from unprotected farms, ranches, roadsides, and construction sites Zybach added.

Soil Stewardship Week is a nationwide observance which emphasizes man's responsibility to protect and conserve soil, water, and other natural resources. Traditionally, churches and local citizen's groups participate.

"Nearly 3,000 conservation districts throughout the U.S. will focus their attention upon conserving and preserving America's best farmlands during this 21st annual observance of Soil Stewardship Week," Zybach said. "The U. S. Department of Agriculture estimates that of the five million acres annually lost to agriculture, nearly one million acres are classed as 'prime' land—the best and most productive land we have. We are encouraging the preservation of these top-quality farmlands for farming rather than their indiscriminate use for housing developments, highways, shopping center, and the like."

The Commissioners Court of Wheeler County has cooperated fully with the Wheeler County SWCD since it originated. To further this cooperation and to pledge further support on this most important of endeavors, County Judge Wendell Morgan has issued the following proclamation.

WHEREAS, the well-being of each individual depends upon the production of ample supplies of food, fiber and other products of the soil; and

WHEREAS, the quality and quantity of these products depend upon the conservation, wise and proper management of the soil and water resources; and

WHEREAS, each individual has a mutual interest in the land and shares the responsibility of preserving its productivity; and

WHEREAS, The contributions being made by Soil and Water Conservation Districts throughout Texas continue to improve the soil resources and make this

county a better place to live; and WHEREAS, the Soil and Water Conservation Districts are sponsoring Soil Stewardship week in an effort to impress upon all individuals the importance of caring for God's resources; NOW, THEREFORE, I, Wendell Morgan County Judge of Wheeler County, do hereby designate the week of April 20-May 7, 1978 as Soil Stewardship Week in Wheeler County, Texas.

In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 19th day of April, 1978.

### Kindergarten Visitation

If you have a child who will be 5 on or before September 1, 1978, he will be eligible to attend kindergarten this fall. The week of May 8-12 has been set aside for children who will start school this fall to visit at Wheeler Elementary. The children are invited to stay from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. Parents who wish to stay with their children during this time are welcome.

The following schedule has been set but if you cannot bring your child on his day, please bring him on another of the scheduled days.

Monday May 8 last names beginning A, B, C, D, E; Tuesday, May 9, last names beginning with F, G, H, I, J; Wednesday May 10, last names beginning with K, L, M, N, O; Thursday May 11, last names beginning with P, Q, R, S, T; and Friday, May 12, last names beginning with U, V, W, X, Y, Z.

The state of Texas requires by law that you furnish the school with an official birth certificate and a complete, up-to-date immunization record certified by the physician's signature before your child can be enrolled. If you do not have these records begin to complete them immediately so your child won't be disappointed by a delay in his enrollment this fall.

## WCA ENTERS STATE COMPETITION, WINS 3rd

12 high school students represented the Wheeler Christian Academy at the 1978 North Texas State Convention for Accelerated Christian Education schools, held April 17-20 in Lubbock.

Of the 30 schools represented, W.C.A. placed 3rd in overall academics. Sophomore Henry Young and Senior Tim Elliott were responsible for this victory. Henry placed 1st in checkers and 4th in chess competition. Tim received a 34th place ribbon for his short story and placed 2nd in Bible Memorization.

Tim will represent W.C.A. at the National Convention in Hammond, Indiana in June in the Bible Memorization competition. He quoted 50 Bible verses correctly before missing one. Because there were 30 schools at the state convention, the 2nd place winners will also go to Nationals. Tim also competed in preaching, in which he placed 4th.

Henry Young and Sophomore Rusty Phipps will also attend the National convention. Henry took the state championship in the mile run, so he will compete in that at Nationals, in addition to checkers. Henry also placed 3rd in the high jump, and 2nd in the 880 yard dash. He forfeited his spot at Nationals in the 880 to the 3rd place winner so that he can concentrate on the mile run.

Rusty is the state champion in weight lifting and the 440 yard

dash. He weighs 169 pounds, and he bench-pressed 220 lbs., squat-lifted 340 lbs.—a new state record, and lifted 420 lbs. in the dead lift—also a new state record. Rusty also placed 3rd in the 100 yard dash, and 4th in the broad jump.

The W.C.A. girls volleyball team placed 4th in state competition. Team members are Kathleen Gately, Mary Gately, Sherry Pearson, Angela Pearson, Lacy Swift, Shannon Swift, Mindy McGee, Jan Duncan, and Lauri Vick.

W.C.A. winners in other state competition were Lauri Vick 3rd in Embroidery, and Jan Duncan 4th in Illustrated Story Telling.

## New Method of Range Management

More net profit per acre, rapid grassland improvement, and reduced labor needs are some of the benefits of a new method of rangeland management being used in Texas, a local conservation leader said today.

Charles Coffman, range conservationist for the U. S. De-

partment of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service at Wheeler, said the technique, called Short Duration Grazing, is now being used successfully by more than 400 livestock producers in Texas.

Coffman also said that SCS has published a new booklet explaining the system in detail. Single

copies can be obtained free from SCS offices.

"Short duration grazing is producing some excellent results in Texas," Coffman said. "The major benefit is rapid grassland improvement, which leads to more net profit per acre."

Coffman said that with the

technique, livestock that are normally run in several pastures are put into one herd in a single pasture. The other pastures are left vacant. When the forage is grazed to the desired degree, livestock are moved to the next pasture in the rotation. That way, all pastures are deferred from grazing for several months before being grazed for a few weeks.

Under continuous grazing, livestock repeatedly use those plants they like best. As a result, these preferred plants are often over-used, become weakened, and may not reproduce. At the same time, other plants are used to a lesser degree, maintaining more vigor than preferred plants.

Short duration grazing breaks this competitive edge gained by unpalatable plants. After a pasture is grazed briefly, it received a rest five to ten times as long as the grazing period.

### BOOK REVIEW

An untamed woman... a fearless man... a virgin land... a family dynasty... here is "The Proud Breed" by Celeste De Blasis, a sweeping, three-generational saga of the making of California. It is first and last the story of the enduring love between a strong woman and an equally strong man, a love tempered by time and grief and joy. It is also about their intense love affair with California, a strange, encharity land caught up in the nineteenth century in the struggle between the proud California and the land-hungry Uankees and outsiders who would annex the territory and forever alter the gentle, peaceful California way of life.

In "The Queen's Husband" by Jean Plaidy Victoria and Albert were destined for each other from the cradle. Albert as the younger son of a minor German Duke, was acutely aware of what marriage to the Queen of England would mean in terms of his personal ambitions. Victoria wrestled with her desire for independence—until she saw Albert at Windsor in 1839. Then Queen Victoria fell in love.

Together they forged the Victorian Age—the impetuous Queen and here indomitable consort. Through the stormy first years, Victoria was in almost perpetual revolt against any encroachment on her powers of state and against the continual pregnancies she had to endure. Albert, who battled for supremacy in the relationship, was forced to take stock of his wife's nature, the clinging femininity that disguised a will of iron and a searing streak of vengeance.

Gradually concessions were made, and as the Prince became instrumental to the management of the monarchy, the Queen blissfully settled into family life. Yet on more than one occasion the Queen narrowly escaped assassination. For, Victoria, no diplomatic crisis or domestic scandal could overshadow her love for a single man—Albert, the Queen's husband.

## LEARN NOT TO BURN

Ken Daughtry, Fire Marshal

**Keep Fire-Safe While Afloat This Summer**  
Safe boating is no accident. To keep pleasure boating in the pleasure category, take care during all fueling and on-board operations which could result in fire and explosion, warns marine fire safety specialist Kent Savage of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

Here are some vital pointers from Captain Savage for all who take to the water in pleasure craft:

1. Fueling should never be undertaken at night, except under well-lighted conditions, and smoking should be forbidden on board and everywhere nearby during fueling operations.

2. Before beginning fueling operations, be sure all engines, motors, fans and heating devices are shut down; all open flames are extinguished; and all ports, windows, doors and hatches closed. The Boat should be completely "dead".

3. Know the capacity of your fuel tanks and guard against overfilling. Leave a 2 per cent space in the tank for fuel expansion; leave more-about 6 per cent-if the temperature of the incoming fuel in 32 degrees F. or colder.

4. While fueling, keep the fuel delivery nozzle in contact with the fill pipe at all times; have the nozzle in place before delivery begins, and hold it there until the fuel flow stops. Wipe up any spills as soon as they occur, and be sure to replace fill caps securely as soon as fueling is completed.

5. Portable fuel tanks used with outboard motors should be removed from the boat for filling. Approved containers are of sound metal construction with a tight closure—a screw or spring cover—and a spout or other pouring device designed to eliminate spilling. Never carry or keep gasoline in class jars, plastic containers, open buckets or cans.

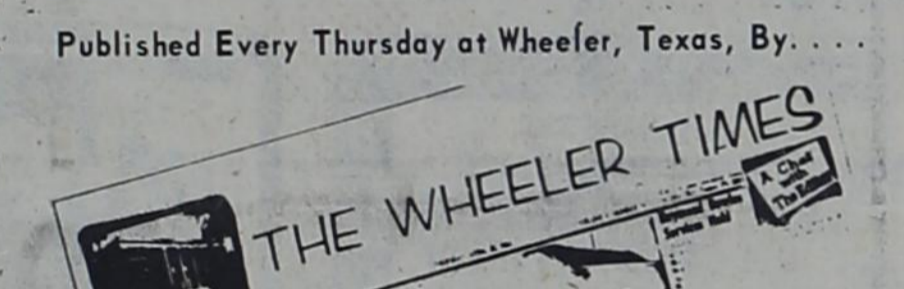

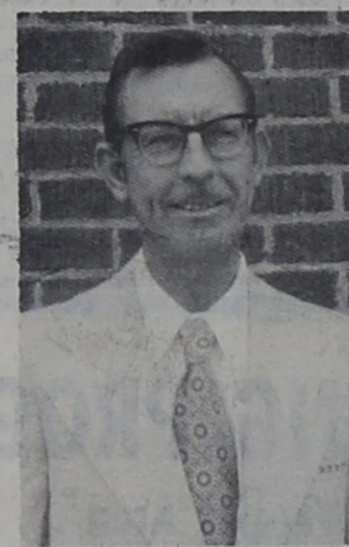

### FOOD SAFETY

To help prevent food poisoning, keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold and live longer in good health.

Specifically:  
 --cook foods thoroughly and serve them hot,  
 --prevent recontamination through cleanliness and use of sanitary utensils,  
 --promptly cool or freeze foods after preparation to retard bacteria multiplication,  
 --and, fully reheat stored foods to destroy bacteria.

In a survey of 2,503 households, 63 percent of those sampled used at least one high risk practice in handling, preparing and storing selected meat and poultry products.

Most of these high risk households left fresh meat, poultry or fish out at room temperature for more than two hours thinking it was safe to eat. They were wrong—meat is a haven for bacterial growth.

Over two and one-half million people were affected in 1976 by Salmonellosis, one of the major

food borne illnesses effecting man. Many more cases go unreported because people assume they have a "bug" or the flu.

Salmonella—a group of bacteria almost worldwide in distribution—may be found in water, poultry, meat and meat products, eggs and egg products, fish, shellfish and oysters. Freezing does not kill salmonella—it only prevents multiplication.

Many homemakers are not aware of the problems involved with handling food safely at

Before the 1978 food preservation season begins, inventory pantry and freezer stocks.

Plan weekly menus around these foods to use them before or during the preservation of new crops.

If last year's foods are not used before this year's canning and freezing starts, store them in front of or on top of the newer foods.

If too many containers of a particular food are left from last year, too much of that food was

planted and preserved or the family may not care for that food as anticipated.

Consider these factors in preserving this year.

Follow these guidelines on how long canned and frozed foods can be kept:

All unopened canned foods—12 months, Canned fruit juices—9 months, Frozen fruits—12 months, Citrus fruits and juice frozen at home—6 months, fruit juice concentrate—12 months, and vegetables—10 months.

Examine containers of frozen foods for tears in wrapping materials and use those items as soon as possible.

## RULES OF THE ROAD

There are no traffic signals on Texas lakes, but there is a body of regulations which is just as clear-cut and definitive as those governing any land-bound traffic interchange.

As far back as 1895, seamen were beginning to observe standardized international regulations, or "rules of the road" to avoid collisions and to establish the type of lights required for night sailing.

Most Texas boaters operate under the "inland rules of the road" listed in the updated pamphlet "It's the Law" available from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department office near you.

A quick survey of these rules tell boaters operating on Texas lakes when approaching head and head, it is a standing rule that both boats shall direct their courses to starboard (right) and pass to the port (left) side, each having given one blast of the horn or whistle.

When approaching a boat to your port and only the red light is visible, you may proceed on course after giving and receiving one blast of the horn or whistle.


When approaching a boat to your starboard and only the green light is visible, you may proceed on course after giving and receiving two blasts of the horn or whistle.

When overtaking a boat from the rear, give one blast of the horn or whistle to designate your intention to pass to the starboard. Proceed on course after the boat being overtaken acknowledges with one last.

the right-of-way and should hold their course and speed. The danger zone for your boat is starboard. Learn and exchange proper signals to avoid misunderstanding.

To overtake to the port, give two blasts and proceed on course after the boat being overtaken acknowledges with two blasts. If the boat being overtaken does not think it is safe to pass, she shall give several short blasts of the horn or whistle (never less than four.)

In addition to the operating rules listed in the pamphlet, all boaters must stop and render aid if you are involved in a boating accident unless to do so would seriously endanger your boat or other persons. Also, you must give your name, address, and identification number of your boat in writing to any injured person and to the owner of any damages property.

If death results from a boating accident, collision, or casualty, a written report must be submitted to the P&WD. If such occurrence results in injury to any person requiring professional medical attention, or physical damage to property (including vessels) in excess of \$100, a written report must be submitted. In all such cases, the report must be prepared and submitted to the P&WD by the operators of the boats involved. These accident reports shall be confidential and shall not be admissible in court as evidence. Reports must be submitted within 30 days.

It shall be unlawful for any person to: operate a motorboat or vessel or manipulate any water skis, aquaplane or similar device in a willfully or wantonly reckless or negligent manner so as to endanger the life, limb, or property of any person; operate any boat at a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and prudent or greater than will permit him to bring the boat to a stop within the assured clear distance ahead; operate any motorboat so as to cause a hazardous wake or wash; operate any motorboat in a circular course around another boat who occupant is fishing or around any person swimming.

Safe operation of a boat is a matter of common sense. Do not insist on the right-of-way if the other boat seems not ready to give-way.

Sailing vessels and rowboats are normally small and less maneuverable than powerboats and should be given the right-of-way.

**Firearm Accidents**

Two Pandhandle hunters are officially listed as hunting fatalities by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department as the March reports from across Texas are compiled in Austin.

Texas game wardens investigating the two fatalities and one injury have found that mishandling a gun was the major factor of each shooting.

One hunter attempted to remove a loaded rifle from a pickup gun rack and was hit in the chest by the discharging gun.

Another hunter was holding a friends loaded gun when it discharged striking him in the upper leg causing fatal results.

A third hunter was injured as his rifle discharged while being unloaded, hitting him in the calf of his leg.

All three hunters wer under 22 years of age and all violated the cardinal rule of gun safety by pointing a loaded gun at someone or something they did not intend to shoot, namely, themselves.

The P&WD recorded 17 hunting fatalities during 1977 as compared to only 11 1976. This year has started with a bang and the fall hunting season will not even begin until September.

The P&WD suggests that you and your hunting companions attend a hunter safety class this summer before your next hunting trip turns into a unforgettable experience that you might not read about in the newspaper.
