Irrigation Clinic Planned For Tues.

There will be an Irrigation Clinic for Wheeler County producers Tuesday, April 18 according to Don King, County Extension Agent. The clinic is being sponsored by the Crops Subcommittee of the Wheeler County Program Building Committee and by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service.

The Clinic will begin at 3:30 P... April 18 in the District Courtroom of the County Courthouse. From there the group will go to 20 or 30 different irrigation wells where Mr. Leon New, Area Agricultural Engineer-Irrigation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock will demonstrate how to check wells to

determine pumping effeciency. At 7:30 P.M. the Clinic will continue in a meeting in the District Courtroom. LEon New will discuss the importance of pumping efficience a way to achieve it. He will go through some examples of calculating pumping efficiency using the information taken during the afternoon session.

Also during the night session, Dr. Ray Sammons, Area Economist-Management with the Agricultural Extension Service at Amarillo will discuss what increasing pumping efficiency can mean to the producer in terms of

the cost of water applied to crops. This meeting is planned to give irrigation farmers information they can use to reduce the cost of producing a crop. As the cost of fuel continues to rise, the efficiency of the irrigation well will increase importance.



Fire Protection Association (NFPA). For these are the Exactly what would you do if people who don't know how to act plans to be at the school for this special event.

The first rule of safety from fire is escape; get everybody out at the very first sign of fire. But unless you have done some thinking and planning, you may not be able to escape. NFPA studies show the great majority of the estimated 6,600 U.S. lives lost in residential fires last year were needlessly lost-because of 3-16 failure to pre-plan and rehearse escape measures.

Here are some pointers from the international fire safety or- 4-4 ganization which can help you

1. Carefully figure out at least 4-5 two routes to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms. Allow for 4-7 blocking of stairways and halls by

2. Particularly for nighttime 4-8 fires, remember that closed bedrooms doors will hold back flame and smoke, allow extra time to 4-10

For upper floor escape, use any available porch and garage roofs, ladders or-for agile children, especially-trees as ways 4-11 down to safety. Be sure exit windows work easily, and that they are low and large enough to

4. Pick an outside assembly point where the family will meet, that the needed information is upper shelf of the refrigerator on stands the rule "Once Out-Stay 4.8 Out!"

5. Know how to call the fire 4-9 department from a street box or neighbor's telephone, and do this as quickly as possible once everyone is out of the burning

Consider automatic household fire warning equipment for your home. It gives vital early warning and extra escape time. Smoke and heat detectors installed in all major areas give full protection. Smoke detectors alone, installed outside bedrooms, partially protect.



Since most new homes no for your home or garden by the longer have symmetrical shape with a centered entrance, symmetrical balance in the landscape is seldom needed or justified. To reduce maintenance and to avoid cutting the front yard into ribbons of concrete and grass, the entrance walk generally comes to the front door from the garage or driveway rather than straight from the street.

This side approach to the home entrance frequently allows for the development of a gardentype planting around the main entrance. In-stead of having a symmetrically ballanced planting at the entrance, landscape materials can be used to create an informal garden for the guest to pass through as he enters your

So, whatever landscape design you develop, always remember to plan before you plant.

Plan Summer Gras Fertilization

To get optimum production from summer grasses, a carefully planned fertilization program is necessary.

Fertilization plans should take into account the amount of hay or grazing needed during a given period of time. If intensive grazing is planned during the entire six-month season, then three applications of nitrogen at a rate of 60 pounds per acre will be required. A soil test can help determine lime, phosphorus and potassium needs.

If intensive grazing is not planned, only one application of 50 to 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre may be needed if the soil tests medium or higher in phosphorus and postasium. It may be desirable to fertilize a portion of the acreage in the spring, summer and fall rather than all in the

Most problems in grass fertilization result when nitrogen is applied to early in the season before warm weather sets in or when the rate of nitrogen is too

The following suggestions are offered for producing an abundant supply of summer grass:

1. Use a nitrogen rate of at least 50 to 60 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre.

2. Test the soil every three or four years to determine when to add lime, phosphorus and potas-

3. If the total nitrogen to be applied is moe than 200 to 300 pounds per acre, add 15 to 20 pounds of sulfur per acre on deep

sandy soils. 4. Combine fertilization with rotational grazing to extend the grazing period, maintain quality forage, and to make more efficient use of plant nutrients, especially nitrogen. Applying fertilizer over the entire pasture before heavy spring growth produces grass to fast for efficient grazing. Thus, excess forage should be harvested to get the most from the fertilized acreage.



Arthristis can go into spontaneous remission (a period during Clean the medicine cabinet which the symptoms subside.) A victim who is by chance trying some quack treatment when this happens often believes that the treatment was a "cure."

Cancer is the second leading cause of death in the United States and is often a terrifying disease. Many cancers, if detected and treated early, can be cured by recognized meanssurgery, radiation, and medica-

The patient with the most to lose through quackery is the one who has cancer in an early stage. While the cancer is under fraudulent treatment, it has time to grow and possibly spread beyond control. The patient may lose his life. Some quack doctors have falsely diagnosed "cancer" and then taken credit for "miracle"

Diabetes is also a prime target for quackery becaase of the difficulties some patients have in following the diabetic regimen.

Diabetes can be controlled, and the patient can live a normal life by following procedures set down by a reputable doctor.

If you are in any doubt, ask yourself these questions-and if the answer to any of the question is "Yes," then you could be a potential victim of quackery:

1. Is the product or service being offered a "secret remedy" or not available from other sources?

2. Does the sponsor claim that he is battling the medical profession which does not accept his wonderful discovery?

3. Is the remedy being sold from door to door, by a self-styled "Health advisor", or promoted in lectures to the public, from town to town?

4. Is this "miracle" drug, device, or diet being promoted in a sensational magazine, by a faith healer's group, or a crusading organization of laymen?

5. Does the promoter report "miracles" he has performed for others?

6. Is the product or service good for a variety of illnesses,



The Panhandle EMS "system" has provided a variety of elements including 31 fully equipped ambulances, specially trained personnel and a unique medical communications network linking physicians at the hospital and Emergency Medical Tecnicians (EMTs) at the scene and enroute to the hospital.

The regionwide EMS communications network affords you, the witness of an emergency, to call a single number for emergency care (1-800-692-1331 anywhere in the Panhandle). Once you have stated the problem to the EMS communications dispatcher, the closest available ambulance and/or fire personnel and law enforcement may be dispatched, as necessitated. In the event of a poison or overdose, you may be direct patched to the Poison Control Center for immediate medical assistance for the patient. A deaf mute communication includes a telewriter for direct access for all emergencies. Future plans call for medical "self help" programs via telephone for the choking or The couple plan to make their drowning victim, as well as heart attack victim.

Once the EMT has reached the scene, assessed and stabilized the patient, he reports the patient's problem and care enroute to the receiving hospital via EMS communication to allow medical readiness for the patient's arrival. He also receives two-way voice medical direction for care enroute. Should a patient need specialized personnel or equipment for transport to the trauma hospital, the EMS helicopter is

Parks, Wildlife

LUBBOCK-All anglers want to catch big fish and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has a Big Fish Award program to insure that your fishing friends believe that story of the "big one" that didn't get away.

In order for the P&WD fishery biologist to gather information on lakes and streams that produce these big fish, exceptional catches need to be reported to the department through the big fish award program.

Eligible species and minimum weights of Texas fish inlcude: largemouth bass, 7 lbs.; crappie, 3 lbs; white bass, 3 lbs; striped bass, 15 lbs.; striped/white bass hybrid, 6 lbs.0 channel catfish, 12lbs.; blue cats, 35 lbs.; flathead cat, 50 lbs; walleye, 6 lbs; rainbow and brown trout, 2 lbs.

The angler applying for a 'big fish" award certificate must have hooked, fought, and landed the fish. All fish entered must be measured for total length, and must be weighted on an inspected scale certified for trade by the signed by a witness.

There are several species of on the card. fish available to the angler that are not listed on the "big fish" award program including the smallmouth bass which is furnishing anglers with plenty of action at lake Meredith in the ing the expiration date. All

Average size of the smallmouth in Meredith are weighing in at 1.75 pounds and recent fishing reports from Meredith anglers indicate that most of the bass caught are smallmouth.

Parks, Wildlife **Boat Registration**

LUBBOCK-Taking care of properly outfitting a boat for operation on area lakes is important, but getting caught-up on paperwork should be number one on the list of things to do now.

A check of the boats' registration will show if it is valid. In Texas, a certificate of number or fascimile thereof must always be aboard and available for inspection by any law enforcement officer when the motorboat is in Texas Department of Agriculture operation on Texas public with a statement of wieght waters. The certificate is valid until the expiration date shown

When you renew the certificate, the same number shall be issued if you apply to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department within the 90-day period precedmotorboats, regardless of length or horsepower, are required by law to register if operated on public waters in Texas. This same certificate of number will be honored by other states for different lengths of time if you boat on their state waters.

The number awarded to your motorboat must be painted, decaled, or otherwise affixed to both sides of the bow of the boats in such a position as to provide easy identification. The numbers must be at least three (3) inches in hieght, and must be of a color that contrasts with the back-

The validation decal must be affixed on a line and three inches

after the registration number. The Texas Certificate of Title Law, which became effective January 1, 1978, is for all new/unregistered motorboats in excess of 14 feet and new/ unregistered outboards motors in

excess of 12 horsepower. Title applications, available at boat dealers and P&WD offices, and the manufacturer statement of origin must accompany a request for boat registration for new boats and new outboard

The title fee for each boat or outboard motor is \$3.50 and registration transfer fee is \$1. Applications for transfer of title and ownership must be filed not later than 15 days from date of

purchase. Other important papers which should be carried onboard are insurance policies and the status of boat and/or motor guarentees in case of an accident on the

water or highway.
