Cross, Hennard Begin Paramedics

Major advances have been made in the delivery of emergency medical care in the Texas Panhandle.

More sophisticated training, leading to paramedic level personnel (as seen on TV's "Emergency") is beginning in the Panhandle in April of this year.

Out of the twenty-eight selected participants for the first Panhandle EMS advanced Life Support Training include Donald Carlton, Shamrock; David Cross, Wheeler; Tommie A. Hennard, Wheeler; Carl Knoll, Shamrock.

The Panhandle progressing to an ALS system involves more sophisticated training and operation with skilled field personnel (paramedics) trained to identify and treat life-threatening emergencies at the scene and enroute to hospital.

At the Advanced Life Support (ALS) level, ambulances may be equipped with intravenous fluids and some form of bio-electrical communication (telemetry). This will enable paramedics with proper physician direction to evaluate the patient, provide treatment, and triage (transport to the proper facility) the critical patient. Standardized treatment with medical direction and regional triage ensures a progressive and continued enhancement of critical care for the patient—from the field to the initial care facility and to the advanced care facility.

Paramedics and emergency department nurses under medical control (a physician surrogate in voice contact with EKG telemetry) can provide resuscitation (CPR) and specific

intervention measures (e.g., endotracheal or esophogastric intubation, intravenous therapy, cardiac dysrhythmia detection, and control with drugs and electrocardiostimulators.)

Improvements in EMS the past two years have resulted from the development of a "systems approach" and integration of standardized vehicles, emergency facilities, and critical care unit capabilities. "At the scene" care by physician agents (certified Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT's) and emergency nurses) in radio communication with medical professionals is improving care for a wide variety of critically ill and injured patients, especially those suffering from heart attack and vehicular accidents.

Development of an EMS system in the Panhandle began in 1975 with an upgrading of existing resources and resulted in establishment of a basic life support (BLS) system. Logical progression is to advanced life support (ALS) system. Logical progression is to advanced life support (ALS), where the level of EMS capability permits.

The EMS system is coordinating through a regional organization - The Texas Panhandle EMS System.

PLACED IN THE HELICOPTER

Wheeler's second serious accident victim in three days was loaded onto the EMS Med-A-Vac Helicopter Friday evening. Jim Patterson from Ft. Sill, Oklahoma received serious head injuries in a motorcycle accident 1/4 mile north of the dump grounds. Patterson was riding a motorcycle without the benefit of a helmet; he apparently hit sand and lost control of the cycle. Patterson was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital where he remains in critical condition.

Also exhibiting steers were Bobby Hamilton and Shonda Quarles.

Jamee Batton placed 2nd in the spring heifer class and Shannon Batton placed second in the spring yearling class in the Top O' Texas Hereford Breeder Show.

CITY, SCHOOL, HOSPITAL ELECTIONS

The three elections held Saturday, April 1, in the School cafeteria place a new face on each of the governing boards for which the elections were held. The elections were for the City of Wheeler, Wheeler Public School and North Wheeler County Hospital District.

The candidates in the City election were unopposed. Mayor Pete Burton was re-elected along with councilmen David Cross and Louis Stas. Bernice Hall was elected for her first term on the council to a one-year un-expired

term. The election returns for the City were canvassed Monday morning, April 3, by the council. The returns showed Pete Burton to receive 164 of the 171 votes cast in the election. David Cross received 16 votes; Bernice Hall received 149 votes and Louis Stas received 147. Fifteen write-in votes were cast. The Mayor and Councilmen Cross and Stas were sworn in at the special meeting Monday. Mrs. Hall will receive the oath of office at the regular meeting

April 17. In the Wheeler School Election, three positions were to be filled on the board of trustees. Positions 2 and 3 were unopposed in the election; these places are held by Betty Hennard and H. L. Lee. Bennie Westmoreland and Don Whiteley each placed their names on the ballot for position 1. The election returns showed Don Whiteley to have 114 votes. Bennie Westmoreland received 96 votes. Betty Hennard received 172 votes and Harold Loyd ee received 171 votes.

An election was held to select the Wheeler representative for the North Wheeler County Hospital District board of trustees. Incumbent Dub Goad and John C. Vise were seeking the position. When the ballot boxes closed, 136 votes had been cast for John C. Vise and 89 votes were cast for Dub Goad.

ACCIDENTS PLAGUE AREA, MED-A-VAC TRANSPORTS 3

The EMS Med-A-Vac Helicopter made three visits to Wheeler County since Wednesday, March 29. The Med-A-Vac Helicopter since February 1, 1978, has been available to the Panhandle through the Emergency Medical Services division of PRPC.

Helicopter transfer is usually recommended by the physician when he feels the patient's condition warrants minimum time outside of a controlled environment of the hospital and/or the patient requires specialized equipment and personnel during transport.

At 12:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 29, Noah Geyer was involved in a two-vehicle accident at the corner of Ninth and Main.

The Wheeler Ambulance was called and following on the scene treatment was transported to Parkview Hospital.

Geyer's injuries, lack of re-

sponse to treatment and respiratory failure warranted the calling of the Med-a-vac Helicopter. The copter arrived in Wheeler at 4:30; the patient was prepared by the Med-a-vac Trauma Team for transport and arrived in Amarillo 35 minutes after liftoff from the lawn at Parkview Hospital.

Geyer is in St. Anthony's Hospital where he remains in critical condition.

The Med-a-vac Trauma Team consists of one registered nurse and one respiratory therapist, each has been certified in a 72-hour coronary care course, emergency department course, EMT certification as well as Med-a-vac helicopter training.

Friday afternoon, Jim Patterson, a Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, soldier, was injured in a motorcycle accident 1/4 mile north of the city dump. Patterson was riding the cycle on the dirt road without a helmet; he struck sand, lost

control of the cycle and landed on his head. Patterson received injuries to the head, chest and shoulder. Wheeler Ambulance was called to transport the victim to Parkview.

Following treatment at Parkview Hospital, Patterson's condition would not allow transporting by ambulance to Amarillo. The EMS Med-A-Vac helicopter was again called.

Patterson was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital where he remains in critical condition.

Patterson was visiting the brother of a Wheeler resident; he is not related to anyone in Wheeler.

The Med-A-Vac helicopter was called to Shamrock at 4 a.m. Monday morning for the transporting of a pre-mature infant to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

The Med-A-Vac unit provides expert care and air transportation for critical newborn infants. In coordination with the Department of Respiratory Therapy, Amarillo Hospital District, a team composed of a flight nurse and a respiratory therapist, experienced in the care and transportation of the newborn, is dispatched by helicopter to the distant hospital after the Amarillo physician's request. Once there, the team institutes intensive care for the newborn in distress, and when stabilized, the infant is transferred to the Infant Intensive Care Center at Northwest Texas Hospital.

OTHER CALLS

In addition to the two calls mentioned above, the North Wheeler County Ambulance was dispatched four other times during the past week. One of these calls were non emergency and the other three were emergency.

The pagers were sounded Saturday morning and the Wheeler Ambulance responded; a member of an oilfield crew had suffered an epileptic seizure. He was brought to Parkview Hospital where he was kept for observation.

Thomas Manley of Mobeettie was involved in a pickup-motorcycle accident Saturday afternoon in Mobeettie and the local ambulance was called. The youngster, suffering from abrasions, lacerations and a broken leg was brought to Parkview Hospital where he was treated and transferred by ambulance to Northwest Texas Hospital. Thomas underwent surgery in Amarillo and a plate was implanted in the leg.

Early Monday afternoon the local ambulance crew transported Mrs. T. T. Wallace to Groom Hospital from her residence in Wheeler.

The Wheeler Ambulance was called to Briscoe Monday evening. The school is in the process of building a storm shelter south of the main building. Alvin Lehman fell into the open pit and was suffering back pain. Lehman was taken to Highland General in Pampa where he was admitted.

On Monday after Easter Sylvia Brown attended the funeral of the seven year old Amber Dawn McLerran of Elk City. She was the daughter of Doug and Jo Ann McLerran of Tipton, Oklahoma.

Book Review

"The Amityville Horror", by Jay Anson, is the true story of a

young family of five which move into a new home, complete with finishes basement, swimming pool, and boathouse. Twenty-eight days later, they fled in terror, leaving most of their belongings behind.

George and Kathleen Luty were aware that the house had been the scene of a mass murder—Ronald DeFeo, 23, was convicted of shooting his parents, brothers, and sisters. But it seemed an ideal home for them and their three children and the price was right. The most terrifying experience of their lives began when their five-year-old daughter boasted of her new playmate someone—or something—named "Jodie".

"The Harvest", by Meyer Levin, is a magnificent and sweeping epic of Jewish life, built around one family embracing the Russian, American and Palestinian experience. It centers around the Chaimovitch family, early settlers in Palestine, through whose dramatic and far-flung lives we ourselves relive the struggles, the successes, the failures, the tragedies and the heroism that linked the nightmares of Nazi Europe to the amazing life-effort in Palestine.

LEARN NOT TO BURN KNOW YOUR FIRE EXTINGUISHER

If you had to use a fire extinguisher during an emergency, would you be ready? Would you know what type of fire your extinguisher is designed to deal with?

The truth is, not every fire can be extinguished with the same type of extinguisher; or for that matter with just plain water! The reason for this is that there are different kinds of fires. Underwriters Laboratories describes a CLASS A fire as one involving ordinary combustibles—like paper, wood, cloth, rubber, and some plastics. A CLASS B fire is one fed by flammable or combustible liquids—like grease, oil, or chemicals. And a fire caused or sustained by electrical equipment is known as a CLASS C fire. An easy way to be sure what type of fire your extinguisher is designed for is simply to read the extinguisher's label. You can also find instructions for operating the extinguisher there.

Remember, a fire extinguisher should be used to prevent a small fire from growing into a large blaze. If you encounter a fire, contact your fire department at once. Then decide if your fire extinguisher can safely deal with the fire. Underwriters Laboratories and your local Fire Department suggest that you don't take chances; know your fire extinguisher and how to use it.

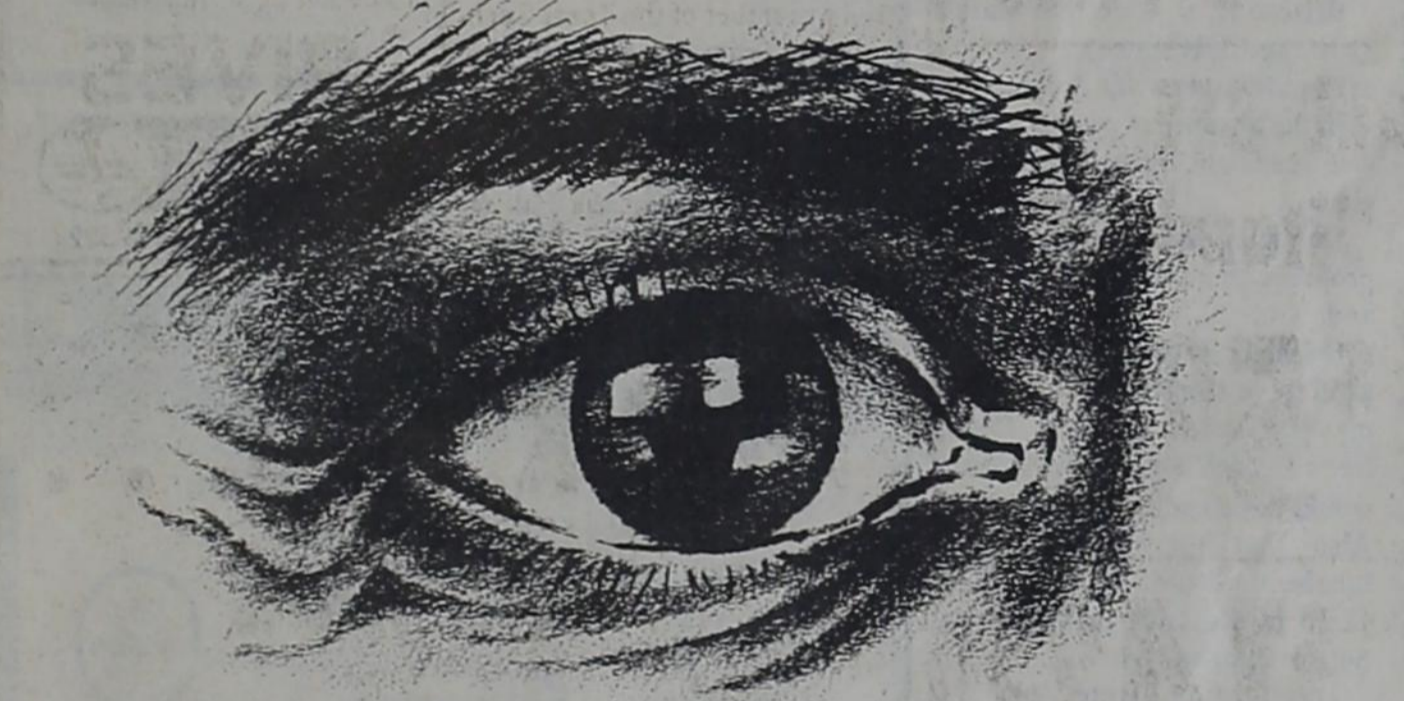

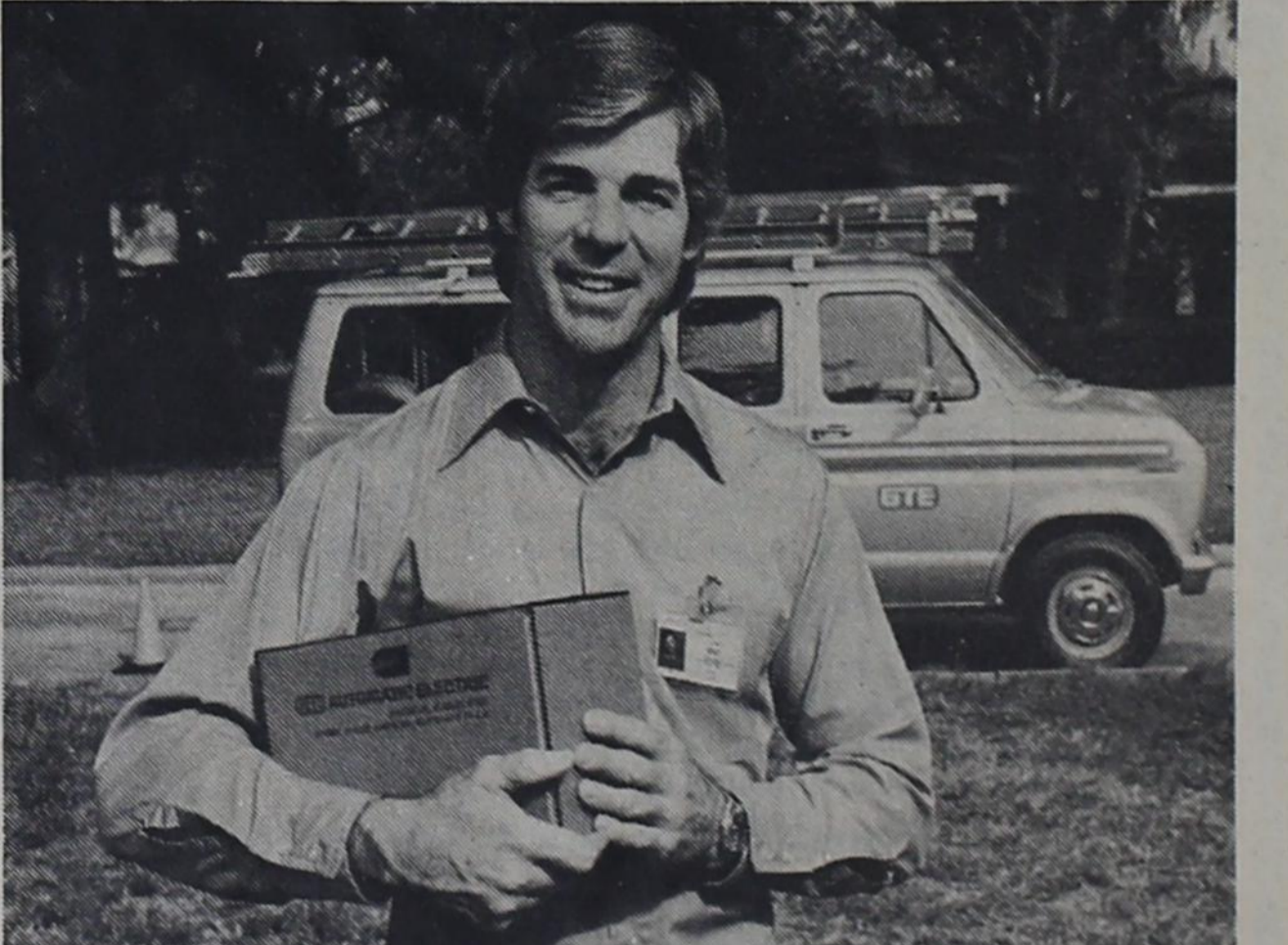

Lace trims add that delicate finishing touch to romantic, feminine fashions.
 Lace flounces create a petticoat effect under a hemline. Collars and cuffs dress up with lace applique and inserts, combined with tucking or ruffled lace edging.
 In selecting a lace trim, let it add to the garment without distracting. It should coordinate with the fashion fabric and garment design.
 Lace trims are versatile—sheer and delicate or heavier and durable. Most laces are made of cotton, polyester, nylon or blends of these.
 If the garment is washable, always choose washable lace trim. Pre-shrink the trim before sewing it to the garment.
 Choose amount of lace according to placement, allowing more lace for gathers and corners.
 For corners, allow two times the width of the lace to miter—or to gently gather around square corners so lace lies flat.
 For an attractive gathered lace, gathers should be at least twice as full as the length needed.
 Topstitch lace edging over a raw or finished garment edge by lapping the lace's straight edge over the garment's edge. Gathered lace trims with bound edges are usually topstitched to a garment edge so that the garment overlaps the bound edge.
 To insert lace in a seam, stitch the flat edge along the seamline of one fabric piece—with the lace lying on the right side of the fabric and the outside lace edge turned toward the inside of the garment. Next, lay the second piece of fabric on the first (right sides together), lining both up along the seam allowance. Stitch along the first row of stitches, slightly toward the inside of the garment.
 For fashions featuring lace with straight edges, topstitch lace in place on fabric—trim the underneath fabric away for an open effect or leave it in place.

Press trimmed seam allowances flat and away from the lace insert, finish raw edges to prevent raveling as needed and topstitch in place.

 When drying clothes, hang them outside or indoors when possible.
 If machine drying, dry full-but not packed-loads.
 Dry them at the lowest possible heat setting to produce desired results in the shortest possible time.
 Do not over-dry clothing—this causes wrinkles and static electricity and it wastes energy.
 If clothes come out wrinkled, more energy is needed to iron or redo them.
 Also, keep the dryer vent or air duct and lint-filter screen clean for maximum energy efficiency.

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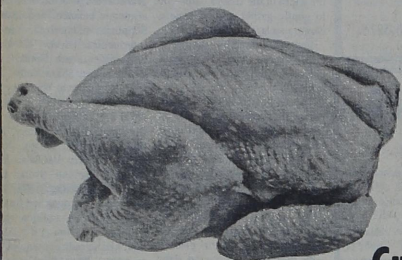
