### FARM EQUIPMENT SALE SATURDAY, APRIL 15

The Wheeler County Livestock Show Association will sponsor a farm equipment sale Saturday, April 15 at the Wheeler County Agricultural Center in Wheeler according to Don King, CEA.

### Foster Whaley Is Kiwanis Speaker

Foster Whaley, Democratic candidate for State Representative, spoke at the Monday, March 27 meeting of the Wheeler Kiwanis Club on the topic, "The Farm Unrest."

Whaley related that much of today's farm problems can be credited to what the Government has done to farmers as well as what they have failed to do for them.

He cited the fact that we have had almost three decades of a bi-partisan cheap food policy. The Government price freeze on live cattle by President Truman created the worst price disaster in the early '50's this county had seen at the time. The Nixon freeze on beef prices in 1973 triggered more bankruptcies in the cattle business than this nation had known to that time.

Whaley cited the fact Secretary Butz had encouraged fence row to fence row planting—then Nixon placed an export embargo and sent grain prices into a tailspin. All of this was an effort to appease consumers.

Whaley pointed out the grain reserve Government program to place three hundred million bushels in storage will pretty well assure the fact that wheat prices will go no higher than \$3.83 per bushel as long as the loan rate is only \$2.25. This is slightly over 70% of parity. Whaley said, "If our wheat and other grains were sold in the World Market at parity, farmers of this nation would stand to earn five billion dollars more for their grain products. Farmers could stand to earn as much as \$3.00 more per bushel for wheat."

He cited government figures that showed the U.S. sold over sixty-three percent of all the feed grains and 41% of all food grains that went into World Trade in the last marketing year. He stated the fact that the U. S. has the power to set world prices. Bad trade agreements with the European Common Market permits Volkswagens to be shipped into this country at only three percent of their wholesale price as import duty. But the import duty on our wheat being shipped to Europe is now \$3.45 per bushel.

The U. S. is the only exporting nation that does not have a government or grain marketing board to set the outgoing price. The Japanese government buys our wheat direct and resells it to their millers for \$2.00 per bushel profit.

Whaley said a grain exporting board run by farmers should be the one spokesman to achieve fair prices.

Proceeds from the sale will be used for improvements to the Agricultural Center and to pay expenses of the Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show.

The Association already has several pieces of equipment, including trucks, tractors and combines, tentatively consigned. This equipment is valued at \$5-\$60,000.

Other equipment is welcome in the sale. Anyone wishing to have equipment listed on the sale bill can call Don King at 826-5243 or 826-3249 in Wheeler, no later than Monday, March 27. Consignments will be accepted after this date but will not appear on the sale bill.

The Livestock Show Association will handle publicity and sale of the equipment. There will be a 5% commission charge and a 1% charge on equipment bought back by the consignor with a minimum commission or buy-back charge of \$2.50 per item. There will be a maximum buy-back charge of \$50 per item with \$150 per consignor.

### 10 SECTIONS GRASS LAND BURNED

The worst fire in a number of years burned as estimated 10 sections of grass Monday afternoon. The fire started 1 1/2 miles south of Briscoe. The fire caught in love grass about 1 p.m.

The damage was limited mostly to grass and fencing. The firemen were successful in protecting two seriously threatened houses and a hay barn full of hay. Some smaller out building belonging to Darville Atherton were lost in the fire but he did not lose the house or hay barn. The fire came within feet of the Oren Horn home. Richard Brown lost one cow and reported several of the calves and other cattle has scorched feet. Just minutes prior to being called to the Briscoe fire, Wheeler was called to a grass fire southeast of Wheeler. Shamrock was called to help fight this fire to partially free the Wheeler Department to help with the Briscoe fire.

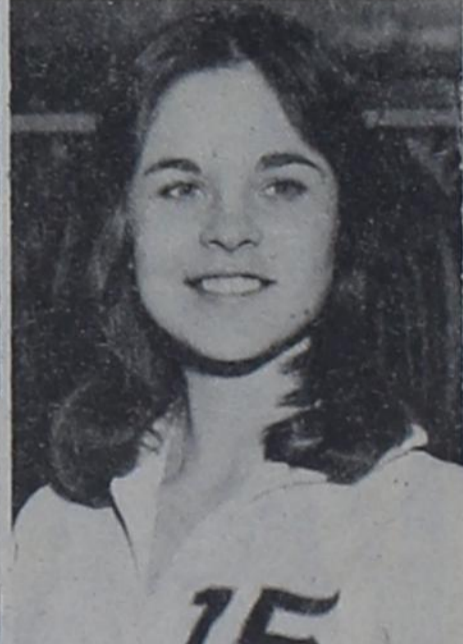

### HEALTH & SAFETY TIPS

Remember four vital pieces of information when making an emergency telephone call yelling "help" is not enough.

(1) Tell where the emergency occurred. Give the street number, the street name and the house or apartment number. Then, repeat the information.

(2) State what happened—a fire, serious bleeding, a heart

attack, an accidental poisoning or a drug overdose.

(3) Identify the caller—this is important, especially when an emergency is not obvious to an outsider.

A neighbor asked for directions will recognize a name more readily than a house number.

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(4) Tell what kind of help is needed for example, a fire truck, an ambulance or the police.

Also, prepare for an emergency--have important telephone numbers posted near the telephone: such as, fire department, police department, local poison control center, office and home numbers of the family doctor, a hospital, ambulance service, drug store and one or two reliable neighbors.

In addition, make sure that everyone in the family--including children and babysitters--know how to give vital emergency information quickly and clearly.

"Take care of yourself" is becoming serious advice. Since the present U.S. medical-care system is not able to serve all who need it.

"Experts are encouraging each person to assume more responsibility for his own health and that of his community, because present medical care

demands cannot be met."

Each person makes choices that influence health both physical and emotional and some of the most important choices involve the individual's lifestyle.

Lifestyle is often linked to the diseases which now are taking the greatest toll in lives and suffering.

We may decide our own link to those diseases by how we eat, drink, smoke and exercise and how we handle stress, anger and other emotions.

Some choices an individual can make to ensure health start with five "take care of yourself" guidelines, many of which focus on lifestyle.

—Establish sound health habits, such as balanced nutrition,

regular exercise and careful dental hygiene.

—Recognize early warning signs and symptoms of disease and take action to prevent extreme consequences of the disease.

—When necessary, use the health-care system efficiently by carefully selecting qualified physicians, by seeking diagnosis early and by following through on recommended treatment.

—Use health care products effectively.

This includes following label instructions on over-the-counter drugs the physicians instructions on prescription drugs.

—Learn and apply correct health-care procedures, such as cardiopulmonary resuscitation, in cases of emergency & illness.

May God bless all who had a part in this.

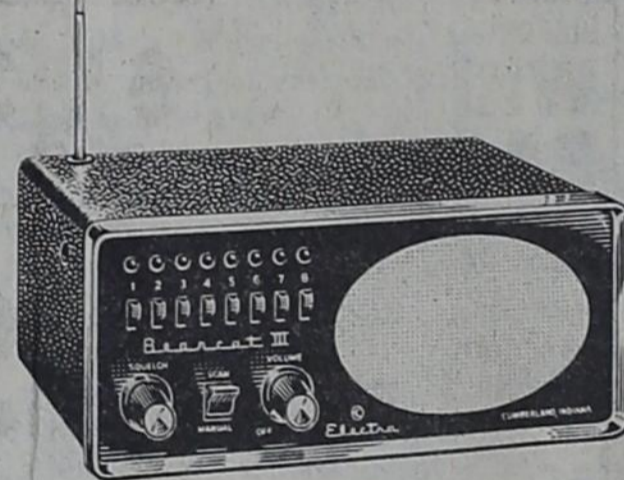
