Whaley cited the fact Secretary Butz had encouraged fence row to fence row planting-then nixon placed an export embargo and sent grain prices into a tailspin. All of this was an effort to appease consumers.

Whaley pointed out the grain reserve Government program to place three hundred million bushels in storage will pretty well assure the fact that wheat prices will go no higher than \$3.83 per bushel as long as the loan rate is only \$2.25. This is slightly over 70% of parity. Whaley said, "If our wheat and other grains were sold in the World Market at parity, farmers of this nation would stand to earn five billion dollars more for their grain products. Farmers could stand to earn as much as \$3.00 more per bushel for wheat."

He cited government figures that showed the U.S. sold over Sixty-three percent of all the feed grains and 41% of all food grains that went into World Trade in the last marketing year. He stated 3-13 the fact that the U. S. has the 3-16 power to set world prices.

Bad trade agreements with the European Common Market 3-22 permits Volkswagens to be shipped into this country at only three percent of their wholesale price as import duty. But the import 3-24 duty on our wheat being shipped to Europe is now \$3.45 per bushel.

The U. S. is the only exporting 3-26 nation that does not have a 3-27 government or grain marketing board to set the outgoing price.

The Japanese government buys our wheat direct and resells it to their millers for \$2.00 per bushel profit.



AG DAY IS OBSERVED

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Ag Day '78 will provide an opportunity for educating all consumers-whether they live in the city or the country. Ag Day is designed to bring several surprising facts into focus.

For example, when America was still in its infancy, approximately 85 per cent of the population worked and lived on a farm. Today, about 4 per cent of our people farm the land.

One American farmer feeds about 56 people, over three times as many as 20 years ago when there were twice as many farm workers. And in the last 10 years, agricultural production has climbed some 20 percent, on 6 per cent fewer acres.

In relative terms, food is actually less expensive today than say 25 years ago. Look at the average increase in hourly wages during those years. If you applied that same percentage increase to 1950 food prices, a pound of round steak would cost more than \$3.00, a quart of milk would run 70c, a dozen eggs \$2.00 and a pound of hamburger or chicken could cost over \$2.00!

In 1973, we spent only 15.5 per cent of our income for food. Compare that with Asia where they spent about 83 per cent of their income for food. An our 15.5 per cent buys not only chicken, but selected parts of chicken, precooked or ready to cook in throw-away packages. The Asian's 83 per cent buys a Chicken that is hanging by its neck in an unrefrigerated dis-

The efficiency of American farmers make it possible for us to enjoy relatively inexpensive food. This efficiency has also allowed us to export the production of one in four acres harvested in the United States. This is an important "plus" to achieving a balance of payments in foreign

We're all a part of the farmerbusiness-consumer complex. A lot of people make agriculture work. It's an industry that supports many of us; four out of every ten jobs are agriculturally related. We are proud the American farmer is the most efficient in the world. Now we must make sure he has sufficient incentive and profit to remain in

The farmer has to see potential for profit in order to have the incentive to produce more. If COMPLETIONS: there is more production, that will act to drive prices down. And this hurts both the farmers and the consumer.

The key to an adequate food supply and reasonable food costs at home is to respond to a profit incentive. Farmers need an environment that's conducive to the expanded production of food.





Book Review

"Jack Benny" is a biography by Mary Livingston Benny and Hilliard Marks. Jack Benny's story is more than a rags-toriches success-it is the story behind his famous on-the-air fued with Fred Allen, and the story of the Golden Era in Hollywood, of Frank Sinatra and Gregory Peck and George Burns and their fabulous extravaganzas -one of the great tragedy. It is the story of a man whose world shook with the death of Al Jolson and who spent long hours of vigil beside Clark Gable after Carole Lombard's fatal accident.

A passionate searing story of America in the morning of her power, "The Land Where the Sun Dies" by Henry Carlisle, is an authentic and moving rediscovery of the times of Andrew Jackson and of the Second Seminole Ware, a ware so infamous as to be stricken from the pages of history. Eliza Hutchins life is profoundly touched by the Indians of Florida, but her husband Lieutenant Laird Coffrey, must fight them. John Hutchins, Eliza father, is a government agent to the Seminoles, whose compassion for their brutal uprooting entangles him in a conflict with his duty and finally costs him his sanity. Osceola, the Seminole leader, wields his scattered nation into a fighting force capable of resisting the United States Army for seven years. The Seminoles black slaves, the pawns of the conflict, become the Indians allies. It is an epic tale of the formulative, speculative early decades of the nineteenth century. It is a love story set against a background of power, land greed, and racial strife. It is a saga of the American past that speaks to the present.
