





"Dust of Life" by Liz Thomas begins in 1972 when she went alone to Vietnam to serve as a nurse. She began work at a Saigon orphanage that housed two hundred children, some of whom were mentally retarded or handicapped. Latter she started her own home for girls who had been living in the streets often as prostitutes, to support their families. Her account of what happened to her, her "children", and to the other people of Saigon under the new regime is a moving and unique record of a tragic moment in history. It is a heroic tale you will not soon forget.

"A Family Likeness" was written by Anna Gilbert. Tessa felt ingrateful urges toward grandmother, which she could not quite explain or justify. These feelings, Tessa was to learn, went far deeper than simply a perverse longing for freedom, as events from far past, which had incredibly been kept from her for all these years, were at last brought to light.




Gardening is a good way for 4-H'ers to help their families beat the high cost of living and provide good homegrown meals. Furthermore, a gardening project helps youth learn responsibility and about such things as seed germination, plant growth and development, pollination and flowering. Young people can also learn the basics of insect and disease control and fertilization principles.

A gardening project can range from a windo box or pots and cans to a full-fledged backyard plot.

Plants grown in containers will have to be watered and fertilized more often than those grown in the ground. Soil should be a mix of organic matter, peat mos and sand.

Vegetables can also be grown around the edges of flower beds. A border of lettuce, onions, carrots or parsley is attractive as well as edible. Plant tomatoes, peppers or eggplants with taller flowers and put beans and cucumbers against a fence or screen.

Whatever the size of the garden and the types of crops grown, a 4-H gardening project can be a most rewarding experience for youth. ***** Energy-efficient clothing-care habits can lower utility bills as well as save energy. Selecting garments from fabrics that require less heat and washing or drying time is an energy-efficient first step. The rest depends on energyminded care habits, which include washing and drying fullmachine loads when possible on appropriate machine cycles in cool-as-possible temperatures.

When machine washing, wash full loads when possible, especially if using hot water.

If the washer is not full, adjust the water level accordingly, but remember that cycle will still take the same amount of energy except for the reduction in waterheating energy.

Use the short machine cycle when appropriate-such as when items are not very soiled or when they will readily give up soil.

When possible, wash with warm or cold water-but no colder than 80 degrees F.

While research shows that cleanability and disinfecting power increases with higher water temperature, unfortunately so does energy usage. Luckily, however, hot water is inappropriate for some fabrics.

When washing in cold water, use liquid detergent or powdered detergent designed for use in cold water to achieve the best results.

Also, always use cold water rinse. Warm water offers no advantage, and it wastes energy.

If we must sacrifice clean, bright and white clothes in favor of energy conservation, we can still usually produce comparable results with bleaching, pretreating and soaking.

If greying and dinginess do occur, an occasional hot-water may help. Also, chlorine bleach will help disinfect some items as needed.


