Grass Seeding

The seeding of grasses is a conservation practice that can be applied to many acres of land in the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District. This seeding may be done on old fields or on rangeland that has deteriorated to grasses with poor grazing value and shinnery. According to Charles Coffman of the Soil Conservation Service "most of these areas are being seeded to weeping lovegrass.'

Ask yourself the following questions. Is my land producing all the forage it has potential to produce? Is the wind and water carrying away my soil to add to air polution and fill our water reservoirs with silt? Can I afford to invest in seeding grass and through increasing my production get a good return on my investment?

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District is interested in helping you plan and apply any type of grass seeding.
