



Shrubs Benefit Area Wildlife

Landowners are placing their orders for trees and shrubs now and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department suggests that these plant orders include species beneficial for wildlife as well as ornamental qualities.

Assistance in selecting the right shrub or tree for wildlife on your property is available through the wildlife extension biologist. Many species of plants suitable for wildlife are not available at local nurseries or the P&WD, but there are several including the mulberry, osage orange, and Russian oliver that can be ordered by contacting your local biologist or Soil Conservation Service.

"If landowners will call or write my office, I can place orders for the four plants listed above for \$10 per 100 through the Texas Forest Department," said Richard DeArment, extension biologist at Wheeler.

"These plants should be planted during their dormant period which extends into March and they should be watered 4. Any team wanting to enter regularly for two years," De-Arment continued. 826-5676, Kay Gatlin, 323-6062

Every farm has tracts of land not used for any major purpose such as the edges of playa lakes, drainage ditches, fence rows, and tree rows. These areas could be turned into a wildlife oasis this

Every wise person provides for the future. Whether we have little or much, we like to lay aside savings for the future, preferably at interest.

Whatever our investments may be, we are faced with the fact "You can't take it with you." As the Bible says, "We brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out" (1 Timothy 6:7). This is true, whether we are rich or poor.



STATEMENT OF INTENT

Pursuant to TEX. Rev. Civ. STAT. ANN. art. 1446c § 43 (1975), High Plains Natural Gas Company hereby gives notice of the Company's intention to raise the burner-tip rates for all customers within the city limits of Canadian and Mobeetie and to the customers of the unincorporated areas adjacent to such cities, effective noon, February 1, 1978 to:

Monthly Use-0-499 MCF -97.69c plus average monthly cost of gas, 499-1200 MCF-92.69c plus average monthly cost of gas, 1200 MCF and Over-87.69c plus average monthly cost of gas

Assuming our average cost of gas during 1978 will be 85c per MCF, the annualized revenues in the City of Canadian would increase from 259,000 to 435,000 and the City of Mobeetie from \$26,000 to \$43,000. All customers in the City of Mobeetie would be affected; all customers in Canadian except the City Power Plant would be affected. These new rates will yeild an 8% return on the 60/40 fair value composition of our distribution plant.

Mites-Small Grain Pests Winter grain mites and brown enlarging the affected area and wheat mites are the two mites most commonly found on wheat and other small grains. These mites cause heaviest damage in fields that have been planted to small grains year after year. The winter grain mite cuases damage in Central Texas, North Central Texas and the Texas Rolling Plains each year. Damaging populations of brown wheat mites occure only in years when dry conditions prevail for extended periods in the Texas Rolling and High Plains. The feeding of both mites cuase the small grain field to first take on a silvery gray appear-

ance. The winter grain mite then causes the tips of the leaves to turn brown and the plants become stunted. The Brown wheat mite cuases a yellow or bronzing of plants when the field is viewed from a distance. grain mites are about 1/25 inch long and have four pair of

Winter grain mites have two distinct generations; the first generation hatches around November 1. The second generation; the first generation hatches around November 1. The second generation develops in early January. These mites feed on the leaves at night or on cloudy days. On bright days the mites can be found on the soil at the base of the plants. Winter grain mites disappear from the field as warmer weather sets in during April.

Brown wheat mites produce several generations each year. Eggs will hatch in 6 to 7 days and mites will mature to adults in about 10 days. Over a 23 day period adult brown wheat mites will deposit 70 to 90 eggs. Heaviest brown wheat mite infestations occur in February and March during years when rainfall is limited. Heavy rainfall will greatly limit brown wheat mite infestations and irrigation will usually lower populations.

Small grain fields should be checked at regular intervals during the growing season for greenbugs. When greenbug populations are increasing, fields should be inspected at least once each week. During favorable weather conditions greenbugs can increase at a rapid rate.

reddish-orange legs. There may also be a raddish-orange spot on the back. The brown wheat mite adults have metallic dark brown rounded bodies and are about the size of a period in newsprint. Their front legs are much longer than the other three pair and are pale yellow.

Rotation of small grains with warm season crops will reduce populations of both mites and is one of the most effective control measures. Pesticides for control of winter grain mites should be applied when large numbers of mites are present and plants begin to show a silvery gray appearance and the tips of leaves begin to turn brown. Chemical control of brown wheat mites has not proven to be practical because increased yields have not resulted where these control measures were applied. Information on pesticides used to control measures were applied. Dr. George Teetes has reported resistance of greenbugs to organophosphorous insecticides in several counties in the High Plains. If difficulty in control is experienced, check on application and weather before declaring resistance.

Poor control can be expected from insecticides applied when the temeprature is below 50 degrees F.

Greenbugs can reproduce and develop at temperatures from 40 degrees to 100 degrees F., but reproduce most rapidly between 70-75 degrees F. When the temperature goes as low as 5 degrees F. or as high as 107 degrees F., most may be killed. Yet the Biotype C can withstand higher and lower temperatures than previously thought possible for greenbugs.

There are several beneficial insects that feed on greenbugs such as a small wasp Lysiphlebus testaceipes, lady beetles, lacewing, damsel bugs, syrphid fly larvae and several species of spiders. The temperature has to be above 65 degrees before you get a very rapid reduction in the greenbug population.

Management Cuts Wind Erosion

For most of the Texas Panhandle this has been a poor fall for wheat pasture. Both dryland and irrigated wheat appears to be behind in its normal growth. Scribner and other relatives and However, many fields are being grazed at the same concentration as in good years. This can lead to severe problems.

To begin with, the roots of following several days of treat- wheat grow in about the same proportion as the tops. If the tops are short, the roots will shallow. Heavy grazing of wheat can decrease grain yeilds very greatly, and the shallow root growth can hamper the water uptake of the plants.

Another problem that will be showing up on these areas for the next few months is wind erosion. Wheat is one of the best wind erosion protection crops known, if properly grazed and adequate height is maintained. But, when wheat is grazed heavily it can't hold the soil in place and the resulting sandstorms rob the land of tons of valuable topsoil. It is not unusual for an unprotected feild to lose fifteen to twenty tons of soil each year from wind erosion.

Wheat should not be grazed until it begins to stool and grazed to a minimum inches. This will adequately protect the land from wind erosion, and grain yeilds will not be affected.
