

Old Mobeetie Hoedown Is Set For Sat., June 28

The Old Mobeetie Texas Association is finalizing the plans for the Old Town Hoedown to be held on Saturday, June 28th on the grounds of the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum. The activities will begin at 3:00 p.m. with a chuckwagon supper being served at 6:00 p.m. and lots of fun in between.

This year's event is packed with historical performances. The Panther City Regulators of Dallas, Texas will be making their first appearance at the festival. This group will entertain guests with Old West shootouts and western skits. The Panther City Regulators are dedicated to providing education and entertainment of the west in the late 1800's. The troupe prides itself on historically correct costumes, weapons, customs, and situations in their presenta-

The leader of the group is Tom Wiederhold, president of the organization. From his love of history and his desire to bring it to life through acting, Tom started the Panther City Regulators in 2004. Through the reenactments and living history, Tom and his group of fellow reenactors have been able to bring entertainment and education to young and old alike. Besides serving as President of the Panther City Regulators, Tom is also President of the North Fort Worth Historical Society, the Fort Worth Police Officers Historical Association, and has just been elected Texas State Director of RGA. This group has won awards in competitions at the Fort Worth Stockyards; Llano, Texas; Yuma, Arizona; Grapeland, Texas; Wichita, Kansas; Meade, Kansas and Tioga, Texas. Colonel Jimmy Northcutt leads this fearless reenactment and living history group. The Regiment is dedicated to accurately portraying the 1870's Indian Wars era, specifically the period that the U.S. Army operated in and around the Texas Panhandling. During the Red River War of 1874-1875, as many as 20 engagements between the U.S. Army and the Southern Plains Indians took place across the Texas Panhandle region. 

Nind Power to Help West Texas

power to desalinate brackish groundwater in West Texas will get a jump-start thanks to a \$500,000 grant from the Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA).

The project holds great promise for rural communities in West Texas and the Panhandle needing to develop new sources of drinking water, said Charles S. (Charlie)Stone, ORCA executive director.

"This project could be a roadmap for how our rural communities can use wind power to help meet the future water needs" Stone said.

The project would be the first in the U.S. to use wind power to desalinate drinking water for an inland municipality, as opposed to a town located of a coastline.

Seminole's proposal to ORCA calls for groundwater to be pumped from the deep, brackish Santa Rosa Aquifer. A 50-kilowatt wind turbine will help power a reverse osmosis plant that will make the water drinkable for the town's drinking water for the city.

"This project represents an in-

A pilot project utilizing wind meet basic human needs, such as clean, reliable sources of drinking water." Said Dr. Wallace Klussmann, chairman of ORCA's governing board.

Seminole, like many West Texas towns, draws its drinking water from the Ogallala Aquifer, which is rapidly being depleted. The town has not access to surface water supplies.

And the cost of electricity to operate a reverse osmosis plant large enough to meet the town's water needs was cost prohibitive. Tech's Wind Science and Engineering Research Center.

"Seminole can make this project affordable by tapping into the strong wind power resources in West Texas," Chapman said. With this ORCA grant, we can get this pilot project underway."

> In addition to the ORCA grant, the project calls for Seminole to contribute \$400,000 in cash, land and in-kink services. Texas Tech will contribute \$25,000 in data collection and analysis and Entergrity Wind Systems will donate for two years a wind turbine valued at \$150,000. After two years, Entergrity likely would lease the turbine to Seminole, Chapman said.

> "We are grateful to ORCA for the leadership on addressing the critical water needs of Seminole and the region," said Seminole Mayor Mike Carter.

Seminole also has submitted to the Texas Water Development Board a request for additional

funds for this project. The ORCA funds for the twoyear project recently were approved by ORCA's state review committee, a group of 12 local elected officials who are appointed by the Governor to approve grants awarded from community development block grant

"Having ORCA and Texas Tech work together assures the chances this innovative project will succeed and set a precedent other communities can follow," said Wants herd, Mayor, City of Wheeler, a member of ORCA. "We want Texas to be on the leading edge in using technology for community improvement.

Stone said many rural communities have benefited economically in terms of jobs, tax revenues and landowner royalties from the large wind farms in West Texas and the Panhandle that now produce about 4,500 megawatts of electricity, or about three percent of the state's electricity.

"The potential now exists for town such as Seminole and even rural school district to cut their energy costs by putting up their own wind power projects," stone

ORCA's governing body in 2007 approved allocating \$500,000 on Community Development Block Grant funds for a tion Pilot Program. Another \$500.000 for the program has been allocate for fiscal 2009.

As the state agency dedicated solely to rural Texas, ORCA makes the broad resources of state government more assessable to rural communities. ORCA was crated by the 77th Legislature to ensure a continuing focus on rural issues, monitor government


