The Wheeler Mustangs hosted the Dalhart Wolves last Friday night at Nicholson Field. The Wolves would be the first of two 3A teams the Mustangs would tackle this year. Dalhart would enter the game winless at 0-3, while the Mustangs records is 1-2.

For the first three quarters, the Wheeler Mustangs would totally dominate the game, playing near perfect football. But a couple of misques would allow Dalhart to get back in the game in the 4th quarter and eventually win a close football game 20-19.

The Mustangs offense would reach paydirt first as Justin Chapman would keep around left end for a 4 yard TD. Joe Salas' kick would split the uprights and give the Mustangs a 7-0 lead with 18 seconds left in the 1st guarter the Mustangs would up their lead late in the 2nd quarter when Justin Chapman connects with Caleb Finsterwald for a 42 yd TD pass. The extra point was blocked and the Mustangs would lead 13-0 with 1:26 left in the 2nd quarter.

The Mustang defense played a great 1st half as they limited the Wolves to two first downs on 17 plays. Those 17 plays would garner the Wolves only 20 yards rushing on 12 plays, while going 0-5 in the passing department. The defense would also force 2 fumbles, one on the Wolves 29 yard line, which would lead to a Mustang touchdown.

The 2nd half would start the same way the 1st half ended as the Mustangs would take the kickoff and drive 80 yards for a touchdown as Finsterwald would bust loose over left side and ramble 56 yards to paydirt. The Mustangs try for two would come up short uping the lead to 19-0. The Mustang defense would continue to dominate, limiting the Wolves offense to only 1 first down in the third quarter. The 4th quarter would prove costly to the Mustangs, as they would turn the ball over on their own 40 and 10 vardlines, which would lead to Dalharts's 2nd and 3rd touchdowns. After the 3rd TD, the Wolves would be successful on a two point conversion to take the lead 20-19. The Mustangs would stage a comeback, but would fall short.



I made a cake for the card game Monday night. And, I may never be able to make it again. I used the "Southern Cream Cheese Pound Cake" recipe in the Amarillo Daily News, but, I did not have enough granulated sugar and had to substitute powdered sugar.

-cwe-The recipe also called for sifted cake flour. I used regular cake flour and didn't sift. 2 tablespoons taken out of a cup of flour is equal to a cup

of sifted flour. -cwe-

The recipe is as follows: 3 cups sugar

3 sticks butter, softened-I used margarine.

1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese softened

1 tbs. vanilla extract

1 tbs. almond extract-I am not a fan of almond extract, so I left it out.

6 eggs 3 cups cake flour, sifted

Cream sugar, butter and cream cheese and beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, and flavoring. Sift cake flour and add to creamed mixture. Pour batter into greased and floured 10-inch Bundt cake pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes or until wooden pick inserted near center comes out clean. Cool in pan 10 minutes; remove from pan and let cool completely on a wire rack. Makes 15 servings.







Some of them came for adventure; some were hiding from the law; some were college professors; some couldn't read nor write. The majority wanted to bulild a new home in this raw Cheyenne-Arapaho Country and give their children better opportunities.

I've read so many stories praising the courage and efforts of adult pioneers but never a word about what good things the pioneer children did. Children can do a lot when their hearts are in it.

Several months ago this Newspaper contained my announcement as the Republican candidate for Wheeler County Attorney. That announcement included my commitment that, if elected, I would not conduct a private law practice while serving as Wheeler County Attorney. That commitment was made because the duty owed by an attorney to a private practice client sometimes conflicts with the duty which that attorney owes to the public while serving as County Attorney. In view of the fact that the public is paying for such extra time, in the form of an adequate salary, conscience dictated that, if I was elected, such extra time should be used for the benefit of the public in some manner. My solution for the use of such extra time for the benefit of the public is set forth below.

I hereby commit that, if elected Wheeler County Attorney, I will:

1. Devote whatever time is required to a diligent performance of all of the duties of that office.

2. Devote the extra time to furnishing FREE legal services to any Wheeler County resident whose economic circumstances make the employment of an attorney a financial hardship. By "free" is meant that I will not accept any compensation of any kind or nature whatsoever, and will decline any offer of future compensation of any kind or nature whatsoever, for any legal service rendered to any such person.

Performing such free legal services, while serving as County Attorney, would not give rise to conflicts of interest.

The announcement of my candidacy referred to above also included a statement to the effect that I was seeking the office of County Attorney for the purpose of doing good for the people of Wheeler County, as contrasted to doing well for myself. Every Wheeler County resident is invited to consider whether or not my commitment to render free legal services above set forth, (as contrasted to the present situation in which the extra time is being used for personal gain) supports my commitment to do good for other people.



I solicit the vote of every Wheeler County voter in the General Election on November 7, 2000. My election will permit me to be of service to others. I will sincerely appreciate each vote which I receive.



From The Minister's Desk:






