

## 1978 IT'S TIME FOR PAVING PROJECT

In Black Are The Streets Being Considered For Paving

CITY OF WHEELER, TEXAS



Wheeler's paving project has not been abandoned. You as citizens still have an opportunity to request the city council to consider the paving of your street. The time, however, is running short.

At the January 16 meeting of the City Council, the council will discuss the project & determine the streets to be paved. After this meeting, the engineers will be contacted for a cost estimate of the project. A date will be set and bond election will be called.

Paving is necessary in a number of residential areas. Mobeetie Street and the 200 block of West Eleventh are probably the worst streets in town after a rain; those streets have a major portion of the runoff in the south part of town. The 100 block of West Eleventh and the north end of Reynolds are presently paved, but refuse to stay repaired. The north end of Osage Street was

paved at one time, but the paving has completely deteriorated.

In 1969 the City of Wheeler completed the paving of 84 blocks. This was a major improvement for the City of Wheeler and improved the appearance of our town 100%. With the completion of this project, new locations for housing on pavement were made available.

At the present time, the number of building lots on paving is practically nil. To apply for a loan for a new home, a paving is almost mandatory.

The Texas Highway Department is going to begin a project to widen, curb and gutter U. S. 83 from 152 north to the city limits. This will add at least 5 blocks of curb and gutter and widen an existing paved street.

Notice: If you want the City Council to consider the paving of your street, contact the City Office before January 16.

### THREE ARRESTED IN BURGLARY AT FAR-TEX

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department was notified of a burglary at Far-Tex, Inc. Wednesday morning, December 28.

Entry into office by prying open a door on the North side of the building. All desk and inside doors along with file cabinets were ransacked and pried open.

Two subjects were tracked from the office at Far-Tex, Inc. to an abandoned vehicle (1968 Pontiac) on Highway 152 by officers. A traffic ticket issued in New Mexico to a Donald D. White led to the discovery of two males registered at the West Motel under the name of David White.

Two subjects arrested at Bus Station having just purchased bus tickets to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Arrested were: Donald David White a 27 year old white male from Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and Robert Edward Kirkland a 19 year old white male from Denison, Texas.

Nothing was taken in the burglary but several dollars worth of damage was done to the desks and file cabinets at Far-Tex Inc.

Investigation by Sheriff Doyle Ramsey and Deputy Art Taylor. Assisted by Kervin Roper of the D.A.'s Office and Texas Ranger Bill Baten of Pampa.

Arraigned before Justice of the Peace Charley Whiteley and bond set at 5,000.00. In the Wheeler County Jail awaiting action of the Grand Jury.

### Sheriff's Report for Dec.

Sheriff Doyle Ramsey reports 31 prisoners this month in the Wheeler County Jail, this brings the total from 1977 to 314.

Of those held this month 8 were Juveniles, 8 on D.W.I. charges, 5 on theft charges, 3 on public Intoxication charges, 3 on Possession of Marijuana charges, 2 on Burglary charges, and one fugitive from Michigan. One was booked as a sleeper only.

Sheriff Ramsey reports 6 felons being held in the Wheeler Jail at this time awaiting action by the courts. This includes 3 black males charged with burglary of Mahnken Drug in Shamrock, 2 WMs charged with Burglary of Far-Tex Feeders & 1 WM charged with Theft of an Auto from Robbie Robinson in Shamrock.

Other activities by members of the Sheriff's Department include investigation of a burglary at Far Tex Inc. Four traffic tickets were

issued, and several traffic accidents were investigated, and a Burglary investigated at Pete Burton Ford. To report an incident of any type in Wheeler call 826-3211 or 826-5211, in Shamrock call 256-2136.

In making the announcement, Dorman stated, "After being approached by a number of voters from precinct 2, I have decided to run for the office. I



## TASTY FISH DISHES

LUBBOCK—You probably noticed several frozen packages while taking the turkey out to thaw in December and more than likely, some of these were fish caught last summer or fall which should be cooked while the favor is still intact.

The key to maintaining quality during freezing of any game is an airtight package that keeps air out while keeping the moisture and flavor of the meat. Most frozen items packaged correctly will retain this quality for two or three months if stored at an even 0 degrees.

There are several thing that will help bring out the flavor in the fish cooked in a microwave oven whether frozen or fresh.

Allow four minutes per pound and cook the fish covered to hold in the steam and lessen the cooking time. Plastic wrap or wax paper may be used. Fish should be cooked only until it may be easily flaked with a fork and wait until you are planning to serve the fish before cooking as it

Fish may be cooked without the addition of fats and if browning is desired, use a browning skillet. Allow the fish to stand covered a couple of minutes and do not overcook. Overcooking will cause dry texture and strong favor.

### BAKED STUFFED WHOLE FISH

- 1 1/2 pounds of fish
- 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups bread cubes
- 1/4 cup boiling water
- 1/4 cup finely chopped celery
- 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 2 tablespoons minced onion paprika

Wash dressed whole fish and wipe dry with paper towel. Brush interior of fish with half of butter. Sprinkle with salt. Toss remaining ingredients together lightly for stuffing. Loosely fill cavity. Fasten with toothpicks. Place stuffed fish in suitable size baking dish. Sprinkle with paprika. Cook in microwave oven 6 1/2 to 7 1/2 minutes or until fish can be flaked with fork. Tips: several types of fish can be used with this recipe including; trout, bass, walleye, pike, strippers, and snapper.

### STRIPED BASS STUFFED WITH SHRIMP

- juice of 2 lemons
- 1 (5 pound) striped bass
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 cup finely chopped onions
- 1 mashed clove garlic
- 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup beef broth
- 1/2 cup fresh chopped shrimp
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh mushrooms
- 3 beaten egg yolks
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon horseradish mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- dash cayenne
- 8 thin slices larding pork
- 1/2 cup melted sweet butter

Squeeze juice of lemons over bass. Marinate 1 hour. Melt butter in 9 1/2 inch browning skillet. Saute' onions and garlic in microwave oven 3 minutes. Stir in flour. Cook 1 minute and pour in beef broth. Cook 1 minute and remove from oven. Cool. Blend in shrimp, mushrooms, egg yolks, parsley, mustard, salt, pepper, and cayenne. Fill bass cavity with stuffing. Seal with toothpicks. Place half of pork slices in bottom of 2 quart utility dish. Arrange bass on pork. Top with remaining slices of pork. Cook in microwave oven 16 to 18 minutes. Turn dish every 4 minutes, basting with natural juices. Fish should be fork tender. Pour hot melted butter over bass.



332-acre park for day-use with several camp w/shade shelters along with hiking trails.

A drive to the top of scenic mountain in the park will provide a panoramic view of the surrounding area. The "big spring" nearby provided a watering place for herds of buffalo, antelope and wild horses and it was used extensively as a campsite for early Indians, explorers and settlers.

Several state parks have facilities available by reservation such as Abilene State Recreation Area, 16 miles southwest of Abilene, which has eight screened-in areas and two group buildings. The applicant must furnish information including the park chosen, type of facility, date of arrival and departure, number of persons planning to occupy the facility, and a check or money order to cover the first day user fee. Those not drawn on Jan. 10 during the scheduled reservation drawings will be refunded.

Most of the state parks in Texas have an entrance fee per vehicle allowing the use of park facilities for 24 hours. If a planned trip through several state parks is planned, the annual permit would be the best buy.

Winter camping is fun and arks personnel make daily checks on campers in case of bad weather or vehicle trouble. Obtaining the extended weather forecasts prior to going camping is advised.

A few state parks offer only day-use facilities such as Caprock Canyons State Park near Silverton. Caprock Canyons offers the angler a chance to fish in a clear, blue lake stocked with crappie, bass and catfish. This park is the most recently purchased area that will be developed for the general public similar to Palo Duro State Park, however, the completion of the road system and overnight camping units are not expected to be finished until the early 1980's.

Dalhart—Fishing for trout in Texas can vary from streams fed by large reservoirs and cold springs in central Texas to lake fishing in the Panhandle and winter is an ideal time to give these rainbows a try.

Rainbow trout are a cold-water fish and to furnish the winter-time angler with a chance at catching a trout, 4,000 rainbows were transported from Arkansas hatchery and stocked in Rita Blanca Lake near Dalhart this month," said Joe Kraai, fishery biologist.

"These catchable-size trout were in the eight-to-nine inch class and are big enough to bite the variety of baits used by Panhandle fishermen including salmon eggs, corn and worms," Kraai continued.

All trout fishing in Texas is done on a "put-and-take" basis. Since the water temperatures of most Texas lakes and streams reach into the 90's by mid-summer, trout usually do not over-summer or survive from one winter to the next. The best temperatures for trout are below 50 degrees F. and trout are consistently caught in 30-degree water.

Trout can normally be found in a variety of habitats, but most will be caught along rocky points, in the edge of riffles, near margins of deep pools and along steep banks.

Trout are wary, but a correct presentation of artificial or natural bait on a light line with just enough weight to hold or move the bait on or near the bottom should be ample cause for a strike.

Artificial lure and fly fishermen can depend on wet and dry flies, streamers, nymphs, and small spinners to produce trout. The lure or fly can be cast upstream so it will float downstream and pass nearly likely trout habitat.

The creel limit for trout is five (5) per day and ten (10) in possession. There is no trout size limit nor any special trout stamp required for the angler.

Texas fishing regulations require a fishing license for all persons between the ages of 17 and 65, except for a person fishing in the county of his residence with trot line, throw line, or ordinary pole and line, having no reel or winding device attached.

After a successful trout fishing trip, a trout needs only to be gutted, gilled and washed to be ready for the frying pan. Trout may be salted or rolled in meal or flour for pan frying, or sauteed in butter over low heat.

The record Texas rainbow trout weighted four pounds and twelve ounces and was caught on the Gaudalup river in 1968 but, there are several trout fishermen who have lost fish in this same weight category.

Trout fishermen can obtain more information by contacting the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department office in their area or near trout fishing spots.
